The regional meet will be held April 22

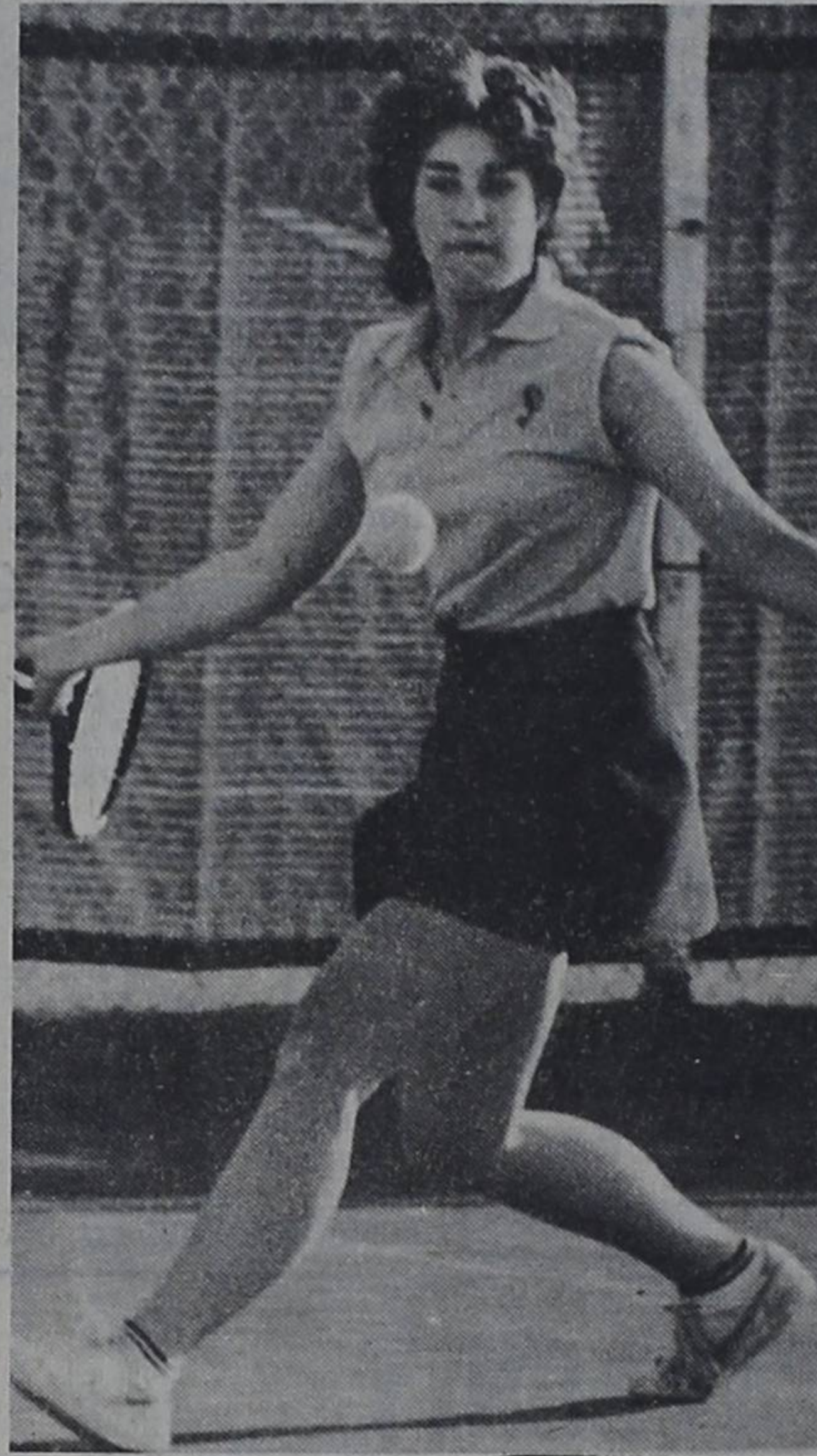
and 23 at the Odessa College courts in Odessa.

Zucker Says He's Still Interested in Buying Plant

Clyde Zucker of New York, who has been negotiating with Burlington Industries for the purchase of the Postex Plant here, told us Tuesday morning that he is definitely interested and has a strong feeling about purchasing the plant.

"Burlington's comment last week that I could not afford to raise my offer is somewhat incorrect," Zucker told us by telephone.

"I told them I was willing to raise my offer, but we were so far apart that it didn't make any sense to make a counter-offer at that time," he continued.

"They knew that their counter-offer was way too high, and at their price it would not be economically feasible to operate the plant," the potential plant buyer added.

"If Burlington wishes to continue negotiating, I will do all I can to buy the plant and get it in full operation," Zucker commented.

He explained that Burlington's price tag

for the plant is not reflective of today's economic times, nor the fact that there are no other potential buyers.

Zucker also pointed out that the plant's equipment is antiquated and could not be sold to a manufacturer.

"Sheeting manufacturing is a high volume, low mark-up product," he added, "and the return on investment depends largely on operating efficiency."

Zucker explained that Burlington's value of the plant is set too high for an operator to pay the debt and still provide an adequate return on investment.

"There are 350 families in Post who depend on that plant for a livelihood, and we hope we can get them back to work" Zucker continued.

Zucker added that he felt Burlington Industries has negotiated in good faith, and has tried to sell the plant, "up to a point, and I think they haven't taken into consideration the real value of the building and equipment in today's economic conditions and logistics," he explained.

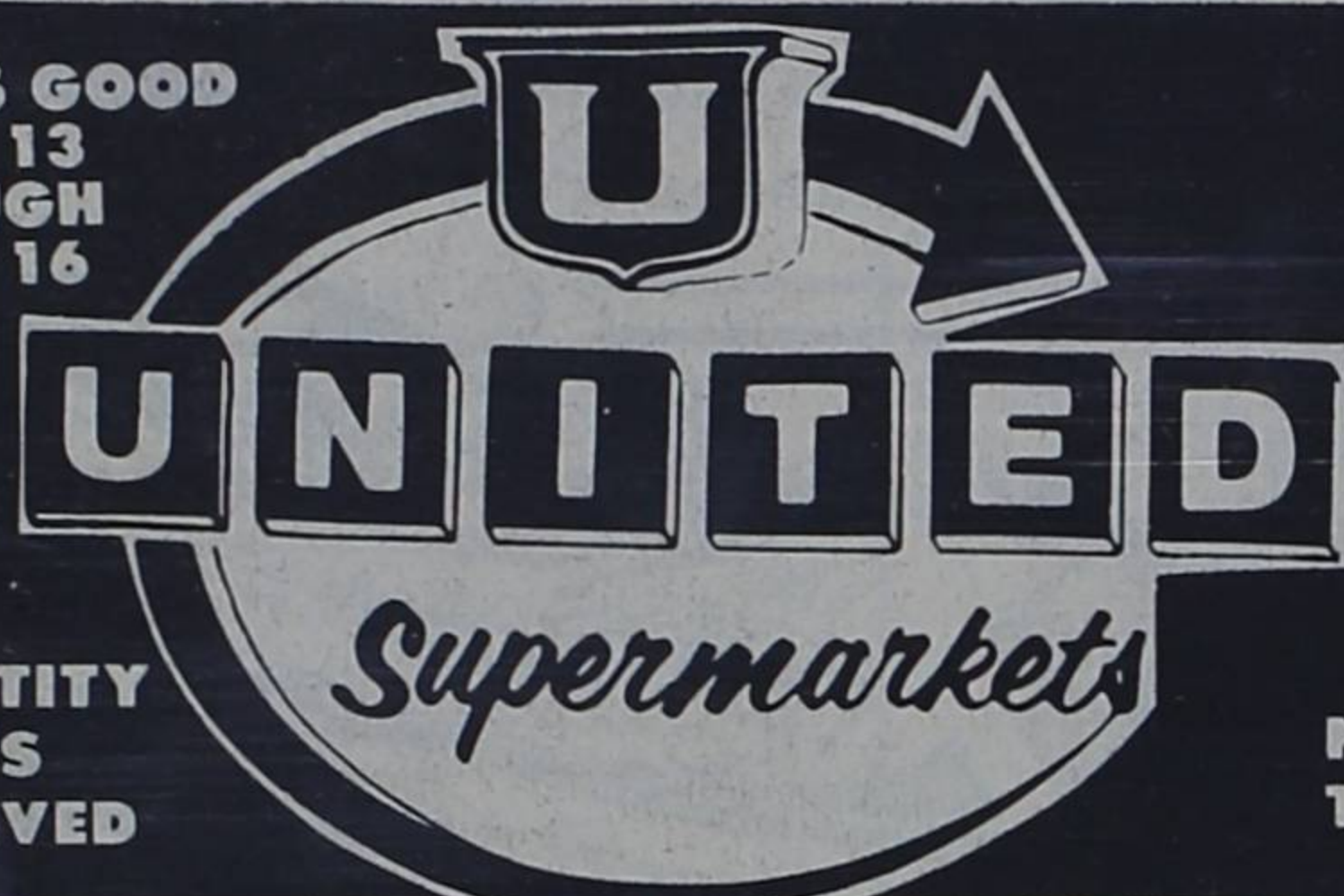

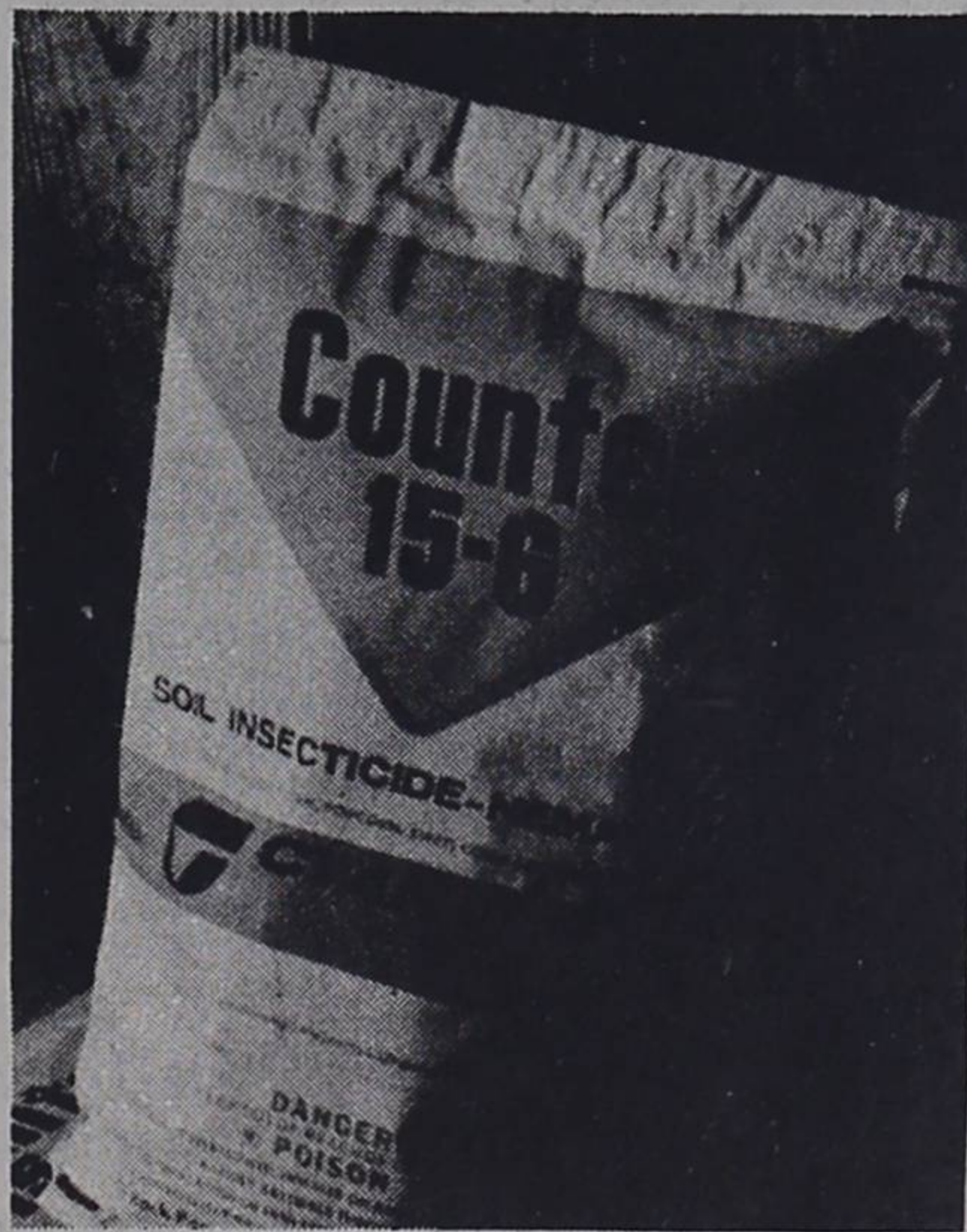
