

Cold Wet Weather Invades Area

Post's first really hard winter storm, blew into Post late Tuesday and held its grip on Post and the surrounding area through the end of the week. The front followed unseasonably warm weather into the area. Freezing rain and drizzle slowed traffic, and caused hazardous driving all over the South Plains, with temperatures falling to the

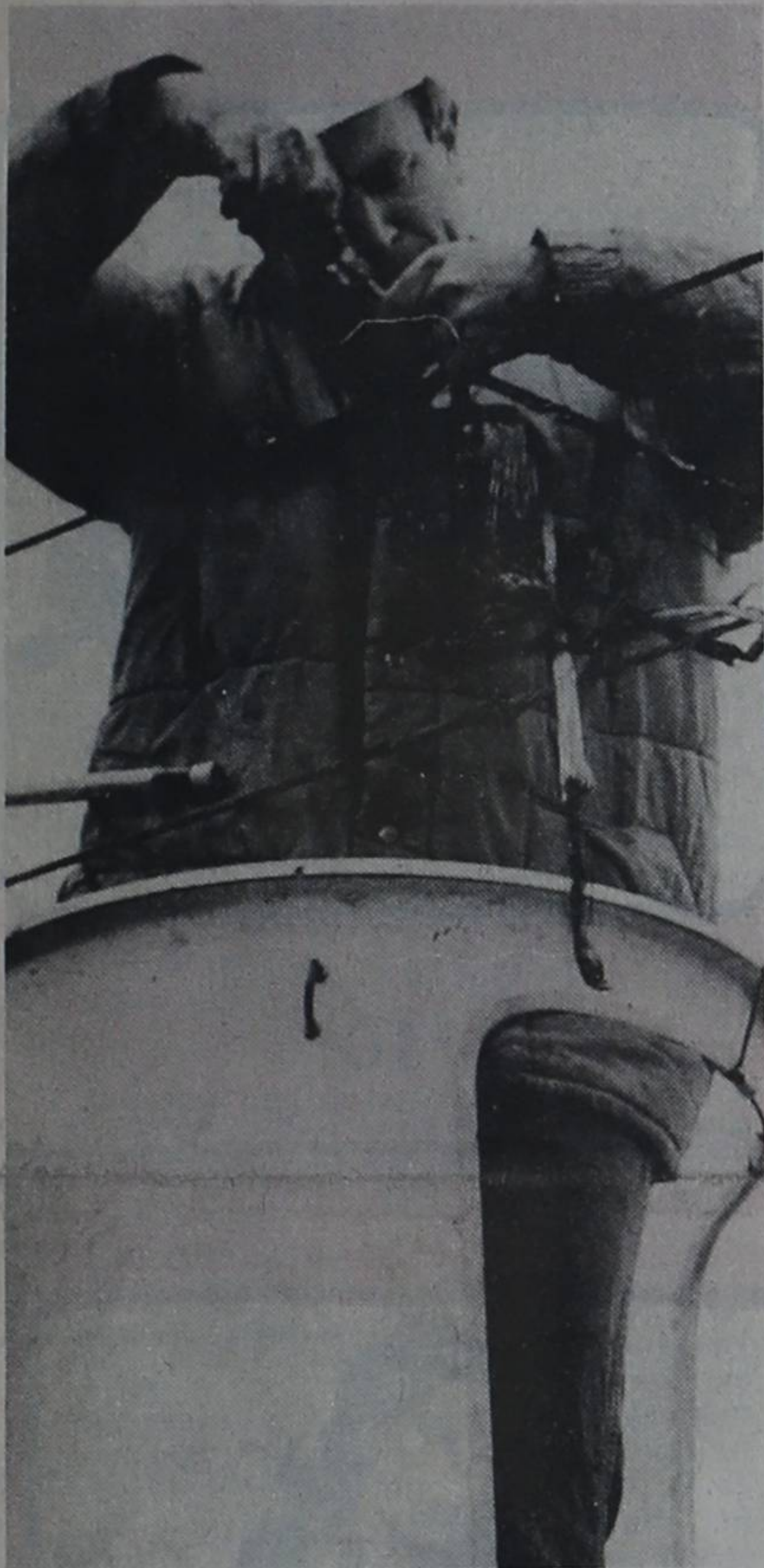

Telephone Service Restored

Local telephone service was disrupted here early Friday morning when a power line fell across a 200 pair cable and burned the cable into, on Avenue O.

A cable splicer was dispatched to Post to restore the burned cable Friday morning and service was restored Friday afternoon.

Hospital Shows Savings

In a recent hospital board meeting, Administrator Maritta Reed advised board trustees that due to some changes in the hospital's heating system, the hospital has cut its' natural gas consumption by over 64 percent over what it was using some three years ago.

Some of the changes the hospital made included changing from steam to hot water and installed two hot water heaters instead of using the boilers.

It was also noted that the hospital had a 25.76 percent smaller usage of natural gas for October '82 over October '81.

The board of directors also heard an audit report of the 1981-82 hospital year.

An application was made to the trustees by Pasupathy Padmanabhan, an interest in Lubbock and was approved to the courtesy staff of Garza Memorial.

An indigent application was made to the board, but was tabled for outcome of AFDC application.

Expenses for an office visit and a prescription were approved by the board for a child following a call from the Child Welfare Board.

A purchase of a new stove for the hospital kitchen was discussed but tabled until a later meeting to see if the present stove could be repaired.

The board approved purchase of a laryngoscope with all attachments from Whittaker General Medical in the amount of \$564.80.

The power wire was thought to have fallen because of accumulations of ice.

The telephone company reported no other major problems during the icy spell other than the cable outage which affected approximately 200 customers.

Advertisement for bids on cardiac monitoring equipment was also approved for Garza Memorial Hospital by trustees.

Due to changes in Medicare reimbursement procedures, it was suggested that the board consider increasing the costs of semi-private rooms, but no action was taken on the matter.

A \$10 fee was established by the trustees for out-patients who would be sent to the hospital for treatment such as suturing, casting, etc.

Delinquent accounts in the amount of \$2,397.63 was written off by the trustees and monthly bills were approved for payment.

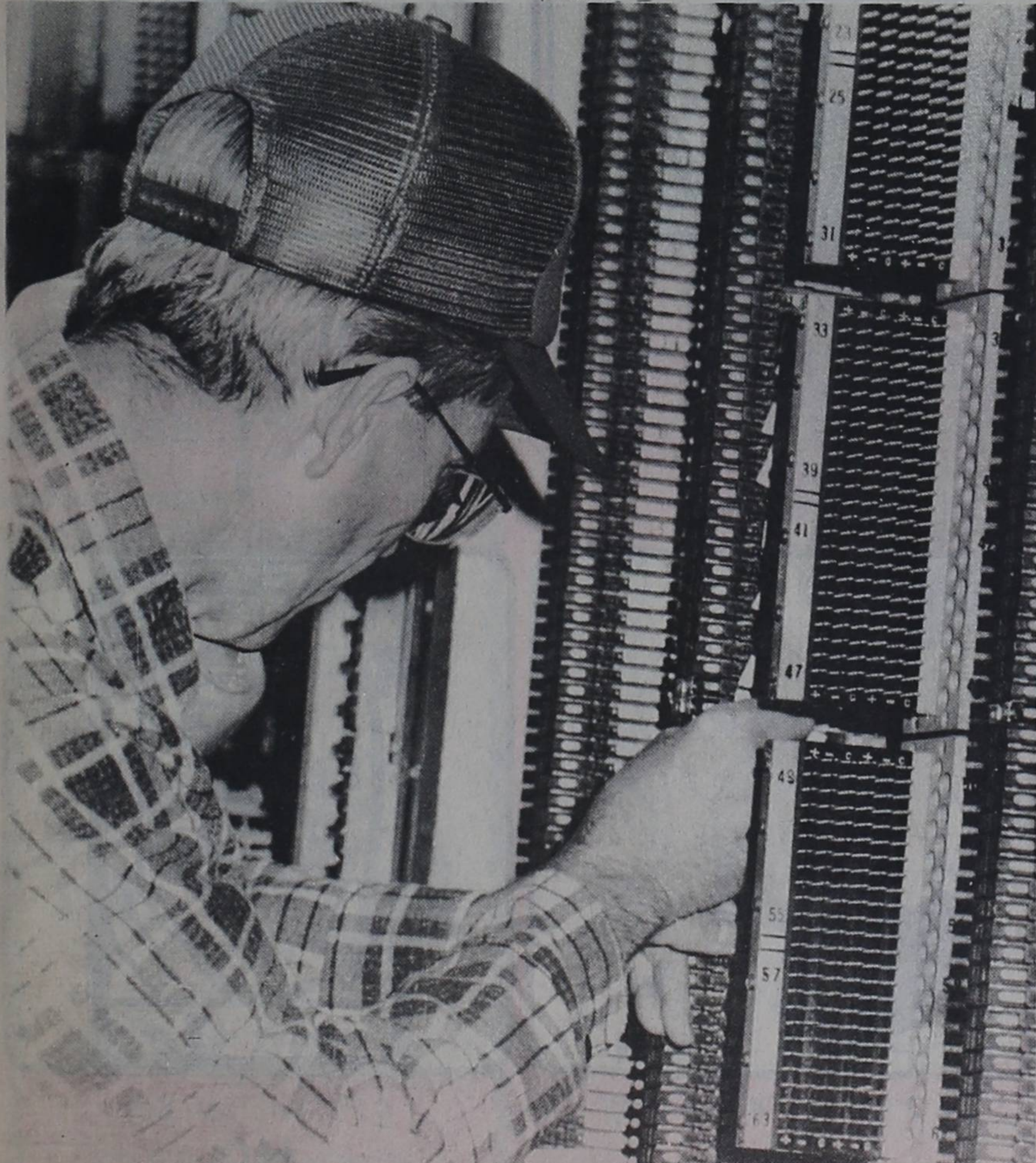
Merry Christmas greetings are also a popular part of the special edition.

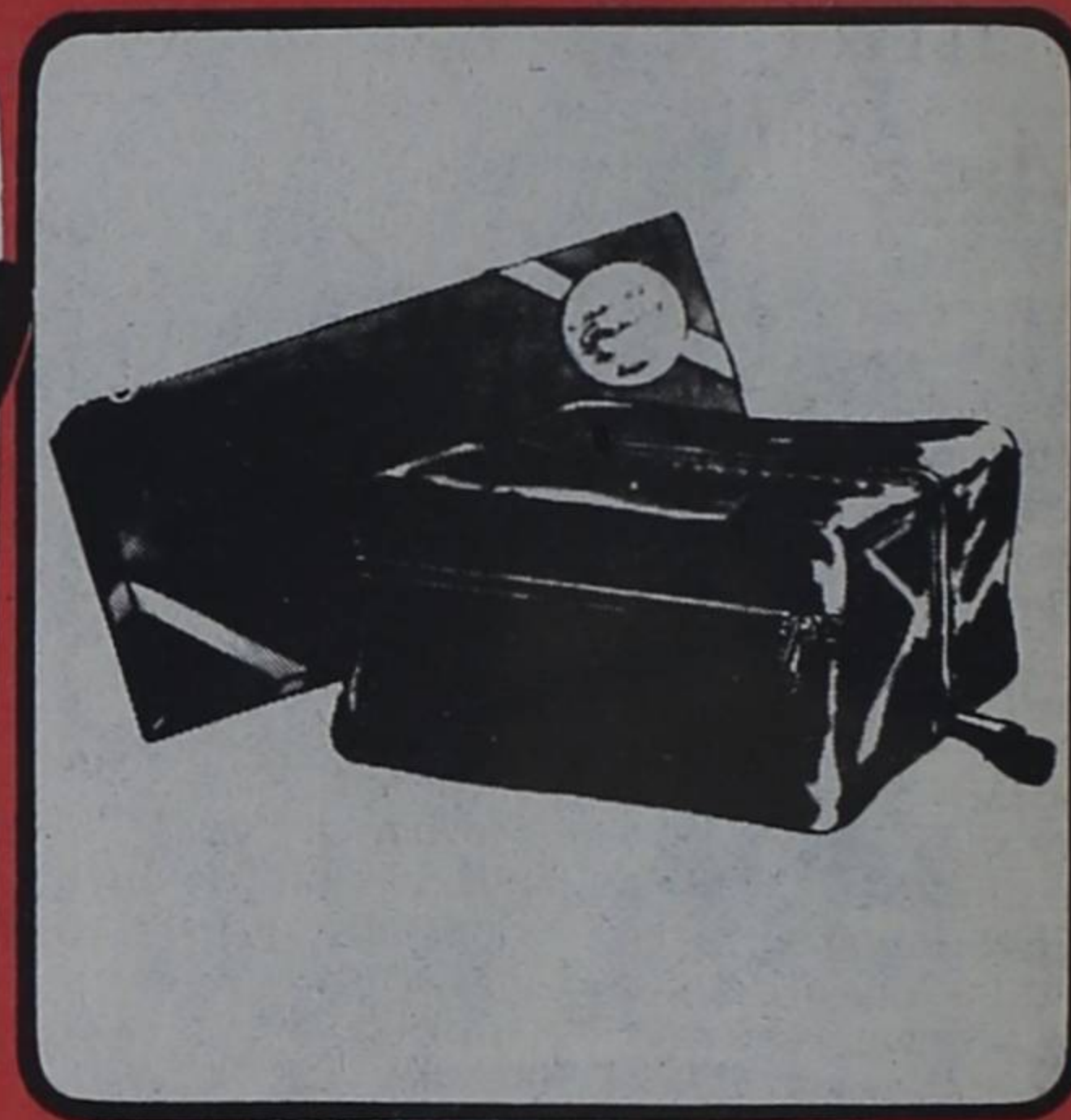

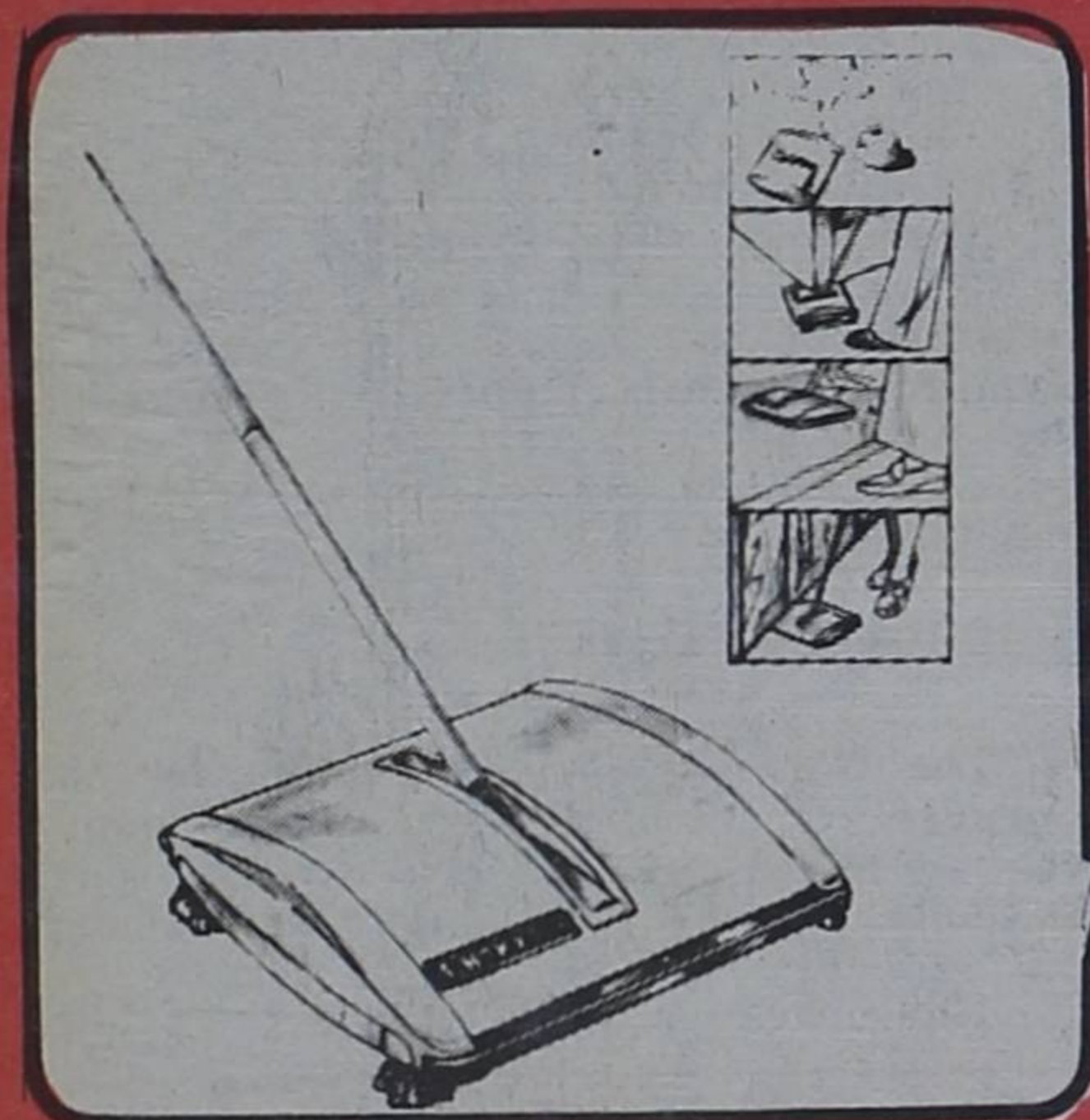

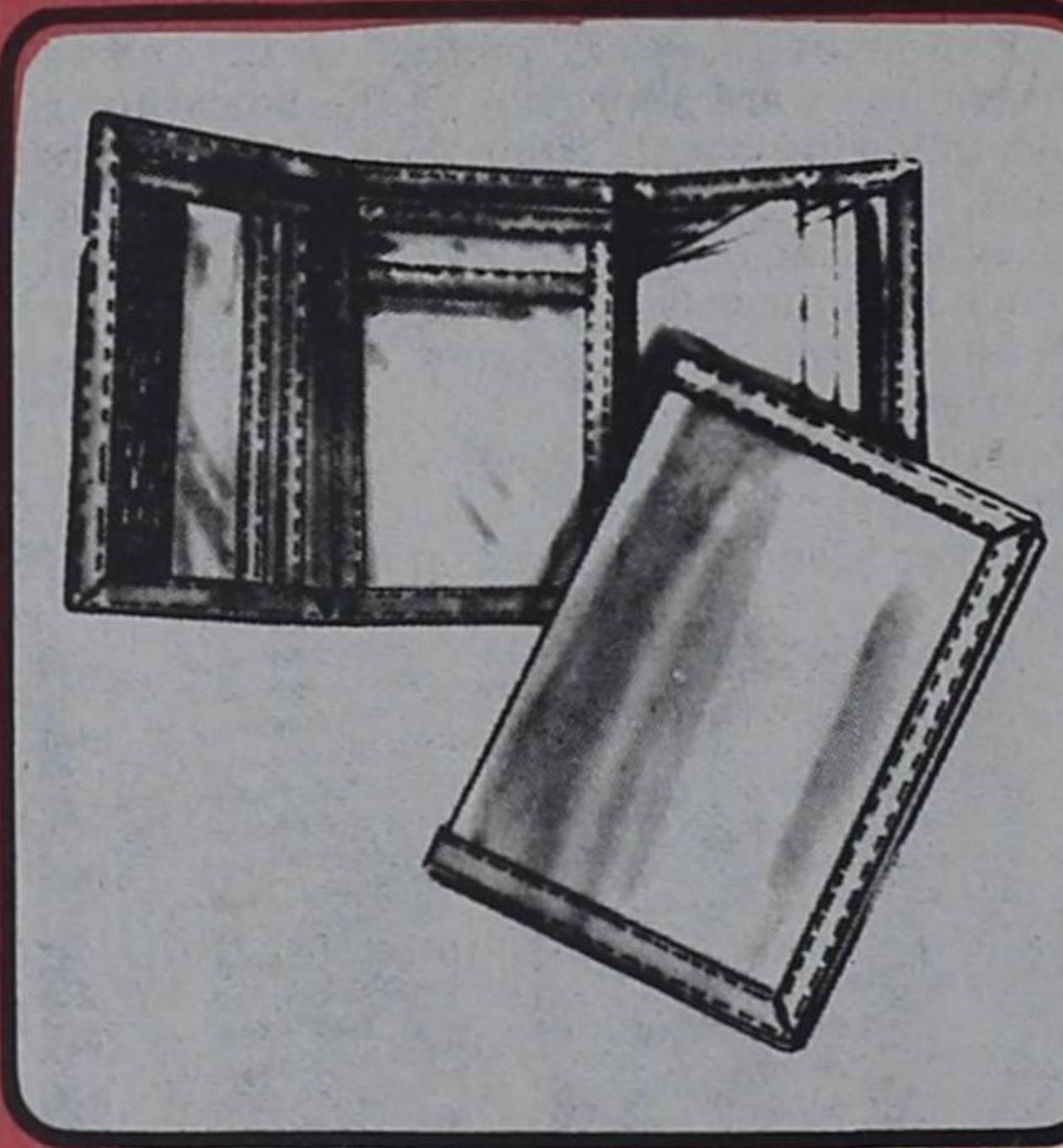

Doris Lindsay testifies in Dallas

DALLAS — Deloris H. Lindsay, owner of Lindsay Country Store testified recently in

Dallas before the Railroad Commission of Texas as to her business's need for having United Parcel Service available for shipments within the state.

UPS is applying to the Commission for authority to pick up and deliver packages between any point in Texas, otherwise known as "intrastate" operating rights. Currently, the nation's largest package delivery firm can only move packages on an interstate basis, or within the commercial free zones of Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio. Texas is one of just two states that restrict UPS intrastate.

Lindsay testified that the lack of UPS service within the state has seriously hampered the operation of her business. She cited no pick up or delivery service, slow delivery time, prohibitive rates and lack of state-wide coverage, as the major problems being encountered with other delivery services Lindsay Country Store currently uses. And, parcel post also does not fill their needs, Lindsay added.

UPS has been seeking intrastate authority from the Commission since 1966. These hearings are expected to continue well into 1983.

For a real Texas Christmas this year, be sure your Christmas tree is a genuine Texas product.

"About 100,000 Texas-grown Christmas trees should be available this year in retail lots and on a 'choose-and-cut' basis," says Dr. Mike Walterscheid, forester with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Sales of these trees should total \$1.2 million to growers. Texas currently boasts about 3,200 acres of Christmas trees, mainly in eastern areas, with some 1,000 trees per acre.

"Texas-grown Christmas trees offer a number of advantages," notes Walterscheid. "They are fresher, more fragrant and usually less expensive than those shipped from other states."

More than five million Christmas trees are sold in Texas each year, imported mainly from northern and western states. So the growth potential of the Texas Christmas tree industry looks good, notes the forester.

Texas growers have planted about a million seedlings each of the past several

years. Most of these are Virginia pines native to the Appalachian area of the southeastern U.S. Another species, the Afghan or Elderica pine, is now being grown in central, western and southern areas of Texas. The trees are generally ready for harvest in about four years.

"While the availability of Texas-grown trees continues to increase, most shoppers will likely have to go to the larger cities in Texas or to smaller communities in eastern areas where most of them are grown," says Walterscheid.

"Choose-and-cut" operations — in which the shopper selects the tree he wants and cuts it himself and takes it home — are popular, says the forester, because this restores the old-fashioned idea of making the selection of a Christmas tree an outing the entire family can enjoy.

Anyone interested in a Texas-grown Christmas tree can contact their county Extension agent for a listing of tree farms, adds the forester.

The Junior Varsity girls started the night off here Tuesday with what was to be a clean sweep against Roosevelt when they defeated Roosevelt 38 to 23.

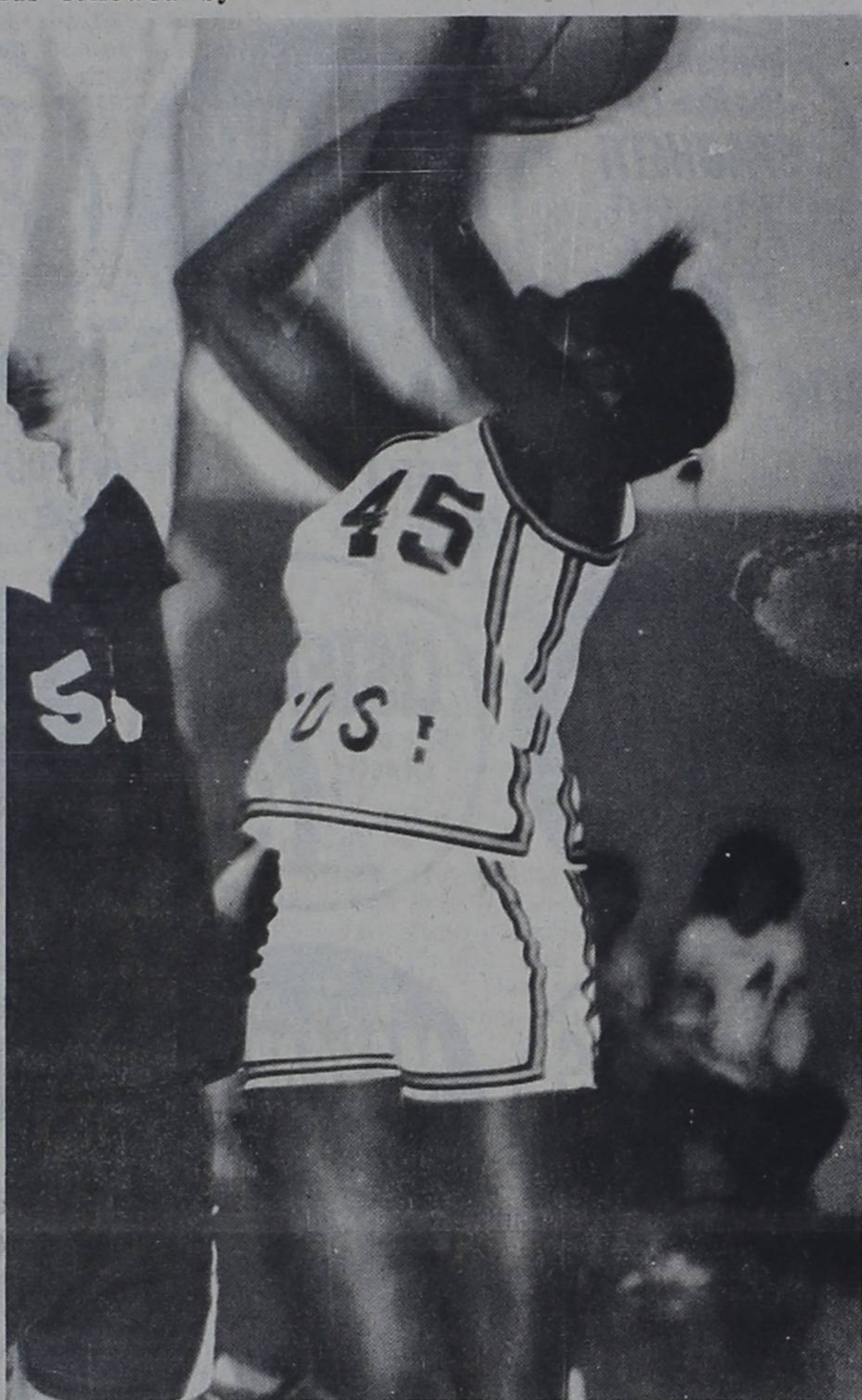
A low scoring game in the first half, Post

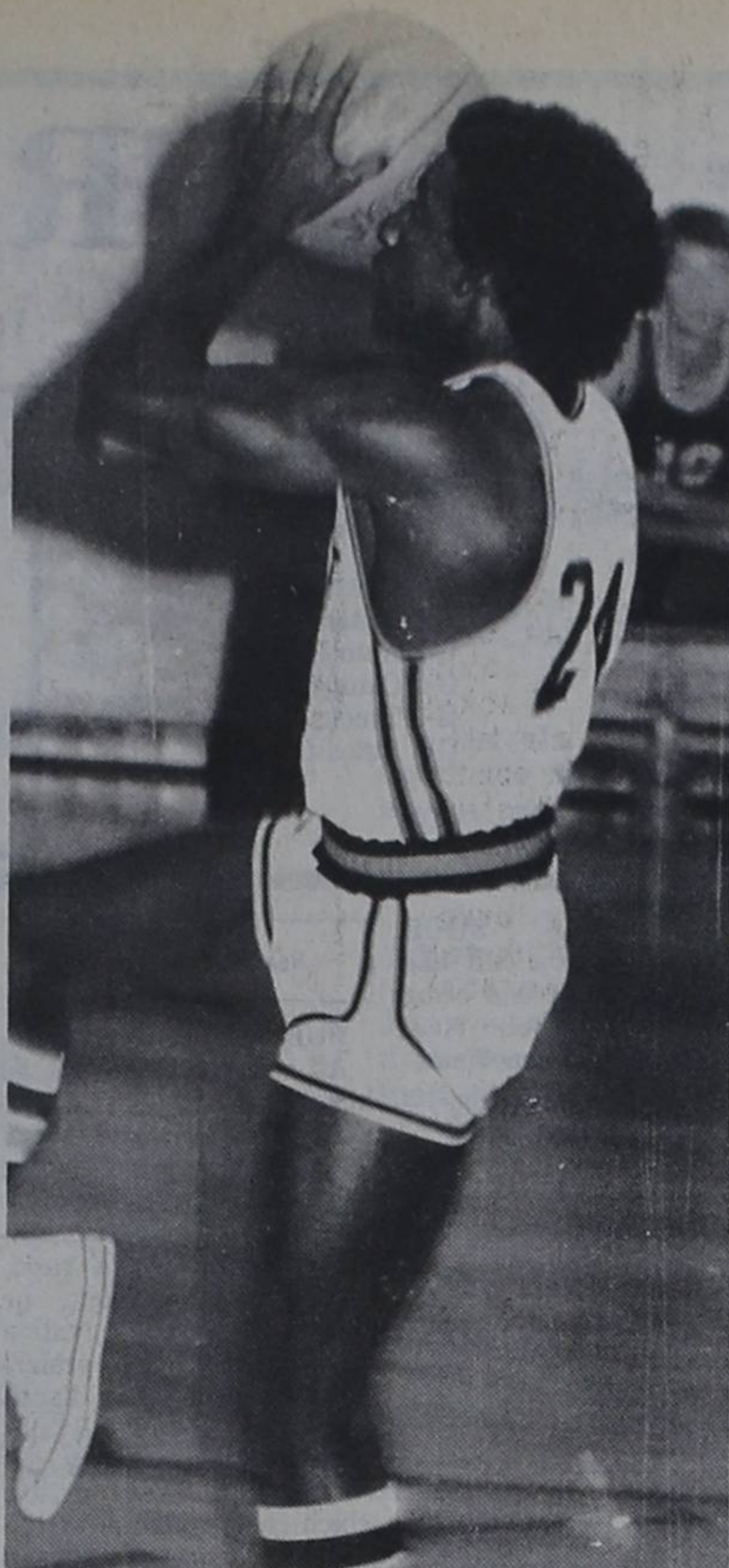

A good dose of basketball, Antelope style, is helping a lot.



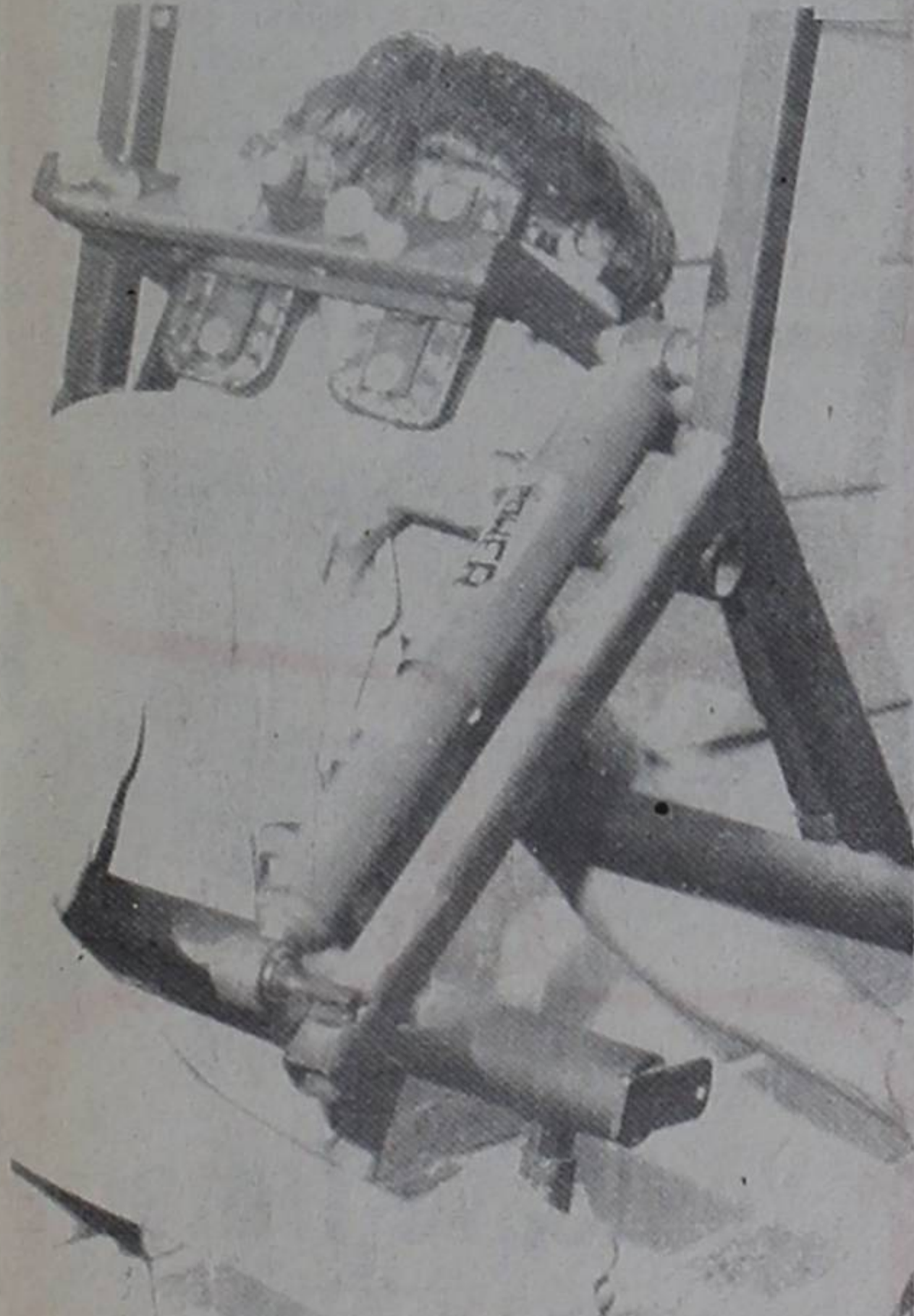

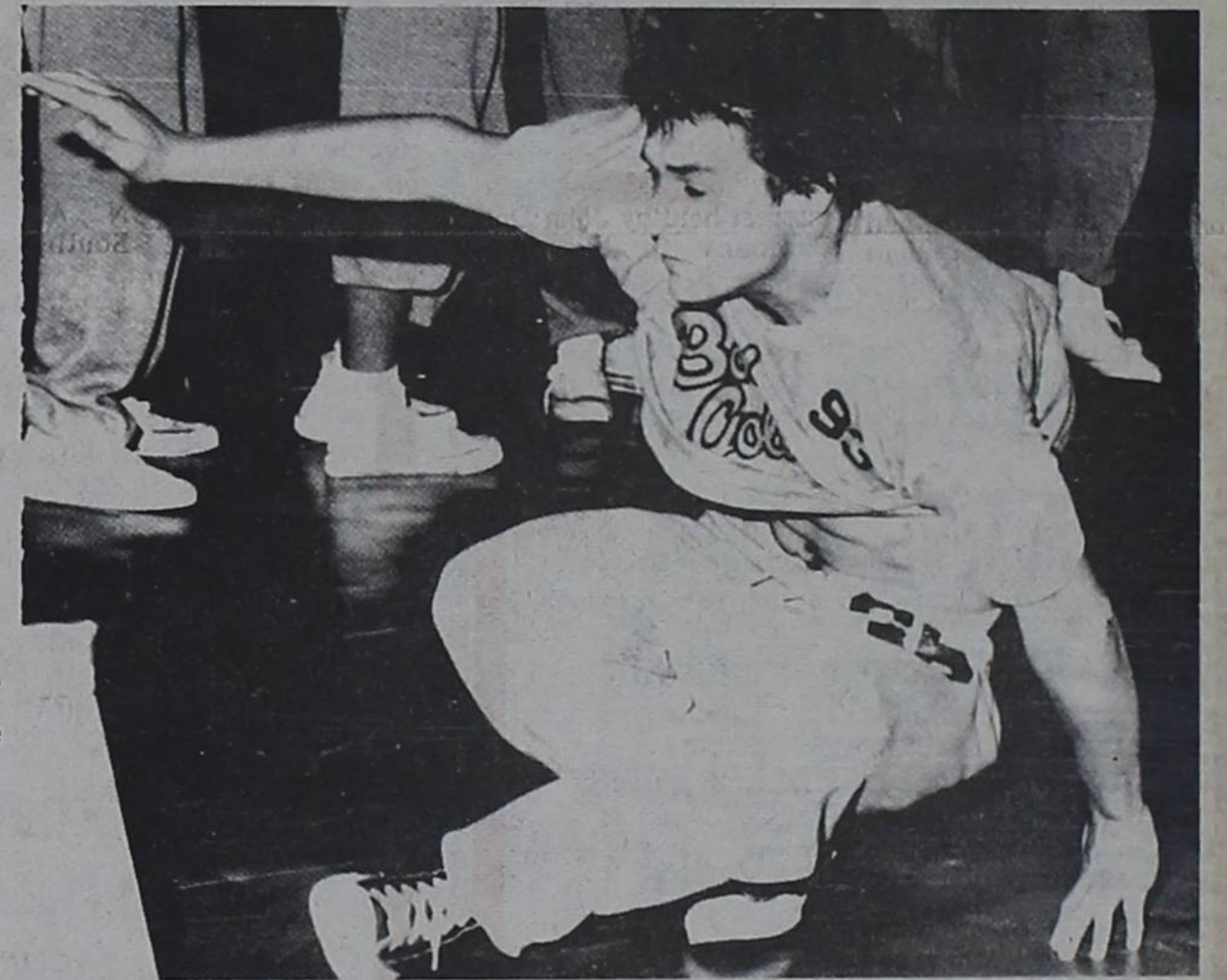

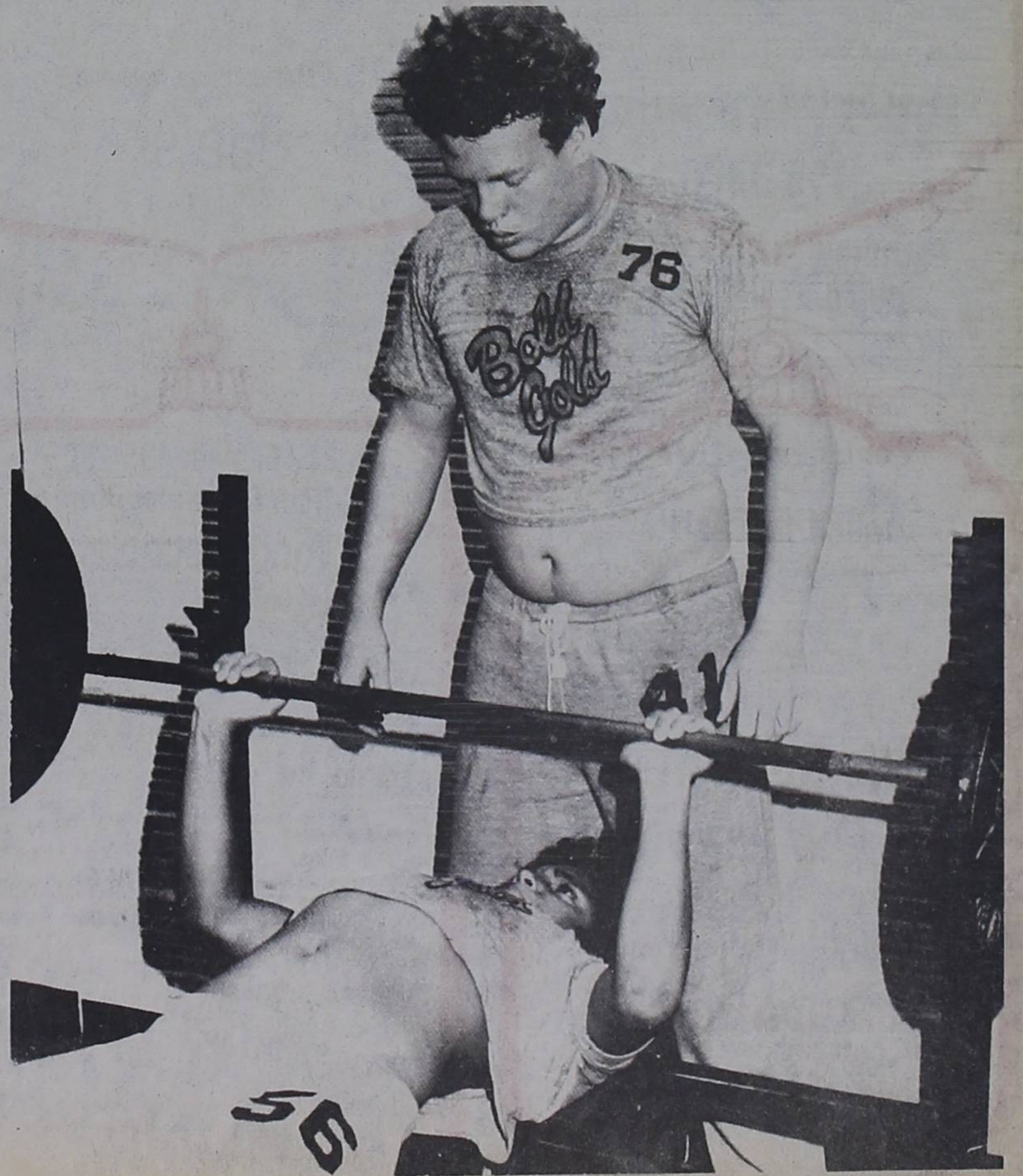
