SCHOOL BOARD RESCHEDULES

The Post Independent School District Board of Trustees meeting, which was to have been held last Tuesday, has been rescheduled to next Tuesday, Nov. 16, at 7:30 p.m. in the high school library.

NEW SUNDAY EDITION

Subscribers to the Post Dispatch got an extra bonus this week as the first Sunday edition was delivered to subscriber homes in the city of Post and through the mail to other subscribers.

The new Sunday edition is an expansion of service to the community, and will be included as part of the annual \$8.50 subscription rate to subscribers in Garza and surrounding counties.

The "two for the price of one" is designed to encourage area residents to become subscribers to the Post Dispatch.

The free classified advertising service to non-commercial, non-profit and private party individuals continues as part of the Sunday edition.

Deadlines for the Dispatch are Mondays at 5 p.m. for Wednesday and Thursdays at 5 p.m. for Sunday.

"All you have to do to get our new Sunday edition delivered to your home is call us at 495-2816...we'll send you a bill or you can stop by our office at 123 E. Main," publisher Wesley W. Burnett emphasizes.

City Council Delays Action on Grader

In a heavy meeting Monday night, the City Council opened bids for a motor grader from three Lubbock firms including Yellowhouse Machinery, West Texas Equipment and Plains Machinery. After studying the bids, the council decided to discuss the bids more

carefully without making a decision at that time.

Dr. James Matthews appeared before the council to request a drilling permit application on what used to be the old golf course. City attorney recommended to the council to approve the request to substitute \$100,000.00 CD as guarantee on performance of city ordinances in lieu of posting the one million dollar bond as presently required. He also approved the liability insurance policy as submitted by Matthews Oil Co. The council voted to grant the drilling application.

The council also approved a request to install a mobile home on back of a family home lot with the understanding that the substandard home would be removed by January 1983.

Clayton Yeager of Parkhill, Smith Cooper, Inc. met with the council to discuss alternatives to drainage problems of Westhaven Addition area. After legal questions arose over easement rights, the council sent him back to the drawing board for other options. The most serious drainage problem comes from 13th St. down Avenue S and the council asked him to study this area with recommendations to come at a later meeting.

Terms of Don Smith and Bo Jackson on the White River Board are to expire in December and with Don Smith leaving the city, the council approved Jim Brown to serve on the board and reappointed Jackson to another term.

Curtis Hudman and Don Payne, both members of the Post Housing Authority submitted their resignations

from the board and the council voted to approve Mrs. Lois Cook to fill one of the terms with yet another appointment to be made.

A problem concerning the building of the new ambulance garage was discussed when it was learned that a neighbor had objected to the building being built on the west end of the hospital. Jack Alexander told the committee that the hospital would approve an alternate site for the building being on the northwest corner of the hospital property.

Insurance coverage for Emergency Medical Services is to expire in December with the present policy being carried by the Tom Power Agency. The council voted to renew the insurance with it's present carrier.

The Parkhill, Smith Cooper firm was also asked to look into the present sewer system. The water, brought up to specifications by the Texas Water Board, is pure enough for resale or usage as water to the cemetery. The firm was asked to look into the feasibility of using the water to oil companies and the laying of a pipe to the cemetery.

Attorney Morton also reported to the council that he is now writing the animal ordinance and will bring it to the council in the near future.

Before adjourning, the council approved the monthly bills and invoices.

Mayor Pro-Tem Bill Pool acted in the absence of Mayor McCrary.

Child Abuse

It's very difficult sometimes for people to understand the difference between a good ole fashioned spanking and child abuse.

There is a fine line between discipline and physical damage.

According to the Texas Department of Human Resources, there are some simple guidelines to look for in adult behavior when child abuse is suspected:

Uses harsher discipline than warranted for the child's age, condition or offense;

Explains a child's injury unbelievable, inappropriately, or not at all;

Seems unconcerned with a child's well being;

Depicts a child as bad, evil, a monster, etc.;

Misuses alcohol or drugs;

Attempts to conceal child's injury or protects the person responsible; or

Mentions being physically or emotionally mistreated or abused or neglected as a child.

Sexual Abuse

Child's appearance:

Has torn, stained or bloody underclothing;

Experiences pain or itching in the genital or rectal areas; or

Has venereal disease.

Child's behavior:

Appears withdrawn, or engages in overt fantasy or baby-like behavior;

Has poor relationships with other children;

Is unwilling to participate in physical activities;

Engages in delinquent acts or runs away;

Reports being sexually assaulted; or

Frequently engages in sexually suggestive or promiscuous behavior.

Parent or caretaker's behavior:

Seems very protective or jealous of child;

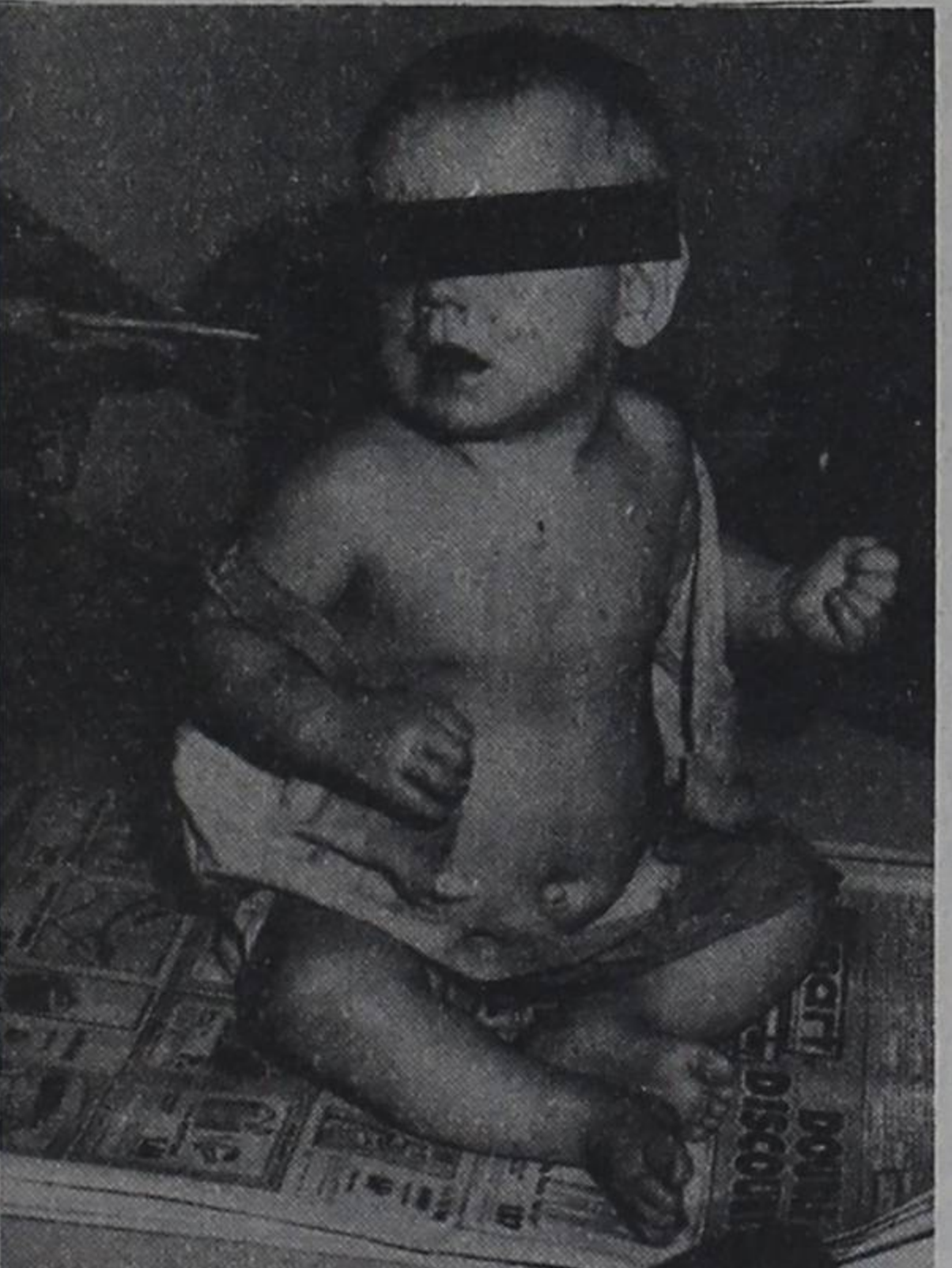
May encourage child to engage in prostitution or in sexual acts;

Misuses alcohol or drugs;

Frequently absent from the home; or

Mentions having had sexual activity with own parents.

Suspected child abuse cases should be reported to the Texas Department of Human Resources, in Garza County, the number if 495-2881.



Two Men Charged in October Hardware Store Burglary

Following a month long investigation by Garza County Officers, two suspects were arrested for suspicious of burglary of Handy Hardware on October 2. The two suspects, Julian Saldivar, and Jerry Solis, were arrested Monday night by Garza County officers.

Bond was set at \$25,000 each, and both suspects remain in the Garza County Jail.

The commissioners voted to adjourn until 8:30 Monday night when they met with the city council to hear consultants Park, Hill, Smith and Cooper concerning the airport.

Antelopes Ready for Big Mustangs

The Denver City Mustangs are big...and they go to Big Spring to meet the Post Antelopes with a 9-1 record, losing only to Frenship 27-6.

The Mustangs are representing District 4AAA as the second place team in the bi-district playoff.

Leading the offensive and defensive line are Marc Curtis (55), 215 pound junior; Brit Clair (74), 6'6" 215 pound senior and Greg Williams (60) a 210 pound senior.

Operating from a veer type offense, the Mustangs are directed by quarterback Ty Sefcik (11), a 155 pound junior.

He options the ball to running backs Butch Burkhalter (20), a 175 pound senior and David Hemmeline (42), a 190 pound senior.

"They throw the ball fairly well," Antelope coach David Thompson observes, "and they run the option and the sweep."

The Mustangs use a 5-2 defensive alignment with linebacker Ronnie Glaze (50), 145 pound senior, in on most tackles.

The Antelopes are expected to enter the contest in good physical condition, with Richard Cisneros and Giles Dalby both returning from minor injuries.

Cisneros suffered a twisted knee in the Lockney game and Dalby twisted his ankle last week at Idalou.

"From here on out it's going to get tougher and tougher," coach Thompson comments, "we're going to work real hard and be ready Friday."

A computer analysis of the six inventories indicates

areas of greatest, intermediate, and lesser strengths, thus providing insight into one's basic nature as a unique human being.

Ellis, a certified Bi-Polar teacher, states three basic goals for the seminar: understanding and appreciating yourself, understanding and appreciating others, and improving relationships.

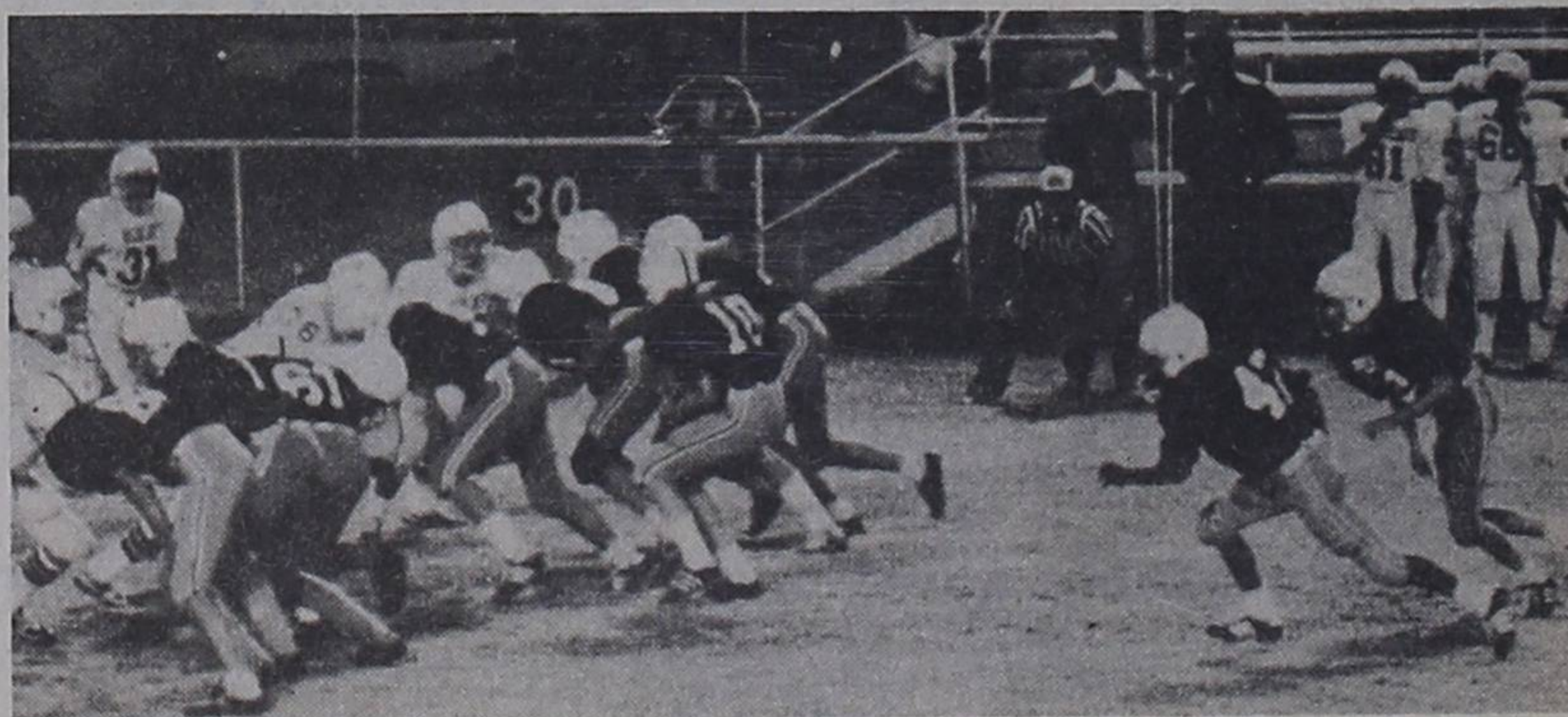

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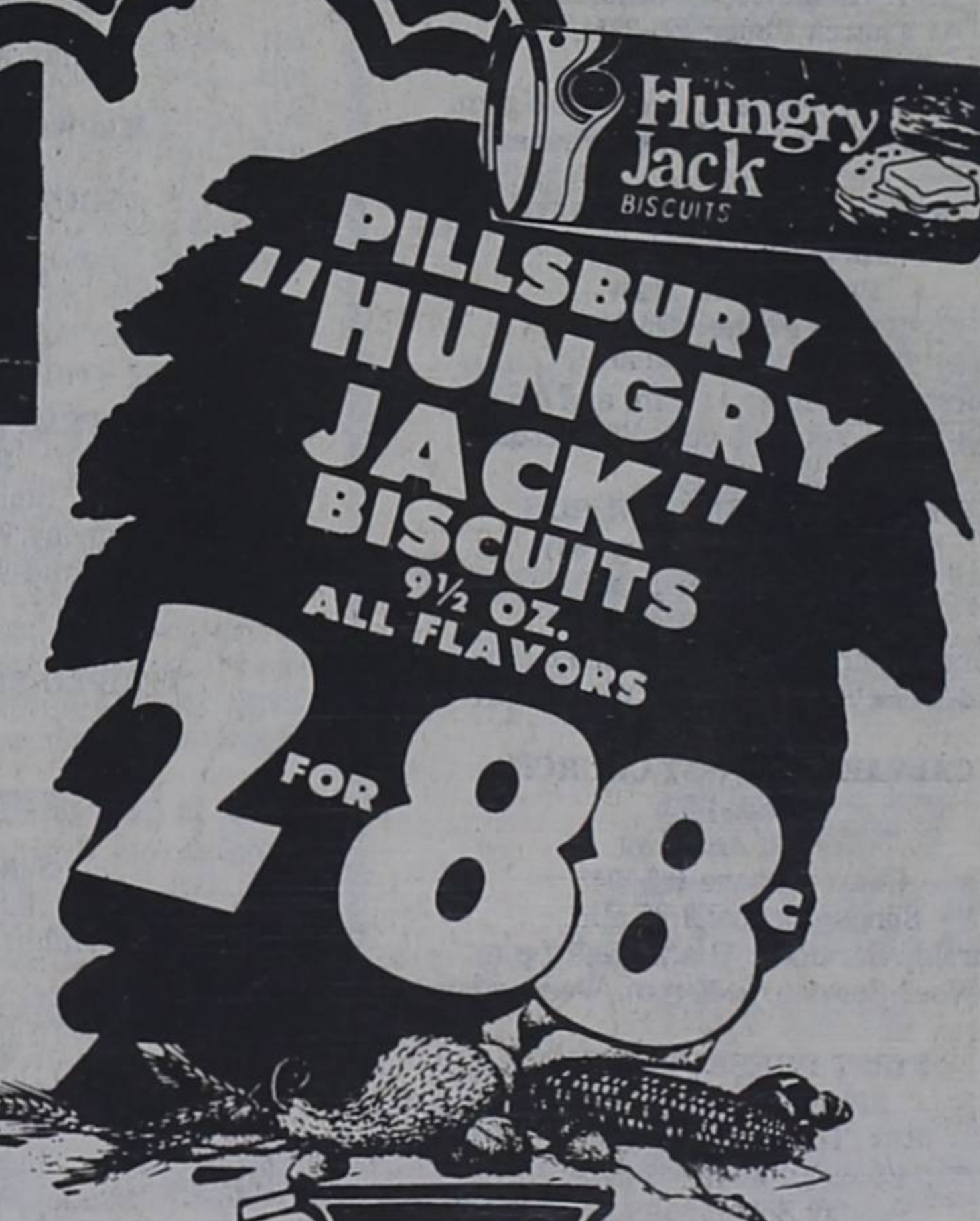
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Creation Theory

This response should not be made because it is "the right thing to do", or that it "makes one feel good", or from a sense of guilt. It should arise from the depth of the heart in an act of genuine love and concern for another human being who has been created in the very image of God.

It is only by living as a creature of dignity, by seeing one another as true daughters and sons of God that we may truly profess with faith and conviction that God created man in his own image.

The Post Antelopes completed the regular football season with a total of 4,472 yards offense and 427 points.

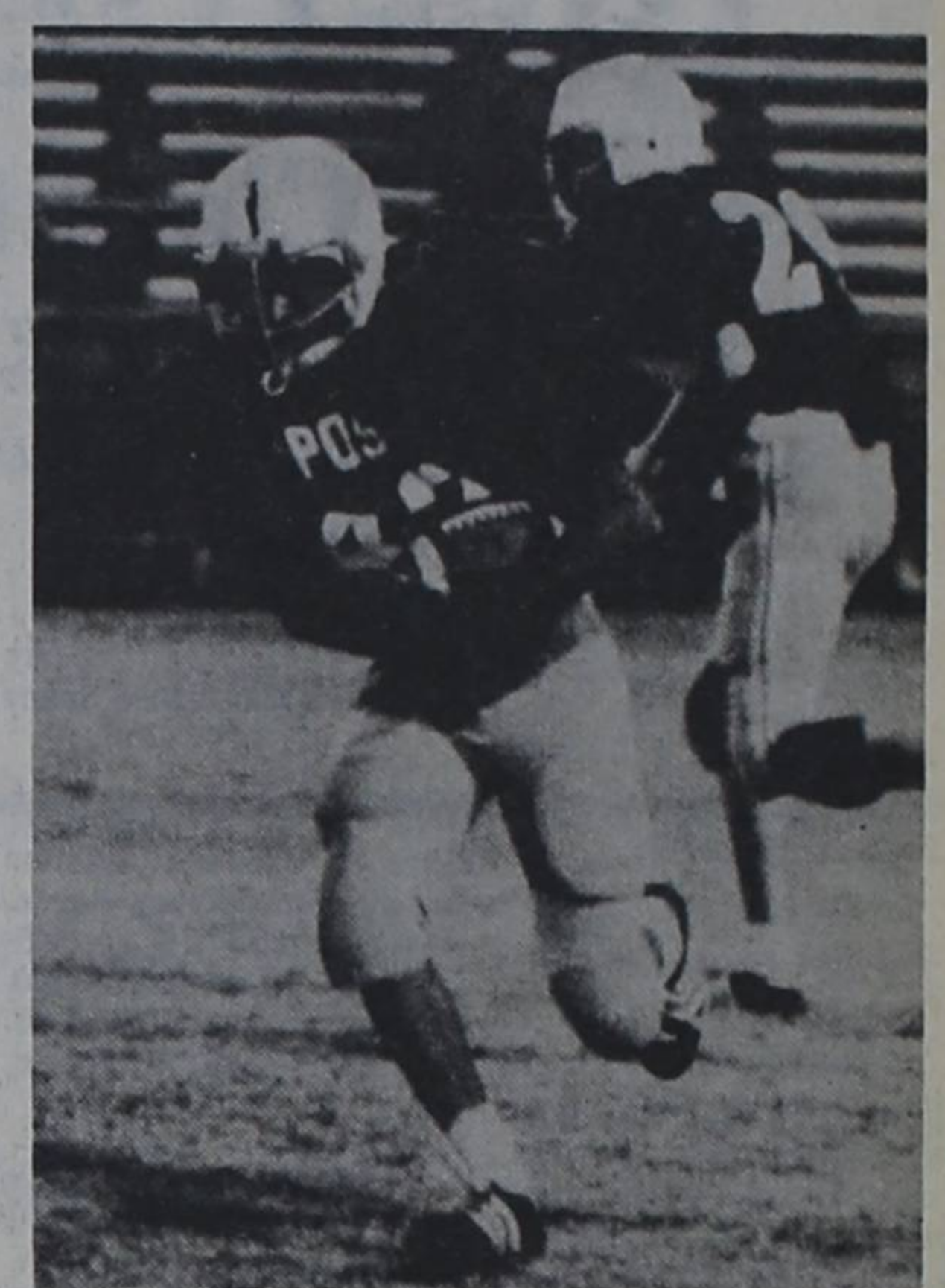
The District 3AAA champs held their opponents to 1,710 yards rushing and 346 yards passing for a total of 2056.

The Antelopes averaged 7.5 yards per carry and 21 yards per pass play and an astonishing 447.2 yards offense per game.

The Lopes were intercepted 11 times, fumbled the ball away 11 times and clicked for 186 first downs.

They intercepted five opponent passes, recovered 20 fumbles and gave up only 125 first downs.

The Antelopes outscored opponents 69-13 in the first quarter, 149-12 in the second, 96-0 in the third and 113-12 in the fourth...allowing only 37 points total during the season.

The Post junior varsity football team completed a 7-2 season last week, dropping the final game to Idalou 26-8.

The Antelopes picked up 188 yards rushing.

Curt Greer scored the lone touchdown following a 27 yard drive.

Individually, Milton Williams leads the team in yards rushing with 1,682 on 184 carries for an average of 9.14 yards, scored 37 touchdowns and caught 11 passes for another 272 yards.

Richard Cisneros gained 481 yards on 62 carries and four touchdowns, Daniel Gonzales carried 28 times for 213 yards and three touchdowns;

Tim Tannehill got 191 yards on 41 carries and 2 touchdowns, Will Kirkpatrick picked up 179 yards on 36 carries, eight touchdowns and 53 extra points;

Marvin Wynne scored two touchdowns, carried the ball 22 times for 158 yards;

Melvin Wynne carried 13 times for 110 yards, Giles Dalby got 53 yards on 10 carries and one touchdown and Jeff Taylor carried the ball seven times for 54 yards and three touchdowns.

Bill Black and Irvin Price each scored one touchdown.

Tannehill completed 63 of 97 passes for a 65 percent completion rate and a total of 1,331 yards and four interceptions.

Jeff Taylor connected on one of two passes for 14 yards and had one intercepted.

Kirkpatrick led receivers with 34 catches and 672 yards, Black had 316 yards on 17 catches, Williams caught 11 for 272 and James Lee caught five for 74 yards.

Kirkpatrick and Lee also were credited with intercepting three passes, Toby Craft picked off two and one each was credited to Taylor, Dalby and Felix Bustos.

Craft was leading tackler with 180, followed by Dalby with 137, Black with 132, L.D. Harper on 127, Cisneros and Price with 122 and Marvin Wynne with 97.

Craft also led in fumble recoveries with four, Marvin Wynne had three and two each for Dalby, Cisneros and Gonzales.

Harper got 10 quarterback sacks and six each were credited to Black and Cisneros.

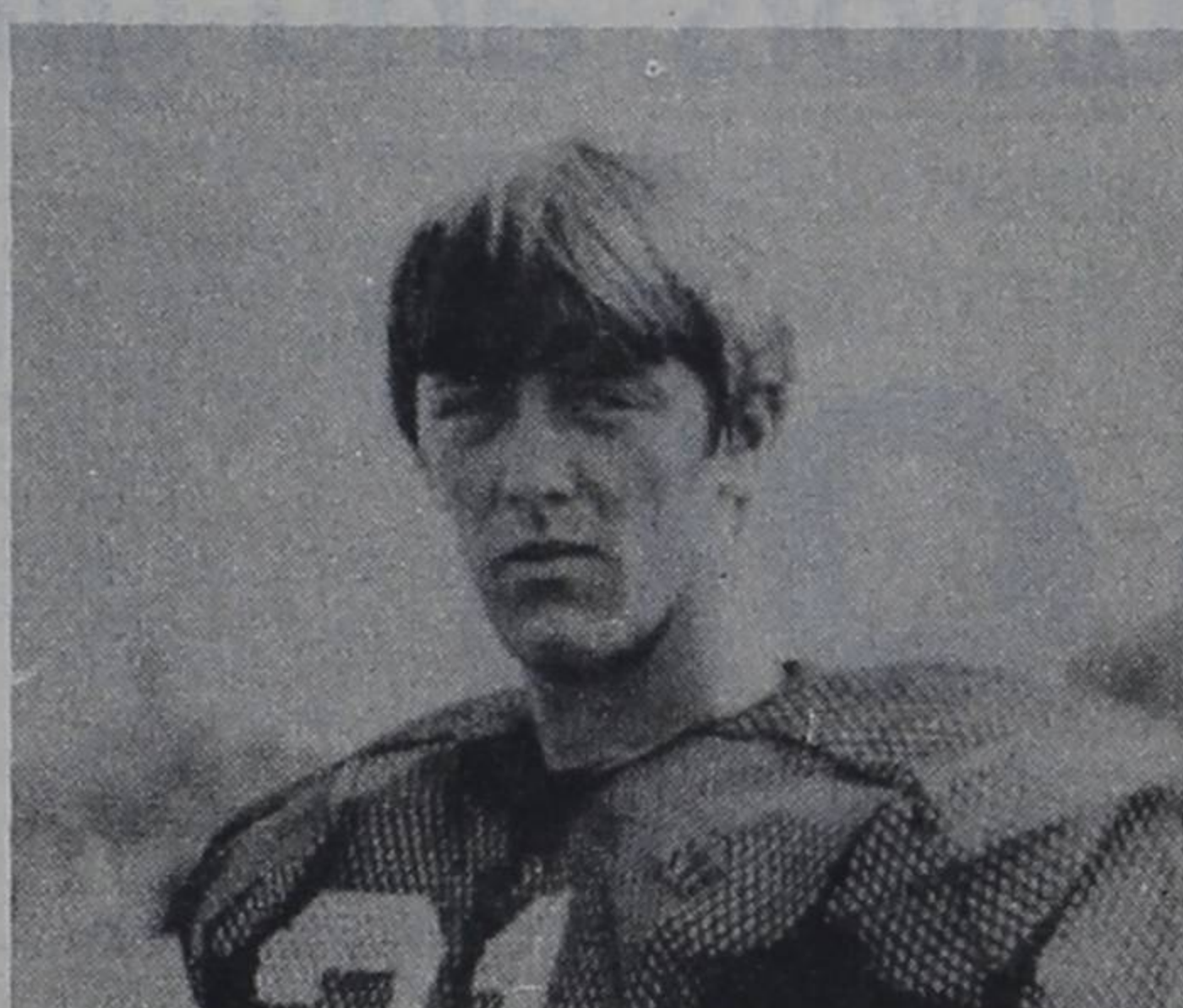

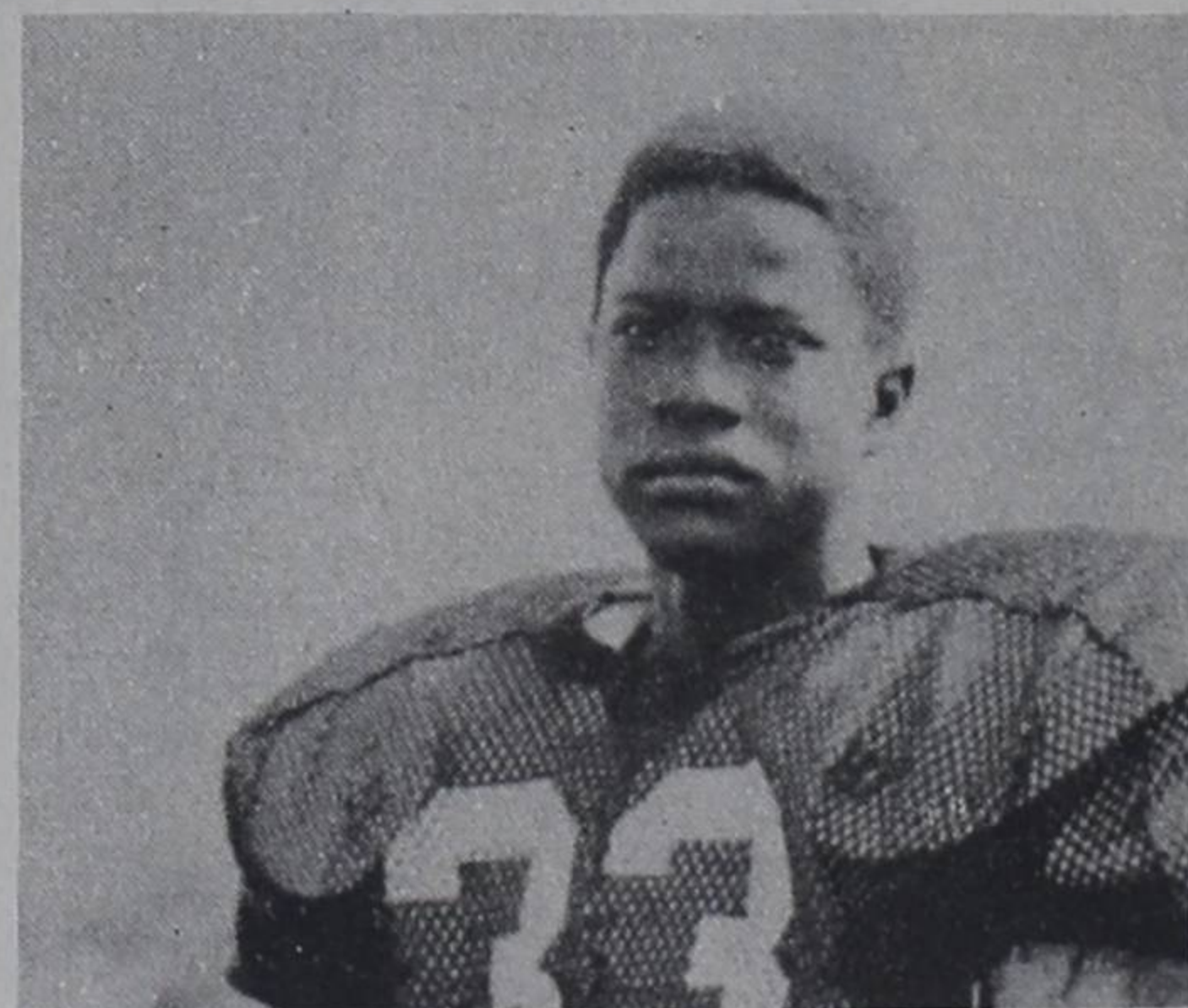

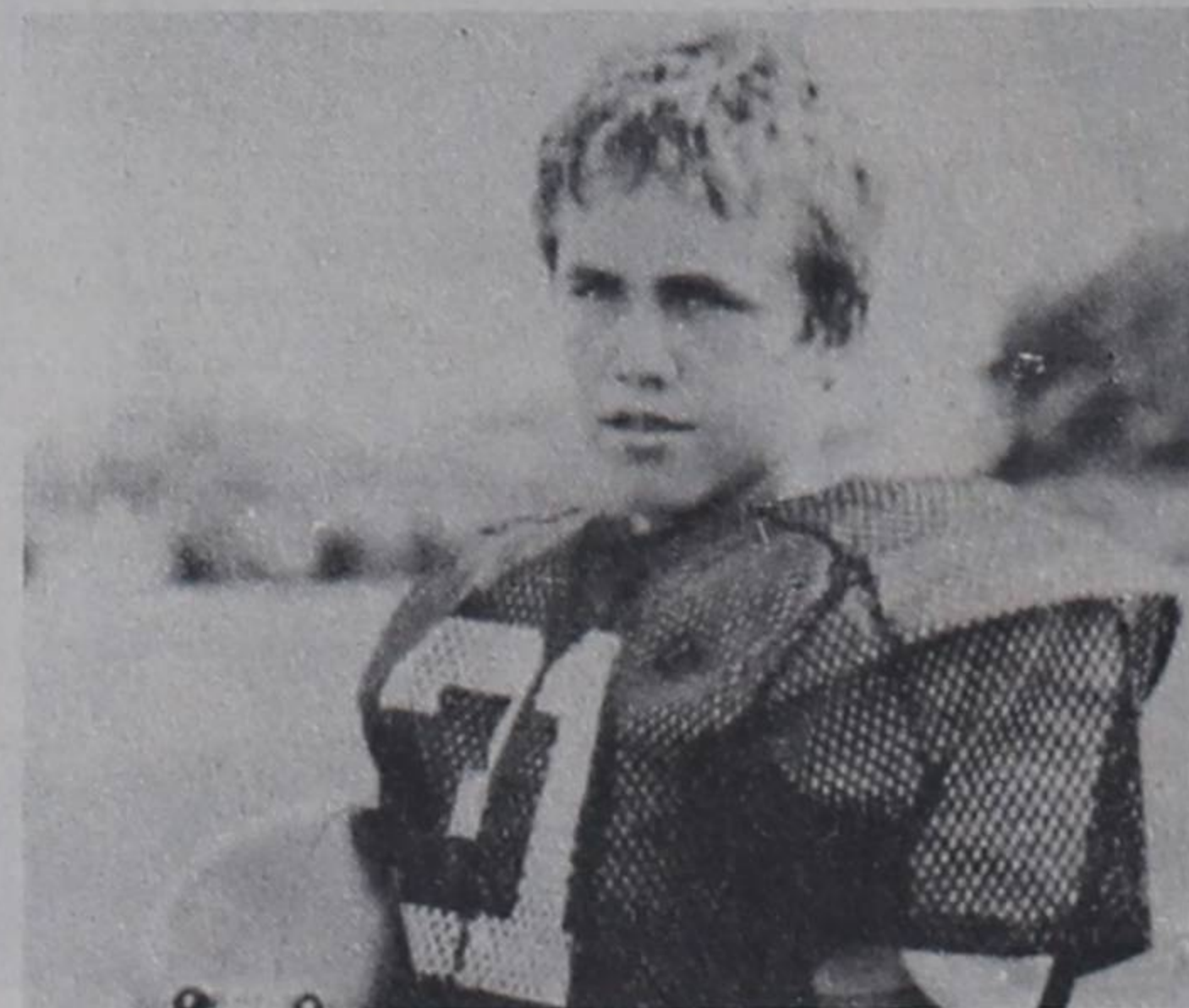
