Plant Rumors Replace Weather

Depending on which rumor you want to believe, Burlington's Postex Plant is either (1) sold and ready to change ownership or (2) everyone is gone and the place is a ghost town or (3) the building is going to be turned into an indoor racetrack or (4) . . . oh well, we could go on forever.

The latest information from Postex Plant manager Jim Brown is what we reported

two weeks ago . . . a potential buyer of the plant, who is interested in producing muslin sheeting, is currently involved in discussions with Burlington Industry officials.

The prospective buyer, whose primary business is supplying muslin sheeting to institutional buyers, expects to make a decision about the purchase in the next couple of weeks.

In the meantime, although the purchase

of the plant by this unnamed buyer looks encouraging, there is no confirmation that a deal has been struck or even that an agreement is near.

Brown says that the current work force of 162 people at the plant will remain constant for an unspecified time.

There are now 129 hourly-waged and 33 salaried employees on the payroll.

A. J.'s long and interesting career ends here

A. J. Baumann, local telephone man, was honored with a luncheon by fellow employees at Brownfield Tuesday noon, March 22 upon his retirement from General Telephone Co. after 28 years service.

Jerry Slaughter, I&M Foreman of Lamesa, presented Baumann with a belt buckle and a money tree gift from employees during the luncheon.

Baumann first went into the telephone industry when he went to work for the Independent Kerrville Company upon his graduation from high school in 1952.

He joined General Telephone Company of the Southwest September 17, 1954 in Port Lavaca, Texas on an unlocated construction crew.

While working in the southern division, he was called to the service in 1956 and rejoined the company in 1958, again on a

construction crew with O. D. Hearn as construction foreman, who is now operations manager over the Brownfield district.

While in the southern division, he worked in approximately 60 towns from 1954 until 1961 with the longest stay being in the Dickenson area for 13 months and the shortest being two hours (long enough to change out a pole.)

In 1961 he transferred to the northern division in the Perryton area as an equipment installers helper and worked in that capacity until Feb. 11, 1961 when he and his family moved to Post where he was an installer repairman.

He was named combination man in-charge in 1965 and has held that position until his retirement.

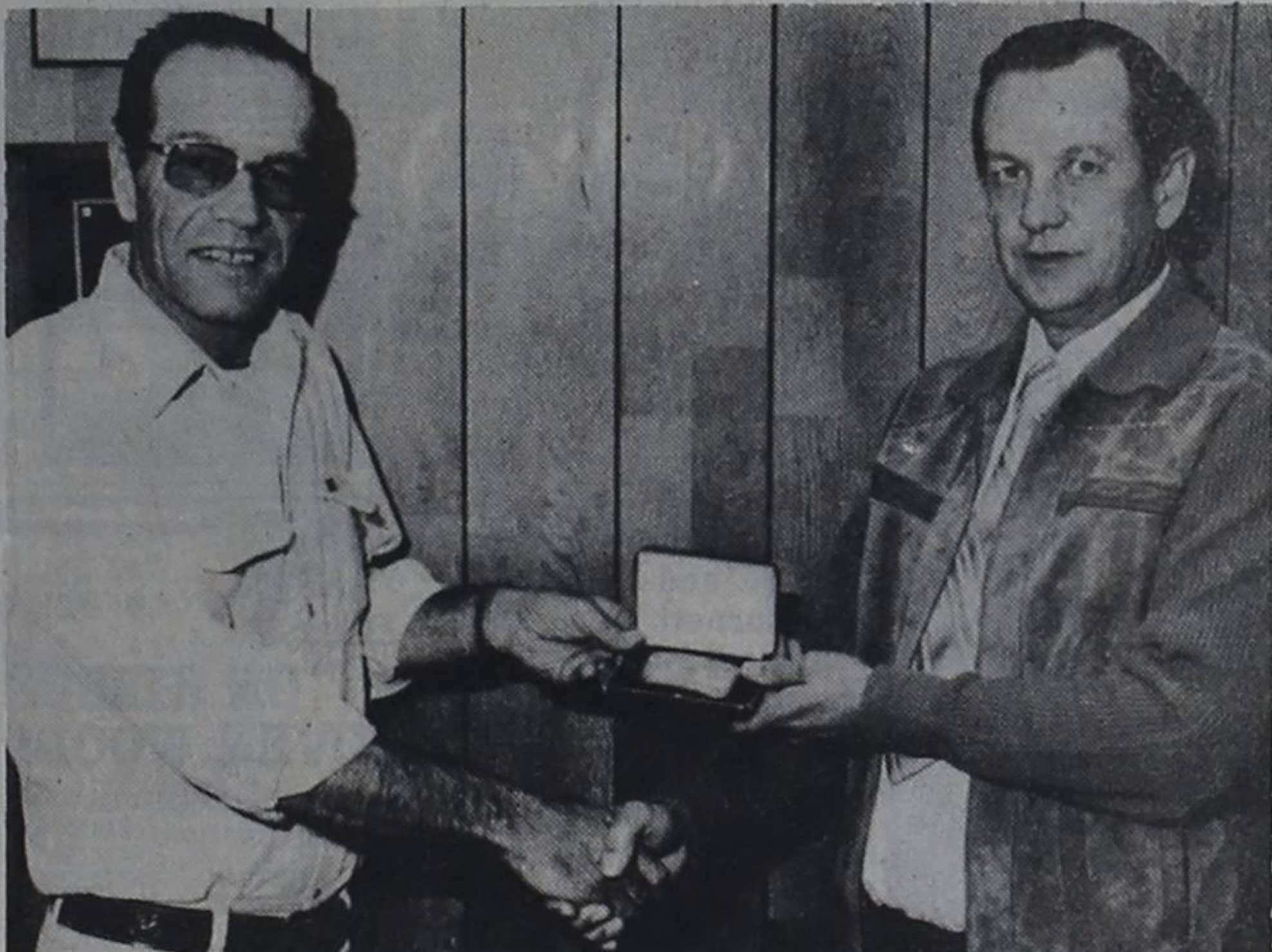
Baumann recalls that phones have made

drastic changes in his 30 years of telephone service recalling that when he went to work, phones were of the magneta type or crank style.

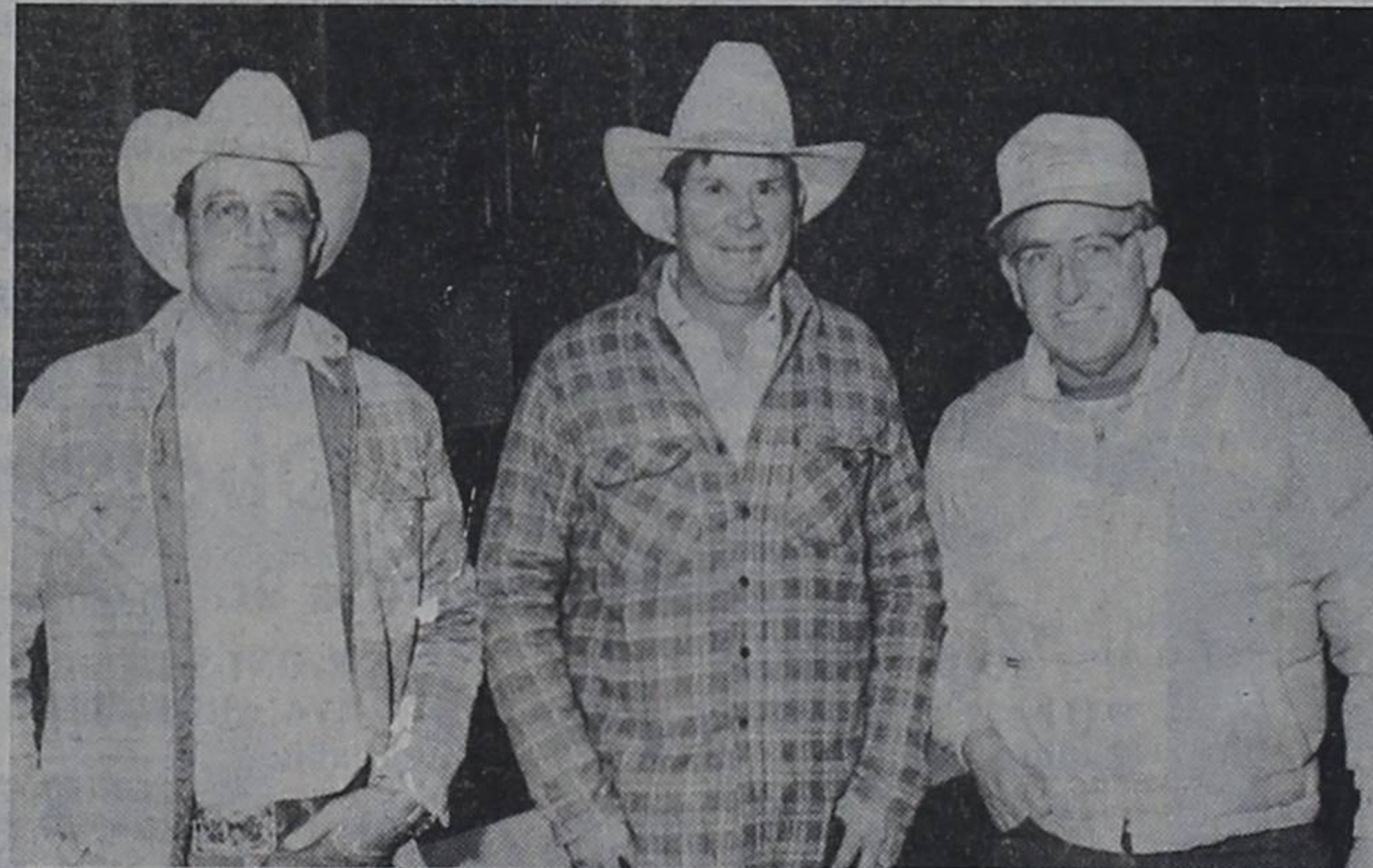
Then came the common battery or when you picked up the phone, the operator was on the line to ask the number you were calling, then modernization took over to the dial system and now the recent touch call type.

A. J. said he planned to spend his retirement doing just that "taking it easy" and not climbing any more poles.

"The Navy ships here in the Western Pacific will be no better than the men who man and fight them. My people, the ones I work with day to day, are tops. That was the gauntlet thrown down on March 3 to the 15 Naval Reserve officers and enlisted men who had just finished the 20 hour trip from the Midwest to Okinawa, Japan. The reservists were there to participate in an annual training exercise called Team Spirit - 83.

Navy Petty Officer Mickey Haas of Post, who is a reservist at the Naval Reserve Center in Lubbock, was one of those sailors.

Within 48 hours Haas was riding the USS Blue Ridge, a 600 foot long communications and command ship, underway in transit to Korea where the Navy ships would "engage the enemy forces of Country Orange."

Orange was the mythical name given to the enemy country. U. S. Navy ships and subs were designated as armed forces for Country Orange. They acted as the opposition for the battle "Practice Game".

The real game, hopefully, never occurring.

For the next two weeks, Haas worked, ate and bunked side by side on board the Blue Ridge with regular Navy sailors. His training would be valuable if the reservists are ever called up to assist the regular Navy.

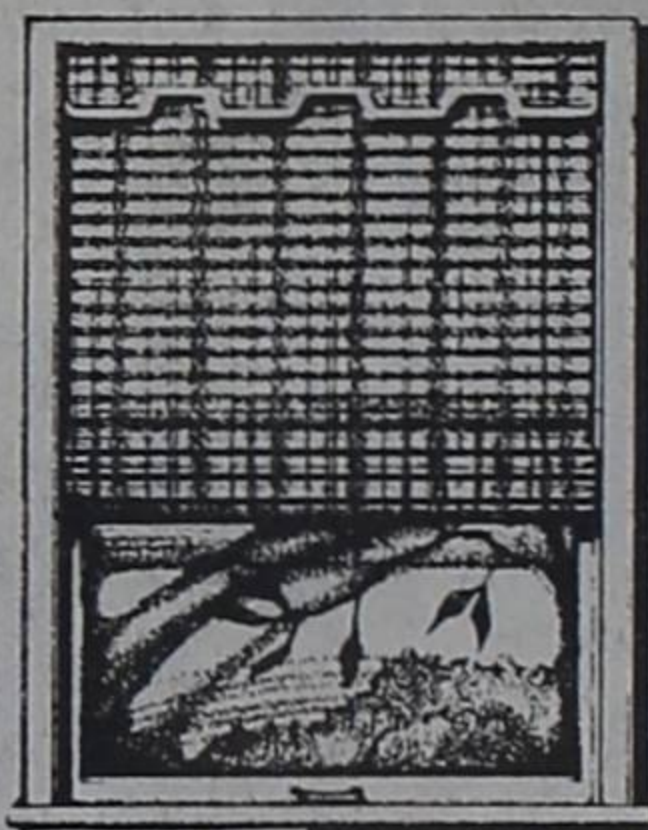

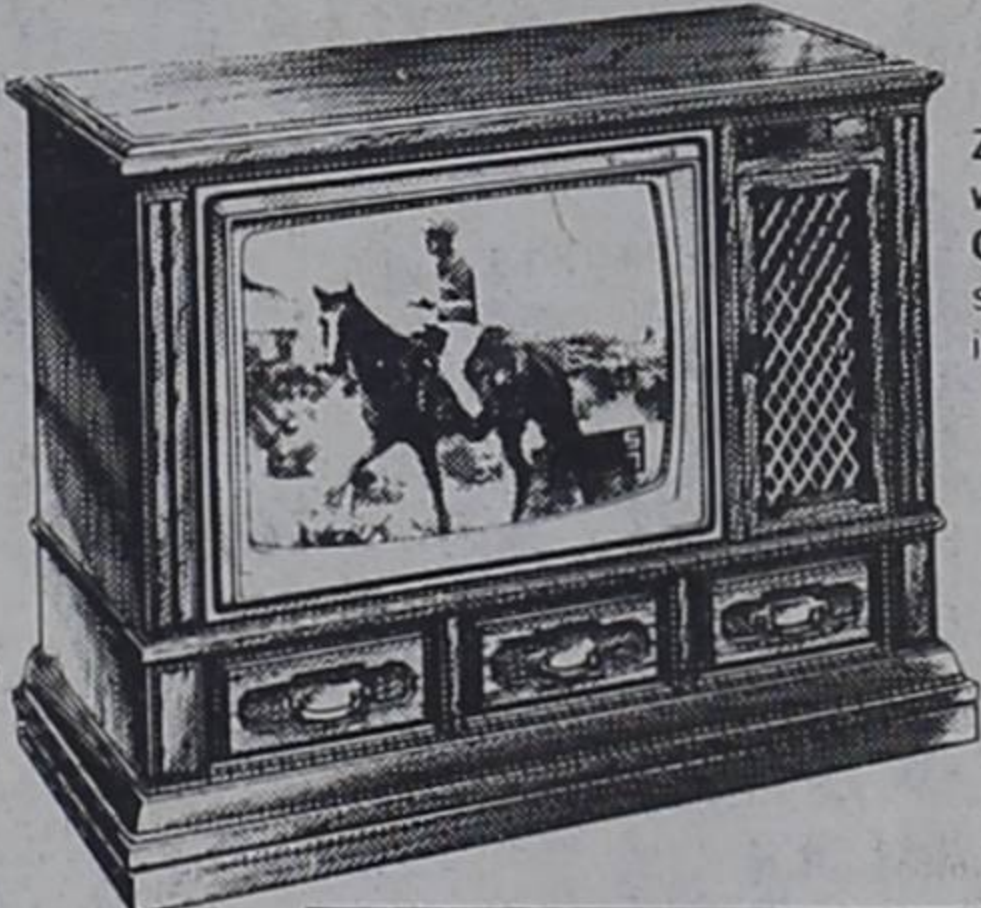

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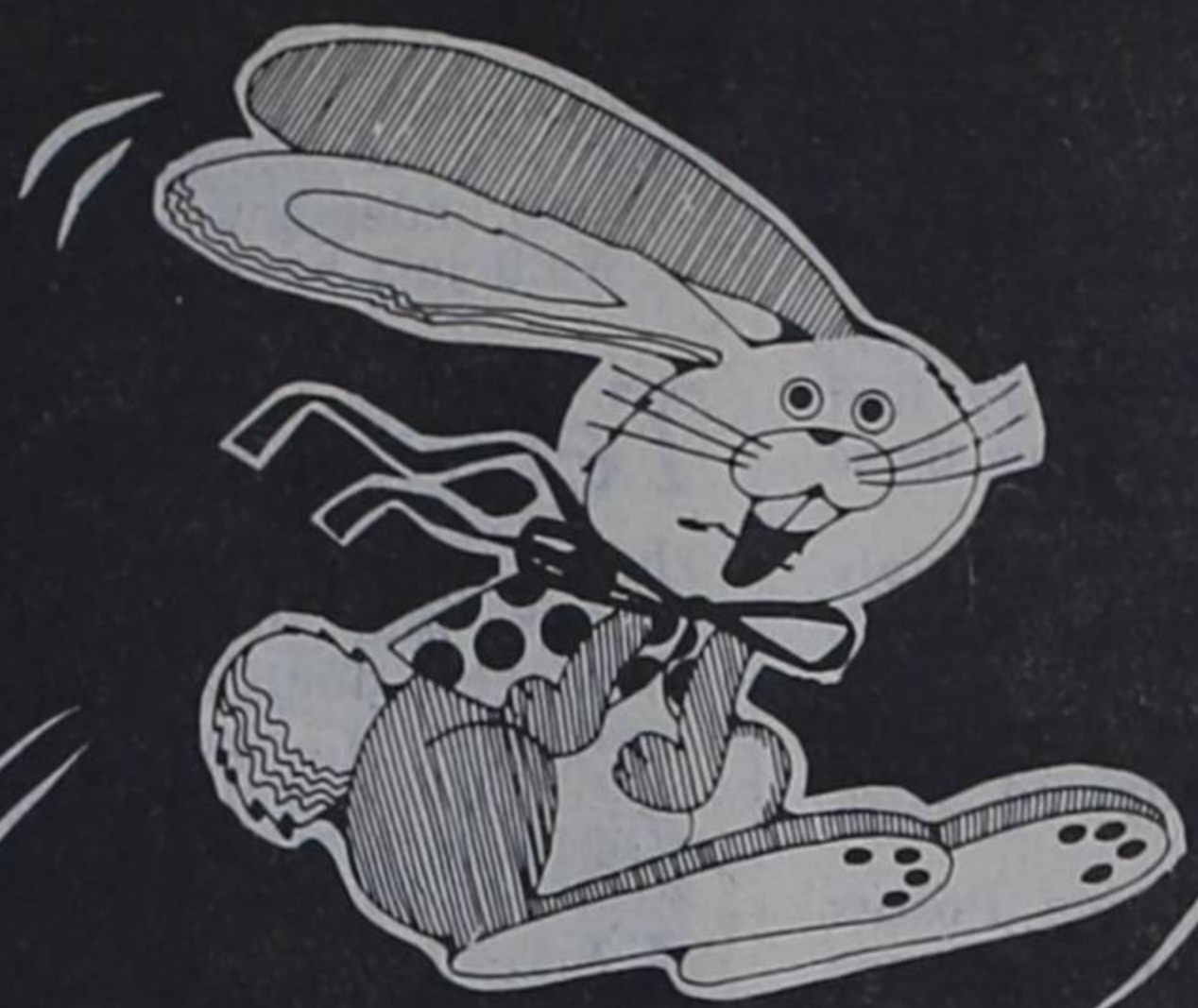

The yarn manufacturing and weaving operations are closed, but the finishing operation will continue for an undetermined length of time.
"We're still getting material in from Sherman," Brown told us, "and we just don't know how long we'll be getting these shipments."
The current work force is approximately one-third of the plant staff before lay-offs began last month.
There have been a total of 189 waged and 12 salaried employees terminated as of Friday, March 25.
So, at this point, the news from Postex is not all that good . . . 201 people no longer at the plant . . . but the news is not all that bad, there are still 162 at work, and more

encouraging . . . there's a good chance the plant will be back into producing muslin sheeting under new ownership.
We'll just have to have a little faith and remember to filter the rumors until a decision is made by the potential buyer and Burlington.

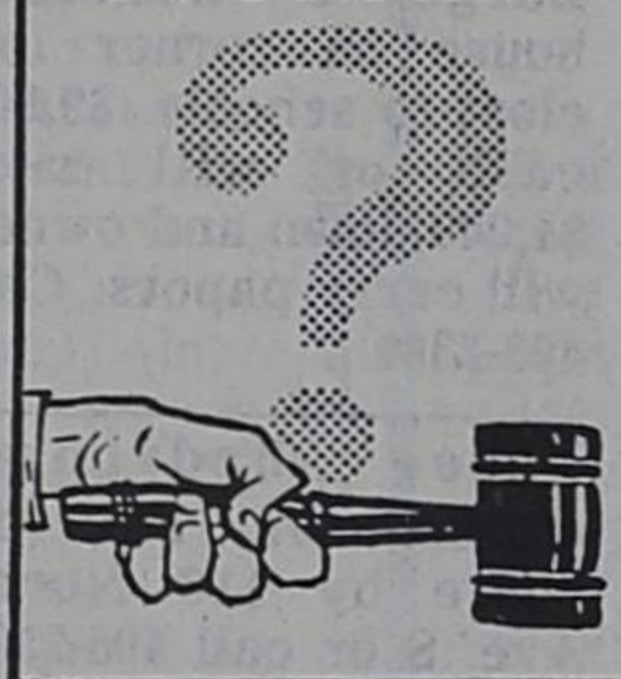

Illegally detained?

A police officer learns from a radio broadcast that a United Parcel Service truck has been robbed of all its packages. Relying on his knowledge of the size of the UPS truck and his familiarity with the area, the officer decides that the robbers will have to use a truck to carry the merchandise and drives to an intersection he believes they must cross.

A half-hour later he sees an unmarked truck occupied by two males pass the intersection. The truck is in violation of local laws because it does not have any markings on it. The officer follows the truck and orders it to pull over.

The policeman questions two men who say they have been performing odd jobs that day and explain the truck was rented. The men will not allow the officer to look into the back of the truck.

The officer calls for a back-up cruiser. Ten minutes later the car arrives with the driver of the UPS truck who looks into the window of the rented truck and identifies the stolen packages. The two men are arrested.

They appeal their arrest, claiming that they were illegally detained so the UPS driver could arrive and inspect the truck. How would you handle this case?

The court said the arrival of the UPS driver was key to the case. The officer's actions were reasonable, the court ruled, because the UPS driver was likely to either identify the packages, resulting in an arrest, or not recognize the merchandise allowing the two men to be released. The arrest was legal.

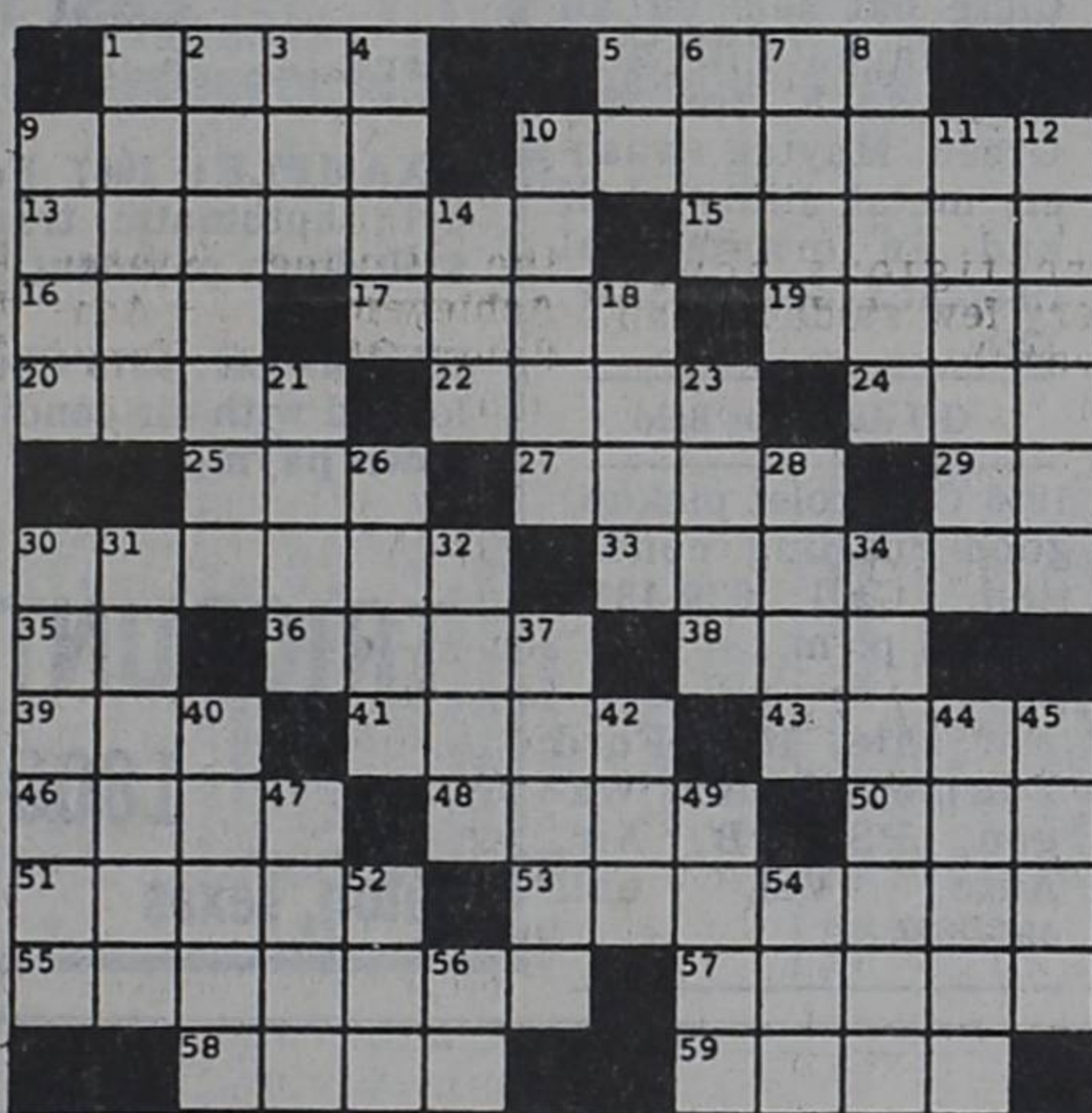

Canine glaucoma

Q. Our 4-year-old basset hound's left eye appears to be larger than his right eye and is always dilated.

Do dogs get glaucoma? Can it be treated?

A. Although not a common disease of dogs, glaucoma does occasionally occur.

The world glaucoma simply means increased pressure within the eye. There are three forms of glaucoma: primary, secondary and congenital. Primary glaucoma occurs without any preceding eye diseases. Secondary glaucoma occurs whenever the abnormal elevation of the intra-ocular pressure is a complication of some other disease or injury to the eye. Congenital cases are those which occur as a result of some developmental malformation of the eye.

Primary glaucoma is found almost exclusively in cocker spaniels and basset hounds. This implies that there is a hereditary predisposition for primary glaucoma. It is also interesting to note that the left eye is usually the first to be affected.

Primary glaucoma is usually seen in middle-aged to old dogs. More dogs are affected with primary glaucoma during the cold months than during the warm months.

Secondary glaucoma is much more common than primary glaucoma. There are many causes of secondary glaucoma. The most common cause is displacement of the lens of the eye to an abnormal position. It is thought that lens displacement is hereditary. It is seen most often in the terrier breeds, Welsh corgis, Chihuahuas, bassets and cockers.

Some other causes of secondary glaucoma include injuries and infections of the eye, cataracts and cancerous growths within the eye.

Dogs with glaucoma always have higher than usual pressure in the affected eye. This pressure can be measured by a procedure called tonometry. Tonometry can be performed by using special instruments made for this purpose or by an experienced veterinarian feeling the eyes with his fingers.

The eyes of affected dogs may look cloudy and the pupils of the affected eye

or eyes are always widely opened. The pupils do not respond to light stimulus. They do not close whenever a light is shined into the eyes. Usually the white area of the eye is reddened.

A complete or partial loss of vision may not be readily apparent. Loss of vision can be evaluated by placing a patch over the normal eye and watching the dog's behavior.

Most dogs experience eye pain early in the development of glaucoma. If the case is long standing, pain may not be evident.

The treatment of glaucoma, whether it is primary or secondary, usually involves the use of drugs and surgery. For drugs to be effective in controlling the pressure within the eye, they must be applied to the eye several times daily. This kind of daily care is extremely difficult to maintain over the lifetime of the dog. Therefore, drugs are usually used to relieve the pressure temporarily and then surgical cures are used for longer lasting results.

Glaucoma is probably the leading cause of blindness in middle-aged dogs. Irreversible blindness can occur within several hours with glaucoma. Therefore, any dog thought to have glaucoma should be examined by a veterinarian as soon as possible. Loss of vision can be prevented in many cases by prompt diagnosis and treatment.
