## \$30,000 in oilfield equipment stolen

Burglars who got away with almost \$30,000 in oilfield equipment kept Garza County Sheriff Deputies busy this week.

George R. Brown lost \$25,390 worth of drill bits, taken from their yard during the night; Stelzer Brothers lost one drill bit off a drilling rig on location, valued at \$3,700; C & C Well Service lost two cases of motor oil; and a set of slips and a set of elevators were found abandoned at a closed Exxon Service Station in Post early Wednesday morning. Ownership of the slips and elevators had not been determined by press time Wednesday morning.

Several arrests were made on a variety of charges during the week, including the arrest of William Earl Hall who was charged with DWI, driving with license suspended, no motor cycle driver license, operating unregistered motor vehicle, and fleeing from officers. He remains in Garza County jail.

Irvin Foster Martin of Oklahoma was found wandering about Garza and Lynn County lines Tuesday night and was picked up by Garza Deputies and put in protective custody. His brother was to come from Oklahoma Wednesday to pick him up.

Other arrests included Janie Boles, defrauding by worthless check, fined \$80 and court costs in County Court; Harvey Leo Boulware was picked up on an AWOL charge from the service, and Lubbock MP's came for him; Ricky Don Mendietta was arrested on a traffic warrant, fined \$106 in City Court; David Monroe Hunter arrested for disorderly conduct, fined \$176 fine and court costs in City Court; one juvenile was picked up for shoplifting and was released to his mother;

Also Terry C. Paul was arrested on a DWI charge, and resisting arrest, he was released on a \$750 bond on the DWI charge and a \$250 bond on the resisting arrest charge; Tommy Lee Hall was charged with shoplifting and remains in county jail;

Martin Lopez was arrested for no drivers license, no motor vehicle identification sticker and operating an unregistered motor vehicle; Juan Bustos, Jr. charged with defrauding with worthless checks, placed under \$250 surety bond and released; Brenda Holly,

defrauding with worth check, given time to pay \$111 fine and court costs in County Court; nand Jim Fields, defrauding with worthless check, released on \$500 surety bond, appeared in County Court and will pay fine in four installments.

Members of the committee hope to make this one of the biggest and best parades in a long while, and everyone is encouraged to participate in this event.

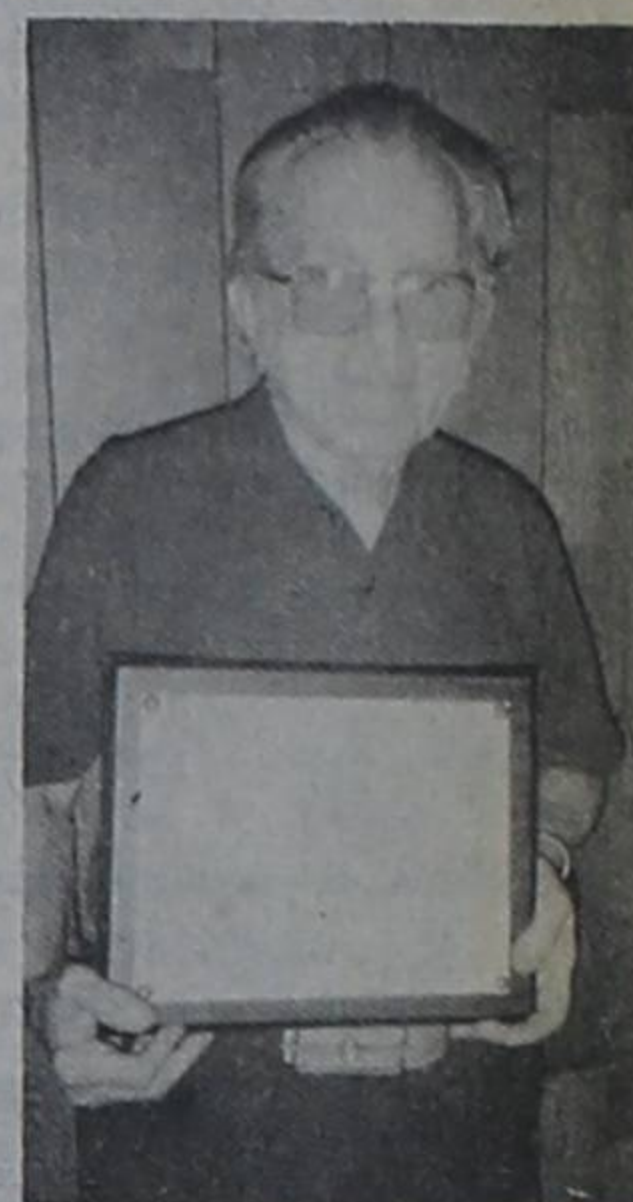

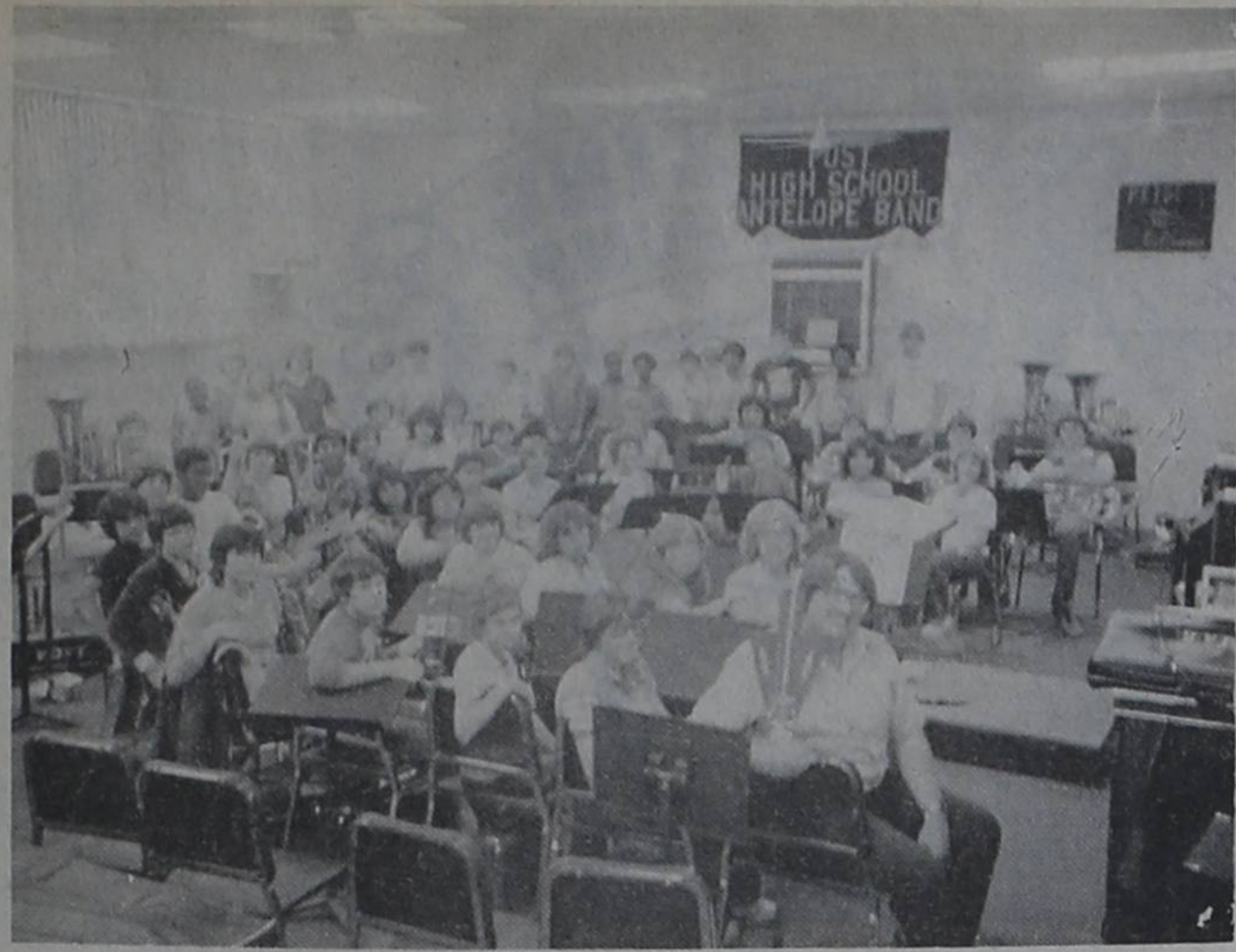
In other actions the budget for the coming fiscal year was discussed and authorization was given to send out twenty (20) day notices with no other action taken.

# SWPS to receive nine percent increase

Southwestern Public Service Company today announced it would accept a 9 percent rate increase recommended by the Steering Committee which represents 66 Texas municipalities served by the electric utility.

The agreement was reached following a study by the cities' rate study committee, and represents 71 percent of the 12.7 percent Texas retail rate increase requested by the Company.

If approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas, the new rate would be effective July 1, 1982, and would be expected to provide additional revenues of approximately \$13.6 million annually from customers inside the cities. The agreement only covers the rates for service supplied within city jurisdictions. Rates outside the cities, which are regulated by the PUCT, would generate approximately an additional \$15.8 million annually at the 71 percent figure.  
Company president Bert

Ballengee said "SPS agreed reluctantly because the combined revenues of \$29.4 million from city and rural customers is less than had been requested, less than is needed, and less than is justified by today's high money costs and the commitment the Company has made to its customers to change to coal as the fuel source in new plants.

Ballengee said that "SPS would go along with the reduced increase because of

the current economic situation which is affecting everyone. I guess we'll hurt just like everyone else," he added.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric utility service to a population of more than 1 million in a 45,000-square mile area of the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

## Giles McCrary Jr. films Johnny Cash special

Clearwater Teleproductions, Inc. a company that is owned and operated by Giles McCrary, Jr., was the production company that filmed the Johnny Cash Special that aired last week on the CBS television network.

McCrary is the son of Mayor and Mrs. Giles McCrary of Post.

Under contract with Joseph Cates Company out of New York, Clearwater provided both location videotaping facilities and crewing for the weeklong production in South Texas. Location audio was provided by Omega Audio, also of Dallas.

The finished show, titled, "Johnny Cash's Cowboy Heroes" aired last week on CBS with Cash, June Carter Cash and the Oak Ridge Boys, currently one of the hottest acts in show business with their latest release "Bobbie Sue" rated number one on both country western and popular charts.

Rain that fell during the first two days of outdoor production at the Indian Creek Ranch near Kerrville, Texas and at the Alamo in San Antonio did not hinder the timetable of the shoot. Cash, who suggested the rugged locations to producer Joseph Cates, said he chose them because "I believe these locations will give the CBS special a particular look never seen before on television...The Rugged West...The part of Texas I like best."

That "Rugged West" proved it's name as crews from Clearwater dragged a tulip crane from Victor Duncan-Dallas up the side of a hill to capture the shots of director Stan Harris. During one rainy afternoon, as the tulip crane was readied for one scene, the entire crew was forced to abandon the hilltop location for a few moments as lightning bolts threatened the staging area. When the electrical storm passed, tapes were rolling again

within minutes with rain-covers over the Ikegami 79 cameras being used for the taping.

Clearwater utilized their present sixteen foot truck with Ampex 1" recording on board and Grass Valley switching to accomplish the Cash shoot. On some scenes, Clearwater's CEI color cameras were used but in other scenes the company's new Ikegami cameras were pressed into use on the tulip crane, tripods, with a Steadicam and in hand-held application.

Most of the hill country location production at the Indian Creek Ranch and Yo Ranch north of Kerrville utilized one, two and three camera configurations. The
