Spring Art Show Opens Fri.

Awards Sunday at 3:30 p. m.

The annual Spring Art Show, sponsored by the Post Art Guild, will be held this week at the Post Community Center.

It will be open to the public from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. on Friday and Saturday and from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m. Sunday.

The awards presentation will begin at 3:30 p. m. Sunday.

The show will feature paintings, sculpture and photography.

Judges Ronald Thomason of Weatherford and Jim Long of Lubbock will choose winners in various categories and designate those winners before the art goes on public display.

The major prizes will include (1) Citizen's Award, Garza Memorial Hospital, \$400; (2) Juror's Art Choice, \$60; (3) Juror's Photography Choice, \$60; (4) People's Choice, \$25; and (5) Purchase Awards from the Post Business community and private patrons in excess of \$2,000.00.

Ronald Thomason, the nationally known artist from Weatherford, will be the art judge at the Spring Art Show.

Ronald, who started his art training at the age of 10, has studied under such noted

artists as K. Sakamoto, John Chumley, Chapman Kelley, John McCoy, Francis Speight, Walter Steumfig, and Hobson Pittman.

During the course of his studies, he has attended North Texas University, Texas Christian University, University of Negasaki in Japan and the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts to name a few.

Since 1962, his work has been widely exhibited in numerous regional and national exhibitions. His awards include the Topin Prize, Pennsylvania Academy and an Obrig Prize for watercolor at the National Academy of Design. His paintings are in many private collections and in many art museums across the country.

One of Ronald's paintings entitled "The Federal City" which he was commissioned to do by the government in 1971 hangs in the National Archives near the Declaration of Independence.

He was honored statewide in 1974 when he was chosen by the Texas Legislature as Texas Artist of the Year.

Ronald is no stranger to Post having exhibited at the O. S. Ranch Show for many years. He has also done some local paintings — one of the old Presbyterian Church on Avenue K and one of the O. S. Ranch house.

Jim Long of Lubbock will be the photography judge at the art show.

Jim started in photography in 1971 in Mississippi. During the years, he has managed camera stores in California, Colorado and Lubbock.

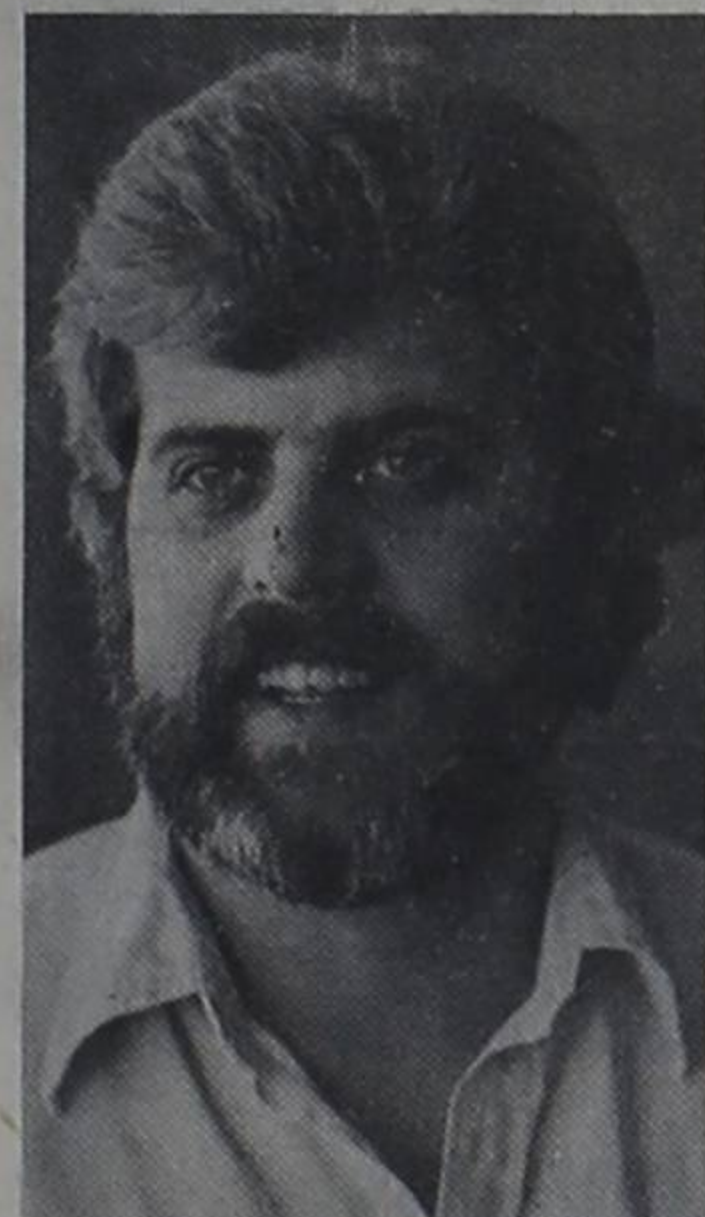
The clinic is being sponsored by the Garza County 4-H Club program in cooperation with Dr. Larry Mills, D. V. M.

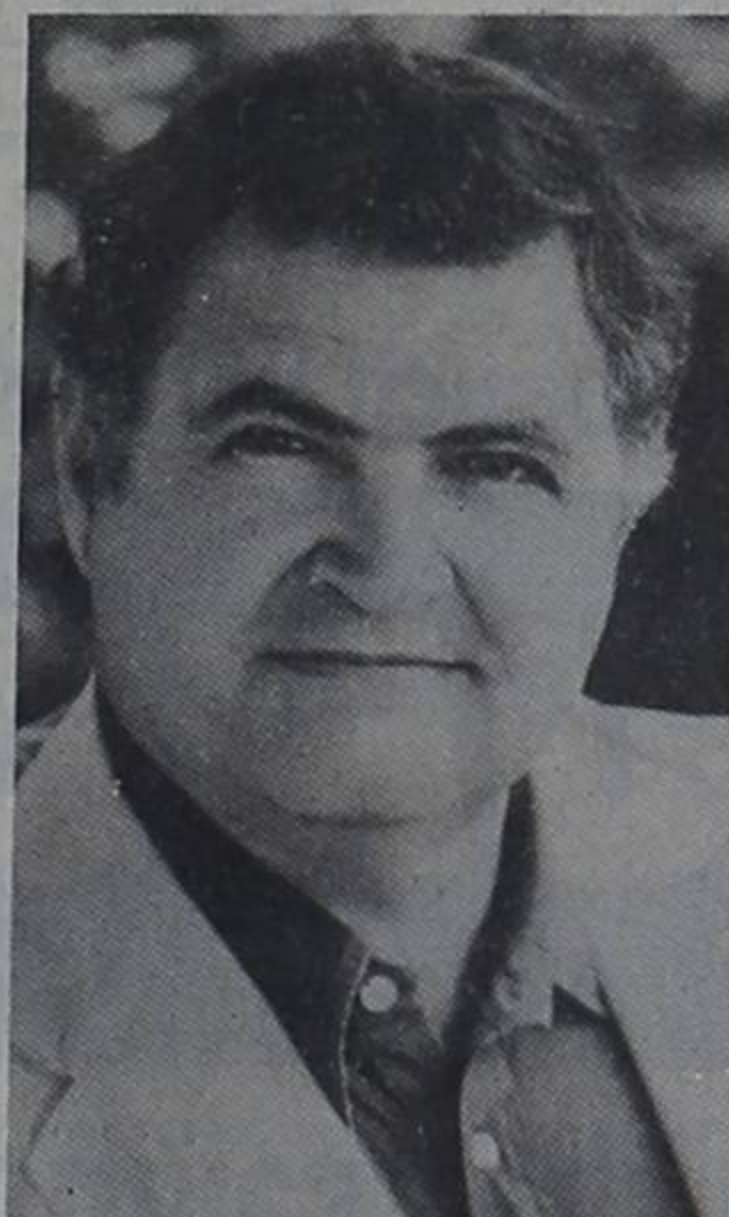

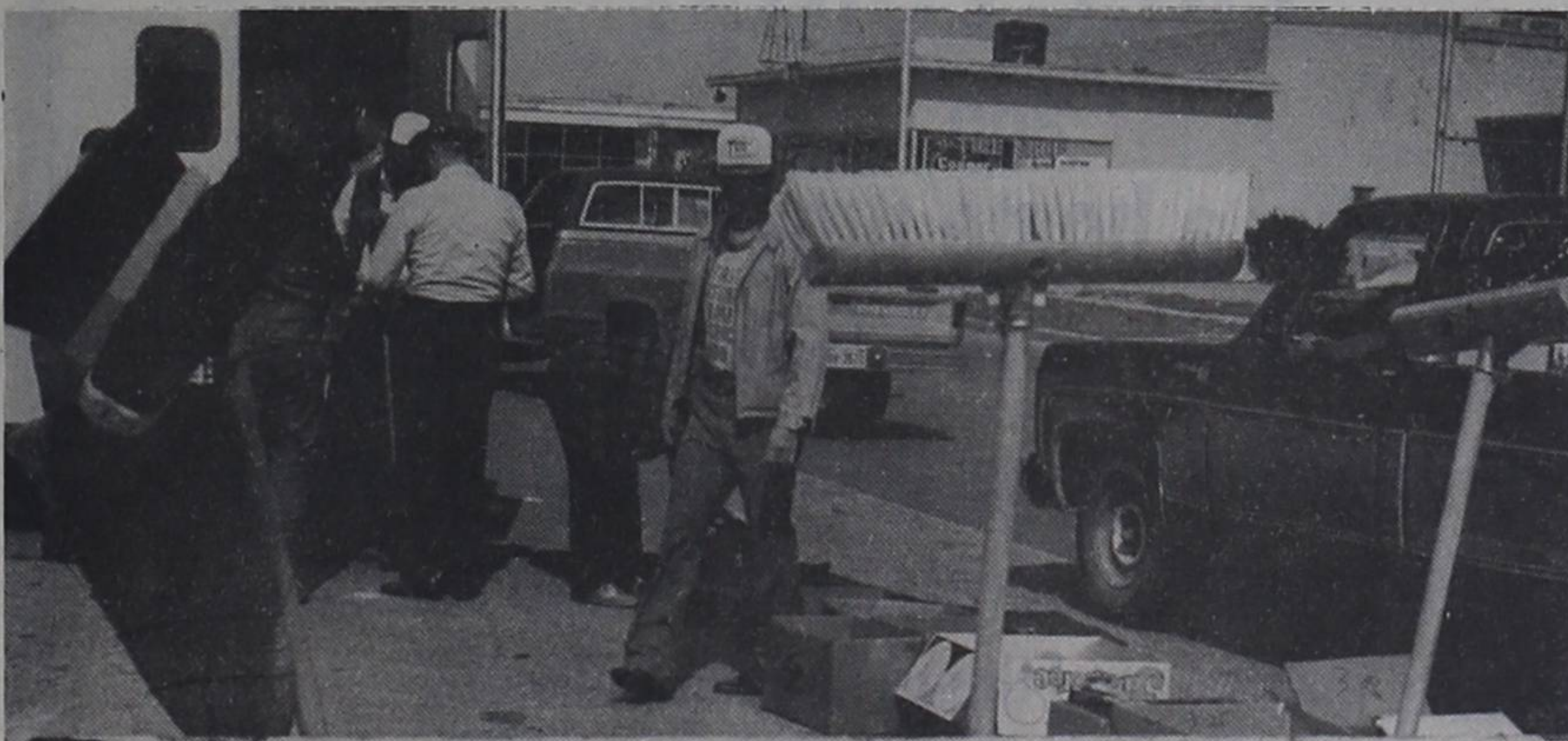

Cancer Crusade Drive Sees Volunteer Need

"What are C-Days?"

"Here in Post they will be the special days when American Cancer Society volunteers ring doorbells of friends and neighbors as part of a month-long educational and fund-raising Cancer Crusade that begins this week," Donna Stelzer, co-chairman of the local effort said.

A special feature of C-Days will be a new ACS pamphlet "Check Your Health," which will be distributed starting this weekend by neighborhood volunteers.

"This little red, white and blue pamphlet might help save some lives here," Stelzer said.

"It offers a quiz on one's risk of developing cancer.

"The risk increases with age and it depends on lifestyle and one's medical history," she said.

"The folder contains different questions for men than for women, and also lists safeguards that anyone can observe to improve the chance of not getting cancer."


C-Days also will provide an opportunity for people to contribute toward the support of the Society's overall cancer control program,

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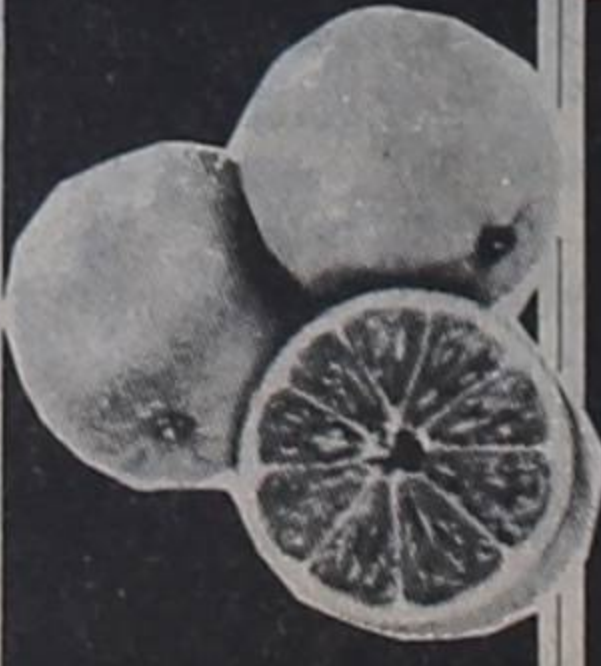

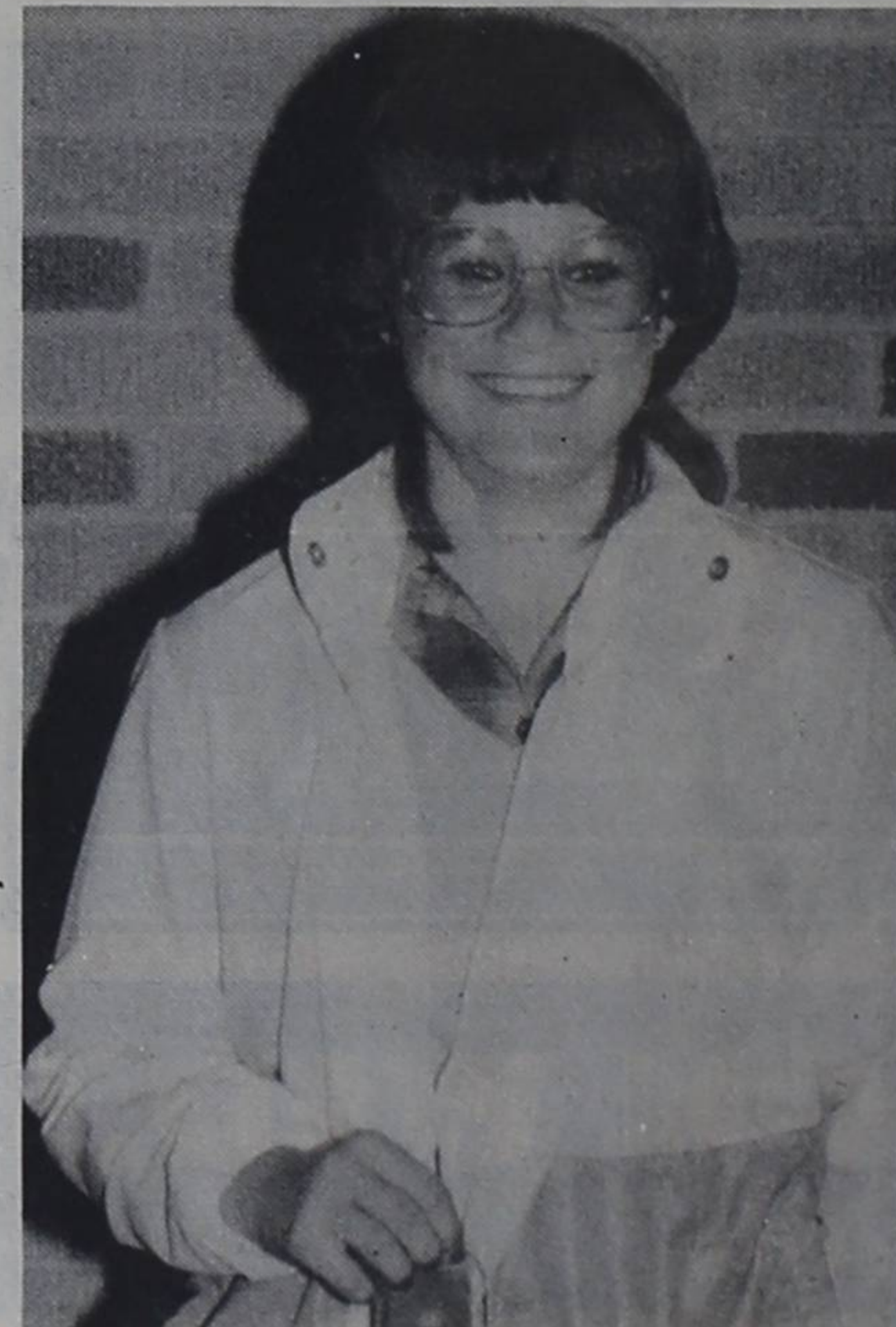

weaknesses — are the very things that often lead us to a Source of strength and power beyond ourselves...

Many people have come to a relationship with God in their weakest moments.

Could the answer be found in the fact that in the 13 chapters of the book of Nehemiah, the book shows our leader in prayer 11 times.

Deep, personal, worshipful and repentant petitions give insight to the source beyond the individual. May our prayer be that we too might continually seek that same unlimited guidance.

Sunday our message returns to the fifth century B. C. and the cupbearer turned warrior.

"Life is a gift to be received with gratitude and a task to be pursued with courage."

For whether you are receiving your life with gratitude, and would like to share your joy, or whether your life is a burden, and you need someone to share that burden, our doors are open to you.

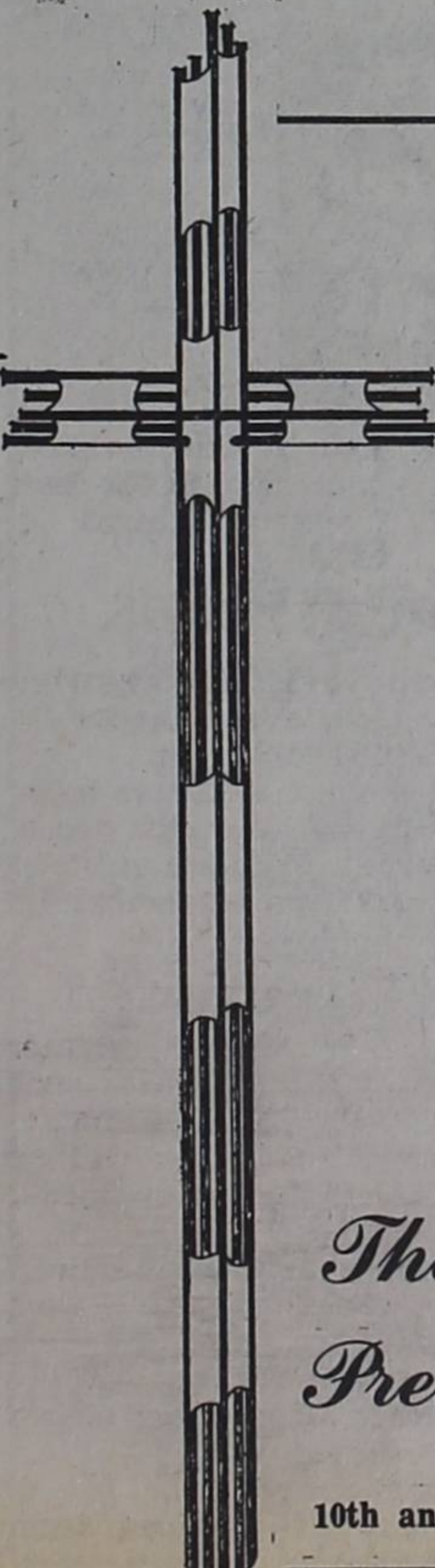

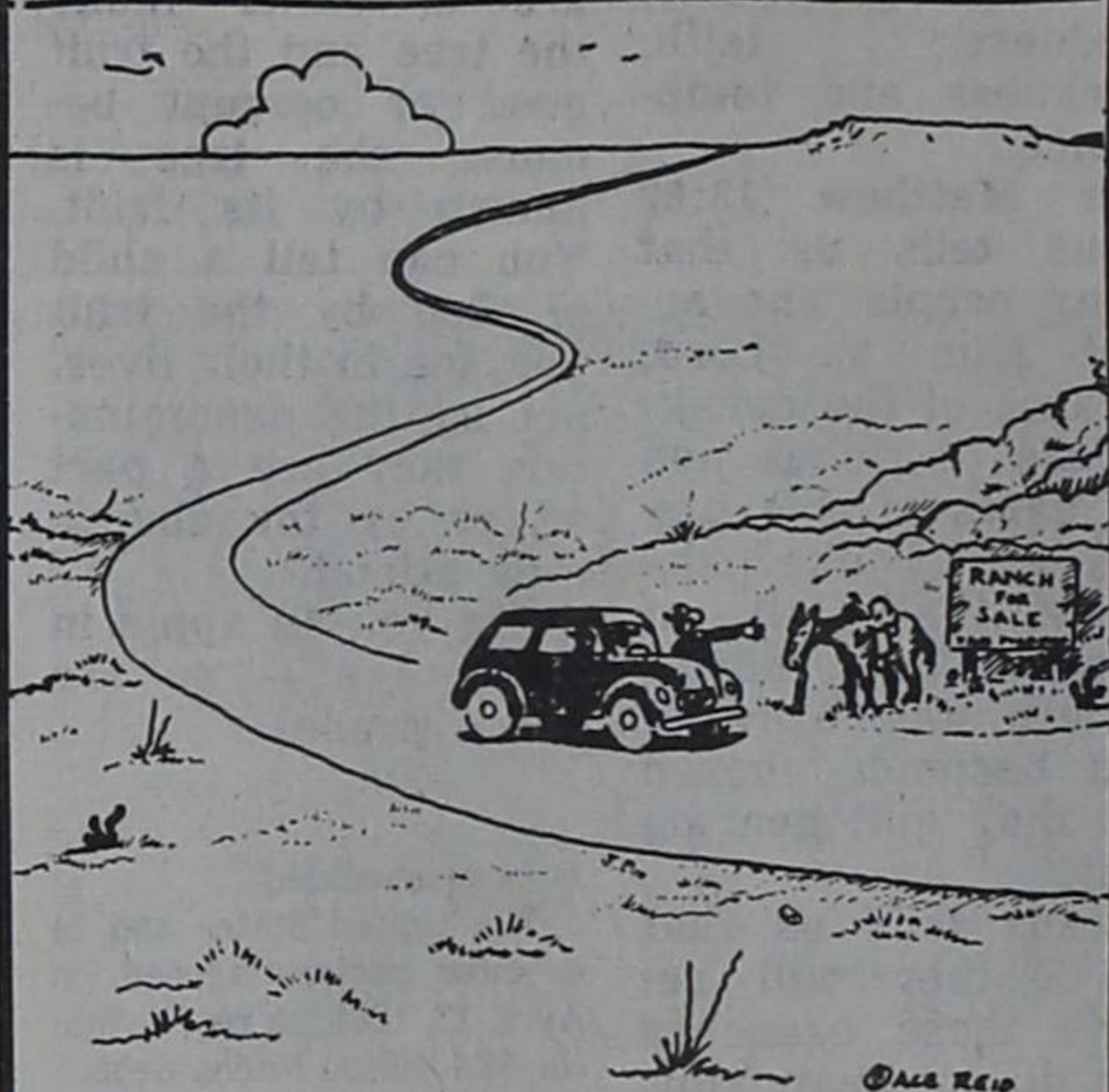
