





Fireflies have managed to avoid extinction because they taste bad to predators, says Dr. Joseph Bonaventura of the Marine Biomedical Center, Beaufort, N.C.

He placed an extract of freeze-dried fireflies in tanks of seawater containing foot-long Atlantic sharpnosed sharks. Within minutes the sharks struggled to get away, and when they couldn't they became paralyzed and died.
