The season is definitely winding down, and hopefully will be finished by Christmas.

#### POST PESO HELPS SHOPPERS



What's Happening in Home Economics By Cheryl Walker ...



## Visiting Nurse Service provides skilled nursing to persons homebound

Visiting Nurse Service provides intermittent skilled nursing to persons in their homes when such care is necessary and ordered by a physician. Procedures commonly ordered are dressings, catheter insertions, and care, ostomy care, special treatments, would irrigations, injections, tube feedings, intravenous therapy, personal care and skin care.

Nursing assessments, evaluation and health teaching are done as are monitoring of disease processes and supervision of medication changes prescribed by physicians. Nurses are available to assist hospital personnel with discharge planning for patients making the transition from hospital to home. Blood samples can be drawn for laboratory from hospital home. Blood samples can be drawn for laboratory analysis for those persons who have difficulty leaving home for this procedure.

Physical therapy and certain other services may also be provided when ordered.

The home office of Visiting Nurse Service is at 3212 34th Street in Lubbock. Visiting Nurse Service is a private non-profit corporation serving 22 counties around Lubock. The agency is licensed by the State Health Department and can bill Medicare and Medicaid for patient services. Other sources of payment are through private insurance, campus, VA and private fee for service.

The elderly have benefitted greatly from the program and often need the support of the service to remain safely and comfortable in their homes.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.




