

# Chutes open on Post Stampede Rodeo

## 400 contestants expected to participate in 42nd edition

The 42nd annual Post Stampede Rodeo will kick off today (Thursday) with a parade in downtown Post at 5:30 with parade marshal Tom Bouchier leading the way in a stage coach.

The first night of the rodeo will begin with the grand entry at 7:45 with the action to begin at 8 each night.

Tuesday afternoon, some of the events were already full with others expected to be full before nightfall.

Events scheduled for the rodeo include bull riding, bareback bronc, saddle bronc, barrel racing, calf ropers, team ropers and a new event this year is

bulldogging.

The county roping, for county residents only, will be held Thursday night in the arena following the rodeo and has 52 entries. Buckles will be presented to the winners.

Terry Walls of Stephenville is stock producer.

A wild cow milking contest is scheduled after each night's action and on Saturday, the top four cutting horses at the OS Ranch last October will perform.

Three big dances are planned following each night's performance with the Rex Thomas Band of Lamesa providing the mus-

ic.

The box seats have already been sold out.

New improvements of the rodeo grounds this year include a new fence around the area and carpet has been put in the aisles of the stands.

The parade will include the Texas Tech Red Raider, four floats, and six riding clubs including the local riding club. Prizes will be awarded for the best entries.

Over \$16,000 in prize money will await the winners of the rodeo.

Admission has been set at \$3 for adults and \$1 for 12 and under.

## Truck wreck claims one

Norris Workman, 58, of Post, was killed early Wednesday morning in a pickup-truck crash near Grassland. Services are pending at Justice Mason Funeral Home in Post.

Details of the accident were unavailable to The Dispatch at presstime Wednesday morning.

He was manager of Producers Coop Gin at Grassland.

He married Syble Fern Hightower, August 4, 1945 in Blum, Texas.

They came to West Texas in 1961 from Frost, Tex. For the past five years he had been the gin manager at Producers coop Gin in Grassland. He has also worked for Rocker A Well Service, Close City Gin, and Dalby Cattle Company. He was a veteran of World War II.

Schedule will be Saturday, August 21, 18 holes during the day. Teams will be flighted after first 18 holes. Four flights are

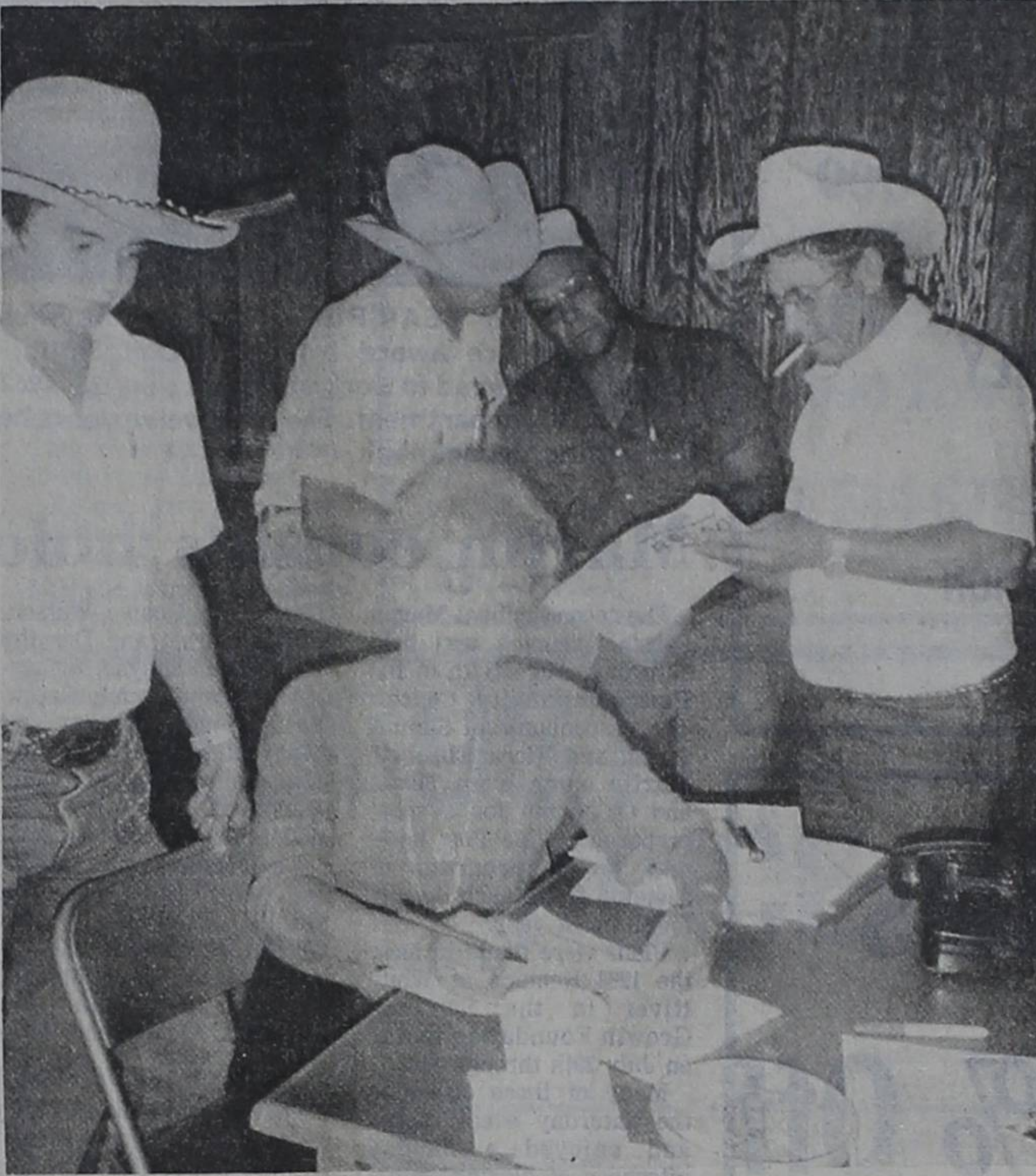
possible depending on the number of entries. Saturday night, 7:30 p.m. discussion of teams.

## Dr. Wilson leaving Post for Hot Springs, Arkansas

Post will be losing one of its three physicians, and a staunch community supporter, October 1, when Dr. William C. Wilson will be moving with his family to Hot Springs, Arkansas to begin a practice there. Dr. Wilson has practiced here in Post for the last 13 years.

His family will leave around September 15 to oversee the moving into the family's new home which is located in the Lake Hamilton school district, and about 7 minutes driving time from downtown Hot Springs. The home is located on Lake Hamilton.

Dr. Wilson moved to Post to open his practice immediately following the completion of his residency. He graduated from the University of Texas at Galveston, and did his internship in El Paso.

He has been on the staff at Garza Memorial Hospital for the time he has been here, and also served as Chief of Staff and County Health Officer.

Dr. Wilson has not yet decided if he will open a solo practice, or will join one of several groups in practice in Hot Springs. There are a number of alternatives open for him there.

Dr. Wilson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Wilson, and is a graduate of Post High School.

Jennifer Wilson, the couple's oldest daughter, who will be a senior student this

year at Gail, will remain with friends here to be able to graduate with her class. His other children will attend the Lake Hamilton schools, which are very close to their new home.

## Joint meeting held on landfill problem

County Judge Giles Dalby and Commissioner Herbert Walls met with the city council in its regular session Monday night in the library for a joint meeting concerning city and county problems.

It was presented to the county that the operation of the city dump ground operation ran \$47,695 as of June 3, 1982 and asked the county to consider sharing the cost of the operation in the amount of \$23,848. It was estimated that at least 75 percent of the refuse taken to the City dump comes from the farms, ranches and businesses outside the city limits of Post. Judge Dalby asked how they came up with the 75 percent figure and Superintendent of Public Works, Mike Sanchez said that the refuse was the kind that would not deteriorate including farm equipment and that two trucks a day, seven days a week were operated by a business outside of Post were dumping in the grounds. The city

feels it needs assistance with this matter and asked the county commissioners to study the problem and consider placing this item in their new budget.

**FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.**

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

On July 3rd, the Supreme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child pornography. That made ACLU very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as complaining this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech.

If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is because it is strange. The ACLU is constantly worried about the "free speech" rights of pornographers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence

when the question turns on the free speech rights of school children. One cannot escape the conclusion that the ACLU would defend the "right" of school children to distribute smut, but they would deny them the right to sing the praises of God.

And if you ever wonder where the ACLU gets the money to pursue its goals, consider this: a lot of rich people in high places give them a lot of money. Our current Lieutenant Governor Hobby, for example, held a fund raiser for them in his Houston home that raised some \$60,000. He is very proud of his efforts in this regard, defending it repeatedly while out on the campaign trail seeking reelection. That is one of the many areas where he and I are in disagreement. 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


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## Pamela Ammons, Billy Roddy wed in Lubbock rites

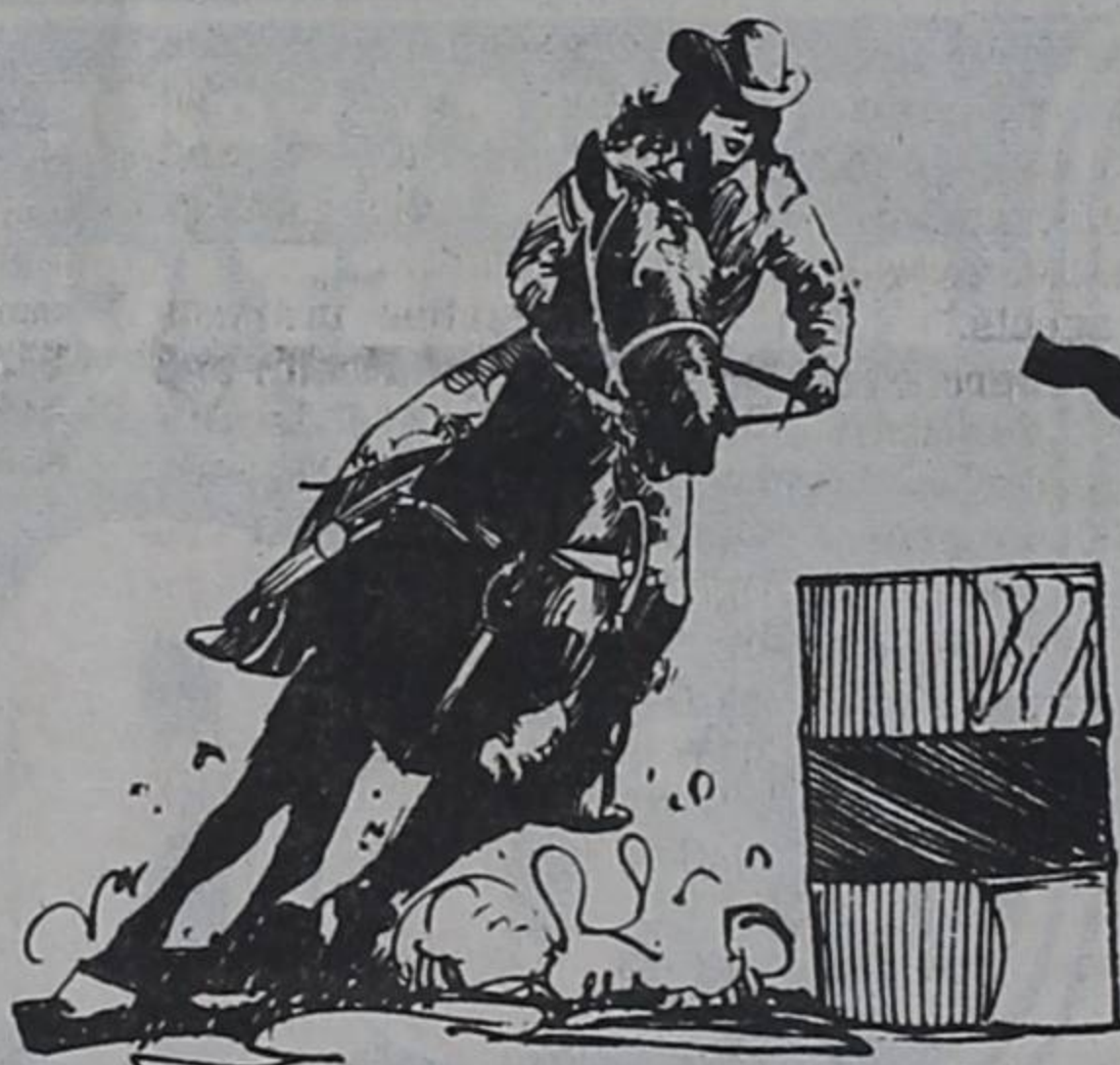
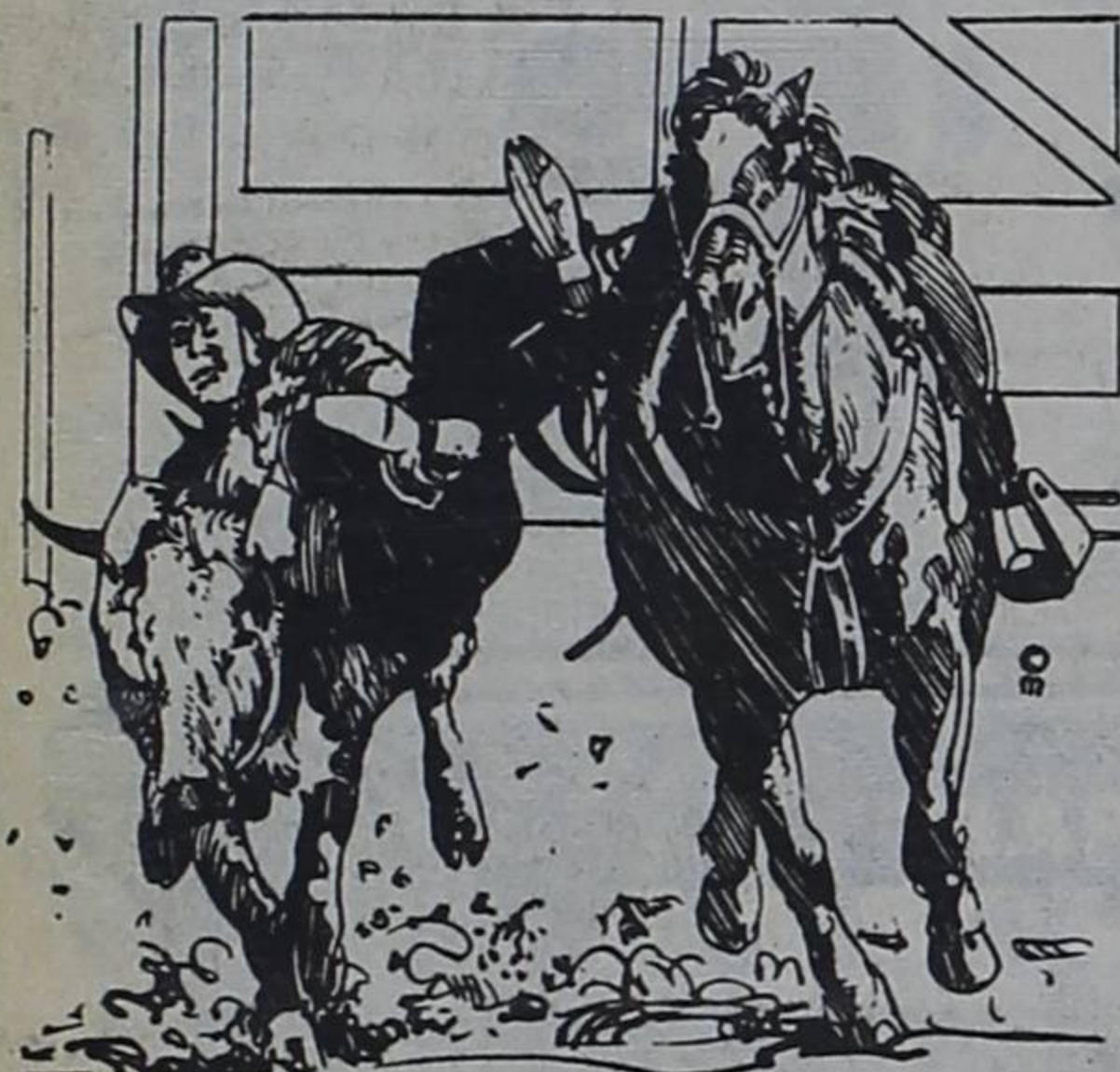

# Clydesdale horses are added to ranch roundup

WICHITA FALLS — Tied up right beside the magnificent cutting horses needed for action during the Texas Ranch Roundup will be eight equally magnificent members of the horse family which have never seen a day of roping or riding.

The Anheuser-Busch Clydesdales, almost as legendary as the 13 participating ranches, will appear as special guests during the 7:30 p.m. performances of the roundup Friday, August 20 and Saturday, August 21.

In addition, the public is invited to see — and photograph — the Clydesdales and their antique Budweiser draught beer wagon, Thursday, August 19 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the 4-H Barn on Midwestern Parkway.

A Budweiser tradition since 1933, the Clydesdales are bred at Grant's Farm in St. Louis County, Missouri, where between 20 and 30 foals are born each year.

Descendents of the huge horses bred centuries ago to carry knights into battle during the Crusades, the Clydesdales stand just over six feet at the shoulders and weigh between 1,000 and 2,000 pounds. They are characterized by their bay color, four fleecy white stockings and feet, a blaze of white on their face, and a black mane and tail.

For public appearances, each horse wears a custom-made black and brass harness and custom-forged shoes, which weigh four pounds each. The Clydesdales make more than 300 public appearances and travel some 60,000 miles annually. Both the appearance of the Clydesdales and the 1982 Texas Ranch Roundup are made possible by Budweiser, Falls Distributing Co., Inc. and the North Texas Rehabilitation Center. Proceeds from the roundup will benefit the North Texas Rehabilitation Center, Wichita Falls; the

West Texas Rehabilitation Center, Abilene; and the West Texas Boys Ranch, San Angelo.

General admission \$5 tickets for the roundup-style competition between some of Texas' largest ranches are available at the gate or at Wichita Western World, the Cow Lot, Holts Sporting Goods, Cruse Western Wear and Cuttys in Wichita Falls; Hughes Western Wear, Vernon; and Frontier Western Wear, Bowie. Also, tickets to dances following the performances each evening are \$5 per person and tickets to the Saturday afternoon contests are \$1 general admission.

## Bentsen asks for help for elderly

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Senator Lloyd Bentsen introduced legislation Thursday to protect hundreds of thousands of elderly or infirm Americans against Social Security fraud.

The Bentsen bill would establish a system for monitoring the activities of "representative payees" — agents authorized to cash Social Security checks for those unable to handle their own financial affairs. It would also increase criminal penalties for fraud committed by representative payees.

"Many Americans eligible to receive Social Security benefits are too elderly or infirm to cash their checks, to see that their money is spent in a responsible manner," the Senator said in remarks accompanying his legislation.

"The Social Security Administration seeks to protect the interests of persons unable to manage their own financial affairs by authorizing representative payees to act as their agents."

Bentsen said there are approximately 2.4 million representative payees, with about 900,000 of that number related to the beneficiaries they represent. That means 1.5 million representative payees are not members of the families of the individuals on whose behalf they are acting. Some 93,000 of these "rep-payees" are in Texas.

The Senator cited a sampling by the General Accounting Office of boarding homes in five states and the District of Columbia. He said GAO turned up serious deficiencies in accounting for the benefits paid, with some boarding home operators continuing to collect and spend checks long after residents died or moved

## NRA wins first round legal action

SAN FRANCISCO — The California Court of Appeals today granted a National Rifle Association legal request and ordered the city of San Francisco to prove that its newly passed handgun ban is not illegal. The court set September 22 for a hearing date.

In Washington, NRA officials were jubilant over

their first round victory. "It's a major step towards knocking out the ban," said J. Warren Cassidy, executive director of the NRA Institute for Legislative Action. "Our attorneys maintained the ban violated several provisions of California law, including the state's gun control preemption statute. Now it is up to San Francisco to legally justify this atrocious ordinance."

the court did not issue a temporary stay against enforcement of the ban, which technically took effect July 28, since the statute gives citizens 90 days to surrender their handguns. A decision on the ban's legality is expected prior to that time.

The NRA brought suit against the ban July 19 on behalf of city residents George Soracco, William Capilos, Beau Hickory and the San Francisco Gun Exchange, a federally licensed firearms dealer.

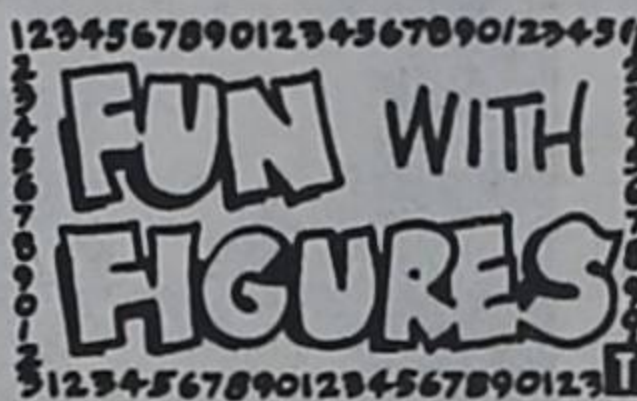

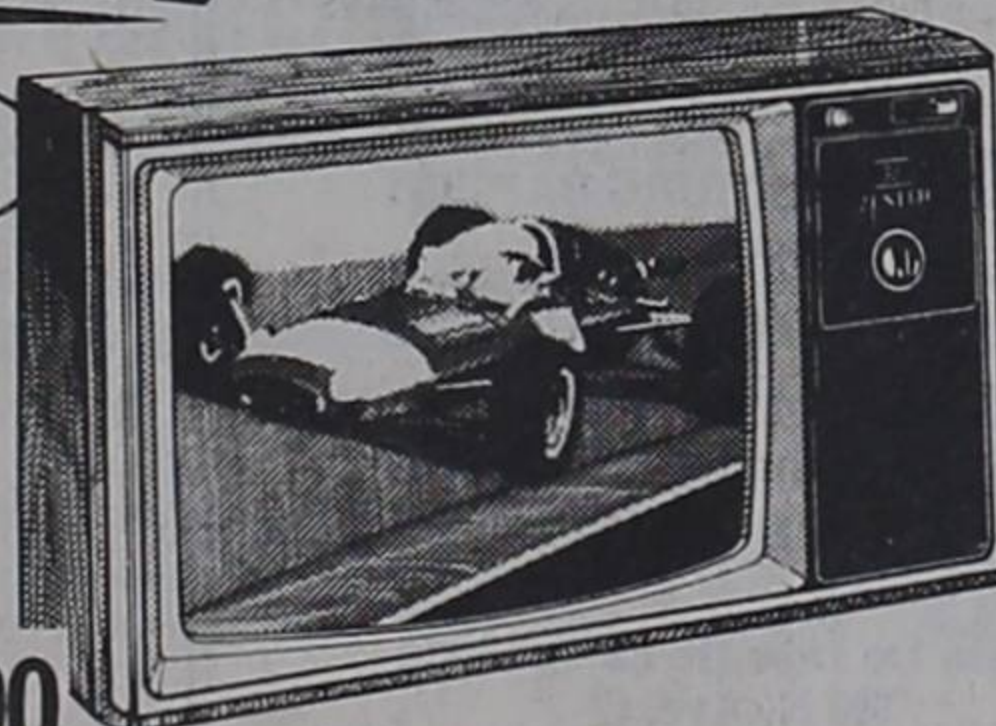

## Terraces completed on Sanchez farm

Although rains are quite sporadic in West Texas, if often comes heavy downpours in short periods of time. These occurrences can cause severe soil and water erosion on cropland fields in many instances, especially if not protected. Many tons of soil are lost each year from valuable farmland in this manner. How can farmers control this severe erosion of one of our most valuable resources?

A common practice is that of terracing the field or putting up ridges across the slope of the land. This helps to break up the water as it runs down the slope of the land and thus helps to control soil erosion and prevent water runoff.

A farmer in Garza County who has completed terracing his farmland this past year is Mike Sanchez. Mike said he was losing soil every year as could be seen by several rills or ditches on his fields. "One gully was four feet deep," he said. "The topsoil was washing into my little pond and filling it up below my fields." "Terraces made my farm," Mike added. With cost-share assistance

through the local Garza County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and technical assistance provided by the local Soil Conservation Service, Mike began terracing one field two years ago. He completed the other field this past April. Approximately 7 miles of terraces were installed on Mike's farm. The terraces built on Mike's farm were parallel. This means that the terraces are the same distance from the one above it along the total length of the terrace. These are usually built for the ease of farming. In most cases, the elimination of point rows is the end result with these kind of terraces. Most terraces in this county are parallel and built level or nearly level in the channel in front of the ridge from one end to the other. The height of the terrace is usually about 1.2 feet high from natural ground with a 24-28 foot base width. The base width can be adjusted to fit the farmers equipment. Most terraces are built between cotton harvest and cotton planting time in this area.

Each individual may have questions pertaining to terrace systems for his particular operation. What kind of terraces should I have? The kind of terrace system that may fit your particular needs depends on the farmer's objectives and type of farming operation. Most terraces in Garza County are parallel due to ease of farming. But regular standard terraces may best fit other situations. Terraces are built not only for erosion control but also for moisture conservation, especially in these dry areas of West Texas. Every drop of rain that can be retained on the land may make that extra pound of production that is needed to offset costs. Also the prevention or control of soil and water erosion is a necessity to prevent pollution and sedimentation of downstream ponds and streams.

What goes into the building of a terrace system: For a parallel terrace system, the field is first grid mapped or topoged. Put simply, an elevation shot is taken 100 feet in each direction with a level or instrument. These eleva-

tions or shots are then transferred to a grid map. After this is completed, elevation or contour lines are drawn on the map, generally every two feet. Then it is finally time for the design of the terrace system. Usually a key line is drawn on the map and lines run parallel from this line. The spacing of the terraces depends on the percent slope of the land and the size of the farmer's equipment. After the system is designed, the terraces are staked in the field from the grid map. Then the terraces are finally ready to be built. For standard terraces, a line is usually run or shot in the field. Depending on the percent slope of the land, the next line is ready to be run.

It usually is not parallel with the one above it as with parallel terraces. These are just some of the procedures that go into a terrace system.

Farmers like Mike Sanchez will tell you that conservation practices such as terraces pay off in the long run; by conserving soil and water, thus increasing crop yields while adding to farm value. 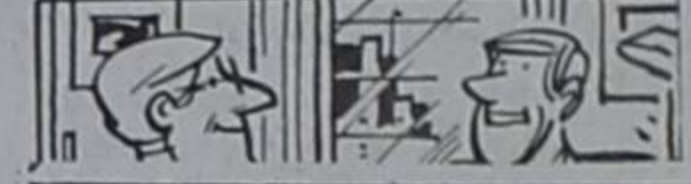

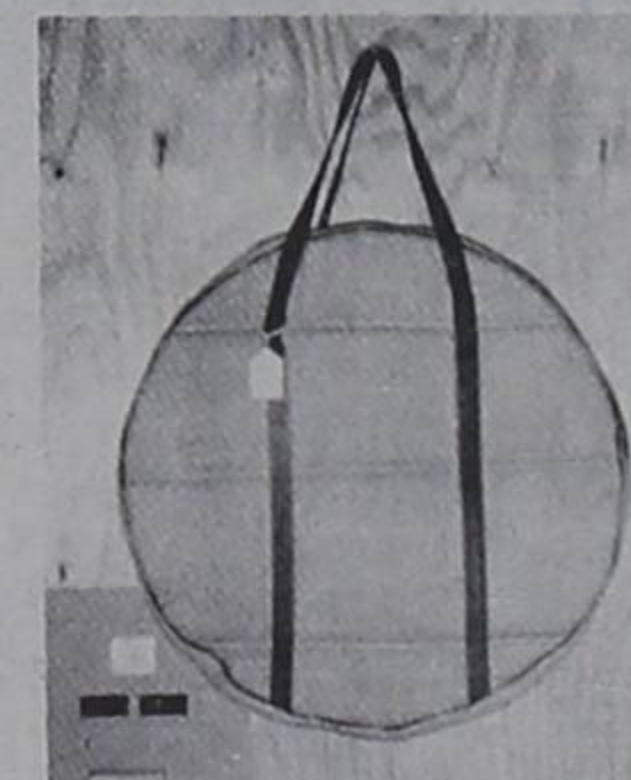
