

patrons in excess of \$2,000.00. Ronald Thomason, the nationally known artist from Weatherford, will be the art judge at the Spring Art Show.





One of Ronald's paintings entitled "The Federal City" which he was commissioned to do by the government in 1971 hangs in the National Archives near the Declaration of Independence.


He was honored statewide in 1974 when he was chosen by the Texas Legislature as Texas Artist of the Year.

Cancer Crusade Drive Sees Volunteer Need

"What are C-Days?"

C-Days also will provide an opportunity for people to contribute toward the support of the Society's overall cancer control program,


