The Post Crime Line will pay cash rewards to people who provide information which leads to the arrest and indictment of a person or persons involved in illegal activities.

### How It Works

You call the Crime Line with information about a crime...the Crime Line will give you a number for identification...your name will not be asked or used.

The Crime Line will take your information and ask you to call back in 24 hours.

When you call back in 24 hours, you give your identification number and you will be given a report on the status of the investigation.

If enough evidence has been provided to make an arrest which would lead to an indictment, the Crime Line will tell you and ask you to call back in 10 minutes to receive instructions on where and when to get your cash reward.

Contributions are requested for the Crime Line Reward fund and may be sent to Crime Line, P.O. Box 11, Post, Tx., 79356. Contributions are tax deductible and receipts will be provided to contributors.

He has toured the United States and Canada for the last 15 years and has appeared on numerous TV shows including the Merv Griffin Show Life from Vegas.

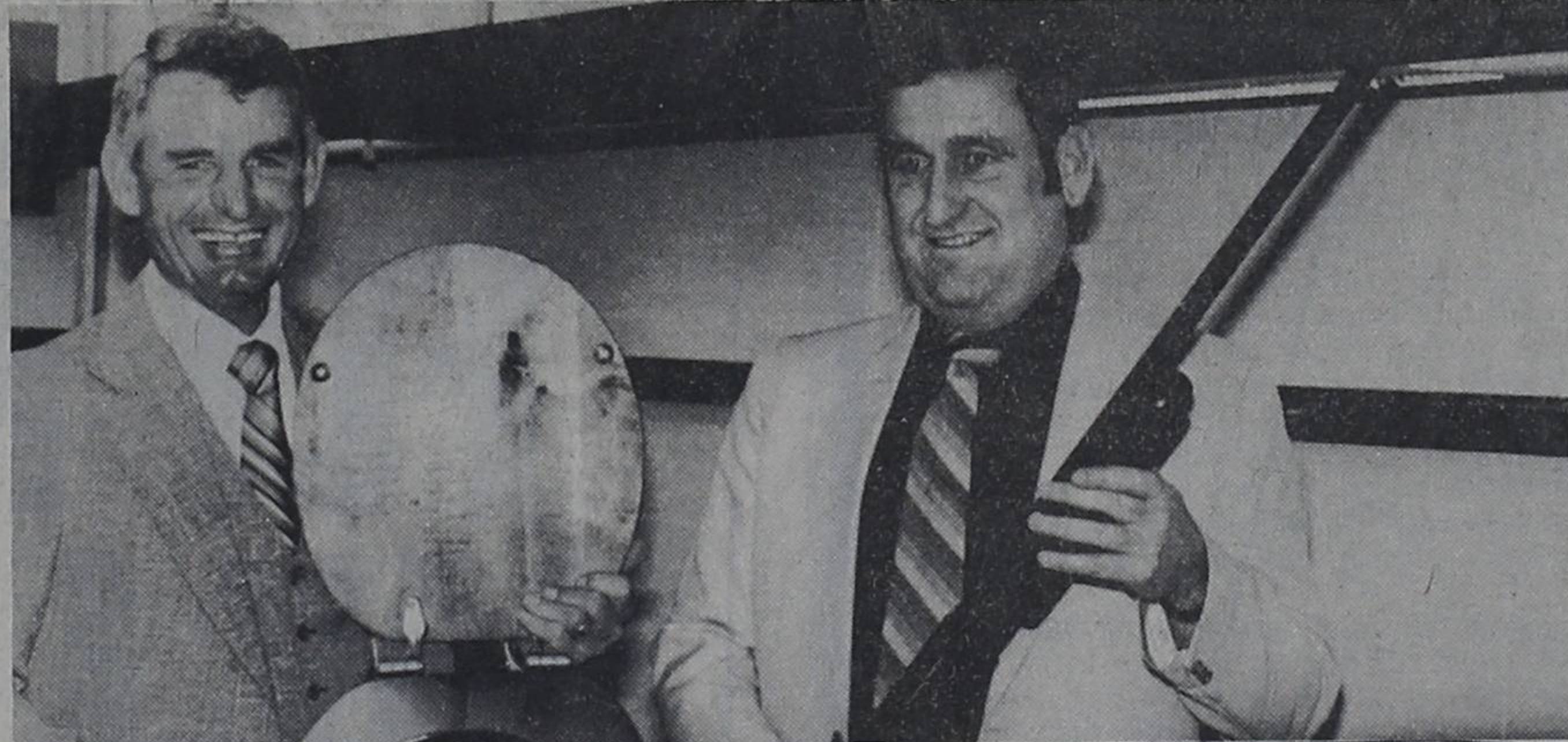

## Burlington Answers Dispatch Questions

"We have been in direct contact with six potential buyers, two have visited the plant and two more are scheduled to visit in the next few weeks," Burlington Industries real estate department manager Marvin E. Baugh told a group of Post civic leaders in a meeting last Thursday afternoon at the Postex Plant.

Responding to an article in last Sunday's Post Dispatch, Burlington's William Johnson and other executives, expressed a desire to provide an open forum for communication with city and county officials and to explain what actions the company is doing toward its closure of the muslin producing plant here.

The Burlington officials said they were taking an aggressive approach to finding a buyer for the plant, but due to the sensitivity of most buyers, names could not be disclosed. "There is a very slim chance that another muslin producer would buy the plant as it is and continue operations without interruption," Johnson and Baugh commented.

"We are treating every inquiry as a serious and potential buyer and we are just as anxious to turn the plant over to someone else as you are," Johnson added.

The Burlington officials also explained that a team of personnel specialists had been at the plant and interviewed every employee.

"Our salaried employees were interviewed with the idea of determining who would be interested in moving to another Burlington plant," executive vice president William L. Whisnant commented.

It is Burlington's policy to submit the list of available personnel to all other Burlington divisions.

Very few hourly waged employees could expect to be offered positions at other plants.

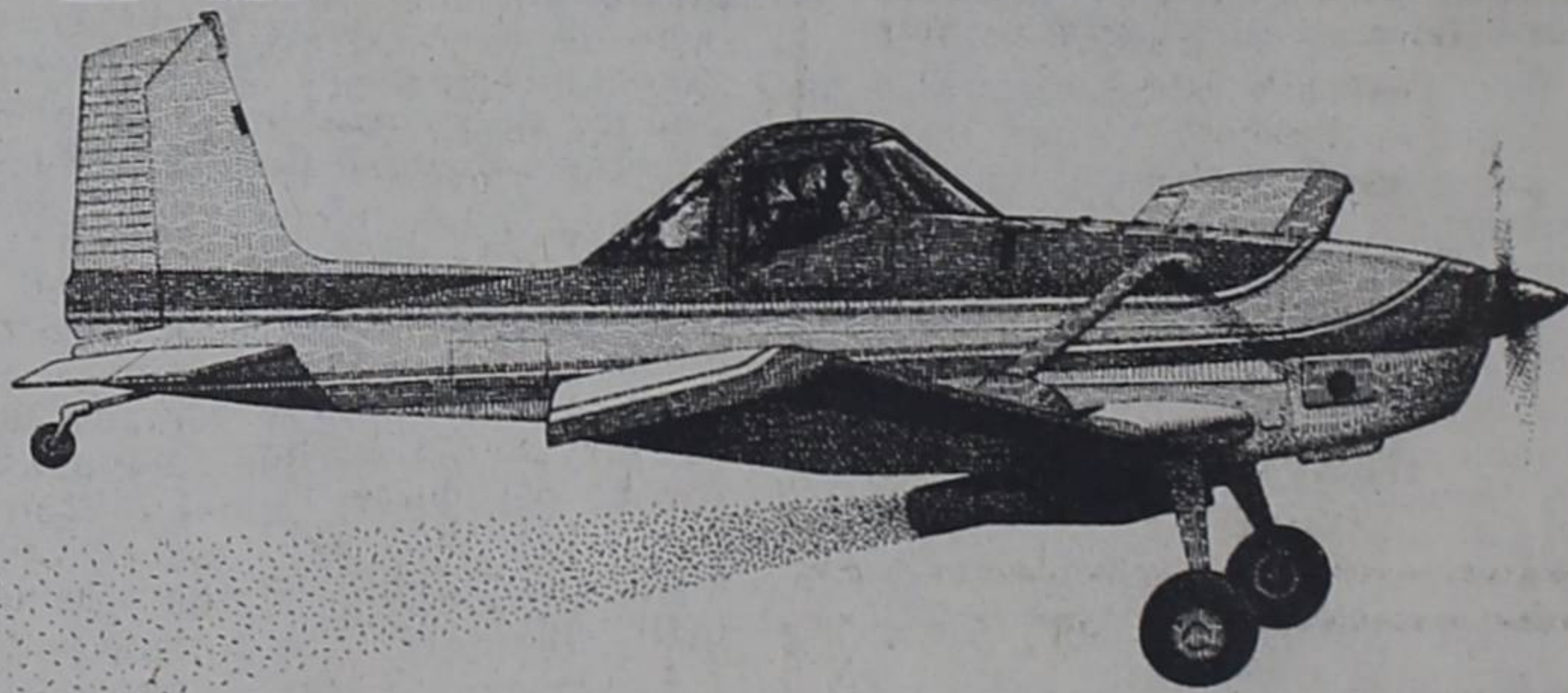

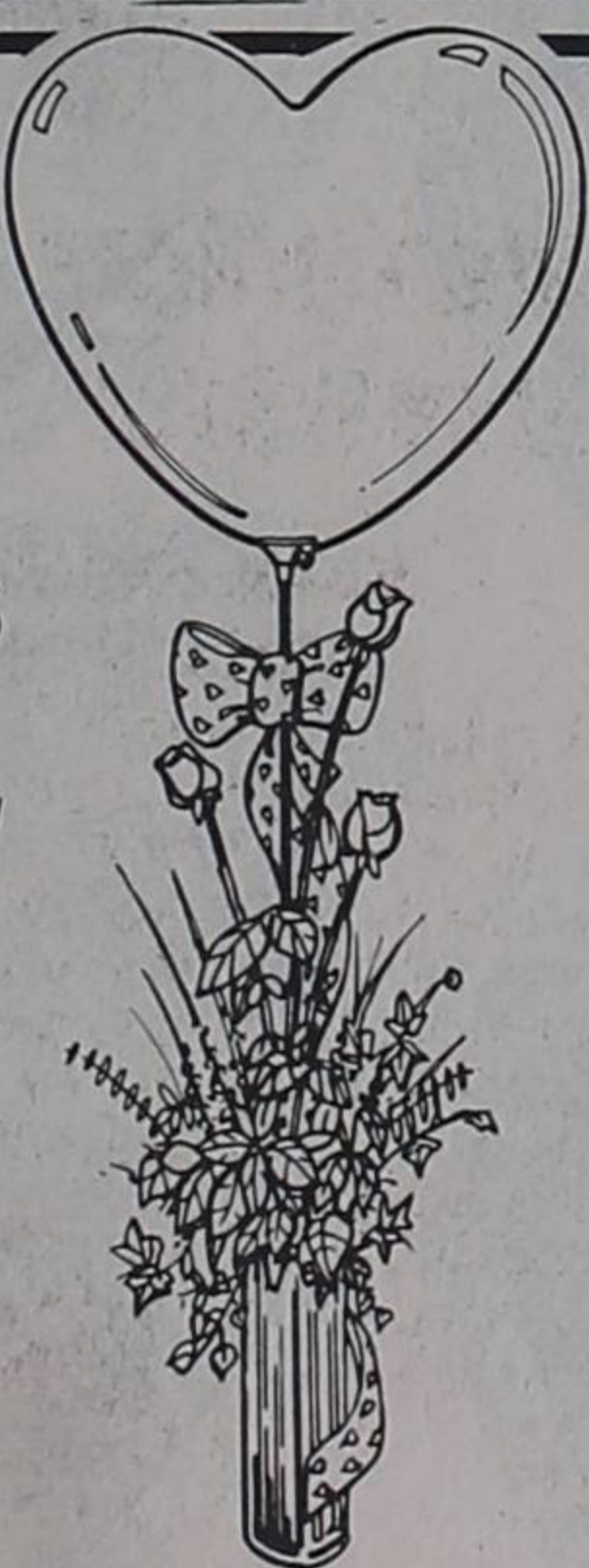

## RUGELACH

CLIP 'N' COOK

1 lb. margarine (or butter)  
1 pt. sour cream  
4 cups flour (approximately)  
1 cup walnuts, chopped fine  
1 cup sugar  
1 tbsp. cinnamon (or to taste)

Combine butter and sour cream. Add flour and mix. Divide dough into seven-ounce portions (just under one cup). Wrap in plastic film and refrigerate several hours or overnight. Roll individual portions of dough into a circle and sprinkle first with sugar and then with nuts. Cut into 16 pie-shaped wedges and roll up from wide end. Place on a greased pan with point on bottom. Shape into a slight crescent. Bake at 375 degrees until light brown, approximately 20 to 25 minutes.

## D.E.C. Locks Installed on Dickens Electric Gates

Many land owners in the Dickens Electric Cooperative Service area keep their gates locked to help prevent theft and vandalism of personal property.

Locked gates work well in keeping unwanted and unauthorized people from entering private property, however, these locked gates create a problem for the Cooperative. We need access at various times to take care of our power lines. Our meter readers need to read the meters monthly. We must do regular maintenance work so that our "outages" can be held to a minimum. We also need access when there is an emergency line outage and we are searching for the trouble. This is very important, since locating and repairing a down line could very well save a life. Someone could accidentally come in contact with a line that is down and be killed or seriously burned.

Our members have been very helpful by allowing us to place a "D.E.C." lock in the chain that is on their entrance gate. The "D.E.C." lock does not interfere with the use of their own lock. This allows Cooperative personnel to enter the property when it becomes necessary to read meters, do line maintenance or perform emergency repairs. Keys to "D.E.C." locks also allow access to vital Cooperative equipment, such as substations, regulators, breakers and air switches. Because of the danger involved with operating this equipment, it is very important that Cooperative personnel only have keys to access to this equipment. We ask the cooperation of businesses that duplicate keys, not to duplicate a D.E.C. key without permission from the Cooperative. We appreciate and respect the trust of Members who allow us to place a lock on

their gates. Because we wish to retain this trust, only authorized Cooperative personnel will have keys to these locks. Should it come to the attention of the land owner that someone other than Cooperative personnel is using the Cooperative's locks to enter their premises, they should inform the Cooperative and we will make every effort to retrieve the key. We also ask that we be notified in the event Cooperative personnel used this lock to enter your property for reasons other than Cooperative businesses. We ask your cooperation concerning this matter and pledge our every effort in seeing that Cooperative locks are used only by Cooperative personnel and for carrying out Cooperative work. Bailey Reece, General Manager of Dickens Electric Cooperative, encourages anyone with one of these keys No. 2473, to please return it to the Cooperative.

## Cotton Today

The decision to participate or not to participate in the payment-in-kind (PIK) program involves innumerable complexities, notes Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., "so every producer should get all the help he can get in making that decision as opposed to taking an 'I'd rather do it myself' attitude. There is only one facet to the whole program that is more or less cut and dried, Johnson adds, and that's the fact that there is a desperate need to reduce acreage and production of the four crops involved which, other things being equal, means full participation in the program should be the logical choice. The "other things being equal" of course refers to the 1983 economic impact on individual farmers.

And on that score, a substantial aid in making determinations is available to cotton producers in the form of a "payment-in-kind participation worksheet" prepared by Dr. Carl Anderson, Cotton Marketing Economist at Texas A&M University. Copies of the worksheet can be obtained from county Extension agents or from the PCG office in Lubbock, Box 3640, zip 79452, phone 806-762-0553.

The worksheet offers a step-by-step procedure for determining expected returns over variable costs if a farm does not participate in PIK, the cost of PIK participation, the amount of PIK cotton to be received,

and the price at which the PIK will need to be sold to reach a break-even position.

"Then comes the big and perhaps the most important question," Johnson says, "What will PIK cotton be worth?"

A number of merchandising firms are offering contracts on PIK cotton at various base prices, some to be settled on quality differences applicable to the 1982 crop cotton loan, others on 1983 crop differences, which are yet to be announced. However according to preliminary figures put together by PCG and others, it appears that the lower mike cottons (below 3.3) in 1983 may be discounted less in the loan schedule than in 1982, perhaps as much as 20 or 30 points less. Figures also indicate there should be no significant change in loan program discounts on predominant High Plains grades and staples. Therefore it would appear that, given a choice, procedures might do well to opt for settlement of contracts on 1983 loan differences instead of 1982 differences.

Also farmers are being cautioned to consider other costs involved in marketing PIK cotton, including load-out charges, market discounts on light weight bales that may be received, and perhaps compression charges. USDA has said it will not pay compression charges, but some are of the opinion that this cost will fall on the buyer, not the seller. Either way, it's something that should be included in overall calculations, Johnson says.

## The Way He Taught Me

The following poem was written with my father in mind. He was "Gido" to all his grandchildren. His effort to teach them about "his" nature brought on many different thoughts and feelings among the grandchildren, as well as the children. These "teachings" seem to take on a more significant meaning and a different light now, many months after Gido's death.

He was from the mountains of Lebanon. He talked about the coolness and the freshness of the mountain air. He spoke of the rock quarries where he toiled long days. He was a farmer at heart and thought that the land was the only wealth. Cool, fresh water, even from the irrigation wells, seemed to delight and please him more than the norm. He spoke many times of "the feeding of the leaves" to the silkworms at his native Lebanon home. As an immigrant, he was discriminated against and I know that he felt persecuted by his fellow man.

In trying to make his point concerning the nature of man (and things), he would tell the story of the frog and the scorpion...which went something like this:

There was a scorpion that wanted to cross the river. The scorpion went to the frog and said, "Place me on top of your head and swim across the river so I can get across." The frog replied, "I will not. If I do what you ask, you will wait until we are in the middle of the river and sting me. I will surely die." "Oh, no," answered the scorpion, "if I do as you say, I will be in the middle of the river also and I would die too". This seemed reasonable to the frog; so he relented, placed the scorpion on top of his head, and started the swim to the other side of the river. As he was half way across the river, the scorpion stung the frog. The frog, with his dying breath, looked at the scorpion and gasped, "But why?" The scorpion said simply, "That's my nature".

Gido believed in the Supreme Being. He truly believed in Nature. He equated these things together. He would say that you could call "Him" many names... "The Super Being, The One, Nature, God..." but it was all the same.

Because...it is the nature of things.

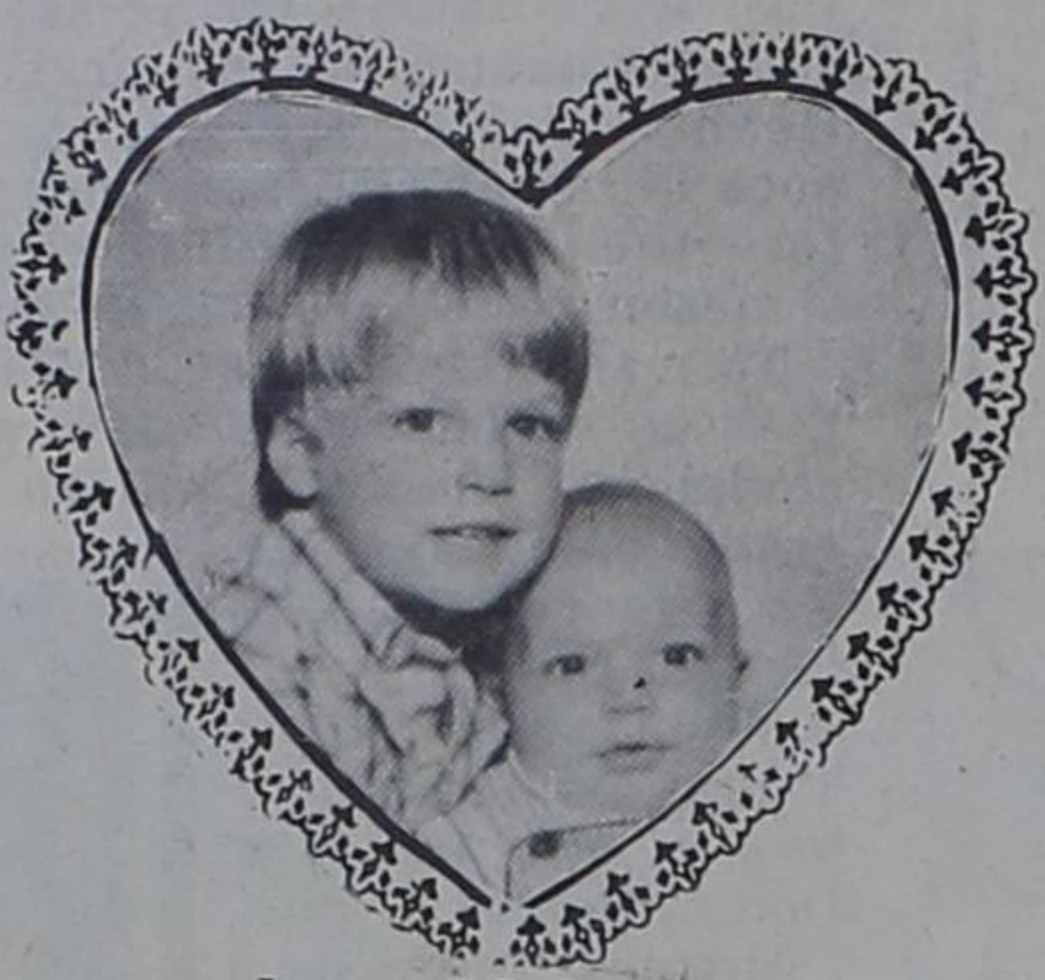

The game was played at Lockney in the afternoon due to cancellation of the game the previous Friday night due to inclement weather.

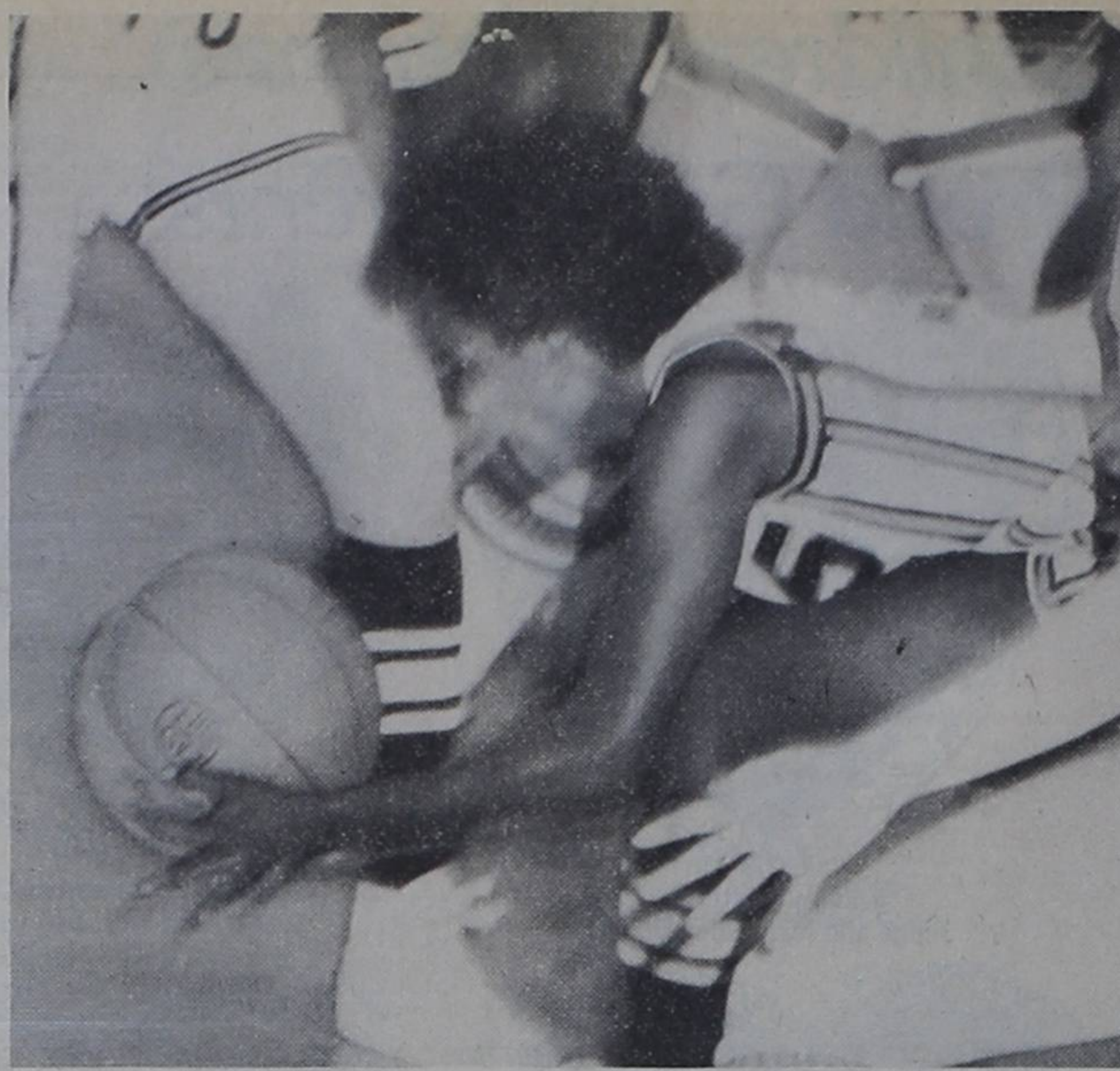
The Lady Lopes fell behind in the first period eight to 18, but closed the gap in the second period to 25 to 31.

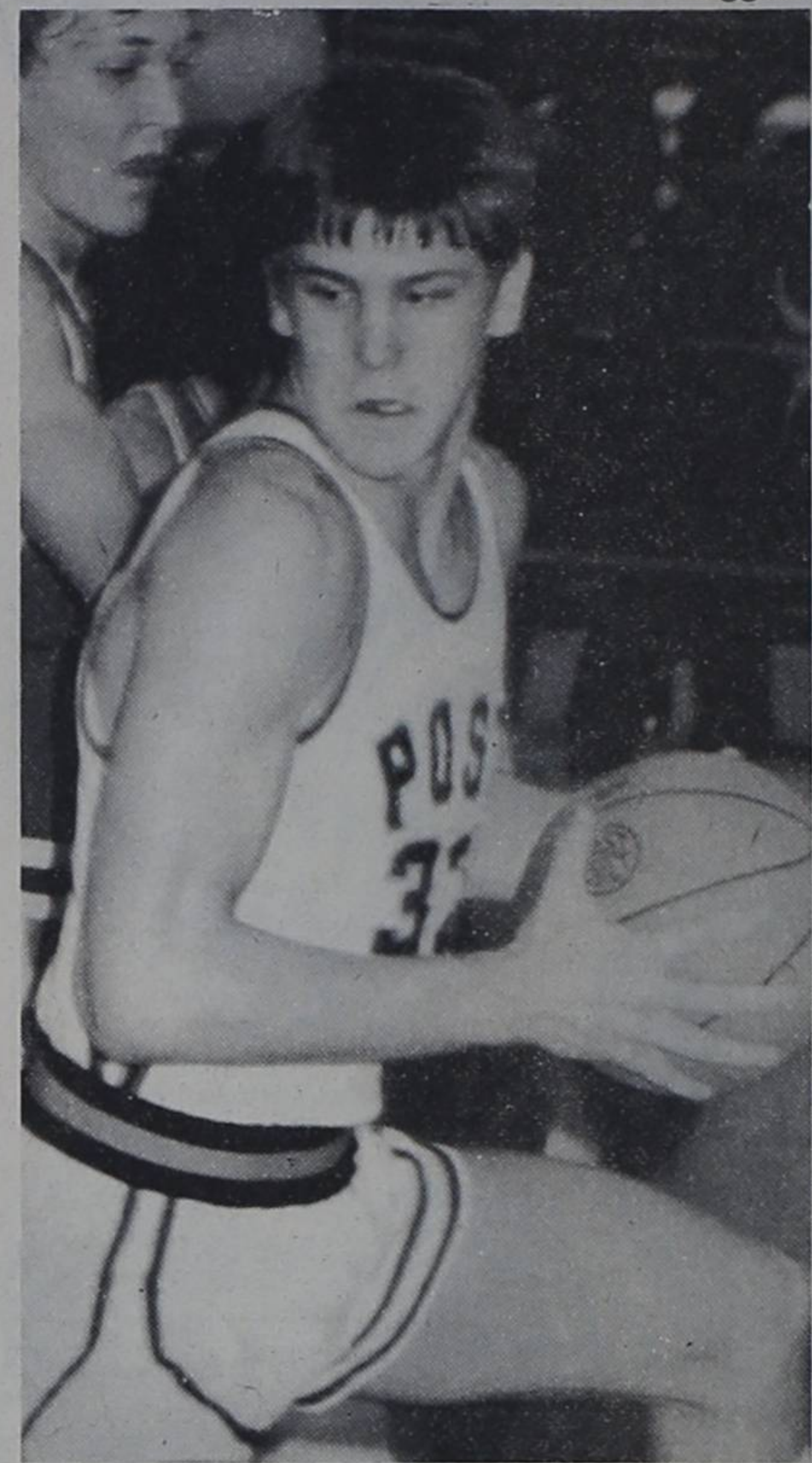

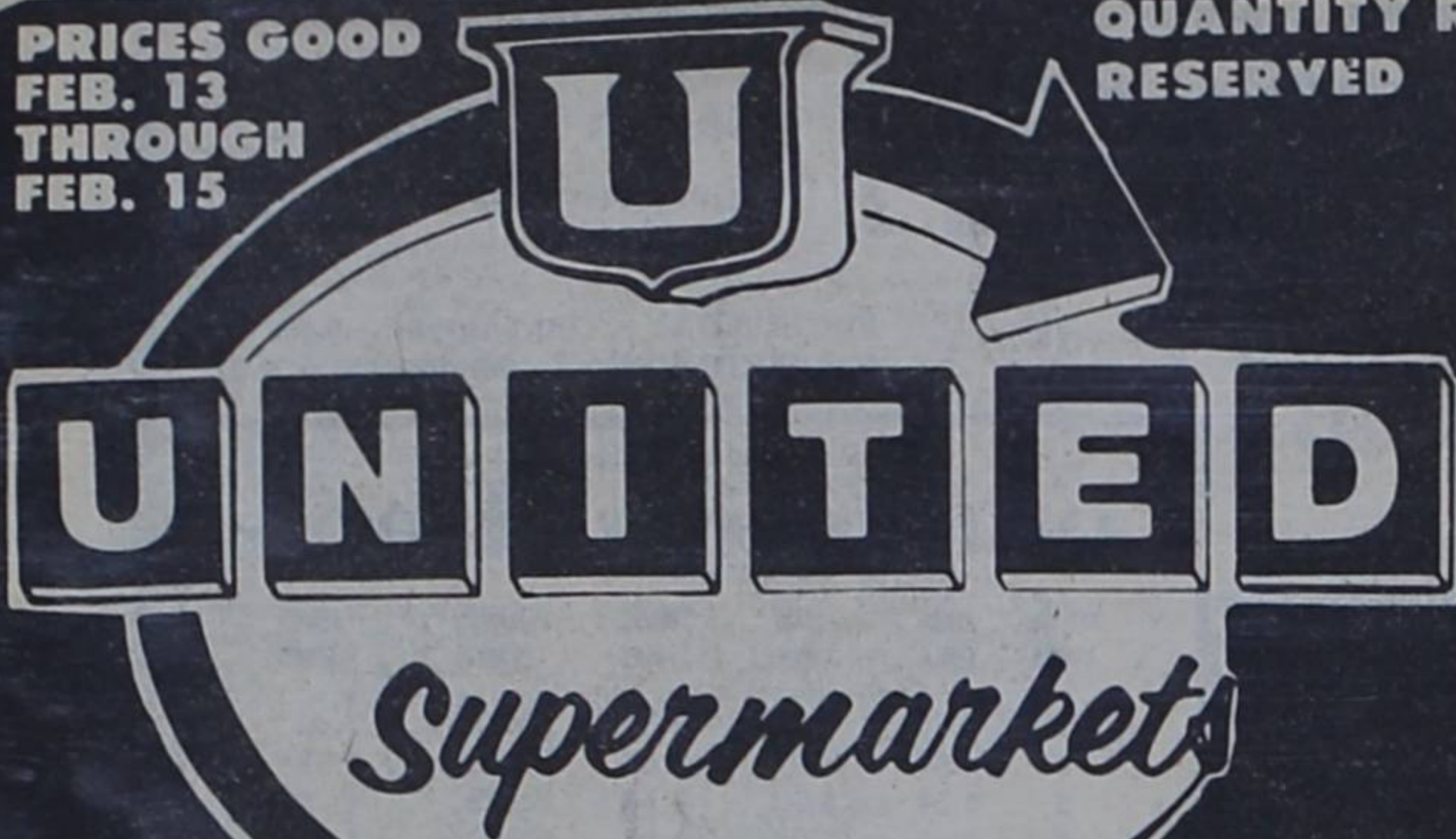


