## Small Yield Expected

Garza County's cotton harvest is getting underway, with a check of the area gins showing that approximately 700 bales of cotton have been taken to area gins.

Harlan Morris, who farms in the Graham community had the county's first bale of cotton, which was ginned by Graham Coop Gin. The bale weighed 431 pounds.

Graham Co-Op Gin is the only area gin with a full day crew working, and they have ginned the bulk of the cotton so far this season. They had ginned 631 bales of cotton early Monday morning, with 115 still on the yard. They plan to put on their night crew this week.

With approximately 48,000 acres of cotton planted in Garza county, and approximately 41,000 left to be harvested, things look a little bleak for area farmers.

The estimated number of bales of cotton expected to be ginned this season is only about 16,000. For 41,000 acres of cotton, that is not much cotton per acre.

Some cotton that has been ginned in the Graham Community has turned out better than expected, and what grade cards that have been returned to area gins, have been about average grades and staple lengths for this area cotton.

Local farmers have been blasted with almost every problem that can come about to cotton farmers, and all of them in this one growing season.

## It's Not a Pretty Sight Child Abuse

What can you do if you know or suspect a child is being abused?

It's easy, you call the Texas Department of Human Resources at 495-3955...in fact, the state law requires that any suspected child abuse be reported.

How do you know if a child is being abused?

Here are some facts from the Texas Department of Human Resources:

There are three kinds of child abuse: physical, sexual, and emotional. Physical abuse is inflicting bodily injury on a child. Sexual abuse is using a child in or exposing him to sexual activities, with or without his consent. And emotional abuse is demanding that the child do more than he is able to do, severely criticizing him or humiliating him for not living up to a demand, or placing upon him such unclear requirements that the child cannot understand what he is supposed to do.

There are several kinds of child neglect. Physical neglect is failure to provide enough food, clothing, shelter or medical care. Failing to provide adequate education, guidance or supervision is also neglect. Emotional neglect is failure to give a child the love and affection he needs.

Similar to abuse and neglect exploitation is forcing or unduly encouraging a child to participate in activities detrimental to his welfare, such as begging, stealing, or working too hard for too many hours.

Next we'll look at some of the signs of neglect or abuse.

Officers for the 1982-83 upcoming year for the Garza County Junior Livestock Association, were elected during a meeting held last week. Noel White was re-elected president by acclamation.

Other members of the executive committee elected by acclamation were vice-president, Jimmie Bartlett; secretary, Mack Terry, and recording secretary, treasurer, Orabeth White.

This meeting was the first planning meeting of the new year.

Stock Show and fair dates for 1983 were set for February 23, 24, 25 and 26, with weigh-in of animals at 4 p.m. February 23.

Following a financial report by president Noel White, on the 1982 show, a motion was made and approved to pay \$2,500 on the building fund bank note.

Judges for the 1983 show were discussed and voted on. Those to be contacted to see if they are available are hog show judge, Dwayne Brown; lamb judge, Joe Ed Wise; steer show judge, Dr. Jim Jenkins, rabbit show judge, Oliver Thompson. A horse show judge is pending.

A new addition to the stock show this year, will be the chicken show, with three broilers to a pen and one pen to an exhibitor.

The success of the rabbit show the past year encouraged the directors to begin the chicken show.

Also, the expense of the buying and feeding of larger animals was causing many of the 4-H'ers and FFA members not to exhibit.

Poultry show rules will be determined at a later date.

Weight limits set by the directors were: hogs, 200 to 250 pounds; lambs 75 to 130 pounds; and steers, 850 to no limit.

Also, the steer show will be broken into four weight divisions this year, with six steers in each division being in the premium sale.

Stock show superintendents for the 1983 show appointed were steers, Neal Clary; lambs, Bobby Terry; hogs, Tony Conner; horses, Bil Hedrick; rabbits and chickens, Tommy Young.

A list of names submitted for new directors include Rusty Wood, Andy Williams, Dennis McGehee, Sammy Ellis, Joey Basinger, and J. W. Basinger.

Jerry Thuet was asked to again serve as announcer for the shows.

# The Way I See It...

Being around cotton gins at this time of the year brings back special memories...and reminds me how, in many ways times have changed, but in others how times are about the same.

The changes are evident to anyone who has been around the cotton business more than 15 years...lots of machinery doing what people used to do.

Twenty years ago a cotton farmer could expect to get 10 bales of cotton picked or pulled in a day, with a good field of hands.

Today, with modern machinery, farmers can get in as much as 13-15 bales a day, and don't have to get started at sunup either.

Isn't hand-picked cotton cleaner and won't it bring a better price? Not necessarily, and the problem of finding people willing to do the stoop labor and the extra cost do not make up the difference.

Anyway you slice it, cotton farmers today are a lot better off with machinery.

If you've ever been in a cotton field either chopping, picking or pulling, you know what I mean.

When I see the suction pipe cleaning out a cotton trailer...my mind wanders back about 30 years...

I remember the days when either of my grandfathers made the trip to the gin...and let us little tikes tag along.

If we were with Granddad Burnett, we'd go in his 1941 Plymouth to the gin at Cotton Center, a few miles from Bonham in Fannin County.

There, the ritual was almost always the same, he'd give my brother Jerry and I 50 cents each, and when we'd drive up to the gin store, we'd all get out...and he'd wander in with the other farmers, pull up an old cane-bottom chair...and they'd talk "big-people" talk while we would find ways to spend the money he gave us.

The talk centered around cotton prices, labor problems and the like...or politics. It seemed to me that everything was kind of leisurely...no one seemed to be in a hurry.

Some chewed tobacco, some drank coffee, some soft

drinks...but every farmer there had an opinion about something.

See...in some ways times haven't changed at all.

When we went with Granddad Samuel, he'd take us to the gin at Bug Tussle, just north of Ladonia, also in Fannin County.

The Bug Tussle store was at a cross roads and was a bee-hive of activity, but generally the conversations and gathering of farmers was much the same as in any of the other gins in that country.

Prices were low, costs were high...and no one was able to figure out how they were going to pay the loan off any better than last year.

The Way I see It, not much has changed in 30 years.

By the way, with Granddad Samuel, we drove in a 1930 (or so) Model A Ford.

That was the car he had to get out in front and crank the engine by hand...especially if it was a cool fall morning.

Times were tough for farmers then too.

Those were the days when the entire family got up before dawn...had a breakfast of eggs, flour gravy and biscuits, maybe milk if it was available, and dress in the warmest old clothes around...pile into the family car and head for the fields.

Work all morning pulling or picking, break for lunch, and hit it again until sundown.

Those were tough times. The children of those times left the farm as soon as they could. You can't really blame them.

The Way I See It, machinery has made farming a whole lot better on farm families...especially the children.

Those gins I went to as a youngster are no longer there, just skeletons hanging in the sky...all that country has just about turned to wheat and grazing...for a variety of reasons....

But the memories of a child are still lingering...and they are good memories for me...after all, I didn't have to stoop in the fields, just went to visit now and then.



## High Speed Chase Reported

Garza County officers were involved recently in a high speed chase, October 2, involving a stolen car, which was clocked at speeds of 130 mph between Post and Lubbock.





# Tigers No Match for 'Lopes

The Post Antelopes blitzed the Slaton Tigers 42 - 0 last Friday in an awesome display of offensive power, as the home team offensive line consistently opened gaping holes for swifty Milton Williams, who kept the fans on their feet with his six touchdown runs.

Williams broke the game open with 268 yards, scoring 36 points...one, a 97 yarder from the scrimmage line and another an 86 yard pass and run play.

Although the half-time score was only 14-0, a magnificent goal-line stand by the 'Lopes early in the third quarter set the tone for the game.

The first quarter ended 0-0, but it only took a few minutes for the Antelopes to put six on the board, as Williams broke loose on a sweep around right end for 33 yards.

With 9:43 on the clock, Will Kirkpatrick kicked the first of seven extra points.

The drive started on the Post nine yard line with 2:25 left in the first quarter.

Williams took the ball on three successive plays to the 14 over right tackle, to the 18 around right end and to the 22 over right tackle.

Will Kirkpatrick got the call over right tackle to the 25 and then quarterback Tim Tannehill pulled a bootleg to the left and threw a pass to Bill Black, who hauled the ball in at the Slaton 43.

Richard Cisneros took the ball over right tackle to the 42 and as the second quarter opened, Williams went around left end to the 40, right guard to the 37 and on fourth down, Tannehill kept the drive alive with a keeper around his left end to the 31½.

On first down Cisneros went to the 26 over right

guard and then Williams, behind good blocking, took the pitchout around right end to the end zone.

## Second Touchdown

James Lee set up the second Antelope touchdown as he intercepted a Tiger pass on the Post 49 yard line.

With 9:09 on the clock, the 'Lopes began a three-play drive, with Williams busting loose from left guard, out-running defenders to the end zone from the 33 yard line.

The Antelopes recovered the following kick-off, but were penalized for being offside and had to kick it over.

No other drives were mounted by either team as the half ended.

## Second Half

In the early minutes of the third quarter, the Tigers got as close as the three yard line, with the main punch coming from running back Gerald Lacy who busted out of the grasp of 'Lope defenders at the 11 yard line and was hauled down from behind by Kirkpatrick at the Post 24.

Five plays later, with fourth down at the four, the Tigers sputtered to the three and turned the ball over on downs to the Antelopes.

With 8:20 showing on the clock, Tannehill handed the ball off to Williams, coming from the right side across to his left, through a gap over left tackle and into

the secondary with no defender able to catch him...he raced 97 yards for the third touchdown.


The one play drive took 14 seconds.

On second down Tannehill's pass deep to James Lee was too long and then on third down the 'Lopes were called for too much time.


Facing third and long, Tannehill found Kirkpatrick deep in Tiger territory for a first down pass at the Slaton 23.

On first down Williams took the hand off over right tackle and scooted into the end zone, with 2:32 left in the game.


It was all over but the counting as the Antelopes kept the Tigers from scoring in the final minutes.






Four un-novels make up the selection of new books from the Post Public Library this week. I almost called them non-fiction but that may not be entirely accurate. William Murray, for example, tells a "truth stranger than fiction story" about his emotional instability, drugs, smuggling, left-wing causes, and anti-religion law suits which ended when he switched from his mother, Madalyn Murray O'Hair's atheism to a firm belief in Jesus Christ. The book is called "My Life Without God," which leads this reviewer to wonder if people would pay \$15 to read about his life with God.

Alwyn James, a Welshman, married an Irish woman, and ended up writing a book called "Scottish Roots: A step-by-step guide for ancestor-hunters" in Scotland. He says you can conduct your search from your own living room, but hints that having a minister of the Church of Scotland in your past would help immensely.

Sherri Nance writes a support book for parents of prematurely born infants, a project which grew out of the experiences of parents of hundreds of premature babies born in Houston. She discusses causes, coping, clothing, caring, and even lists some famous premature babies.

Finally Leslie Blanchard, the hair dresser who "knows for sure," tells his secrets in the "Hair-Coloring Book." Barbara Walters, Cheryl Tiegs, Mary Tyler Moore, and Donald Sutherland, and others regularly visit Leslie's salons in Beverly Hills and New York. In language so simple that even a man could understand it, he tells when, why and how a man or woman should change the color of their hair. And all that information is at your peroxide-covered fingertips at the Post Public Library.

## Antelope Statistics

The Antelopes posted 461 total yards offense, with 268 rushing and 193 passing, hitting eight of 13 passes and holding the Tigers to 332 yards, 248 rushing and 84 passing.

Milton Williams led the rushing game with 211 yards on 14 carries, six touchdowns, one pass and run for 86 yards and a kickoff return for 38 yards.

Richard Cisneros collected 30 yards on seven carries, Tim Tannehill ran three times for 23 yards, Will Kirkpatrick picked up six yards on five carries, and Daniel Gonzales carried the ball once for minus three.

Tannehill threw five passes to Bill Black for 75 yards, two to Kirkpatrick for 32 yards and the 86 yarder to Williams.

Kirkpatrick kicked six of six extra points and Irvin Price put the football into the end zone all but one time on kick-offs.

### Season Totals

Through seven games the Antelopes have hit 45 of 70 passes for 924 yards, rushed the ball 275 times for 2,104 yards, and held opponents to 234 passing and 1,277 rushing.

The 'Lopes have lost two interceptions and picked off nine opponents' passes, lost five fumbles and recovered 11 of their opponents.

The Antelopes are averaging 20.5 yards per reception and 7.9 yards per carry on the ground.

Opponents are averaging 11.1 per reception and 3.5 per rush.

The Antelopes have scored an average of 41.7 points per game, limiting opponents to 3.4 points.

Scoring by quarter shows the first stanza with 28 points and six for opponents, 102 points in the second period to six, 76 in the third to zero and 86 in the fourth period to 12 for opponents.

Individually, Williams has 1,153 yards on 120 carries and Richard Cisneros has 51 carries with 311 yards.

In passing Tannehill stands at 45 of 69 for 924 and two interceptions, finding Kirkpatrick 22 times for 561 yards, Black 11 times for 166 and Williams eight times for 173 yards.

Williams has scored 138 points and Kirkpatrick has added 83 points.

On defense, Irvin Price leads tacklers with 22, followed by Toby Craft with 19, Bill Black with 13, and 11 each for L.D. Harper, Cisneros and Kirkpatrick, James Lee with 10, eight each for Giles Dalby and Melvin Wynne and the following with five or less tackles:






