The Crime Line issues an identification number to callers, and that number is used by the caller in all future conversations with the Crime Line.

How It Works You call the Crime Line with information

about any crime...the Crime Line will give you an identification number...your name will not be used or will you be asked to give your name.

The Crime Line will take your information and ask you to call back in 24 hours.

When you call back in 24 hours, you give your identification number and you will be given a report as to the status of the investigation.

If enough evidence has been provided to make an arrest, the Crime Line will tell you and ask you to call back in 10 minutes to receive instructions on where and when to get your cash reward.

Alfredo Raul Jones, arrested on a warrant out of Snyder for burglary of a building. He was returned to Snyder.


Charlie Hall Clanton was arrested on a warrant to cause bodily injury, he was released on \$1,000 surety bond.

Tuesday Sunrise Wind Foretells Success Rate

People who depend on the weather to make a living are anxious to see which way the wind blows next Tuesday morning at sunrise.

Since 1906 the wind direction at sunrise on March 22 has told the story of good or bad crop years in Garza County as the old Plains Indian tradition of "Taba'na Yuan'e" has been repeated.

Again this year, as he has since 1973, "Chief" Frank Runkles will patiently and quietly build the ceremonial council circle and build a fire by rubbing two sticks together.

Then, just at sunrise, "Chief" Runkles will test the wind direction and an observer will declare the findings.

of the project.

Using his knowledge of the Plains Indian culture and after extensive research, Runkles has pulled together all the cermonial dress, Indian signs and mystical preparations as the Comanche understood "Taba'na Yuan'e."

Starting about 15 minutes before sunrise, Runkles prepares for the sun, just as the Comanche had done for hundreds of years and other plains Indians for perhaps thousands of years.

And as Runkles tells his friends, "you know if you're outside much at sunrise, that the wind always changes direction between the ending of dark and sunrise."

The breakfast, \$1 per person, is sponsored by the Post Chamber of Commerce, which is also sponsoring the "Taba'na Yuan'e" observance.

Observers of the "Taba'na Yuan'e" will want to be at the City-County Park before 6:45 a.m., Tuesday, March 22 to catch the full "Taba'na Yuan'e" ceremony.

The cantata will follow the traditional congregation's traditional "Maundy Wednesday" Love Feast observance, which starts at 6:30 p.m.

Both the Love Feast and the Easter contata are open to the public.

Postex Up-Date

By the end of this week a total of 142 employees will still be working at Burlington Industries' Postex plant, with 92 personnel remaining in the sewing room and 50 in the shop and warehouse. Through Monday there were 146 hourly-waged employees, five salaried personnel terminated at the plant.

Last year the wind told the story of a "very good year."

"Taba'na Yuan'e" translates to mean Sunrise Wind and the ceremony is an authentic dance used by the Plains Indians to determine their success in the coming year.

Early Pioneers in Garza County picked up the tradition from stories they heard from Indians and J.A. Wilborn was the first of local folks to maintain the ceremony.

What started out as a simple sunrise year. testing of the wind has developed into an authentic re-creation of the Comanche version of "Taba'na Yuan'e" by "Chief" Runkles.

He is a student of Indian lore, and when year. the Post Chamber of Commerce accepted the responsibility of maintaining the tradition in 1973, Runkles was asked to serve as the leader

In other words, the wind could be blowing out of the south at a minute before sunrise and at the precise moment of sunrise, quickly shift to the southeast or southwest.

Farmers and ranchers will be watching closely to see which way the wind is blowing the smoke as Runkles points in the direction of the breeze.

A west or southwest wind means a ppor year.

South or southeast predicts a very bad

North or northwest means an average year.

East or northeast indicates a very good

Since 1906 the wind prediction has been 94 percent accurate.

County Commissioners Okay Industrial Development Corp.

County commissioners, with Judge Dalby presiding, approved the formation of a Garza **County Industrial Development Corporation** after listening to a presentation made by Jack King accompanied by Ken Yeates of the **Texas Industrial Development Board.**

King told the commissioners that they wanted it formed through the county rather than the city, in case some industry wanted to form somewhere in the county.

Dick Milam with Mid-Plains Pipe Company also met with the commissioners to ask permission to use right-of-way in bar ditches in Pct. 2 and Pct. 1 to lay plastic lines with a pressure capacity of 25 pounds leading to the gas gathering plant located on the Floy Richardson place.

Milam told commissioners that the lines would be buried 48 inches deep with a 42 inch cover. All but one mile of the pipeline would be located in Pct. 1 under Buck Craft. Milam presented a check to the county in the amount of \$13,686.36 to Pct. 1 and \$4,950.00 to Pct. 2 for right-of-way use. Don Hefner of Kelley, Cole and Co., auditors went over the yearly audit with commissioners and gave his recommendations for the upcoming year. The audit was approved as presented by commissioners and it was decided to advertise for bids for auditors for the coming year with bids to be opened in regular session during the April meeting. Before adjourning, commissioners approved monthly invoices and paying of the bills.

Speaker Gib Lewis announced his own House Ethics Committee would investigate his failure to fully disclose his business interests. Bullock trimmed \$867 million from earlier estimates of state monies available for the next two fiscal years, blaming oil prices and sluggish tax receipts for the reduction in state cash.

His announcement immediately fueled the on-going debate of whether the Legislature should pass a tax bill or slash state spending. The Legislature itself remains visibly divided as Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby seeks a tax increase and House Speaker Gib Lewis stands adamantly against one.

Luxury Taxes

White, who earlier opposed a tax hike, told lawmakers he supported raising an additional \$800 million in state revenue by taxing alcoholic beverages, tobacco and amusements such as video games and pinball machines.

The governor also suggested issuing bonds for highway construction, which got a mixed reaction.

All in all, White's budget is still over a billion dollars

If White and Bullock can't agree on revenue estimates, it should come as no surprise to onlookers who have watched the pair jockey for position these past two months: it's no secret that Bullock intends to challenge White in the '86 gubernatorial race.

White avoided support of any tax hike as long as he could, and whether Bullock played a role in forcing his change of stance, White responded by suggesting tax
