## Plant Rumors Replace Weather

By Wes Burnett

Depending on which rumor you want to believe, Burlington's Postex Plant is either (1) sold and ready to change ownership or (2) everyone is gone and the place is a ghost town or (3) the building is going to be turned into an indoor racetrack or (4) . . . oh well, we could go on forever. '

The latest information from Postex Plant manager Jim Brown is what we reported

two weeks ago . . . a potential buyer of the plant, who is interested in producing muslin sheeting, is currently involved in discussions with Burlington Industry officials.

The prospective buyer, whose primary business is supplying muslin sheeting to institutional buyers, expects to make a decision about the purchase in the next couple of weeks.

In the meantime, although the purchase

of the plant by this unnamed buyer looks encouraging, there is no confirmation that a deal has been struck or even that an agreement is near.

Brown says that the current work force of 162 people at the plant will remain constant for an unspecified time.

There are now 129 hourly-waged and 33 salaried employees on the payroll.

## A. J.'s long and interesting career ends here

A. J. Baumann, local telephone man, was honored with a luncheon by fellow employees at Brownfield Tuesday noon, March 22 upon his retirement from General Telephone Co. after 28 years service.

Jerry Slaughter, I&M Foreman of Lamesa, presented Baumann with a belt buckle and a money tree gift from employees during the luncheon.

Baumann first went into the telephone industry when he went to work for the Independent Kerrville Company upon his graduation from high school in 1952.

He joined General Telephone Company of the Southwest September 17, 1954 in Port Lavaca, Texas on an unlocated construction crew.

While working in the southern division, he was called to the service in 1956 and rejoined the company in 1958, again on a

construction crew with O. D. Hearn as construction foreman, who is now operations manager over the Brownfield district.

While in the southern division, he worked in approximately 60 towns from 1954 until 1961 with the longest stay being in the Dickenson area for 13 months and the shortest being two hours (long enough to change out a pole.)

In 1961 he transferred to the northern division in the Perryton area as an equipment installers helper and worked in that capacity until Feb. 11, 1961 when he and his family moved to Post where he was an installer repairman.

He was named combination man in-charge in 1965 and has held that position until his retirement.


Baumann recalls that phones have made





## Illegally detained?

By DAVID A. SELLERS Copley News Service

A police officer learns from a radio broadcast that a United Parcel Service truck has been robbed of all its packages. Relying on his knowledge of the size of the UPS truck and his familiarity with the area, the officer decides that the robbers will have to use a truck to carry the merchandise and drives to an intersection he believes they must cross.

A half-hour later he sees an unmarked truck occupied by two males pass the intersection. The truck is in violation of local laws because it does not have any markings on it. The officer follows the truck and orders it to pull over.

The policeman questions two men who say they have been performing odd jobs that day and explain the truck was rented. The men will not allow the officer to look into the back of the truck.

The officer calls for a back-up cruiser. Ten minutes later the car arrives with the driver of the UPS truck who looks into the window of the rented truck and identifies the stolen packages. The two men are arrested.

They appeal their arrest, claiming that they were illegally detained so the UPS driver could arrive and inspect the truck. How would you handle this case?

The court said the arrival of the UPS driver was key to the case. The officer's actions were reasonable, the court ruled, because the UPS driver was likely to either identify the packages, resulting in an arrest, or not recognize the merchandise allowing the two men to be released. The arrest was legal.
