

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



COLLEGE STATION -Dr. Daniel C. Pfannstiel, who has served as director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service since 1976, will leave his administrative post Sept. 1 to join Texas A & M University's Department of Agricultural Education, where he will head a new doctoral program.

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TAEX, part of the Texas A & M University System, is headquartered on the Texas A & M University campus, and Dr. Pfannstiel has long had close ties with the university's agricultural education program.

His departure from the TAEX directorship was announced by Dr. Perry Adkisson, deputy chancellor for agriculture for the Texas A & M University System. 


