When you call back in 24 hours, you give your identification number and you will be given a report on the status of the investigation.

If enough evidence has been provided to make an arrest which would lead to an indictment, the Crime Line will tell you and ask you to call back in 10 minutes to receive instructions on where and when to get your cash reward.

Contributions are requested for the Crime Line Reward fund and may be sent to Crime Line, P.O. Box 11, Post, Tx., 79356. Contributions are tax deductible and receipts will be provided to contributors.

Texas Flag Day

March 2, (today) is Texas Flag Day and proud Texans around the state will be flying the "Lone Star" flag from houses, schools, public buildings and businesses.

"A goal of 10,000 flags flying statewide has been set," says Joe Russo, Flag Day State Chairman. "By encouraging flag flying, we are encouraging awareness of our unique Texas heritage."

At 10:00 a.m. March 2, there will be a special flag raising ceremony at the Capitol in Austin, with simultaneous ceremonies in communities around the state.

The Texas Flag was adopted in 1839 as the official standard of the Republic.

The single star signifies that Texas was alone in the Mexican Confederation and that the star of liberty was rising.

This gave Texas its nickname, "The Lone Star State".

Local Man Charged in Allsup's Theft

Abel Reyna of Post was arrested and charged with theft by Garza County Sheriff's Department officers in connection with the February 3 burglary at Allsup's No. 39, on East Main.

The theft had been reported by Reyna as an armed robbery, but the investigation determined that no armed robbery took place.

Reyna was arrested February 26 and remains in Garza County jail under a \$5,000 bond.

According to investigating officers, Reyna, an employee at the Allsup's store, took approximately \$1,100 to \$1,200 from the drop safe and then Reyna reported that he was robbed by a black male with a pistol helped by another man.

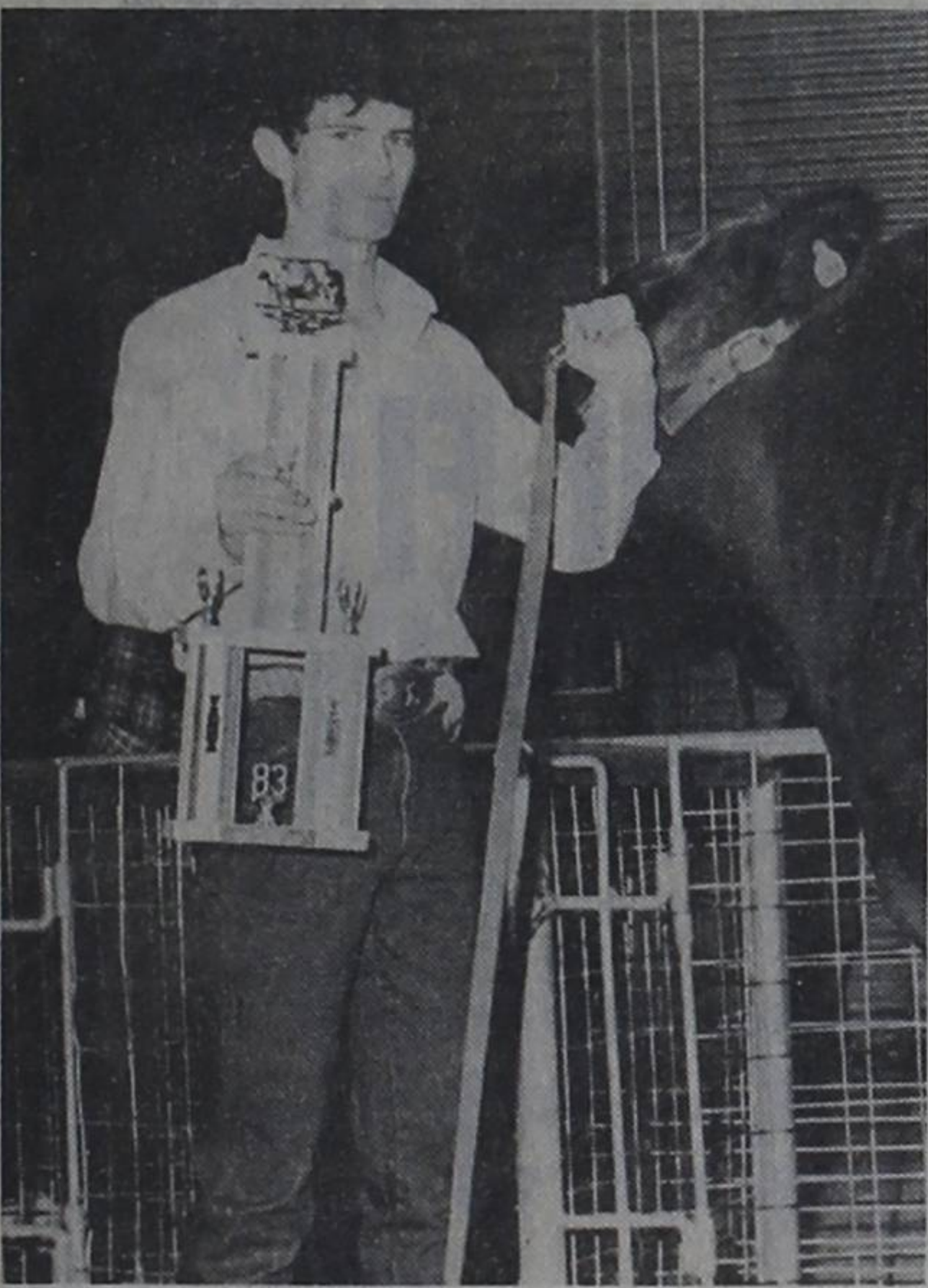

Local Support Makes the Difference

Livestock Sale Breaks Record

Total money paid in premiums, add-ons, and floor price for the Garza County Junior Livestock Show this year tops all records, with a total of \$87,692.64 paid to exhibitors.

In a time when money is tight, concern was expressed by directors and all involved with the show, that the sale would be down some, but not so, it broke all records of previous years.

Grand Champion and Reserve Champion winners in each of the divisions include:

Swine, Grand champion, Marlana Adamek with her heavy weight cross hog and Reserve champion, Gregg Haire with his heavy weight other pure bred.

Showmanship in the swine division was Mike Johnson.

Horse division — Grand champion gelding, Jana Middleton, and reserve champion gelding, Giles Dalby, Jr.

Showmanship in the Horse division was Jana Middleton.

Lamb division — Grand champion, Brad Byrd with his medium wool heavy weight lamb, and reserve champion went to Derick Dunn in the medium wool heavy weight lamb.

Showmanship in the lamb division went to Lynn Allen.

Steer division — Grand champion went to Rusty Morris with his heavy weight steer, with Jana Middleton winning reserve champion with her light weight steer.

Showmanship trophy went to Sam Butler for the steer show.

Heifer division — Grand champion went to Jana Middleton, and reserve champion went to Tammy Johnson.

Rabbit division — Grand champion pen went to Edwin Gossett with Ben Kirkpatrick winning reserve champion.

Showmanship in the rabbit division went to Joel Kirkpatrick.

Market broiler — Grand champion went to Eddie Moreno of Southland FFA and reserve champion went to Donica Basinger. Showmanship went to Kim Basinger.

Trophies awarded during the showing included the rate of gain trophy to Clay Cowdrey, his steer had averaged gaining 2.93 pounds per day since the Nov. 6, 1982 weigh-in date, for a total of 320 pounds. He received a trophy plus a check for \$200, which was presented to him by the GCJLA and Arnold Sanderson, who each donated \$100.

The Overall Sportsmanship trophy was awarded to Sam Butler for his help throughout the show to other exhibitors, working to keep the barn clean, working in the show ring during the hog and the lamb shows and setting up the show rings for each show.

The Hard Luck Award, a \$25 gift certificate from Ridge Range Western Wear, was awarded to D'Lynn Young. She was unable to show her animals due to a skiing accident the weekend before the stock show.

Breakdown of the prices paid included \$43,125.00 premiums paid on 88 animals to 58 different exhibitors, sale add-ons of \$3,340.00 and floor prices for swine, 10,389 lbs. at 43 cents a lb. \$11,733.67; lambs 8641 lbs. at .60 cents, \$5,574.60; lightweight steers, 8341 lbs. at 62 cents, \$5,171.42, and other steers, 28465 lbs. at 63 cents, \$17,932.95; prize money for rabbit show, \$100, market broilers, \$100, horse show, mares, \$100, geldings, \$100, geldings, aged \$100, and heifers, \$90, rate of gain \$200, and gift certificate \$25, with total prize money \$87,692.64.

One other great accomplishment are reports that when the final accounting is done this year following the show, the barn which is just in its fifth year will be paid for, two years before the allotted time.

Proceeds from the \$900 riding lawnmower donated by B Bar T Farm Supply, brought in \$2,205.00 and was won by Monk Palmer who donated the lawnmower back to the GCJLA to be held until a Washer Pitching Contest in May, when it will again be awarded as a prize at that time. Donations for the May drawing will be \$2.00.

The finished pig, donated as second prize, by the Ronnie Dunn family was won by Paul

Thank goodness for small favors...two big news items in one week to help the petroleum industry...

First, the United States Supreme Court agreed to hear the case challenging the constitutionality of the so-called "Windfall Profits Tax."

This could be the best thing that ever happened to Texas and Texans, if the high justices uphold a lower federal court judge's ruling that the law is unconstitutional.

Something a lot of us know knows since the very beginning.
The second good piece of news was President Reagan's announcement over the weekend that he is introducing legislation to decontrol the price of natural gas.

National gas producers have been crying for this for years...and one of the reasons a lot of Texans voted for Jimmy Carter was his promise to do the same thing...which he promptly forgot about after he was elected.

If congress will go along on the president's proposal, our petroleum folks can get about the business of drilling without worrying about all that government red tape...

I have my doubts about the congress allowing decontrol to go through too easy...after all, look at the loss of say-so they'll have.

The president has a great argument for decontrol, when oil was decontrolled there was all kinds of fury raised about how oil prices would sky rocket and the big oil companies would dominate and control and so forth...

Now look what's happened...not only have prices fallen below the old controlled prices, but there is even some fear that oil prices will drop too low...my goodness, the world is turning upside down.

Even without the decontrol of natural gas prices, which would equalize the northeastern consumers with Texas consumers, the supreme court decision would have the most positive short-range effect on Texas.

With all that rip-off to the federal government being channeled back to producers and royalty owners, more money will be available for more drilling and more drilling means more jobs and you know what that means for us!

I'd even go so far as to recommend that we pray for the high court judges to arrive at the proper decision...even if that is a violation of the constitution...praying, that is.

Texas A&M engineer fears chemicals may affect water quality

COLLEGE STATION — The quality of some drinking water is a big question mark, says a Texas A&M University environmental engineer.

The average person consumes about half a gallon (two liters) of water every day from the kitchen tap, cooked food, coffee, tea and soft drinks.

But researchers in water quality aren't sure what effect, if any, is caused by minute levels of chemicals now being found with regularity in the nation's underground water tables, says Dr. Bill Batchelor of Texas A&M's Civil Engineering Department.

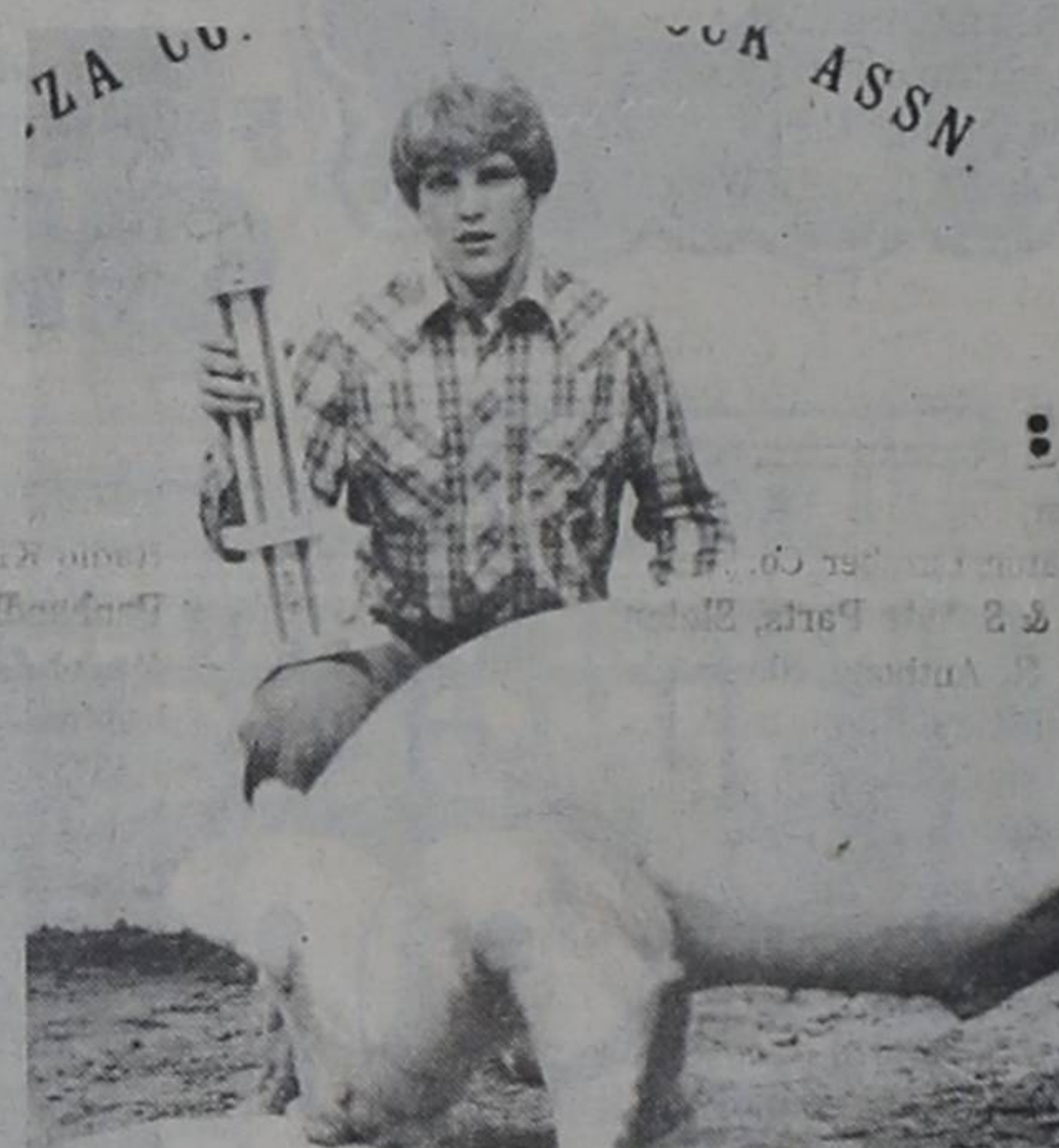

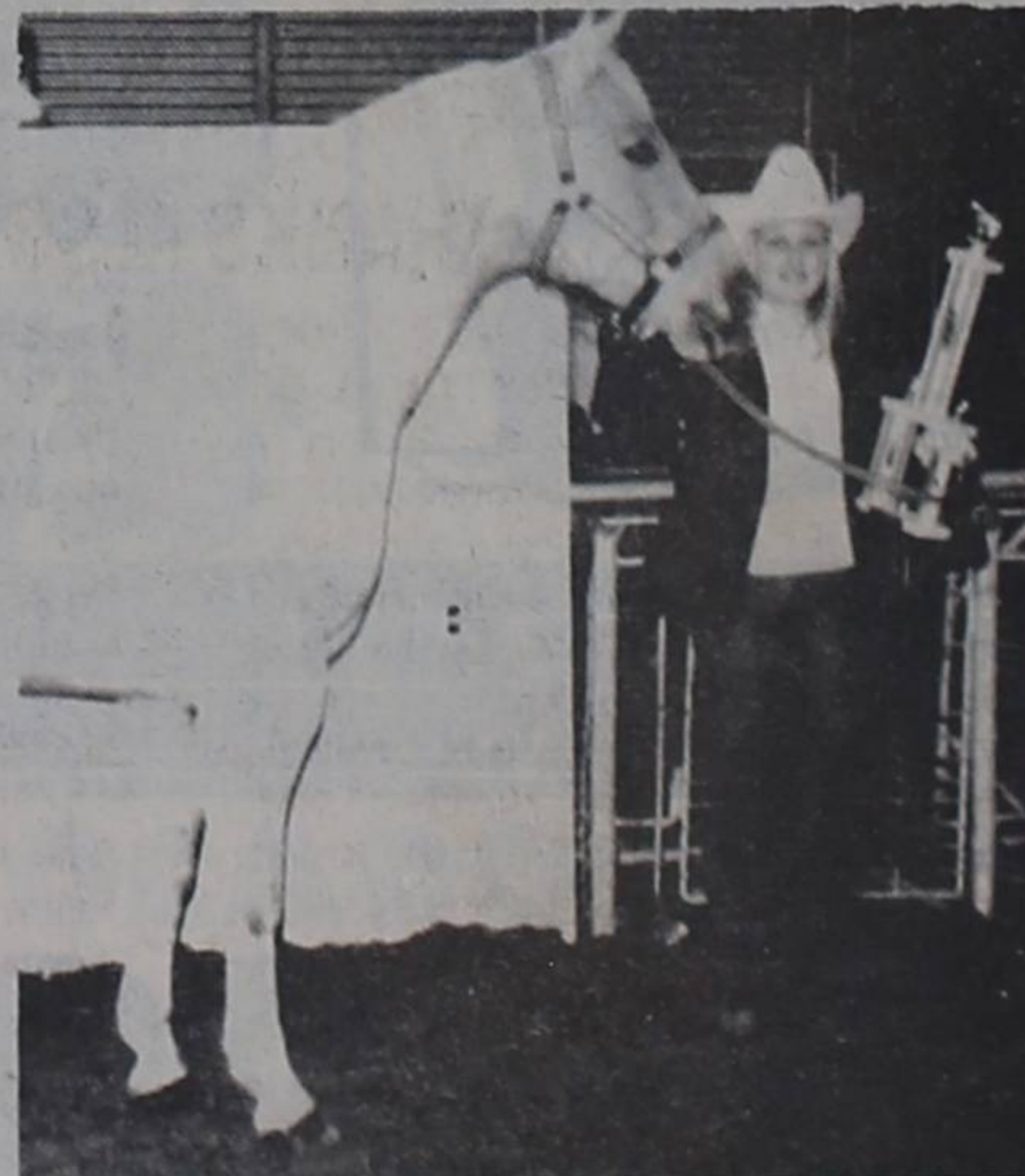
