The Other Side of the Lake Story

This is a really trite saying, but so very true, "there's always two sides to every story."

And in the case of the proposed Justiceburg dam and lake, the opposition presents evidence just as convincing as the proponents.

Although consultants for the city of Lubbock quote engineering studies claiming 119 acre-feet per square mile per year, land owners in the lake site show studies from 1962 to 1981 with only 84 acre-feet per square mile per year.

And the list of directly opposite engineering data and estimates continues.

The different of opinion by the professional geologists, hydrologists and engineers reminds me of the court scenes where prominent doctors testify with equally convincing arguments the merits of a guilty by insanity plea.

"This person is insane, incapable of logical reasoning," one eminent psychiatrist

testifies, and later another with just as great a list of credentials tells the court, "in my opinion, this person is just as sane as you or I."

The Texas Water Rights Commission and the hearing examiner must feel they are in a no-win situation.

The land-owners, whose ranches will be virtually split in half and will lose the integrity of their lifestyle, present evidence which directly disputes the findings of Lubbock's experts.

And the Lubbock city planners stand to lose, in their viewpoint, a vital source of desperately needed water to supply the future growth of the city and its suburbs.

I for one do not envy the hearing examiner nor the Texas Water Rights commissioners who have to sort through the complicated data on both sides to arrive at what is certainly to be an unpopular decision by at least one set of people.

Water Drainage Estimates

As an example of the difference in engineering data, take the case of the water drainage area.

Lubbock's consultants estimate of 119 acre-feet PSM, per year, compared to the opponent's measurements is 30 percent higher.

The firm of Graves, Dougherty, Hearon and Moody, in a letter to the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, disputes that the city's consultants made a reasonable estimate of the quantity of water to be caught at the dam site.

"Before 1962 there was no gauge measuring the amount of water that came down the stream at any point above the

proposed dam site," the letter comments.

"The consultants employed by the city estimated that the water available to be captured at the dam site will be 30 to 40 percent greater than records from the gauge support."

A gauge was installed at the highway bridge near Justiceburg in December 1961.

The letter adds that the "estimated" amount of runoff prior to 1962 and after 1980 is double the amount per year that has actually been measured since 1962.

"There is no place on the Brazos anywhere east of Waco that has a measured runoff per square mile per year of more than 100 acre-feet," the letter continues.

"If the measured data from 1962 through 1981 is a more nearly correct projection of the amount of water the reservoir will receive than the consultants estimate, the reservoir would have been completely dry for at least five years during the period from 1940 to the present.

"Moreover, if the reservoir had been in place since 1970, the city would have virtually gotten no usable water from it."

"If the first ten years of operation are like the last ten years, the city of Lubbock will have a dam, but no lake.

"Residents will have to pay for water, but they will not have water."

Will It Hold Water?

Another potential problem outlines by the land owners is the question of whether or not the reservoir will hold the water.

"There is no dispute that many, if not all, locations along the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River in this area are unsuitable for constructing a reservoir because of problems relating to the geology of the area that will cause leaking.

"The most paramount problem in the area is gypsum formations."

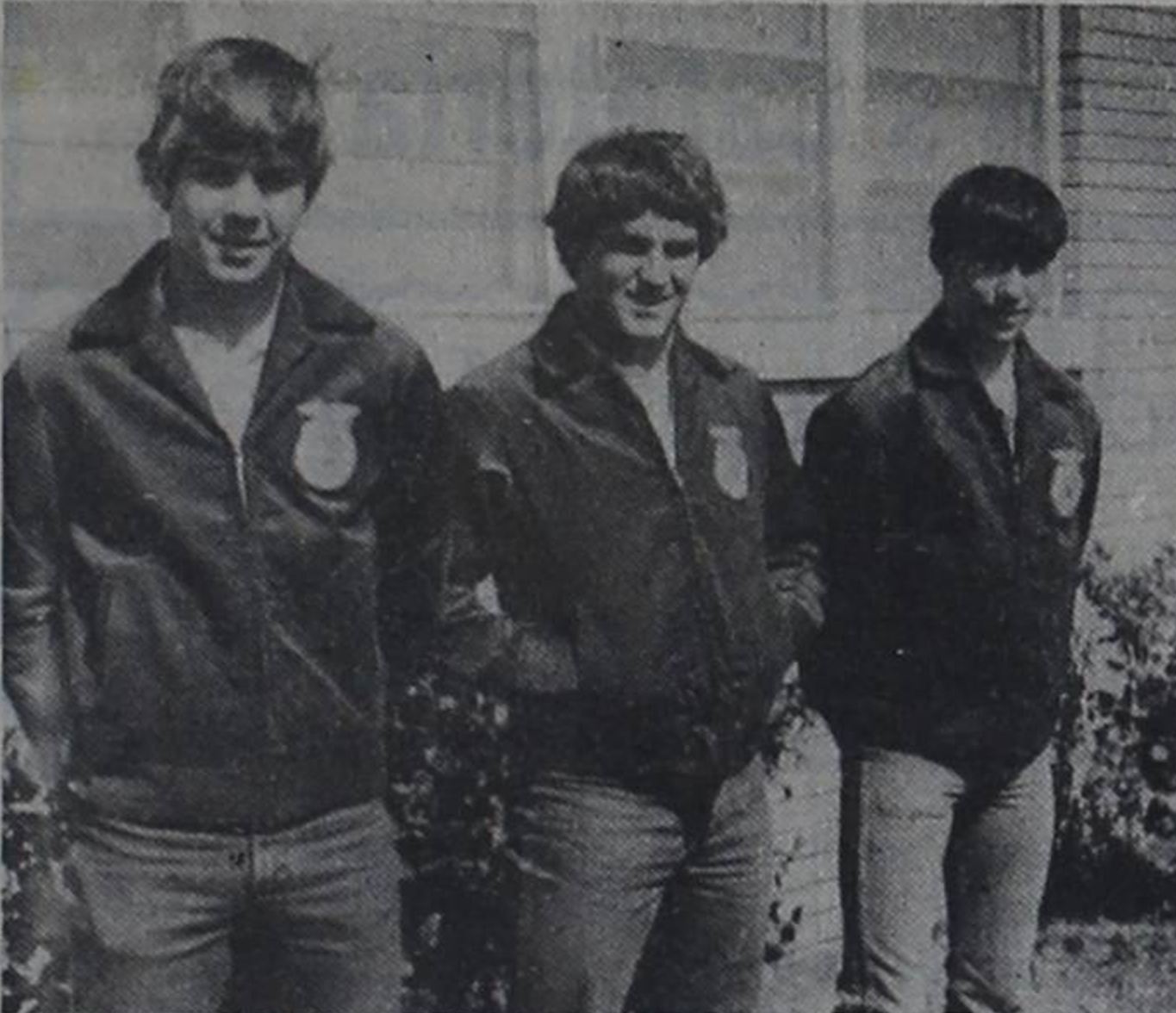
Gypsum is highly soluble and if it occurs in and around a reservoir site, it will quickly dissolve ruining the taste and utility of the water in the process and cause substantial leaking in the reservoir," the letter adds.

The Lubbock consultants, according to the letter, admit in their own data that gypsum does occur just below the gravel bed of the river and "that it could result in substantial leaking and at a minimum, require a large amount of unplanned expenditures to try to prevent the leaking."

What About Sandstone?

The city's consultants have concluded that the sandstone that outcrops at the dam location at 2,200 feet above sea level is unsuitable for the banks of a reservoir and

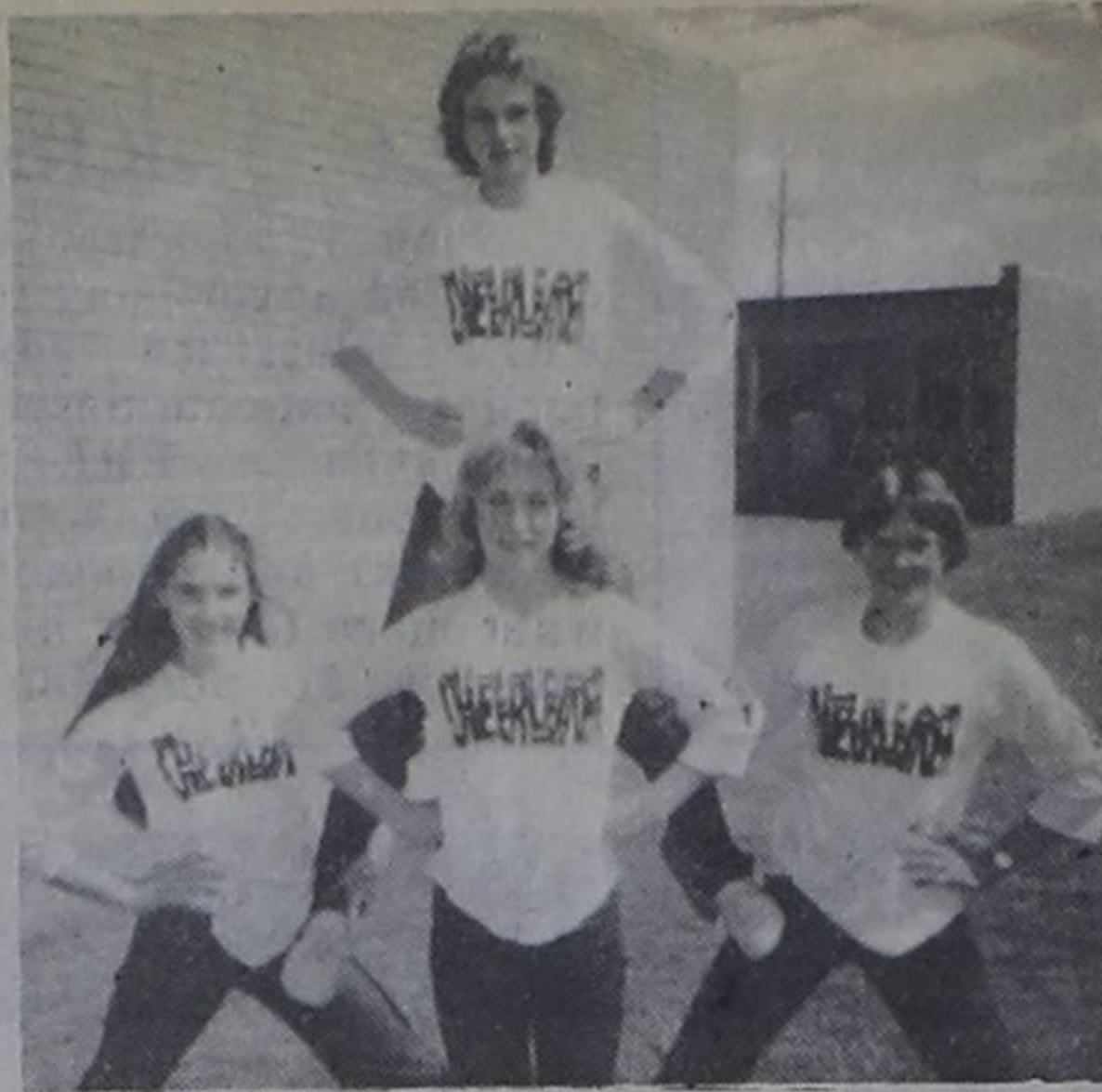

It's 'surge' time

This community got a lot of reassurance that their "oil economy" is going to stay around for a good while with the explanation offered at the Rotary luncheon Tuesday on plans to begin a 12-year carbon dioxide "flood" of one unit of the Garza field by Highland Resources.

It's well over a \$200 million project. And that means if they put over \$200 million in, they expect oil worth a whole lot more to float back out in return.

What's more, that's just one operating unit of the current Garza field waterflood. There are plenty more if the CO2 holds out.

Oil operations here in the county have never been better than at the present time. With the high price of oil, a lot of old wells can be profitably reopened. The proposed CO2 flood could never have been considered if the oil price hadn't been ballooned by the Arabs.

All of which makes for a bustling economy — and a time when Post should fill up its empty buildings with retail businesses and surge ahead.

that the water level has to be kept below 2,200 feet."

If this is true, the letter continues, then similar or exactly the same sandstone deposits at other areas within the waterline would also present serious problems.

"Our geologist simply walked up and down the streambed and found that the sandstone that the city's consultants said was so serious a problem does in fact occur upstream from the dam at several locations below the water level."

The list of other questions includes caves or caverns in the sandstone formations which would also be problems of leaking.

Quality of water is also a potential problem, according to the letter, "it will be salty," when the water level is low.

"If the time since the installation of the gauge at Justiceburg is an accurate window to the future runoff at the dam site, the lake will not fill up instantly, in fact, it may never fill up and it may never come to a level where there would be significant quantities of available water to the city."
