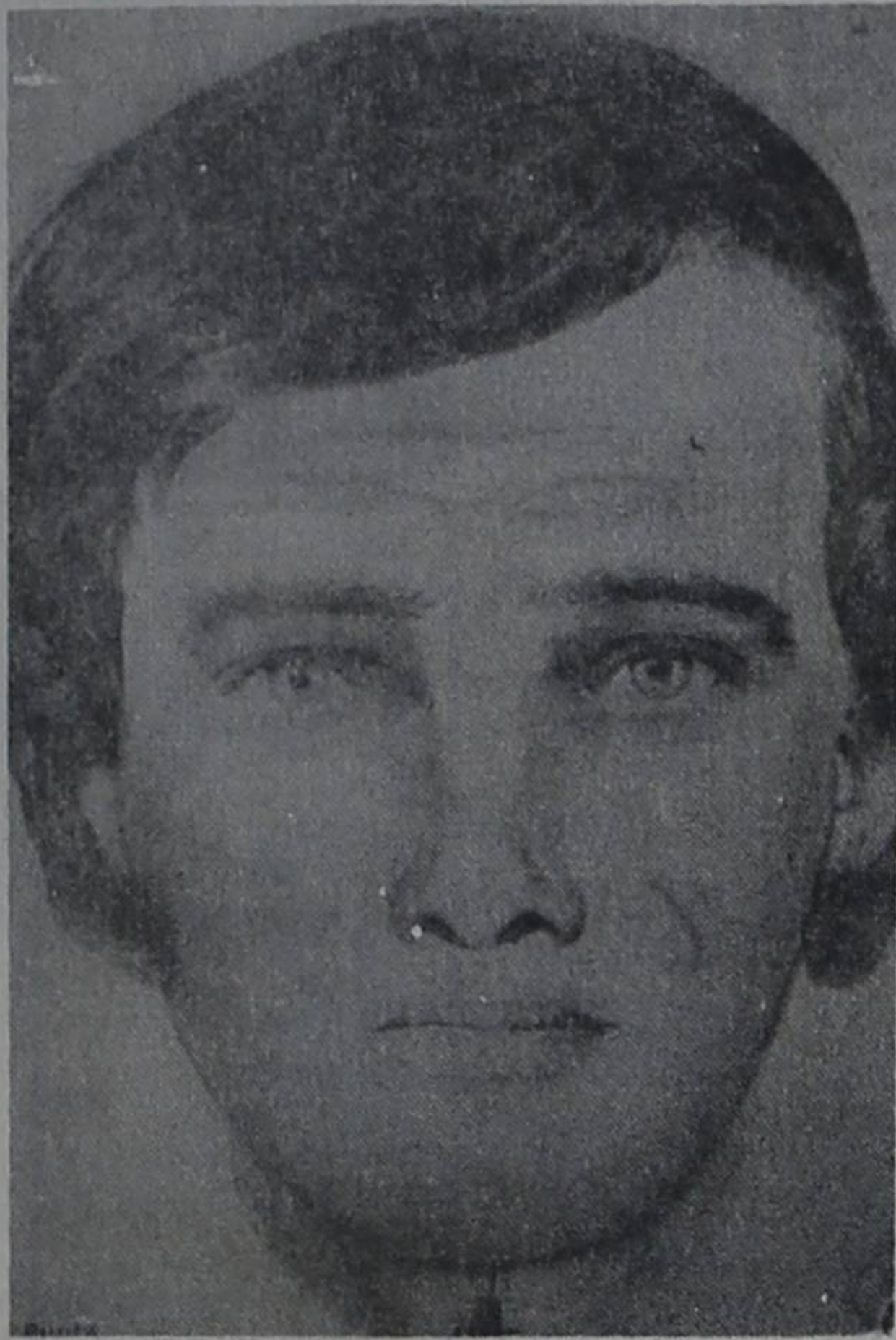


Rapist Attacks Housewife



The Lynn County Sheriff's Department has provided the Dispatch with a composite drawing of a rape suspect in a two-month old Lynn County investigation.

A young housewife was raped last Wednesday morning in her residence, located near the Grassland community.

The rapist, described as a white male, about 21 years old, was reportedly in the residence and confronted the woman before she realized he was in the home.

The attack took place at 8:30 a.m. and one hour earlier a neighboring housewife reported that she had slammed the door in the face of a similarly described man when he came to the front door.

Neither the rape victim nor the almost-victim were able to identify the man, who was wearing a garment

over his face.

The garment had holes cut out where he could see. The investigation is being conducted by the Lynn County Sheriff's Department, which reports that a similar incident occurred two months ago in the area around Draw.

A composite drawing of the suspect is being

Voters Choose Democrats

Approximately 40 percent or 1,096 Garza County voters trekked to the polls Tuesday to vote along with the rest of the state in electing a Democratic governor, lieutenant governor, senator and state senator to name a few.

Reaganomics fell by the wayside in a heavy turnout Tuesday.

On the local scene, all candidates were unopposed with County Judge Giles Dalby leading the tally sheet among local candidates with 869 votes followed by County and District Clerk Carl Cederholm with 866 and County Treasurer Voda Beth Gradine receiving 859. Other local candidates on the ballot included Shelia Melton, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1 with 258 votes; Dee C. Justice, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 4, 196; Constable Precinct 1, Lonnie G. Peel, 243; Constable, Precinct 3, Cecil Foster Sr., 151; County Commissioner, Precinct 2, Ted L. Aten 261 and Commissioner Precinct 4, Herbert Walls had 191.

All the Constitutional Amendments carried in Garza County.

Other results of the election include U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen getting 653 of the votes with Collins receiving 393; U. S. Representative Charles Stenholm 708 to 15 for James Cooley; Governor Bill Clements got 474 to Mark White's 576; Lieutenant Governor Hobby brought in 565 to George Strake's 445.

In the Attorney General's race Jim Mattox had 673 to Bill Meier's 357 and Katherine Youngblood had 10;

Comptroller Bob Bullock received 591 to 413 for Mike Richards and Janet Tlapak had nine; State Treasurer Ann Richards received 520 to 471 for Allen Clark and Alma Kucymbala had three.

County Commissioners Meet

The Garza County Commissioners court will look at a 10 item agenda at the regular monthly meeting tomorrow, beginning at 10 a.m. in the courthouse.

Highlighting the meeting will be the canvass of votes from last Tuesday's election and appoint an absentee judge.

Other items on the agenda include a decision on the South Plains Association of Government (SPAG) contract, consider a \$5,000 bond for Willie Rodriguez, badges for constables, review employment policies and study with the city of Post the consultant firm of Park, Hill, Smith and Cooper.

City Council Monday

The Post City Council will tackle a 17 item agenda at its regular meeting tomorrow at 7:30 p.m. in the city hall.

A request for special consideration of the mobile home ordinance will be heard as well as a drilling permit application.

The council will also consider public bids for the motor grader purchase, review storm drainage alternatives and take action on the airport grant application.

The airport item will include setting a public hearing, appointing professional engineers and authorizing contract action.

Other agenda items include ambulance garage property assignment, White River Water District Board appointments, Post Housing Authority annual report, Post Housing Addition Plat, animal code and ordinances, sewer extension contract and insurance coverage for Emergency Medical Services.

Post ISD Trustees Meet

The Post Independent School District board of trustees will take action on budget change requests as part of the regular monthly meeting Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in the High School Library.

The trustees are also to discuss the scheduling of sports activities during the Christmas holidays.

Among the other items are the transfer of funds for the expansion of the elementary building, consider the employee vote on insurance for retired employees, hear a report on the comprehensive testing of basic skills and take action on financial statements through Sept. 30, 1982.

District Champs Tame Wildcats

There are two halves to a football game . . . and the Idalou Wildcats came out the second half playing as if there had been no first half in the 34-0 Post Antelope win Friday night.

The District 3AAA Champion Antelopes carried a comfortable 27-0 lead into the locker rooms at halftime in Idalou, expecting to come out and do what they've done all year long in the second half . . . bury their opponents.

It didn't happen . . . through a combination of tough running, fairly consistent defense and several key penalties on the Antelopes, the Wildcats controlled the football well into the fourth quarter.

The Antelope defense kept the Wildcats out of the end zone, including a magnificent goal line stand at the four, where the reserve quarterback fumbled the snap and Keith Osborne covered up the loose ball for the 'Lopes.

Two plays earlier the Wildcat starting quarterback suffered an injury when he scampered from the 14 to the five.

The Antelopes took the ball following the fumble recovery and drove the length of the field to the final touchdown, eating up all but 24 seconds of the clock.

First Half Action

The first half belonged to the number one ranked AAA team in Texas, as the Antelopes, scoring four out of five times they handled the ball.

And one touchdown was called back on a penalty. The 'Lopes took the opening kickoff, drove from their 37 yard line in eight plays, with Milton Williams blasting the final 16 yards over right guard for the first of his five touchdowns.

L. D. Harper took the short kick and then Tim Tannehill directed the 'Lopes down the field in a precision march.

Williams went over left end to the 46, Will Kirkpatrick sliced over left tackle to the 49 of Idalou, Williams went over right tackle to the 47, again over right guard to the 40, took a pitchout around left end to the 35 and then Tannehill found Kirkpatrick on a screen pass in the left

flat, which took the Antelopes to the 17.

Kirkpatrick kicked the first of four extra points.

On Idalou's first possession, linebacker Toby Craft crashed into Allen Johnson at the Post 48, knocking the ball loose and stopping the Wildcats.

The Antelope second possession was stymied by an interception at the Wildcat 17.

The quarter ended like most of this year's games, with the 'Lopes out front 7-0.

District 2AAA winner Littlefield, will face the second place team in District 1AAA.

Littlefield outscored Friona 23-9 and posted a 9-1 record, losing only to Post.

Post will be the "visiting" team at the bi-district game with Denver City this Friday at 7:30 p. m. in the Big Spring High School stadium.

The gate opens at 6 p. m., tickets will be \$3 for adults and \$1 for students and there will be no pre-game ticket sales.

WORLD GRAIN PRODUCTION

Total world grain production in 1982-83 is forecast at 1,623 million tons marginally lower than last month's estimate and slightly below the 1981-82 record. Improved prospects for crops in Canada and Eastern and Western Europe were more than offset by lower estimates for Mexico, India, Australia and the United States.

BRUCELOSIS PROGRESS

AUSTIN — Texas livestock producers are continuing to make progress in their efforts to control brucellosis, John B. Armstrong, Kingsville, chairman, Texas Animal Health Commission, reports.

The state is divided into two areas in accordance with the Texas brucellosis control program. Infection is less prevalent in the western part of the state. "We have had a tremendous encouragement from the way things are going in West Texas, and we have an opportunity for additional progress in the eastern half of the state," Armstrong said.

"We are making progress, and we feel this is due primarily to the cooperation of our state's livestock producers. The number one criteria for successes we have seen is cooperation. There is no way for any disease program to be successful without producer cooperation," Armstrong said.

"When we began our two area program, the whole United States was skeptical about its chances. Now, I doubt there is anyone today who even questions whether we are able to make it work. Experts from

I'll bet you've "met" "Deadeye Dick", alias Rudolph Waltz, the last word in born losers. "The best thing for me," said Rudolph, "was to want nothing, to be enthusiastic about nothing, to be unmotivated as possible." So he becomes a night pharmacist, and limps through life as an uninvolved observer of the world crumbling all around him. He numbly witnesses the drug-induced downfall of the most beautiful girl in town, the accidental (?) depopulation of his city by what the government calls a "friendly bomb", and he chases the blues — somehow. Let me hasten to add that Kurt Vonnegut tells Rudolph's story, and it becomes even more interesting.

In "The Demon Lover" Kate Collison yearns to paint miniatures, not knowing that her journey to France to find artistic success will also shape her destiny as a woman. Victoria Holt offers this thrilling romance, called "The Demon Lover."

Wat Tyler's daughter was insulted by a tax collector, and Wat led the Peasant's Rebellion of 1524-26. Prince Richard of Bordeaux faced the rebels at Mile End and "saved" the country. Jean Plaidy tells a vivid story of Richard's court, his extravagance, and his journey toward disaster. The novel is called "Passage to Pontefract."

Peter Cosgrove writes murder stories. Someone else in his town plans the hideously real thing, intending to turn the Cosgrove family reunion into a deadly celebration. Why would someone want to kill 80-year-old Henrietta? Why is there a real skeleton in her closet? Who will be the next victim? E. X. Ferrars writes "Skeleton in Search of a Closet."

Cadillac Jack is a rodeo cowboy turned antique dealer. His vintage Cadillac links the worlds of Texas, flea markets, and the Washington social-political life. Two worlds. And two women. Larry McMurtry tells the story of "Cadillac Jack."

In a different vein, "Royal Children" begins with the nine children of Queen Victoria and covers each generation up to the present. Charles Kidd and Patrick Montague-Smith offer the treasured insights of diaries, letters, official portraits and family photographs. They

even offer the suspicion that the newest royal child, the Prince of Wales, had George Washington and William Shakespeare for ancestors!

Do you remember the movie "Breaking Away"? The screenwriter for that movie offers his first novel, "Summer Crossing." In Eash Chicago, Indiana, three high school athletes graduate, but have nowhere to go. As the three friends try to begin new lives, their friendship threatens to die. Daniel Price, one of three, meets Rachel Temerson, a recent import. She seems to offer love, escape, and success to Daniel, in spite of her family secret. "Love," Daniel discovers, "is both a sickness and a cure, and you never know which one you're getting." In his final summer of boyhood, Daniel experiences the sickness and the cure.

Katherine Brown falls in love with the Goldman family, all six kids, the Bhoemian squalor in which they live, the way they play the violin, dig cabbages, and argue about books. She especially loves Roger, with the help of a second-hand sex manual, breaks their affair off rather painfully, and moves to Rome, only to return ten years later to be reunited with her past. Barbara Trapido writes "Brother of the more Famous Jack."

Travis McGee is one of the most famous characters in contemporary American fiction, a product of the imagination of John McDonald. McDonald has written more than sixty books, twenty in the Travis McGee series alone. But before that, he wrote short stories for magazines. Now there is a collection of "The Good Old Stuff."

Jenny, the divorced mother of two girls, works in a Manhattan art gallery, where the paintings of Erich Krueger intrigue her, with their peaceful Minnesota landscapes, and the haunting portrait of a woman who seems familiar. To make a good story short, she meets Krueger, who carries her off to his old house in Minnesota, where Jenny learns that something bizarre and still-threatening happened there, something that threatens her marriage, her children, and then her own life — unless she can unravel the secret of the mansion that has become her prison. Read Mary Higgins Clark's novel, "A Cry in the Night."

throughout the nation are impressed by the progress that Texas has made," he explained.

He noted there is now a program underway in 32 counties in East Texas with emphasis on increasing vaccination. About 50 percent of the known brucellosis infection is located within those 32 counties. They generally are in a band from the Red River to the Gulf.

"Texas has the opportunity to get to be a B state totally in a very short time, maybe even a year if we concentrate on that band of 32 counties. We have an ongoing program in that area."

"By becoming a B state, Texas cowmen will have freer movement of livestock and fewer testing requirements," Armstrong explained.

Basic cornerstones of the Texas brucellosis program are vaccination with the reduced dosage of Strain 19, individual herd plans, increased research, and improved laboratory support systems to detect field strain brucellosis infection.

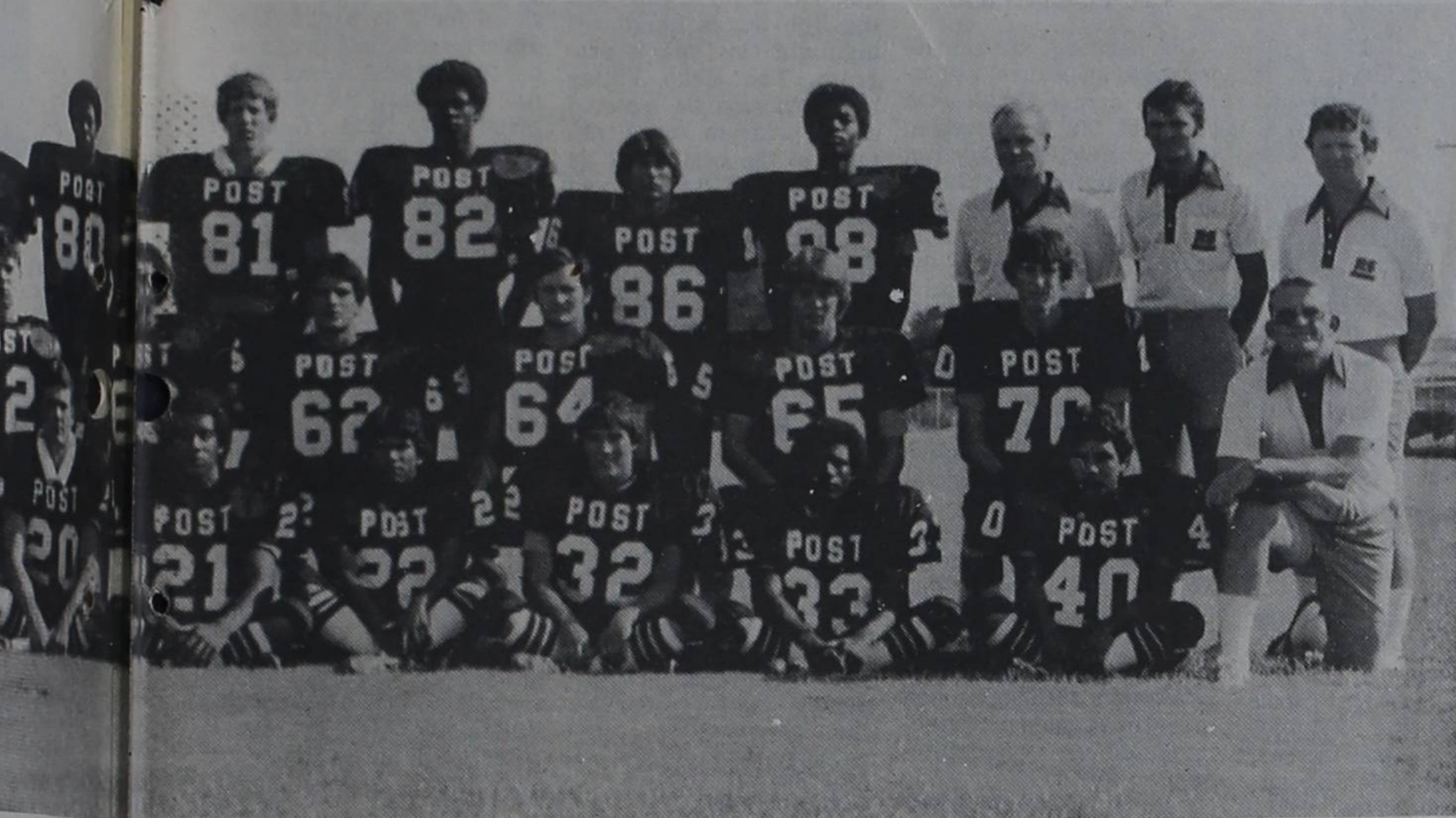

Burlington Report Sales

GREENSBORO, N. C. — Burlington Industries, Inc. today reported lower sales and earnings for the fourth quarter of its 1982 fiscal year compared with the final quarter of fiscal 1981. Consolidated net earnings for the quarter ended October 2, 1982 were \$8,007,000 or 28 cents per share on net sales of \$676,972,000. In the fourth quarter of 1981, consolidated net earnings were \$35,174,000 or \$1.25 per share on net sales of \$876,541,000. Foreign currency items, while not comparable to 1981 results because of the adoption of FASB Statement No. 52 at the start of fiscal 1982, reduced earnings by 1 cent per share for the quarter. In the fourth quarter of last year, currency items under FASB Statement No. 8 increased earnings by 22 cents per share.

For the 1982 fiscal year ended October 2, 1982, net sales were \$2,876,205,000 compared to \$3,262,886,000 reported for fiscal 1981. Net earnings for fiscal 1982 were \$52,487,000 or \$1.85 per share on 28,354,434 average shares outstanding, compared to \$115,314,000 or \$4.10 per share in 1981. The 1982 fiscal year earnings included a charge for foreign currency items, largely related to Mexican peso devaluations, of 9 cents per share which, as noted above, is not directly comparable to the 90 cents per share gain recorded from foreign currency items under FASB Statement No. 8 in fiscal 1981. The full year results include a 10 cent gain from an exchange of cash and stock for debt completed in the March quarter of 1982.

William A. Klopman, chairman and chief executive officer, stated, "Fiscal

1982 was a year in which most areas of the company were affected by adverse economic and market conditions. Reduced volume, price pressure and increased abnormal costs associated with modernization programs were the chief factors causing the decline in operating results.

"The company is in excellent financial condition as indicated by an improved debt to capital ratio, lower outstanding debt and improved inventory and receivables turnover. Capital expenditures for the year totalled \$222,000,000, the second highest level in the company's history."

The Board of Directors meeting in New York recently declared the regular quarterly dividend of 38 cents per share payable December 1, 1982 to shareholders of record at the close of business Nov. 8, 1982.

Idalou took the kickoff, couldn't get past the Antelope defense and punted on fourth down.

Third Touchdown

With 7:43 left in the half, the Antelopes got the short punt on the Idalou 39 and began a 10 play drive finished off by a one-half yard plunge by Williams.

On first down Williams took the sweep to the 32, Marvin Wynne went over left guard to the 27, Williams lost a yard, Tannehill missed a pass to Bill Black, and on third down Tannehill pulled a quarterback keeper over left end for a first down at the 17.

A touchdown pass to Black was nullified on a penalty... the Lopes huddled and from the 22 Williams carried over left end to the 17.

A late hit penalty on Idalou put the ball at the eight and on third down Williams ran behind good blocking on the right side to the two.

The Lopes liked it so well they went over the same spot to the one-half and then on second down Williams hit pay dirt, with 5:14 left in the half.

Idalou then fumbled on the second play from scrimmage following the kickoff, with Giles Dalby getting credit for causing Johnson to cough up the football at the Idalou 23.

Opponents have found out that if you give the Post Antelopes that good a field position you can expect another six points.

The Lopes lived up to their reputation and five plays later Williams scored his fourth touchdown, this one from the seven around his left end.

The next play Tannehill's intended pass to Kirkpatrick was tipped and intercepted by Idalou at the 25 yard line.

The Wildcats took the ball with 9:40 left in the game, and mounted a 17 play drive which ran the clock down to 3:22, when Osborne recovered the fumble at the Post five yard line.

Then 10 plays later, Williams took the pitch out

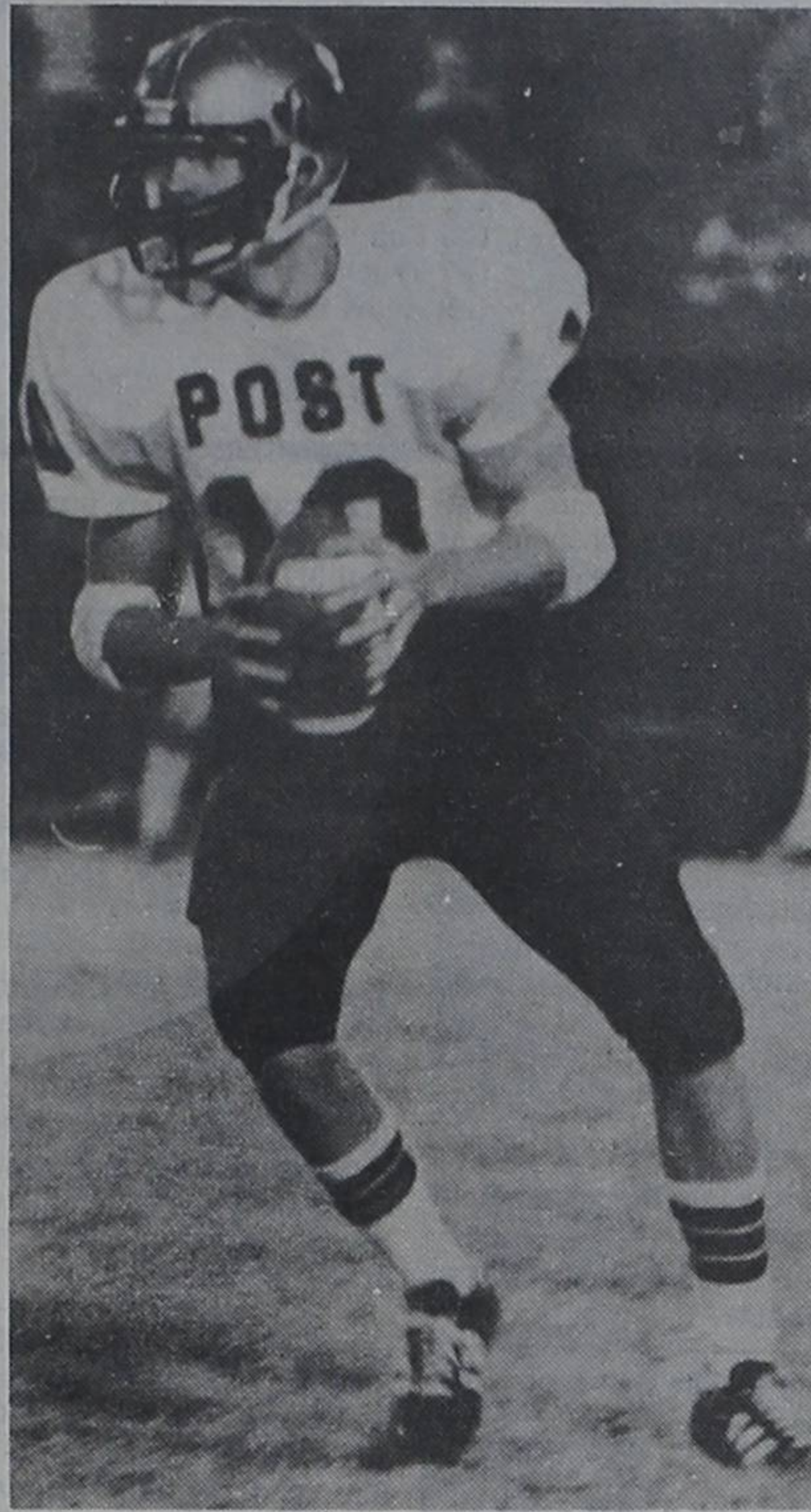
around left end and raced 34 yards to the end zone.

What, no penalty?

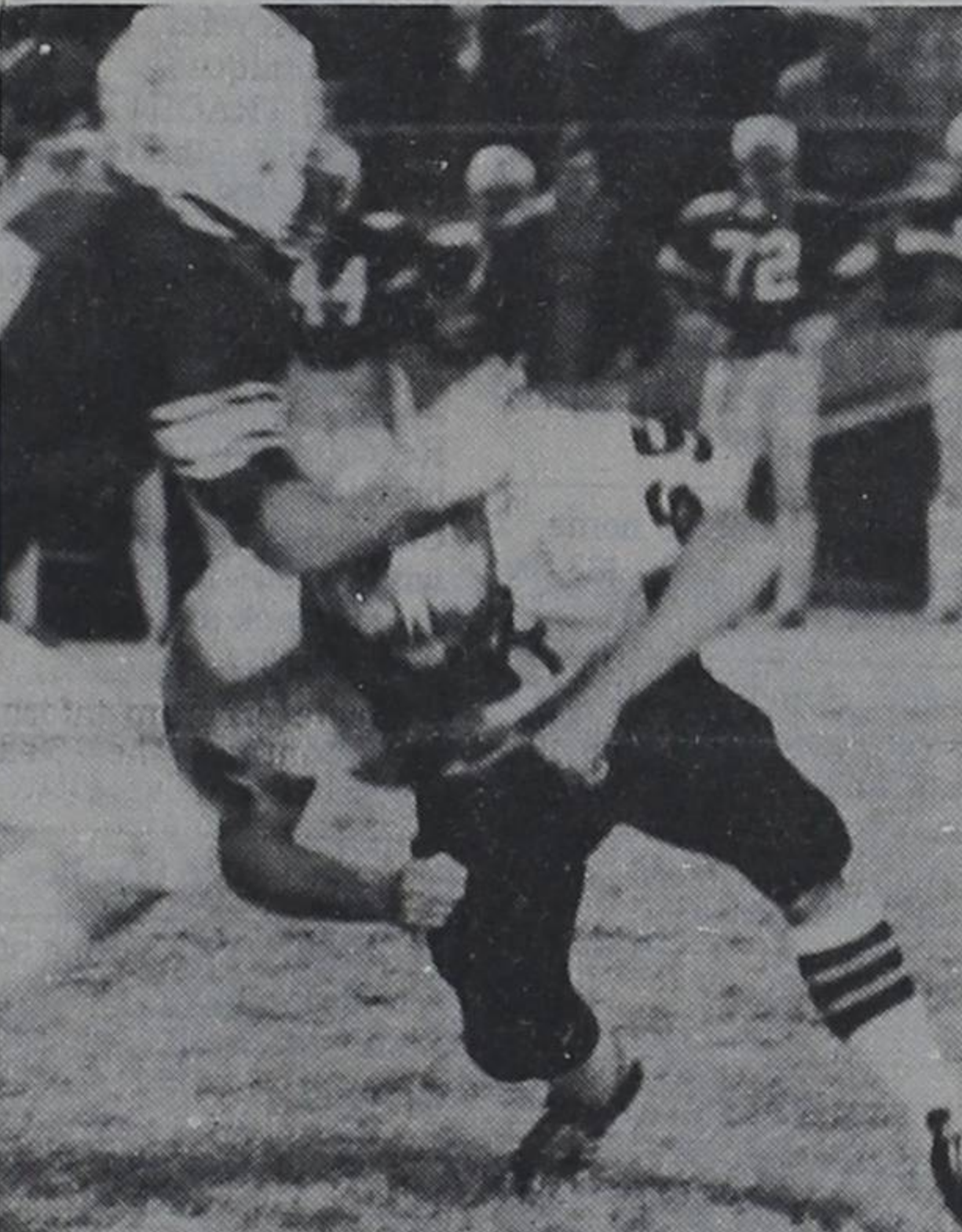
Kirkpatrick put the finishing touch on the 34-0 score with 24 seconds left in the contest.

Court Fines Operators

AUSTIN - Nine oil and gas operators have been fined from \$8,500 to \$80,000 by the Travis County District Court this month for failing to properly plug oil and gas wells. The operators were directed to plug the wells within a certain number of days or face contempt proceedings.

Suits were brought against the operators by the state Attorney General's office at the request of the Railroad Commission. The affected operators, and the fines assessed, were:

Balcones Oil Co. Inc., Austin, \$8,500; J. D. Production Co., Laredo, \$20,000; Cerco Petroleum Inc., Abilene, \$10,000; Tom E. Ricks, Odessa, \$10,000; Ralph Woods, Inc., Odessa, \$14,000; Gilbert J. Moore Jr., Longview, \$16,000; T. D. Humphrey Jr., Dallas, \$20,000; Gee and Stone, Wichita Falls, \$30,000; Cortez Corp., Odessa, \$80,000.

In all the cases, Railroad Commission investigators found the operators had abandoned wells without properly plugging them, posing a potential pollution danger. Commission orders directing that the wells be plugged in accordance with commission rules were ignored.

In 1981, the commission referred 37 well plugging cases to the Attorney General for action. So far this year, more than 160 such cases have been forwarded by the commission.

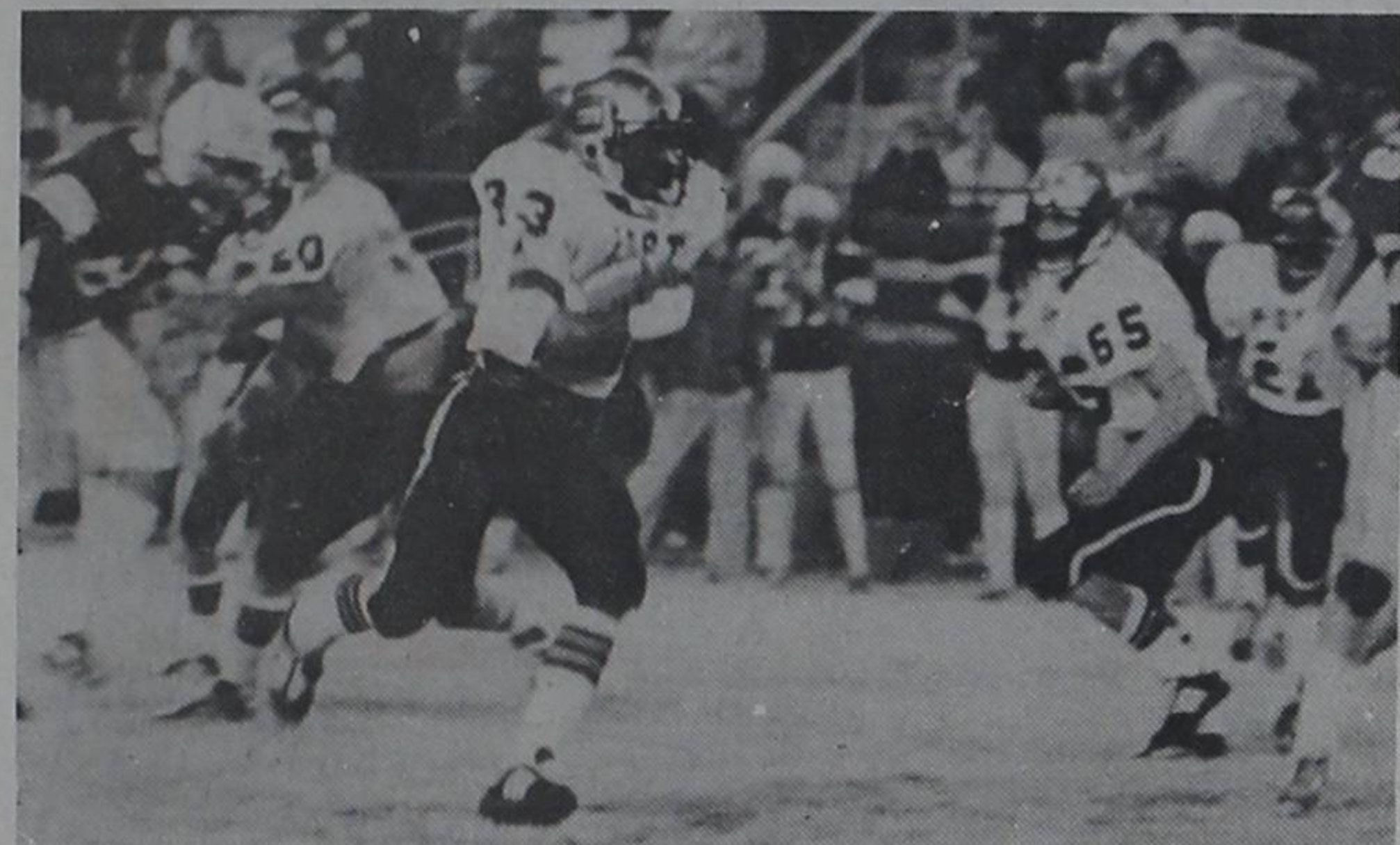

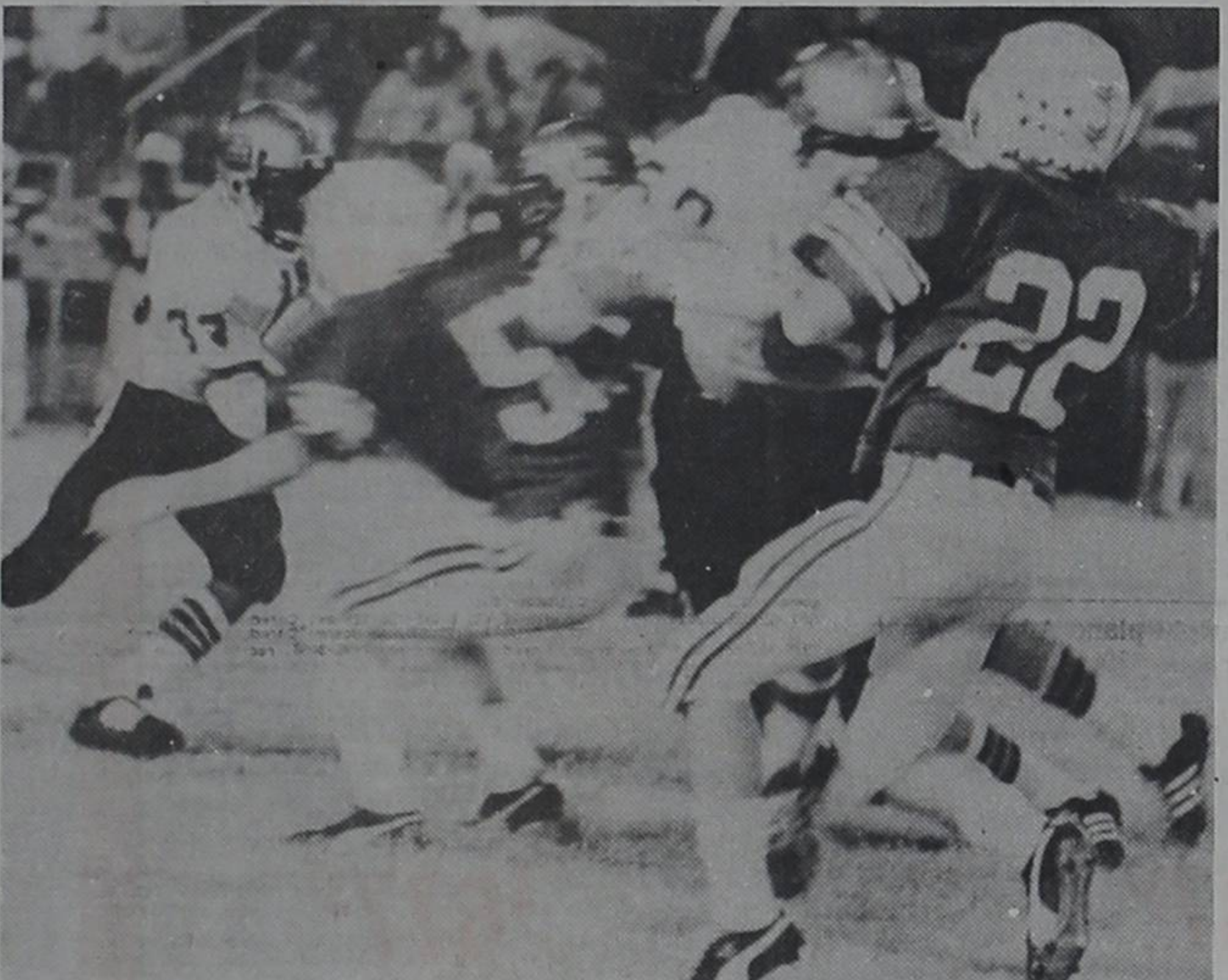

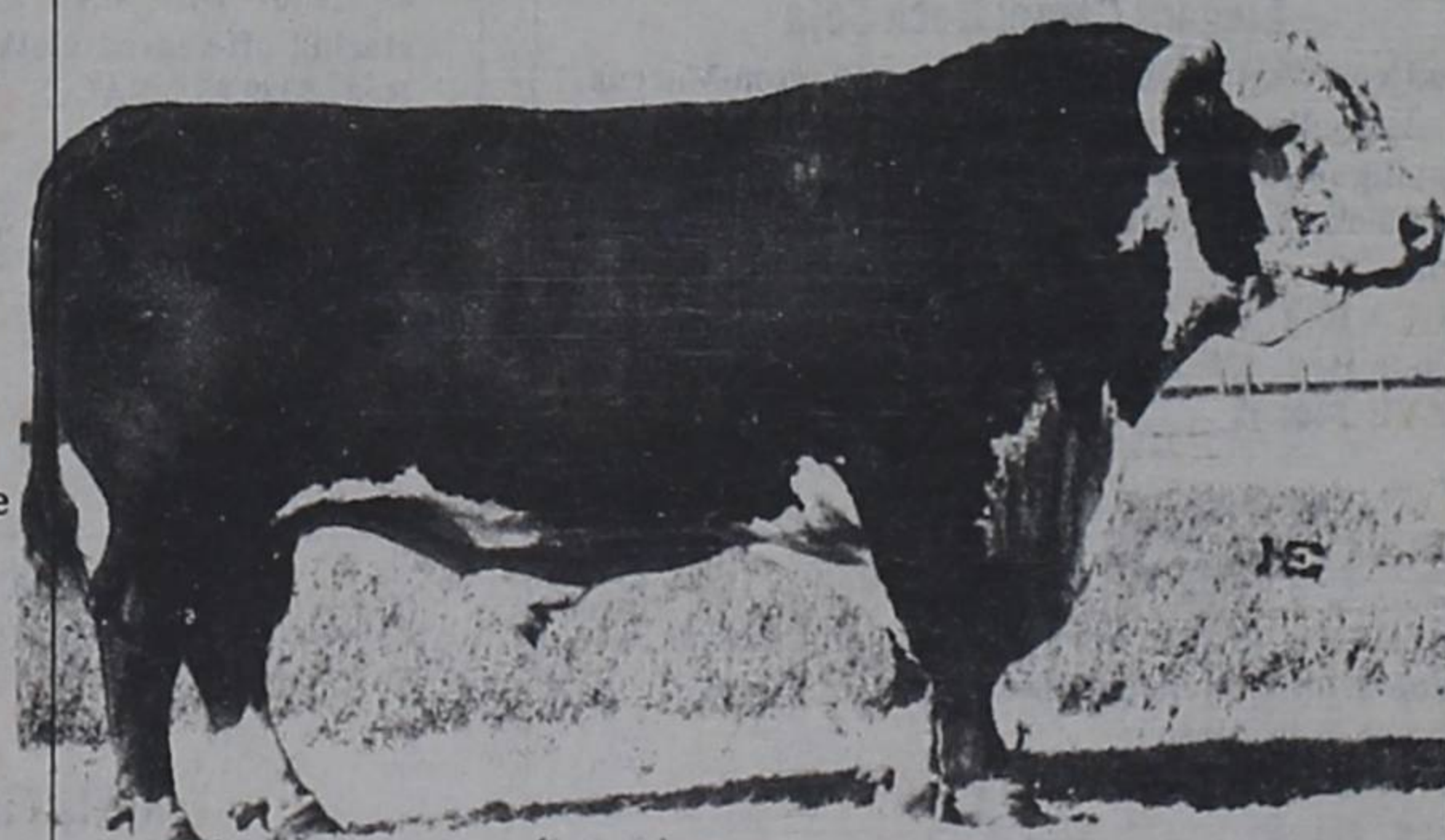

EMT Conference

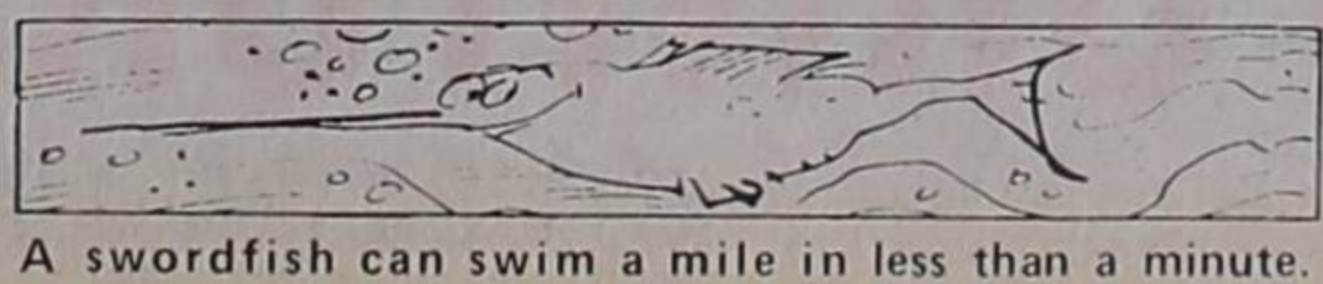
The third annual SPEMS conference will be held Saturday, Nov. 13 at the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center.

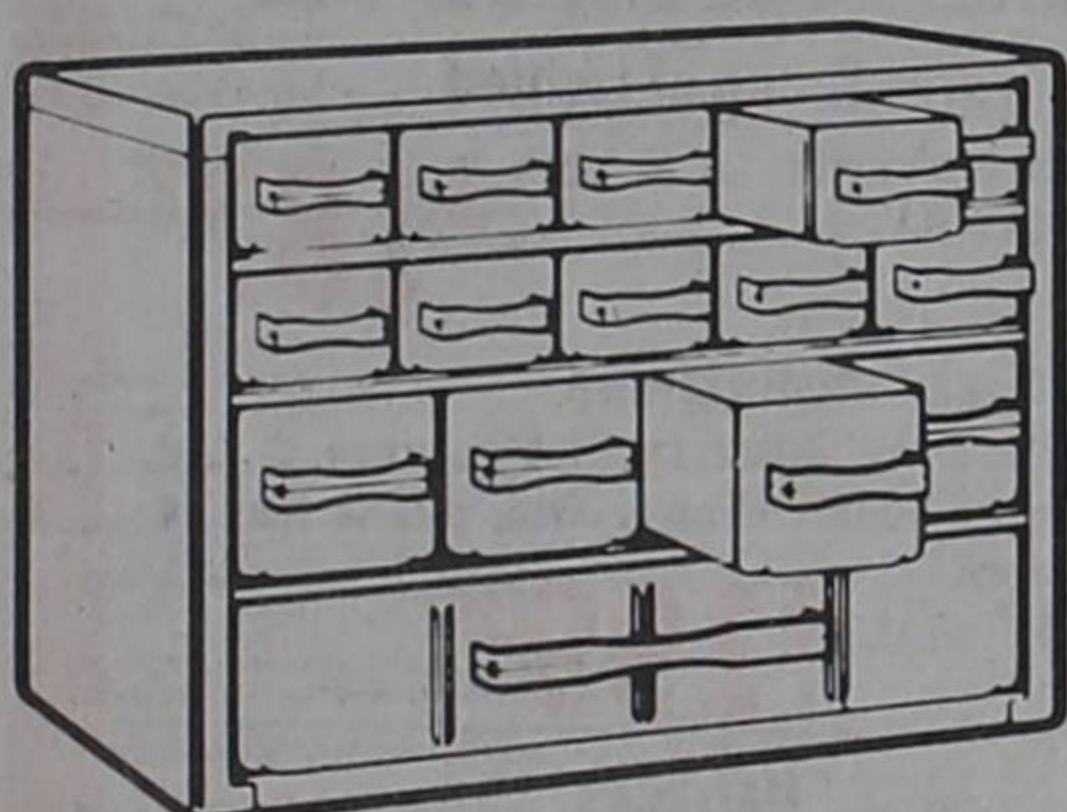

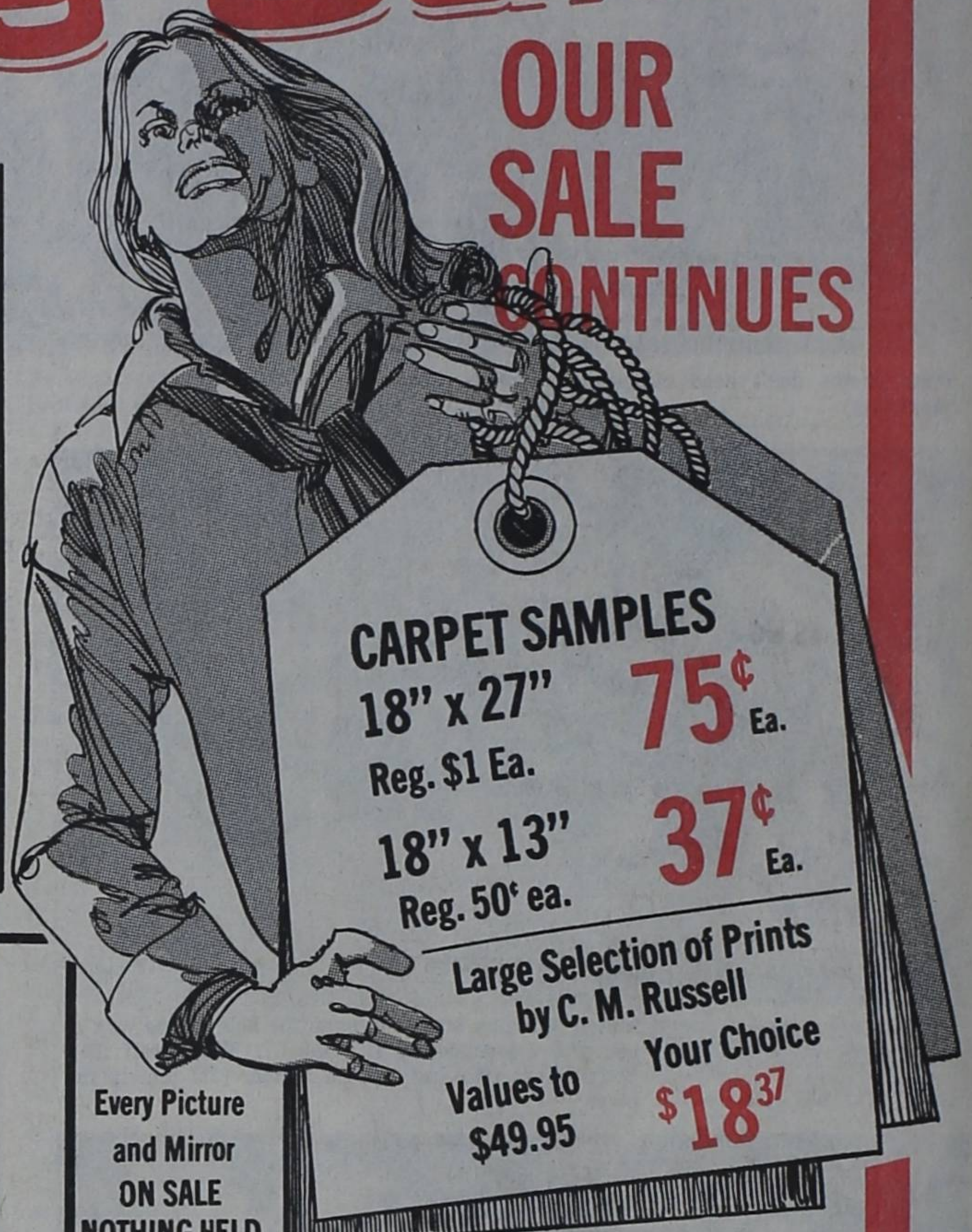
