## Manslaughter charges filed on Slaton woman

Involuntary manslaughter charges have been filed against Amanda Viola Lowe of Slaton in connection with the death of Charles A. Elmore, who was discovered by a passerby early in the morning March 31, in a ditch on a dirt road just east of Southland.

Following the report to the Garza County Sheriff's office, officers and Justice of the Peace Zora Robinson went to the scene to investigate. The victim had apparently been run over by a car.

Amanda Viola Lowe was picked up in Slaton, brought to Post and charged with involuntary manslaughter. She gave a statement and was released on a \$10,000 bail bond, according to

Sheriff Jim Pippin.

The body was taken to Lubbock for an autopsy, but reports have not been released and the case is still under investigation by the Garza County Sheriff's department.

Funeral services for Elmore were held Friday, April 2 at 2 p.m. in Englands Chapel in Slaton. Burial was in Englewood Cemetery.

Survivors include his mother Docia Whitehill of

Slaton; his father, Henry L. Elmore of Slaton; two brothers, Billy Wayne and Tommy both of Slaton; three sisters, Ruby Parrish of Post, Betty Nelson of Slaton and Linda Arnold of Dublin, Texas.

Tony Mason, one of the nation's most successful football coaches, will speak at the Post Antelope Booster Club Sports Banquet, next Thursday night, April 15, at 7:30 p.m. Tickets for the event, to be catered by Jackson's Cafeteria, cost \$7.50 and are available from any Booster Club member.

After coaching at two Ohio high schools for ten years, with seven undefeated seasons, Tony Mason went to the University of Michigan as an offensive backfield coach for five years. After four more years at Purdue University as defensive line coach, he took his first college head coaching job, turning the University of Cincinnati Bearcat football fortunes around. His first season at Cincinnati, the team had a 4-7 record, but his 1976 team won 9 of 11 games.

His next coaching stop was at the University of Arizona, where again he took a declining program,

(5-7 in 1977), and four years later took his team to its first bowl game in a decade, losing 16-10 to Pittsburgh in

the Fiesta Bowl.

Tony Mason is married to one of the top national amateur women tennis

players, his wife Carolyn, and they have a daughter, Carey.

The banquet, which will be held in the Community Center a week from tonight, will honor Post's Varsity and Junior Varsity athletes. The community is urged to purchase tickets and come out to honor Post's best, and to hear a truly inspirational speaker.

A violent dust storm blew into town Friday, April 2, and before the dust had really cleared, the results of the Saturday election indicated a real flurry of interest in several races that appeared ho-hum before the polls opened.

418 votes were cast in the School Board election in which Dr. Charles McCook,

and Jack Lott, incumbents, faced different degrees of opposition from candidates whose names were not on the original ballots. Jack Lott garnered 244 votes, to keep his seat on the board, Place 3, but Mike Flanigan, a write-in candidate, polled 147 votes in the same race. Four candidates split a total of four votes in the same

race: John Valdez, Bill Shumard, David Iles, and perennial candidate Wayne Whitten.

Mike Flanigan showed up in the totals for Position 1 as well, in which Dr. Charles McCook was the incumbent. The margin of victory was far greater however, as Dr. McCook tallied 363 votes, to 10 for Mike Flanigan, with seven for Dr. William C. Wilson, 2 for Dwayne Capps, 2 for Johnnie Norman, and 1 each for Noel White, Royce Hart, Wanda Mitchell, and Johnny Kemp.

Johnny Kemp got an additional vote in the Place 2 election, but it was not enough to catch pharmacist Don Payne with 324 votes, or Tom Evans, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene, who had 81 votes.

In the city elections four candidates ran for three places on the Council. City Secretary Wanda Wilkerson reported that Jim Jackson (248 votes), and Jack Alexander, (260 votes) kept their places on the Council, and will be joined by A. C. Cash, who received 220 votes. Ronald G. Ammons, the fourth candidate in the race, received 164 votes, but no place on the Council.

380 people voted in the uncontested Hospital Board race, with new board members David Tyler (356 votes) and Ignacio Varela (258 votes) winning in a race that also included 25 write-in votes.

## Bounties placed on city canines

The Post City Council and joint County Commissioners meeting was held Monday night with a moderately heavy agenda.

A dog bounty will go into effect April 15, paying \$3 for small dogs (up to ten pounds), \$6 for dogs between 10 and 20 pounds, and \$10 for dogs weighing over 20 pounds. The dogs must be taken to the pound at 11 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Glen Barley asked for a 120 day delay in action on a new Southwestern Public Service rate increase, and his request was granted. Charles Hardin, immediate past president of the Cham-

ber of Commerce, requested that the 4 percent motel room occupancy tax be designated for the Diamond Jubilee, July 2, 3, and 4, and his request was granted.

John Ellis requested a permit for a TV repair shop at 308 North Avenue O, and the request was approved, the business to be known as Ellis Electronics.

The Council asked Harvey Morton, city attorney, to write a resolution on behalf of the city-county, asking the Highway Department to install a red light at Highway 84 and 3rd Street, adjacent to the Park.

The matter of purchasing

a roller-paving machine was tabled until the May 3 meeting of the Council. Routine approval for the payment of bills was given and votes from the April 3 City-County elections were canvassed, and the election

## Scanning Social Security

By JIM LATIMER

A 1980 change in the Social Security disability Insurance program set a new maximum family benefit. The change was prompted by concern that prior law encouraged some people who were seriously disabled but could continue to work to stop working and discouraged persons already on the disability rolls from returning to work.

Moreover, regardless of the effect of the law on current or potential beneficiaries, there was concern about the appropriateness of a provision that enabled disabled workers to receive more in monthly payments than they realized while still employed. According to estimates by the Social Security Administration, prior law permitted the average family of a disabled worker to receive benefits that replaced about half of his or her predisability net earnings. At the same time, however, about six percent of disabled workers coming onto the rolls and their families were eligible for monthly payments that exceeded the worker's predisability net earnings.

A comparison with the pattern among private insurers shows that they generally limit the benefits they pay to no more than two-thirds of their beneficiaries' gross earnings. The rationale for this limitation is to prevent families from being as well off, or better off, financially than when the worker was employed and thus to discourage beneficiaries from remaining on the rolls even when they were able to return to work.

Under the new law, Social Security disability benefits for a family are limited to 85 percent of the worker's predisability average earnings (but no less than 100 percent of the basic benefit) or to 150 percent of the worker's basic benefit whichever is lower.

## What's Happening in Home Economics

Last week, on March 30, eight Garza County Extension Homemakers and I attended the District Meeting of the Texas Extension Homemakers Association. Viva Davis, Annie L. Francis, Linda Malouf, Sue Maxey, Emma Mueller, Jewell Parrish, Inez Ritchie and Hooter Terry represented local extension homemakers at the meeting in Snyder.

The annual meeting is held to allow extension homemakers to share ideas between counties. Also, they attend workshop sessions to receive information on current topics of interest.

The main workshops were on Family Life - Stress Throughout the Adult Years; and Health - Texans War on Drugs. Both workshops were presented by interesting and very knowledgeable speakers. Dr. Joe Reaves, Professor at Western Texas College in Snyder presented the Family Like program; while Marilyn Golightly and Steve Warren presented the Health Program.

During the business session, we were inspired by two additional speakers. Billies McCraw, President of the Texas Extension Homemakers Association, challenged club members to work to improve their local clubs. Also, Dr. Jennie C. Kitching, Assistant Director for Home Economics with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, offered ideas to assist clubs with monthly programs.

As the county group returned home, I think everyone agreed the day was interesting and educational. It was a day well spent.

Getting credit and keeping it is challenging, but possible. Building a credit record poses special problems for women and teens. There are several ways to establish credit in your own name. Credit is important in today's credit-oriented economy, for acquiring "luxuries" in most cases and even for necessities in some cases. To establish credit in your own name, first open checking and savings accounts at a local bank. This will set up your financial identity. It also may provide you with access to such sources of credit as bank credit cards and personal loans. Next, apply for a "small" personal loan — use your savings account as "security." It may be easier to obtain than other additional sources of credit because it is secured by your savings account. After you pay off the loan, you can use this credit history to qualify for

additional sources of credit. Another way to establish credit is to apply at local retail stores for small amounts of installment credit. Once you've paid off the charge account, again, you can use that history to obtain additional credit.

Now let's talk about keeping credit. Remember two things in building and keeping a credit record. First, be extra careful about making payments on time, since doing so will

help you get credit and keep it.

Second, don't abuse credit. Credit improperly handled can cause you more problems than not having it.

Finally, you have the right to know what your credit record is. That was always true. Prior to the enactment of the federal Fair Credit Reporting Act in 1970, credit records were rather mysterious things. Credit reporting agencies refused to reveal the contents of their records to consumers, and there was no requirement that erroneous reports be corrected. The Fair Credit Reporting Act represents an attempt to solve these problems and others connected with the business of maintaining credit records.

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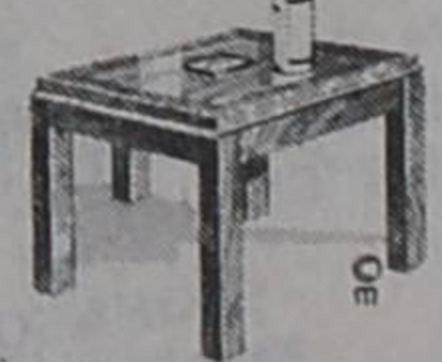
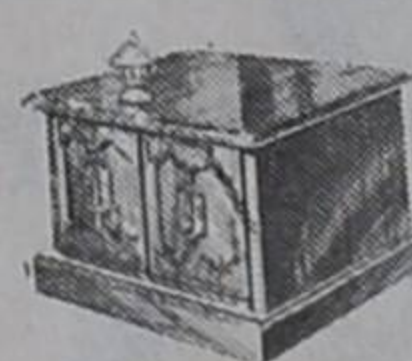

Supplementary materials traveling with the exhibition include a catalog written by British art historian Christopher Wright.

USDA said 35.4 percent of upland cotton acreage base has been signed to participate in acreage reduction program as of March 26. Producers must sign up by April 16 to be eligible, but may withdraw later, the National Cotton Council reports.

**Loan Cotton Decreases**  
The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that 1981-82 crop cotton under CCC loan decreased by a net of 20,782 bales during the week ended March 24. While new entries totaled 79,960, loans were repaid on 100,742 bales. The latest transactions left loans outstanding on 5,076,769 bales. In addition, 122,836 bales of 1980 crop cotton remained under the loan after repayments on 1,229.

**Export Shipments Continue**  
Cotton export shipments for the week ended March 25 totaled 150,800 running bales to bring total commitments to 6,323,400 bales, compared with 5,620,500 a year ago. New sales of 48,000 bales for the 1982-83 marketing year were 9,300 bales.

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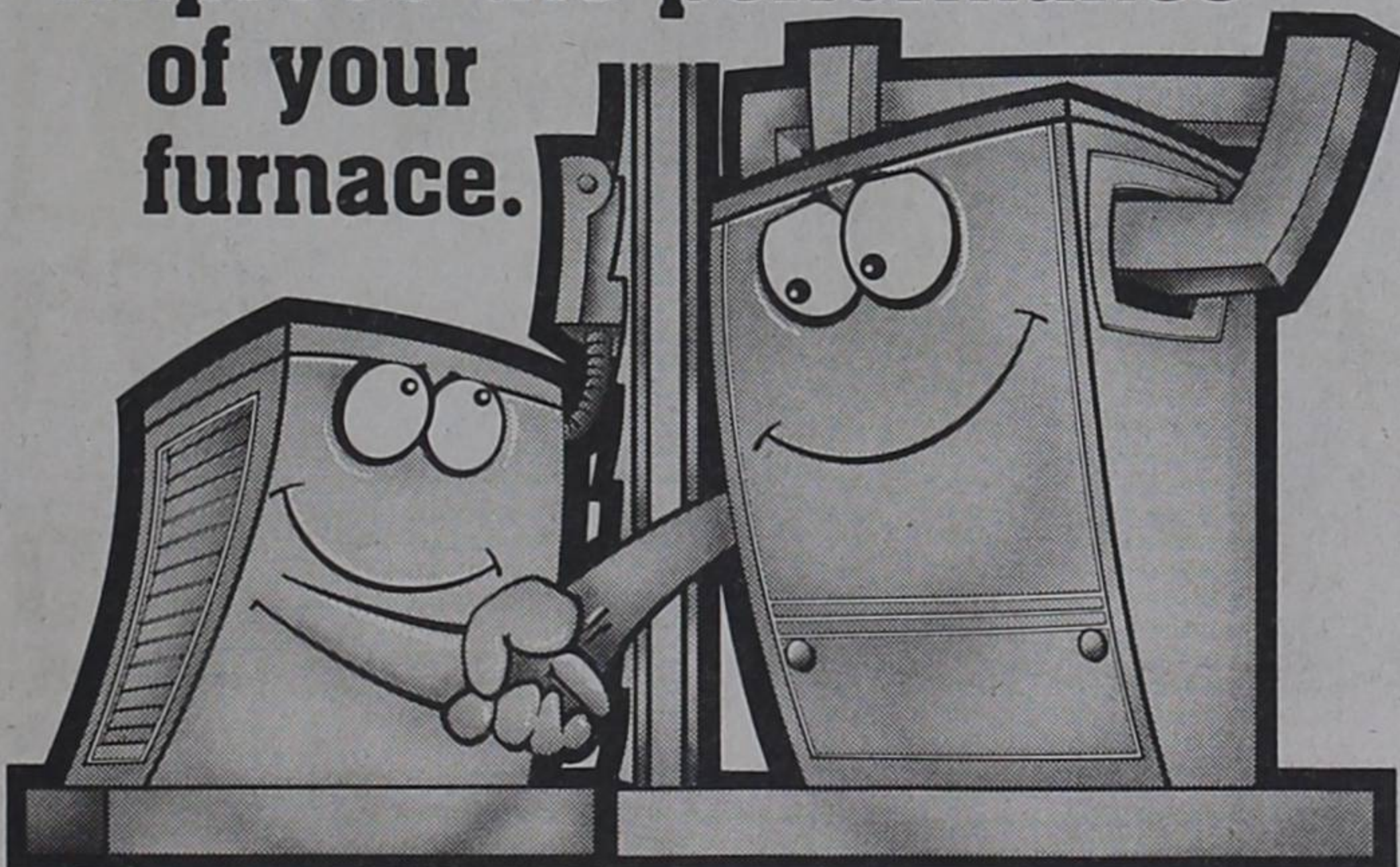
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# Antelope relays are best ever
