

Applicants wanted for heritage program

AUSTIN - "This year we're hoping to surpass the 1,500 mark in the total number of Texas properties registered in our Family Land Heritage Program," Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said recently.

"And we certainly hope individuals interested in history or agriculture in Garza County will help us by bringing as many qualified applicants into the program as possible."

"Ted L. Aten, Garza County Historical Commission chairperson and Garza County Judge Giles Dalby, will be working with us on the program," Brown said. Since 1974, the program has honored 1,443 Texas properties.

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) is entering its eighth year in sponsoring the program which honors "those families that have persevered for a century or more in the cultivation and production of food and fiber," Brown said. "Undoubtedly, these families, with their unfaltering determination have been the backbone of Texas agriculture."

The registration period will extend from May 15 to

August 15. Those who qualify are honored in state cermonies and receive a certificate and a copy of the Family Land Heritage Registry. The publication has a brief history of each farm or ranch and includes old photographs of the families and homes.

Basic requirements include the following: Continuous agricultural production on the farm-ranch for 100 years, land ownership within the family, complete operation or supervision of the farm-ranch production by family members who are Texas residents and a size of 10 acres or more with agricultural sales of \$50 or more a year, or if less than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year. County judges must approve all applica-

Persons who meet the basic qualifications and wish to enter can obtain an application from the county judge, county Historical Commission chairperson, the nearest TDA district office, or by writing to Commissioner Reagan V. Brown, Texas Department of Agriculture, P. O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711.

Record highs set at Western Heritage sale

HOUSTON - Prices for Quarter Horses and bronze sculpture hit record highs as the 1982 Western Heritage Sale topped the \$3 million mark May 14-15 at the Shamrock Hilton Hotel.

Total sales of \$3,461,100 were recorded during the seventh annual 'event, the foremost sale and auction of art, cattle, and horses in the nation. As in past years, fine art of the American West set the pace at \$2,117,800, including a new world record of \$50,000 for a

Western-motif bronze sold at auction by a living artist. Event history also was made by the overall Quarter Horse tally of \$1,033,500, top individual price of \$150,000 for a mare, and average per animal of \$41,048. The total for Santa Gertrudis cattle came to \$309,800, for an average of

\$11,915 per consignment. of 1,200 prominent guests attended the unique gala sponsored by former Texas governor John B. Connally,

Dallas land developer Joe Marchman and Houston businessman and civic leader Louis Pearce Jr.

Bids went into six figures for art as buyers from around the world vied for a select collection of oils, watercolors and sculptures. Top price of \$140,000 was brought by the oil "Walking Coyote and the Buffalo A by-invitation-only crowd Orphans," painted by Tom Lovell of Santa Fe, New Mexico and purchased by Steve Langham of Houston. Tucson, Arizona artist How-

ard Terpning came in a close second with his oil, "Coffee Coolers Meet the Hostiles," which was purchased for \$130,000 by L. D. Brinkman of Kerrville, Tex.

The record-setting bronze, "End of a Long Day", was created by Simonton, Texas sculptor Jim Reno and bought by B. F. Phillips of Frisco, Texas.

The total figure for art includes \$1,117,800 for the 27 select works sold at auction on May 15 and another \$1 million for the more than

150 works offered at fixed prices during the wall-hung art sale on May 14.

Top-selling horse in the Sale was Gwyn Tari, a two-year-old mare consigned by Pearce Ranches of Houston and purchased for the new event record of \$150,000 by Crawford Farms of Carrizo Springs. The previous record of \$130,000 was set at last year's event. Second highest price, \$100,-000, was paid by Mae West Syndicate of Houston for the mare Gajes Mae West from

Welch Ranches at Merkel, Texas.

Santa Gertrudis sales were led by a bull from Cosgrove Ranches of Coalgate, Oklahoma, which brought \$37,000 from J&S Fullen Farms of Ripley, Tennessee. A cow with two calves at side, consigned by Double TT Ranch of Scurry, Texas, brought the second highest price at \$24,500 from Silverbrook Farms of Mid-

New concept for insect control in Texas cotton

Many Texas cotton growers will be trying a new system of cotton insect management this year because of Pay-Off insecticide, a new pyrethroid which received registration from the EPA in January

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Rosas.
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Pay-Off, a "second generation" pyrethroid manufactured by American Cyanamid Company, controls cotton bollworm and tobacco budworm at variable application rates, depending on whether insect pressures are low, moderate or extremely heavy

Using an insecticide at

variable rates is a concept that can save cotton growers money, along with reducing the amount of pesticide entering the environment. At light to moderate insect infestations, the product will often provide adequate control at less than half the rate of currently registerd pro-

Corky Helstrom, general manager of Goodland Farms at Hearne, Texas, and his consultant, Ronnie Phillips tried the new chemical under an EPA Experimental Use Permit in 1981. They applied

Pay-Off at varying rates on 100 acres of irrigated cotton, and both of them say that it provided good insect control at half the dosage rate of their standard pyrethroid.

The variable rate system relies on accurate scouting programs so that levels of insect infestation can be properly evaluated and rates adjusted accordingly. Field should be checked every three to four days to detect any changes in pest, beneficial insect, and mite populations, as well as crop condition and maturity.


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
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


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






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What's Happening in Home Economics

By MRS. CHERYL WALKER County Extension Agent — Home Economics

Tomorrow's fabrics will "weave" some important changes into the "fiber" of consumer choices at the garment marketplace, Ann Vanderpoorten, a clothing specialist, predicts.

New fabrics "in the mill" today will mean lower prices for consumers tomorrow - sometimes along with lower quality, she says.

But don't be to quick to pin potential problems on the manufacturer only. Many problems with fabrics stem from consumer carelessness — or a combination of that and other pitfalls, says the specialist on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

changes

One advancement that will help keep fabric costs down without lowering quality is the much faster loom.

Modern high-speed looms make fabrics more quickly and they use less energy. They need fewer production steps, and they create wider fabrics. All of this helps keep prices from soaring, the specialist says.

Another development is the application of dyes, sizing and other finishes they are foams instead of liquids.

One advantage here is more speed, which, in turn, means that more fabric can be processed in a day. Foam dyes and finishes require less energy and less chemicals than liquids. All of these factors keep prices, down, too.

A third major development involves fibers - in the garment industry and others.

Two big newsmakers are the extremely strong fibers and the hollow fibers.

Some are made into strong woven and nonwoven fabrics and cables. They are used for such things as airplane fusilages, tire cords and off-shore oil-rig anchor cables.

These textile products save energy - they require

less energy to make and less to transport since they weigh less than the products they replace.

Development of the hollow fibers is putting quilted products in the price range of many, the specialist

Some of the new hollow fibers now insulate more effectively than down, and they have the added benefits of weighing less and surviving laundering better, she says.

Along with all the benefits, there are some problems resulting from textile-industry changes, Miss Vanderpoorten says.

"One major problem is the loss of color-fastness in dyes used for apparel.

"Many manufacturers are encouraging the use of dyes with poorer color-fastness because they believe that consumers don't really need as much fastness as they've been given in the past, especially if using poorer dyes will help hold prices

So, many fabrics may fade after just a few launderings, she says.

A consumer's only recourse is to return the aricle to the retailer or manufacturer with a letter explaining that fading is the reason for return.

Consumer care will help tomorrow's fabrics do the most for the money, the specialist points out.

Read labels and follow the instructions carefully, and learn about fabrics - what will hurt them and what won't, she advises.

Take fading, for example: it isn't always due to poorer

Rapid fading of fabrics in some cases is caused by a chemical called "benzoyl peroxide," an ingredient in many acne preparations.

It will cause garments to fade, as well as drapes, upholstery, linens and even carpets. Before sending complaints, check your medicine cabinet.

Another problem occurs when consumers combine carelessness with "sweatfighting" olefin products,




