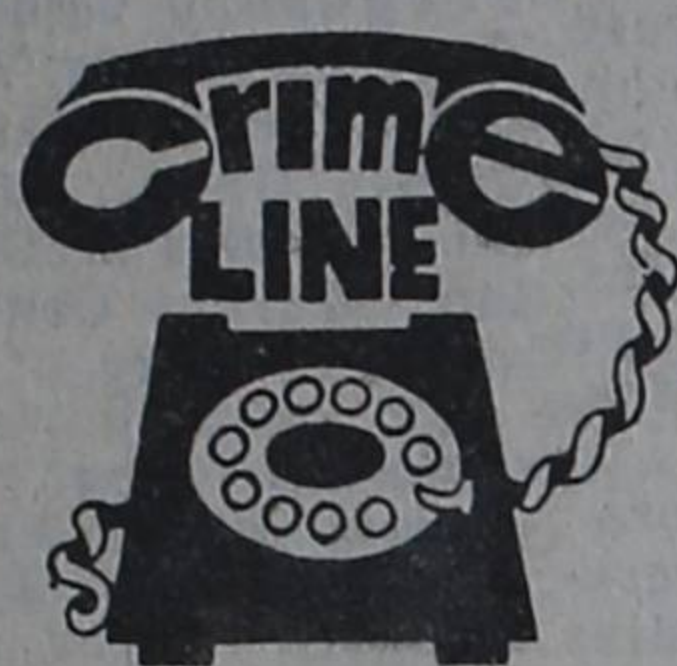

Crime Line Pays Cash Rewards

The Post Crime Line will pay cash rewards to people who provide information which leads to the arrest and indictment of a person or persons involved in illegal activities.

How It Works

You call the Crime Line with information about a crime...the Crime Line will give you a number for identification...your name will not be asked or used.

The Crime Line will take your information and ask you to call back in 24 hours.

When you call back in 24 hours, you give your identification number and you will be given a report on the status of the investigation.

If enough evidence has been provided to make an arrest which would lead to an indictment, the Crime Line will tell you and ask you to call back in 10 minutes to receive instructions on where and when to get your cash reward.

Contributions are requested for the Crime Line Reward fund and may be sent to Crime Line, P.O. Box 11, Post, Tx., 79356. Contributions are tax deductible and receipts will be provided to contributors.

Congressman Stenholm, 17th Congressional District, was first elected in 1978 and serves on a wide range of committees, including agriculture.

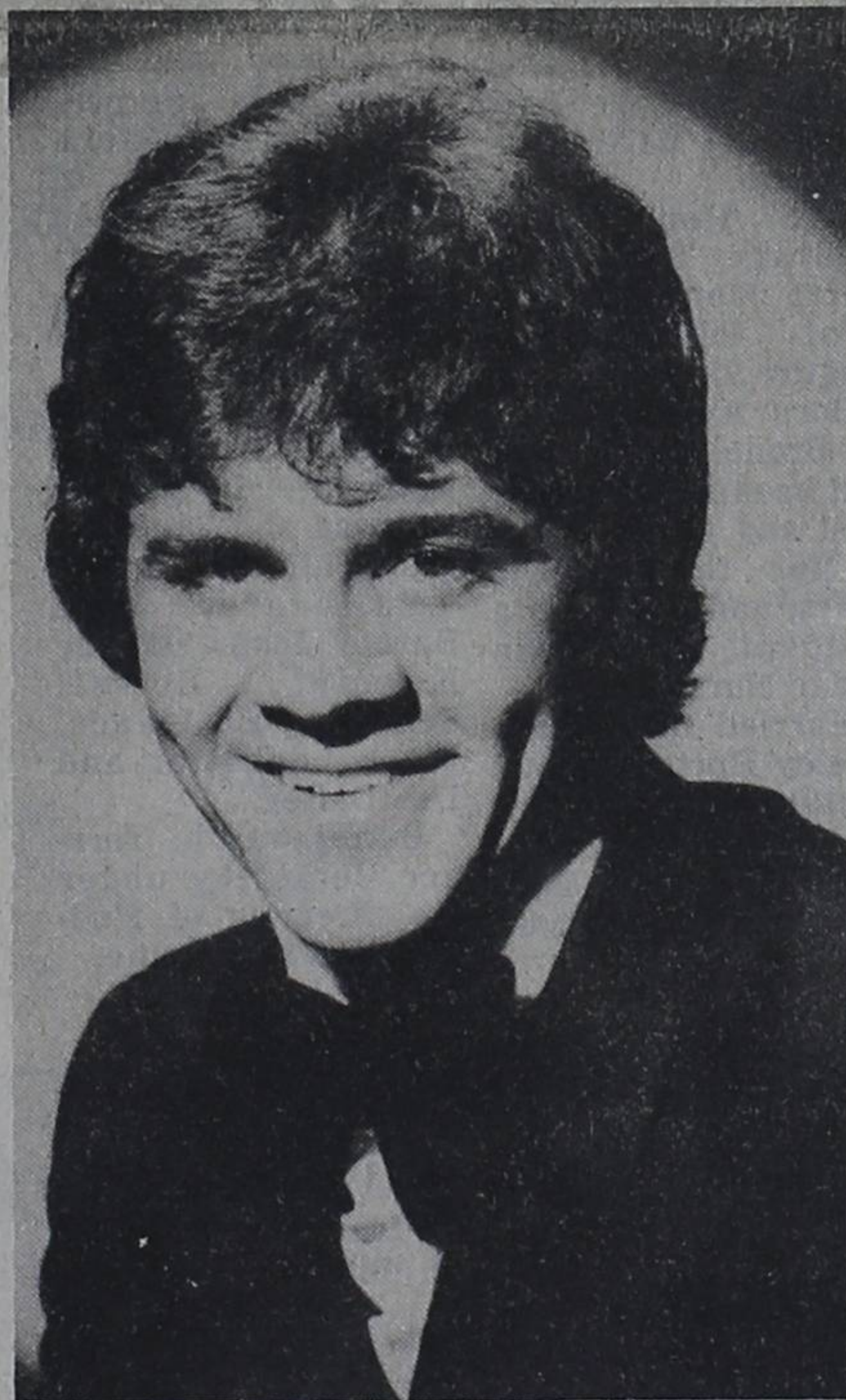
He is a graduate of Tarleton State Junior college and Texas Tech and makes his home near Stamford, where he has been involved in agriculturally related business.

Commissioners Freeze Hiring of New People

A moratorium was placed on hiring additional employees or replacements effective Feb. 14 by the county commissioners during regular session held Monday morning in the commissioners courtroom.

Before any additional or replacement employees can be hired, those making the request must first meet with the commissioners in regular session to give reasons for hiring and the county treasurer was ordered not to issue any pay checks to anyone hired without the commissioners OK after the effective date. The motion carried unanimously.

Upon reviewing the employee policy for the county, commissioners also voted to include maternity leave which would provide for a 30 day absence providing the employee came back and worked for six months, then would receive that 30 day leave pay.

In other action, the commissioners, with Judge Dalby out of the court, voted to accept the First National Bank as the county depository.

Lonnie Gene Peel, Constable of Precinct I, met with the commissioners to give a report on finances of a new radio and was given permission by the court to make the purchase, along with a siren.

Voted to approved a bond for new deputy Randy Smith of Wilson; appointed Judge Giles Dalby and District Judge George Hansard on the Garza County Juvenile board; set the precinct judges pay at \$4 per hour with an additional \$15 going to the presiding judge for delivery of the ballots; approved the monthly bills and invoices; received a written report that Justices of the Peace Dee Justice and Shelia Melton had just completed a 40 hour JP course in Huntsville.

Vandalism, Theft Reported

Several acts of vandalism were reported to the sheriff's department this past week with the Fiesta Car Wash No. 2 reporting locks being torn off, as well as spray nozzles and coins taken totaling \$140 in damages and theft.

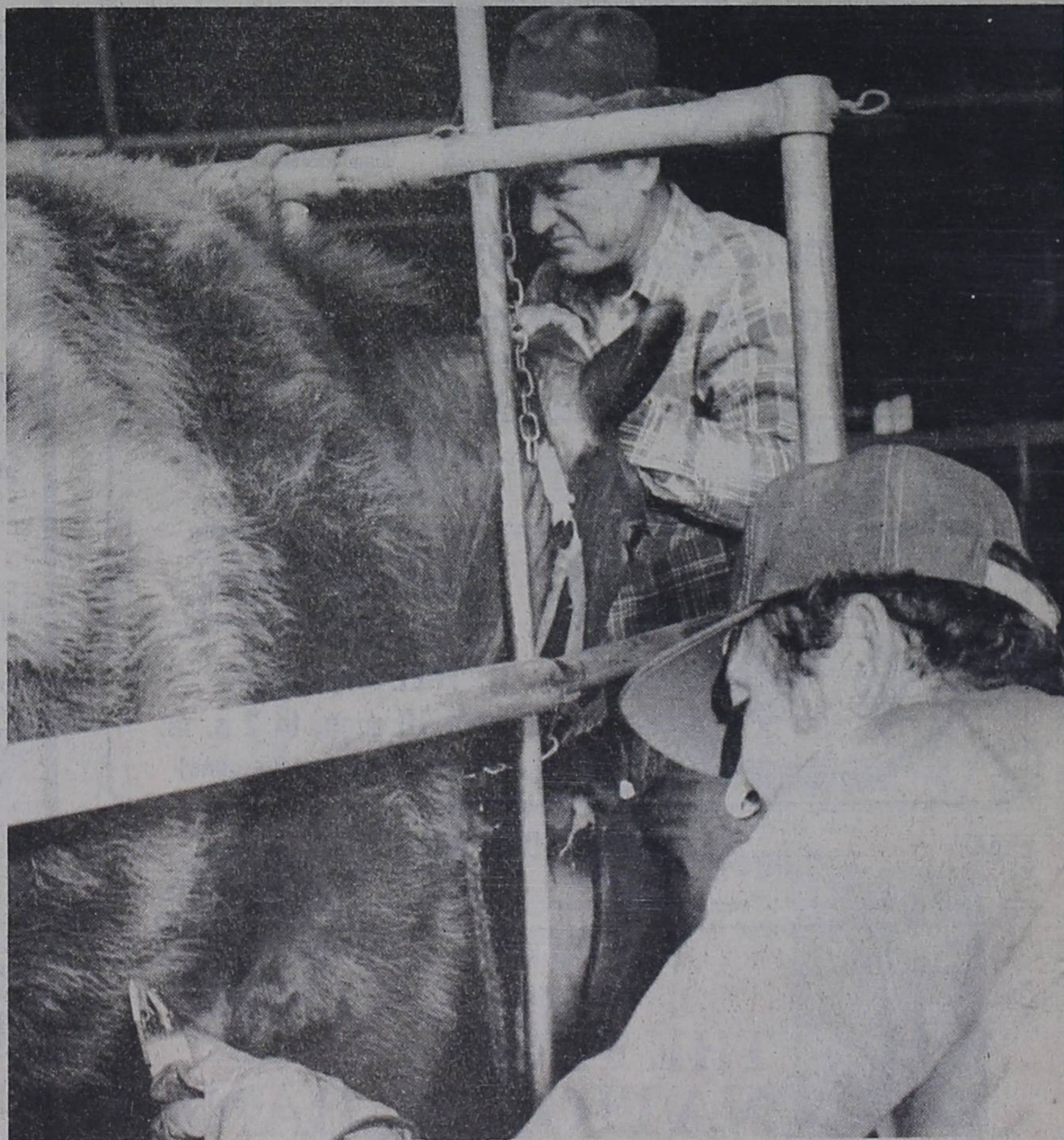

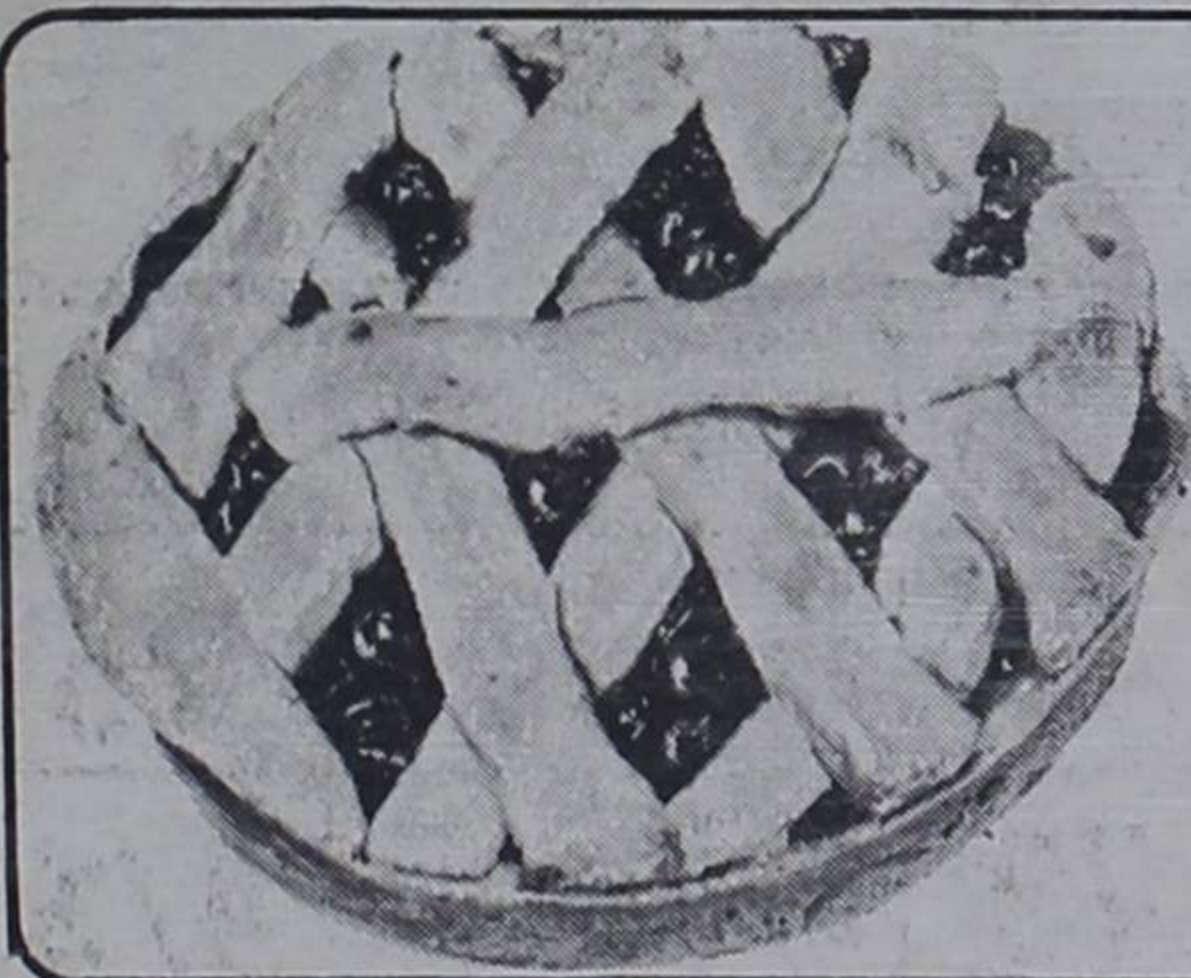

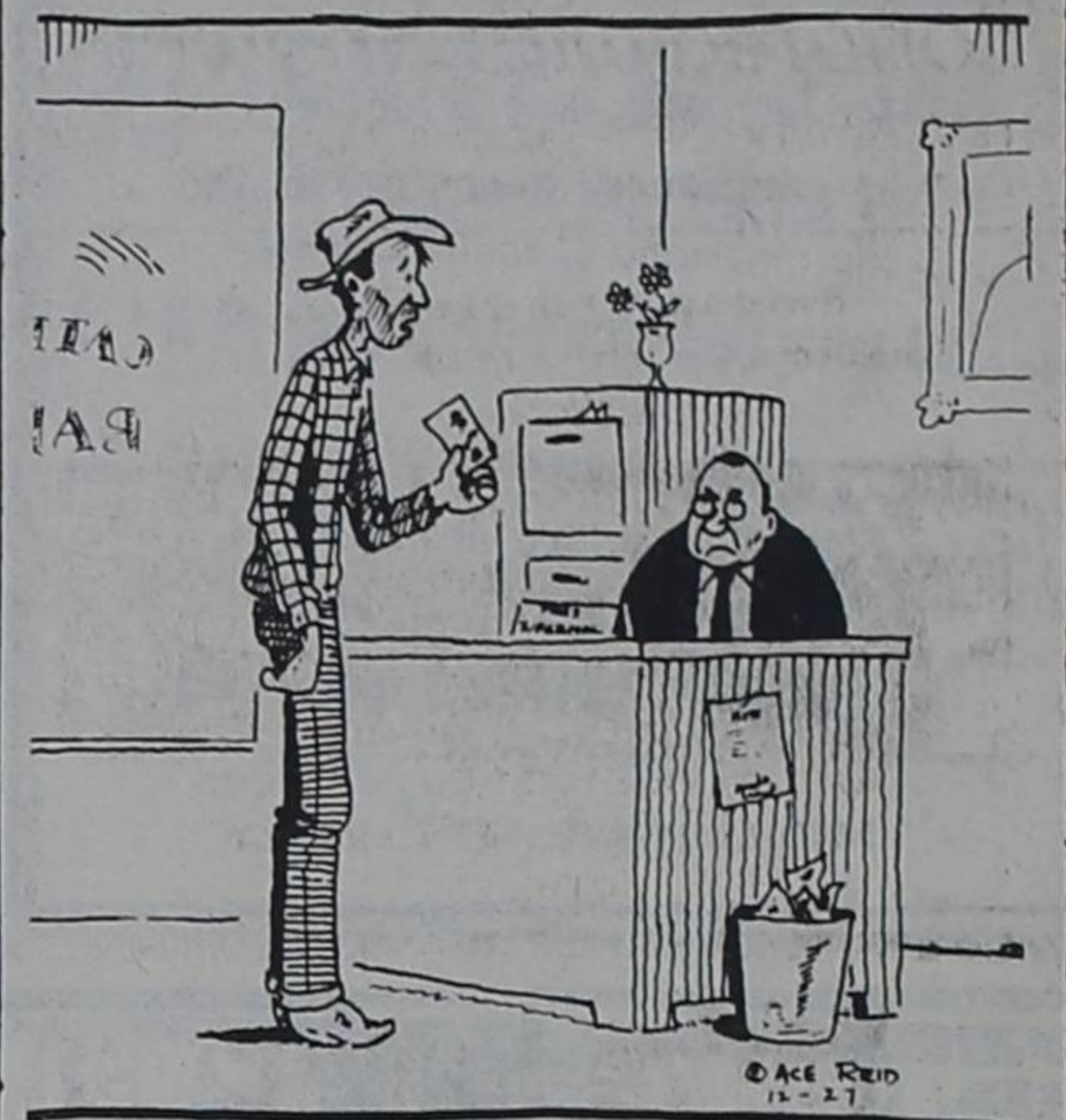
Beetles to fight weed

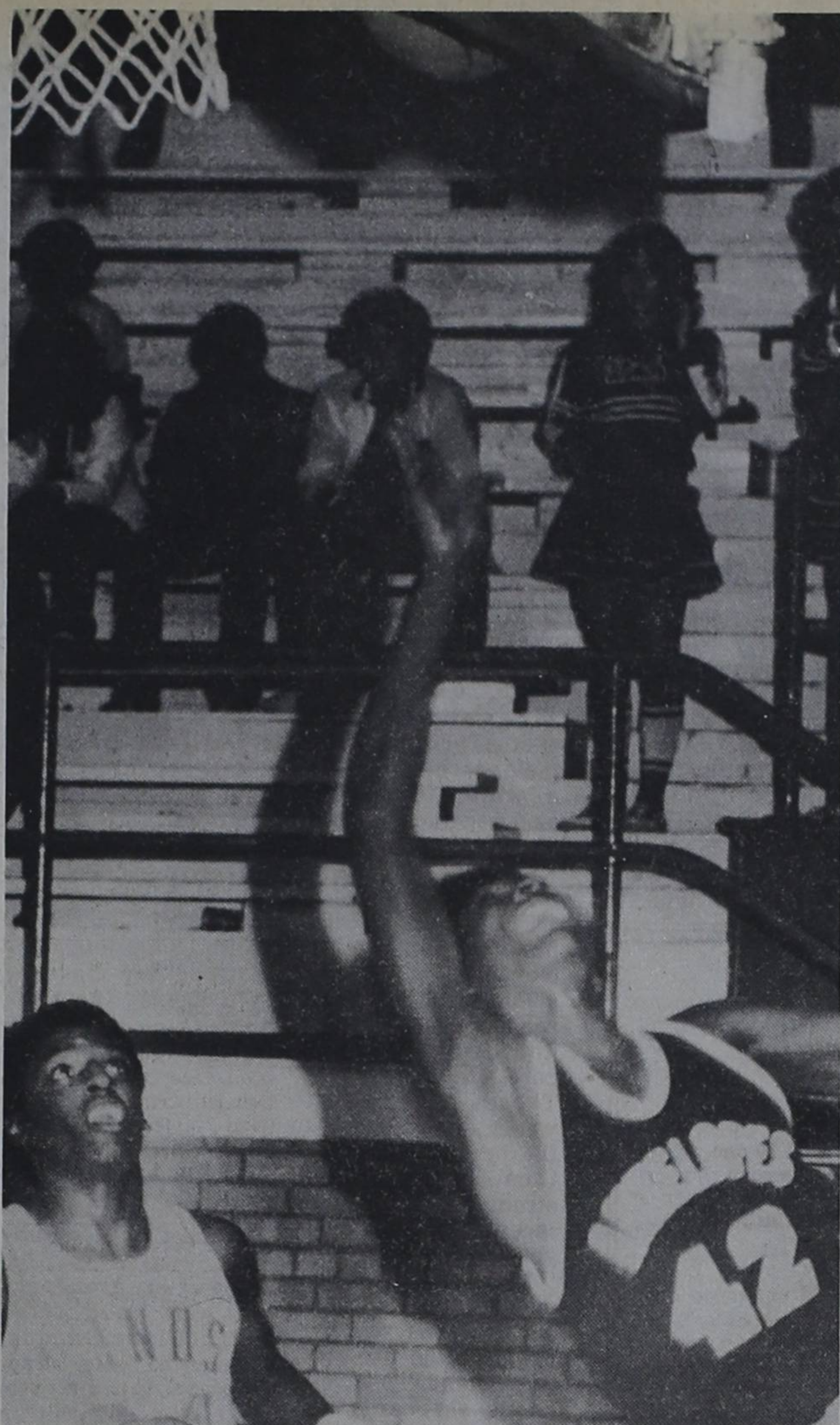
Idalou will represent the district as the first place team.

went ahead at the end of the first period of play 11 to nine, but fell behind in the second period nine to 18 and were behind at the half 31 to 36.

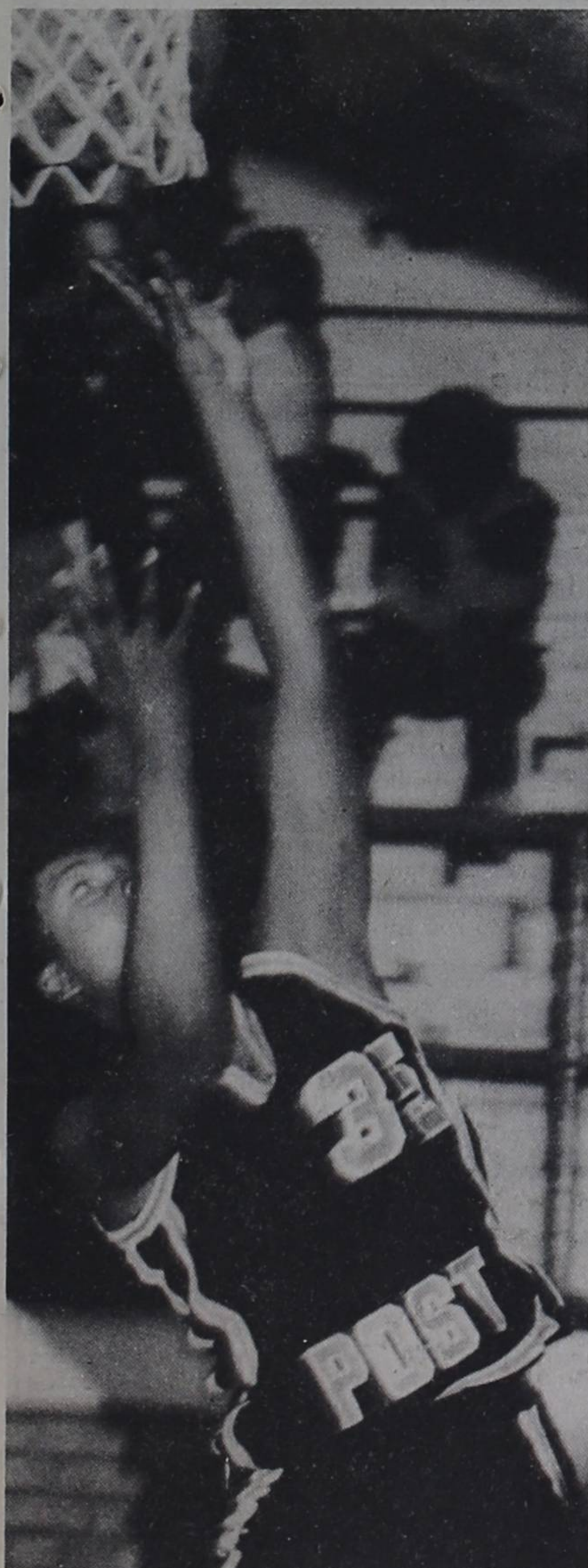
Scoring 13 more in the third period, the

The need to enter the mountains of Emmanuel's Land is as great today as ever. The pastor, or shepherd, is pictured as one fulfilling the model of Christ's love by reaching out from his knowledge, heart of care, and background. Those who become weary on their way to the heavenly city are thus renewed and strengthened as they meet the challenges of yet another day.
