Fire Department receives new trucks

Bobby Terry and Larry Waldrip of the Post Volunteer Fire Department, will leave Post Sunday to fly to Tipton, Indiana, where they will take delivery on a new Pumper truck for the

Department. The truck, which was ordered nearly a year ago, has a hauling capacity of 1,000. In addition, it has the ability to pump 1,000 gallons per minute from a large enough

water main. To pump that much water, several hoses would be required to deliver water from the truck to the fire at that rate. The cost of the new truck is about \$75,000.

A second unit, a Chevrolet 1-ton truck, is currently being custom rigged in Lubbock to deliver "Jaws of Life" equipment to accident scenes. The "Jaws of Life" device will be used to rapidly pry wrecked vehicles open to permit faster removal of injured accident victims.

With the addition of the two new trucks, the local Fire Department will have four Pumpers, three "grass rigs," and the "Jaws of Life" vehicle in its fleet.

Post EMS technician to give demonstration

"Post EMS...respond to a motor vehicle accident on Highway 87 just north of the city limits." The high pitched siren and bright lights move to the scene of the accident to find four people seriously injured when their vehicle lost control and slid into the median. "Where does it hurt?" "He has a compound fracture of the tibia." "I can't find a pulse, start CPR." These are just a few of the familiar sights and sounds that the Emergency Medical Technician encounters in his work.

During the last few years, emergency medicine has emerged as an important part of the medical field. The EMT (Emergency Medical Technician) plays a major role in this complex, fascinating field of medicine. The EMT is trained to deal with life threatening and non-life threatening situations such as: Cardiac-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR), bandaging open wounds, splinting fractures, etc. In addition, the EMT learns how to deal with specific medical emergencies diabetic problems, drug overdose and heart problems, to name a few. The EMT is taught that stabilization of victims is a critical aspect of good patient care. The days of the "scoop and haul ambulance" are far behind us.

Since mid-March of this year, approximately 11 students have embarked on the journey to complete their EMT certification. The students under the instruction of Tom Nakagawa, spend

approximately 110 hours in the classroom and 40 hours within various hospitals experiencing "hands on" practice, dealing with patients. In addition, the students must complete five emergency ambulance runs with a certified EMS crew. The training is extensive and thorough.

Saturday, May 15, is a special day for the EMT

students. The students will have the opportunity to perform extrication (removal of patients from difficult situations, primarily autos). With the use of the live "victims", accident type situations will be simulated to give the students a chance to utilize all their skills and classroom knowledge. Governor, Judge sign proclamations

Governor Bill Clements and County Judge Giles Dalby have signed proclamations declaring this week as Soil Stewardship Week in Texas and Garza County.

The governor in his proclamation points out that "the soil and water resources of Texas are God given resources and are of basic importance to the welfare of all the citizens of the state.

"Soil and water conservation districts provide a practical and democratic organization through which land owners are taking the initiative to conserve and make the proper use of

these resources.

"Soil and water conservation districts are committed to improving our state through the wise use and development of our soil and water resources and are sponsoring Soil Stewardship Week," the governor added.

Judge Dalby declared that the well being of each individual depends upon the production of ample supplies of food, fiber and other products of the soil; and the quality and quantity of these products depend upon the conservation, wise and proper management of the soil and water resources.

So easy to follow--so easy to share.*

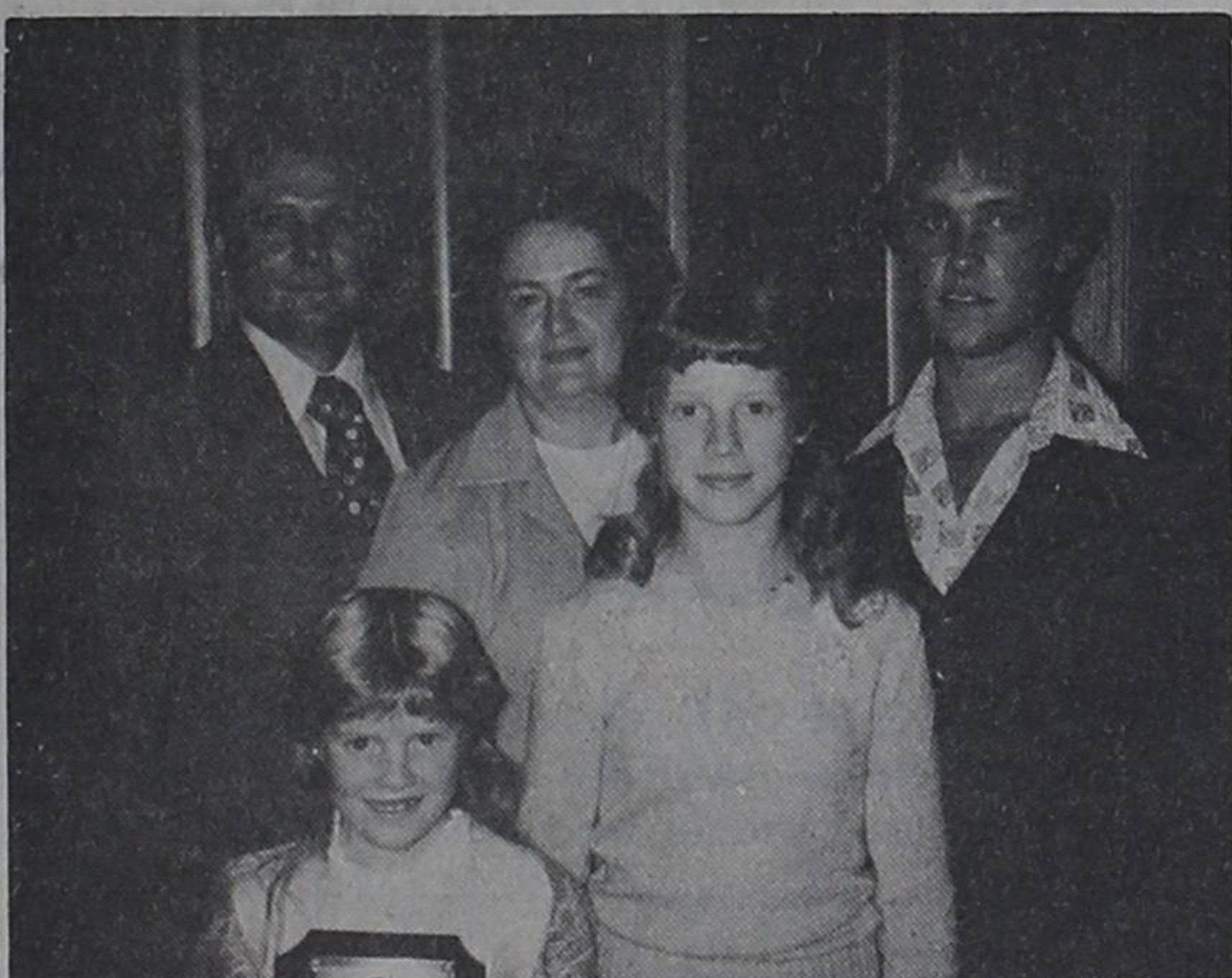
*Is preserving land critical, I'm tempted to ask,

Then the answer . . . heard by my ancestors and brothers,*

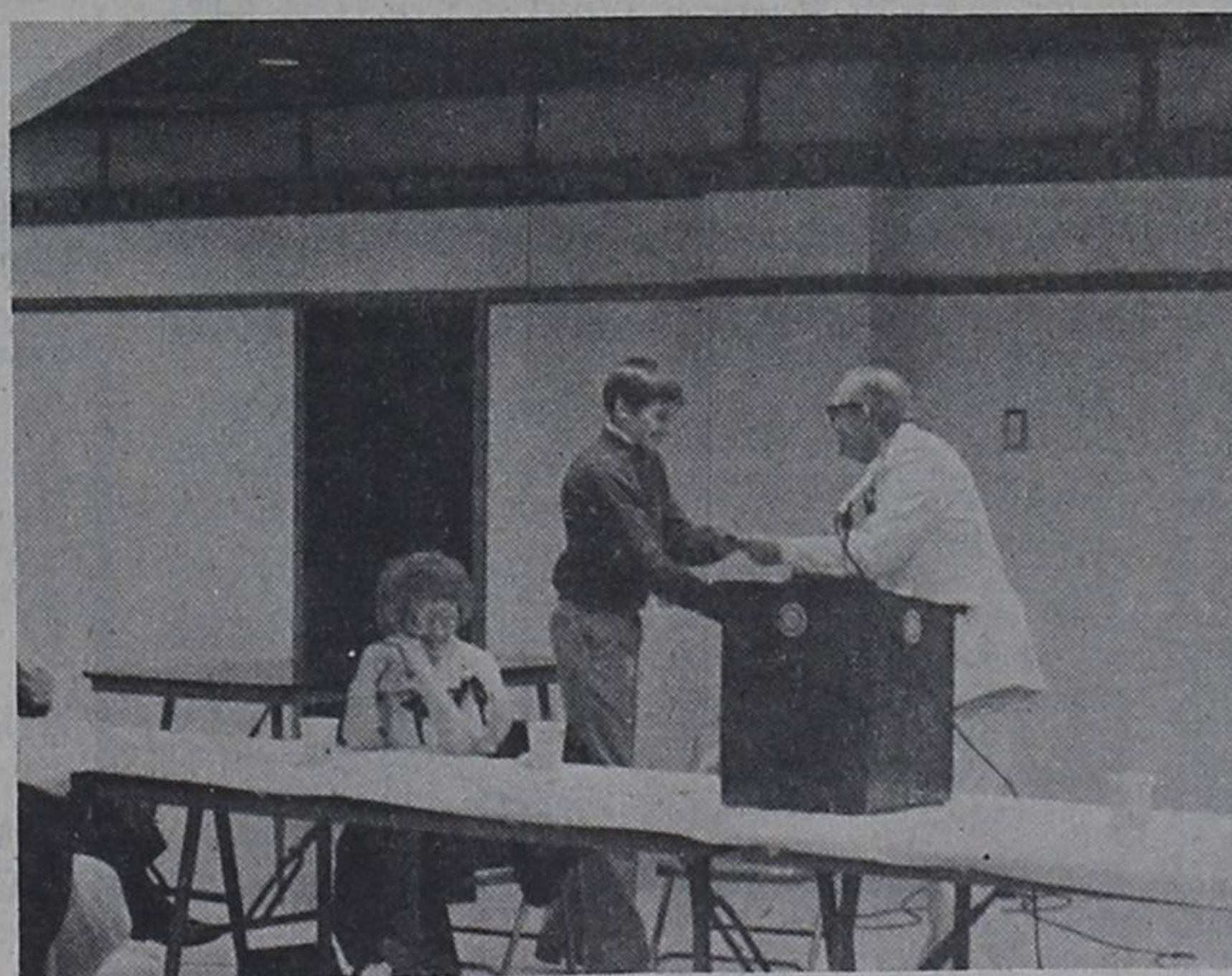
"It's a time for tenacity; consider it well."

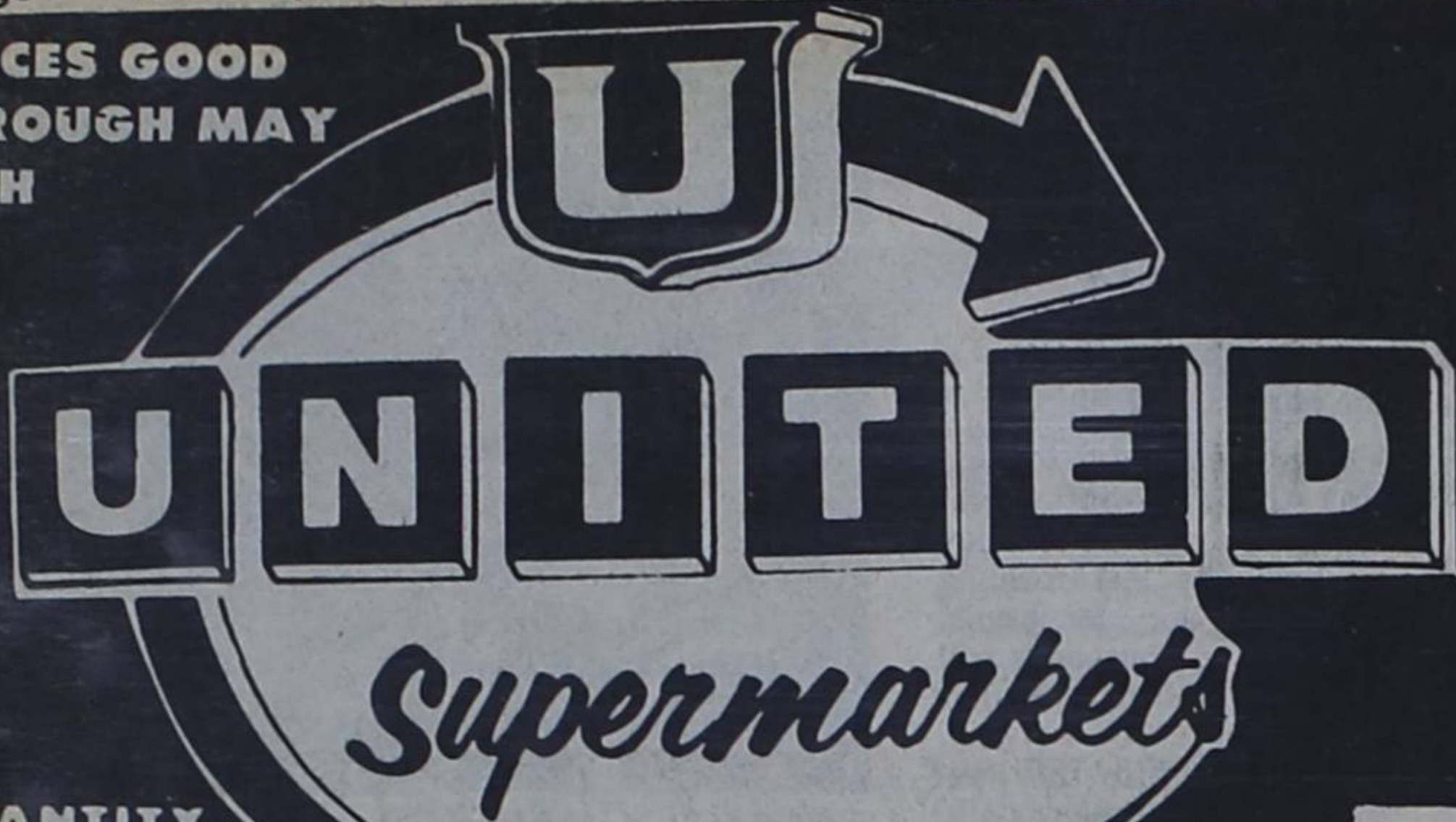



Phillip K. Jordan is not my real name. What difference does a name make? Many of the current popular authors are signing various names to their books. One male author of "romantic novels" uses a woman's name deliberately to persuade women buyers of his books that he "understands the way a woman feels."

Take the case of Philippa Carr, who is also Victoria Holt. It says so on the cover of "The Adulteress," one of the new books on the shelves of your Public Library. It's a story of menace, manipulation, malice, men and mistresses. It is written about the moors of mid 18th-century England, and if I had written it, I might have changed my name too.

The name of Father Andrew Greeley has taken on new importance recently. He publicly condemned his bishop, has been described as "one of the ten most influential Christian thinkers in the world," and Americans remember him as a commentator during Pope John Paul II's tour of the United States. He wrote "The Cardinal Sins," a best-seller. Now he has written "Thy Brother's Wife." About a priest, and a senator, two brothers who live the same woman, each in his own way. Let Nelson DeMille describe the impact of this book: "Thirty years ago, a priest would have been excommunicated for writing such a book. Three hundred years ago, he would have been burned at the stake. Don't look for this book on the shelves at the library: Philip K. Jordan has checked it out."

George Steinbrenner. Think Pinstribes, megabucks, Reggie. Think genius, bully, winner, generous millionaire, and convicted felon. Think Yankees. Some of his associates claim that Steinbrenner does not have a single friend. Certainly Dick Schaap, who wrote the unauthorized biography, called "Steinbrenner" is not a friend. The book is not dull. DETECTING BABY'S VISION PROBLEM

There isn't much a baby can see clearly when he's first born. He doesn't have the ability yet to focus quickly or accurately. It takes a while before he learns how to use both eyes to see well. In the beginning each eye acts independently of the other.

As time goes on, if baby still doesn't seem to be seeing well, he should have an eye examination. There are certain telltale signs a parent can watch for. Does your child find it difficult to pick up small objects? When he reaches for a toy, does he miss it completely? And when he starts to walk and hustle around the house, do you often seek him stumbling over things that he should have seen and avoided?

There are other signs to look for. Check to see if he is using both eyes to focus on an object. If he tilts his head to look at something or squints or closes one eye to look closely at something, there may be a vision problem. An eye examination is the only way you can be sure.
