The Crime Line will take your information and ask you to call back in 24 hours.

When you call back in 24 hours, you give your identification number and you will be given a report on the status of the investigation.

If enough evidence has been provided to make an arrest which would lead to an indictment, the Crime Line will tell you and ask you to call back in 10 minutes to receive instructions on where and when to get your cash reward.

### Culture Club Tea

### Commissioners Meet

Following their new policy, which took effect last month, the Commissioners Court in regular session, heard Donald Windham recommend Prudencio Basquez for the position of janitor for the county courthouse to become effective March 1.

The commissioners had set a moratorium at its February 14 meeting on hiring of replacements for the county, before first being approved by the commissioners in regular session.

If a replacement is made without approval, the county treasurer is not allowed to write a pay check to that employee.

The hiring of Basquez was approved with a salary set at \$800 a month for a three month trial basis with the salary upped to \$953.34 after the trial period.

The employee policy was again discussed concerning the maternity clause which was inserted in the policy at last months meeting. Following the discussion no changes were made in the policy.

After concluding their agenda, the commissioners met with Sheriff Jim Pippin concerning the recent jail inspection by the state.

Although a letter of certification was received by the jail, it was noted that Garza County is on the very edge of being in non-compliance due to being unable to segregate inmates properly.

It was also pointed out that three minor items needed immediate attention in the facility which Pippin told the commissioners had been corrected.

It was also noted that the microfilming of county and district records in the district clerks office had been completed and was hoped that the new reading equipment would be installed soon.

## Jr. Livestock Asso. Barn Note 'Burned'

Garza County Junior Livestock Association directors and officers held a "note-burning" ceremony in the lobby of the First National Bank last Wednesday, as the final installment on the new barn was paid.

The original note was \$60,000, made in October 1978 and was not due for another two years.

Association president Noel White presented the final payment of the bank,

following a record year for building fund donations.

The \$35,431.08 check opened the door for the Association to begin plans for a much needed expansion of the facility, which is located on the north side of Hwy 84, just north of the city limits.

Construction on the current facility was started in September 1978, with Noel Construction of Plainview getting the \$45,000 bid on the 80 by 180 ft. show barn and 40 by 60 ft. fair building.

The first show was held in the new barn in February 1979.

The association sold the old barn to the county and put that \$35,000 on the original note, leaving a balance of \$25,000.

Finance charges of \$2,157.53 and interest of \$8,273.55 brought the total balance to \$35,431.08.

The association received numerous private donations and other fund raising efforts included farm sales, flea markets, chances on a Molly boat, chances on boots, chances on a riding lawnmower and pig, washer pitch, Rotary Club auction and pancake supper, cake sales, concessions, two percent commission by exhibitors and exhibitors donating premium money.

Association officers include White, vice president, Jimmy Bartlett, secretary Mack Terry and Co-secretary Orabeth White.

There are a total of 55 directors serving on the board for the Garza County Junior Livestock Association.

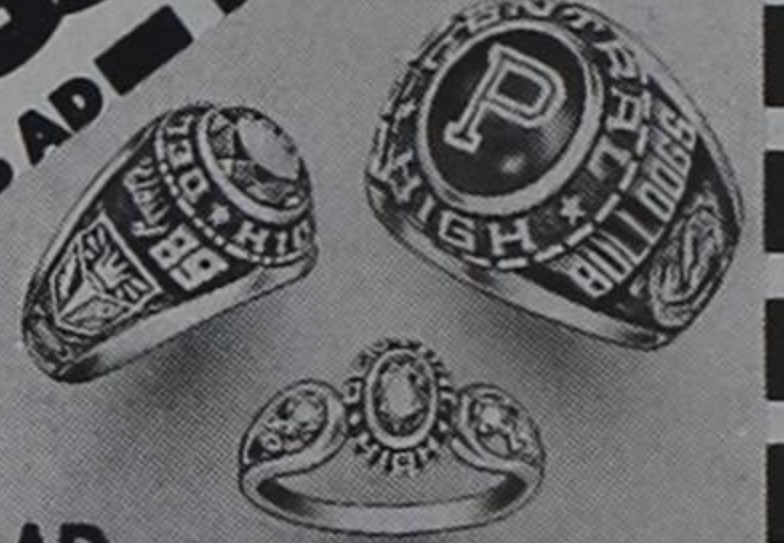

### Grassland Club Meets

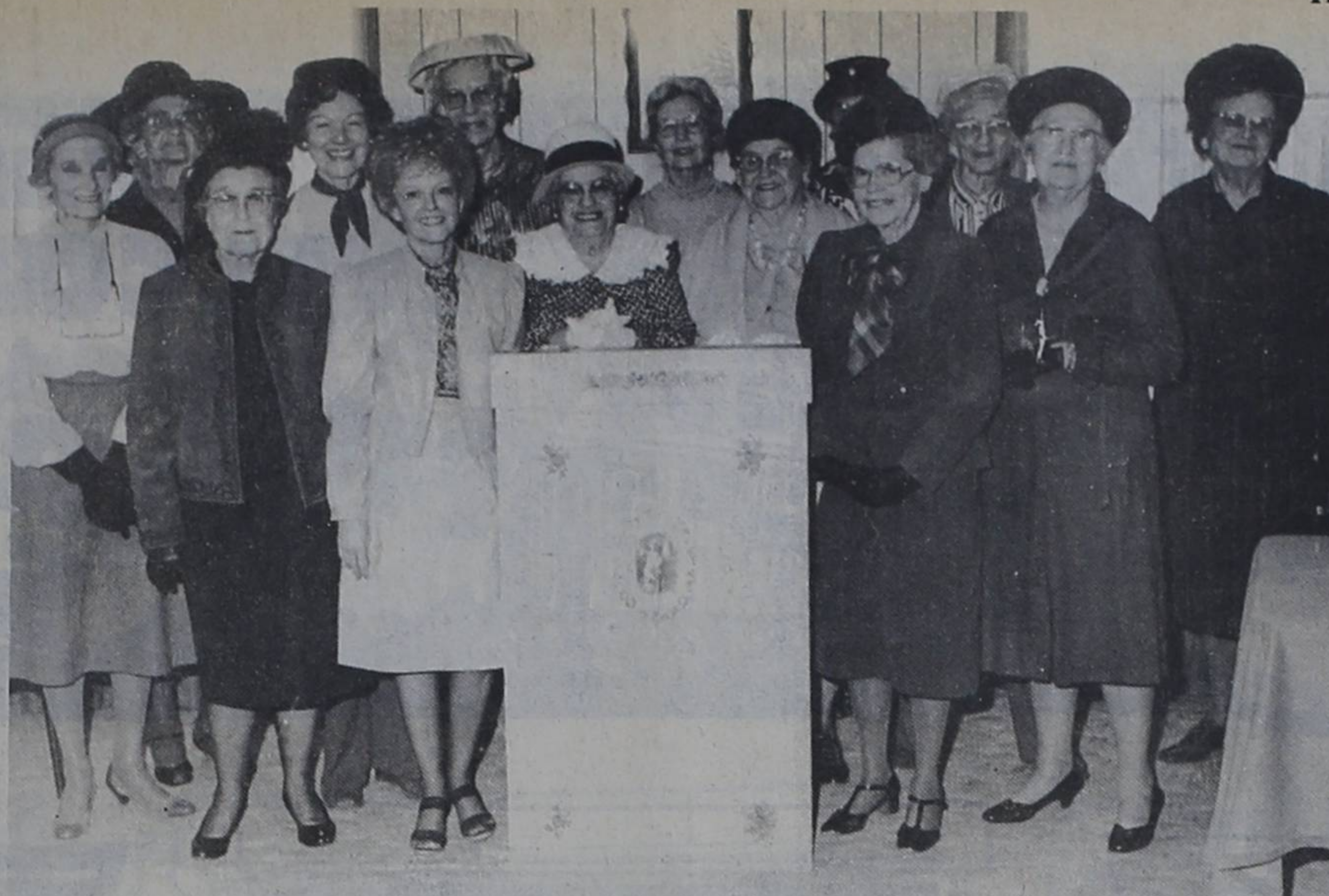
The Grassland Hobby Club met Feb. 8 in the community center with Valentine decorations used for the motif.

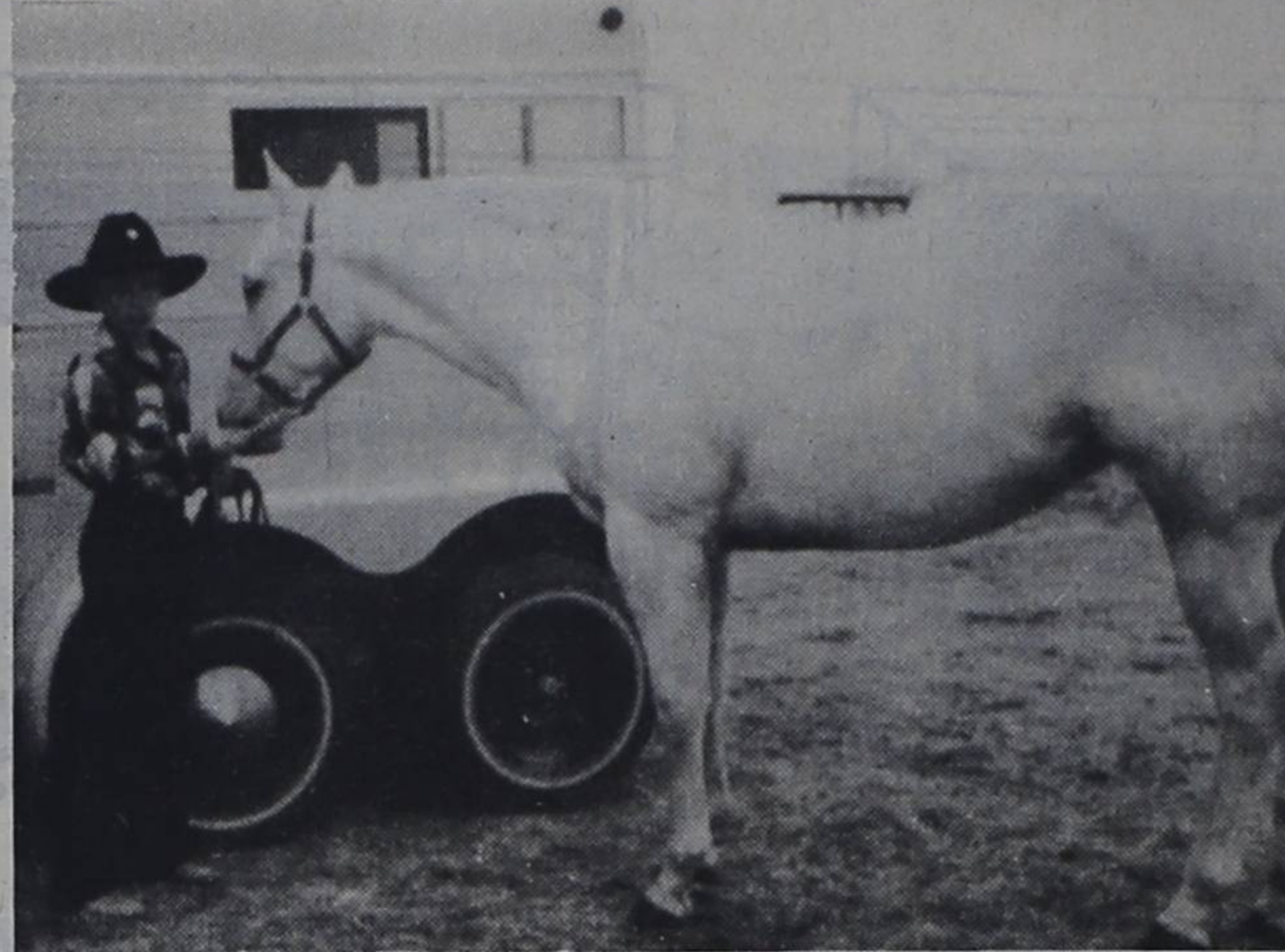
## TSTA

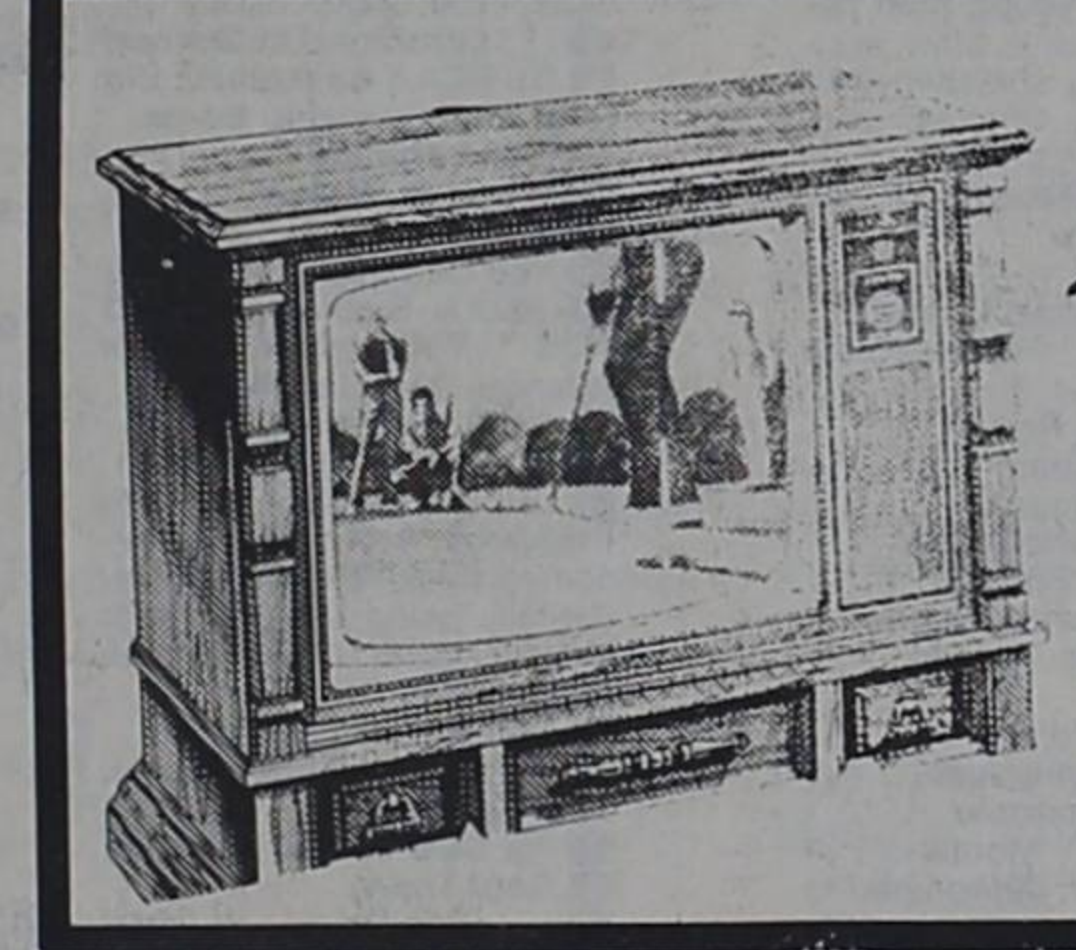
