Airport Repairs

Council, Commissioners OK Funds

City Council members and County Commissioners met for a meeting Monday night during the regular City Council meeting to discuss funds available for the local airport.

It was reported that a grant had been received for \$165,000 and that an additional \$37,500 in funds had been made available making the total \$202,000 available for repair to the facility.

The city and county would each have to put up 25 percent bringing each entity's share to \$33,750.

It was also noted that the state will allow the entities to use the original plans that the airport was built with which would save considerable monies and also that board member, Bob West had agreed to serve as resident engineer which would also be a savings of \$10,000.

Motion carried by city council members and the county commissioners agreed.

Post Library to Show Movies Friday at 3 p. m.

The Post Public Library will be showing movies Friday afternoon, June 10 at 3 p.m. with the first movie being the "Astronauts" a 21 minute film featuring the magnificent 6½ gang converting an old boiler into a space ship. Unknown to them, a crane lifts them into outer space.

The second film of the day will be "The Red Balloon" a 34 minute film. A lonely boy makes friends with a balloon and the balloon begins to take on a life of its own.

"Pandas", a 14 minute film will be the third feature, and will include photographs of Pandas in their natural surroundings in mountains of China, and the giant pandas residing in the national zoo, Washington, D.C.

The "Pigskin Capers" will conclude the films for the afternoon and is a nine minute film with excerpts from "Horsefeathers". The boys run amok on a football field and all but destroy the game as will as their opponents.

The city was also asked to take care of the airport books and expenses and to bill the county for 50 percent which was also approved.

Lewis Earl gave a report to those in attendance concerning a parks application grant which he had been working on and will be made to TORP, Texas Outdoor Recreation Plan.

He told the council and commissioners that it was certainly no guarantee that the grant would be received but it would not hurt to file the application.

He noted several instances where the money could be used if granted, such as the local swimming pool for needed repairs, building a gazebo in the park to be used as a bandstand, and the local baseball parks for new wiring and adding a soccer field.

It was decided to hold a public hearing concerning the park application June 27 at 10 a. m. in the commissioners courtroom at the courthouse and will be during the commissioners regular meeting.

In other council action:
Dr. Tom Pass was appointed to another term on the library board;

In discussing insurance coverage and policies, the city voted to renew two policies and increase one, and also to renew the group medical policy which comes due July 1.

Pilots Went Home with Pistols

When the wing commander at Oxnard AFB, Calif., ordered all the fighter aircraft loaded with nuclear weapons . . . a quiet gasp rippled through the command post.

The maintenance officer was the first to speak, breaking the nervous silence.

"Colonel, you don't mean all aircraft, do you sir?"

"Damn it! I'm just following orders . . . get every damn one of them loaded!" the wing commander shouted.

That order started a bee-hive of activity, as the operations officer and the fighter squadron commander huddled together to determine which aircraft should be schedul-

ed for loading first.

Maintenance personnel began hustling through the building, as the wing operations officer started moving aircraft numbers around on the big board on the wall in front of the command post.

In a few minutes the alert buzzer sounded . . .

"Attention all fighter squadron personnel . . . attention all fighter squadron personnel . . . pilots and operations personnel . . . report immediately to the fighter briefing room . . . I repeat . . . report immediately to the fighter briefing room . . ." the official voice sounded over the public address system.

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Farm Bureau Fights

The Texas Farm Bureau is seeking amendments to the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1983 that would soften its impact on agriculture, according to TFB President S.M. True Jr.

In a message to leaders in TFB's 216 organized county Farm Bureaus, TFB asked that they contact their congressmen, urging them to vote for amendments to H.R. 1510, the House of Representatives Immigration Reform Bill. The Senate approved S. 529, its version of the bill, on May 18.

H.R. 1510, as written, would include the following stipulations:

— Employer sanctions in the form of heavy fines and-or prison sentences for any employer who "knowingly" employs an illegal alien. It would also require employers to keep strict records on all employees hired.

Does not include a workable guest worker or temporary worker program for agriculture

Provides amnesty for those illegal aliens who entered the U.S. prior to January 1, 1977, and have been here continuously since that time. Those entering the U.S. after 1977, but before January 1980, could apply for temporary resident alien status and apply for permanent status after three years.

According to Ed McKay, TFB's national affairs director, the Farm Bureau is working to secure sponsors and votes for amendments to this bill.

McKay said Farm Bureau is asking for a vote against the bill "if amendments are not adopted to correct the severe employer sanction provisions, or to provide a workable guest worker or temporary worker program for agriculture."

Farmers Urged to File Acreage Reports by July 15

All farmers are advised to file an acreage report whether they participate in farm programs or not, according to Victor Ashley, ASCS director. The acreage reports are used to determine compliance with farm programs and to document the crop acreage for establishing future crop acreage bases.

To be eligible for price support loans, target prices and other program benefits, farmers are required to report the actual planted acreage on a field-by-field basis.

Ashley said farmers who did not sign up for the programs also could benefit by certifying their planted acres because the reported 1983 acreage may be used in establishing the 1984 base acres.

To verify that acreage reports are

accurate, ASCS will randomly check farms and also provide aerial photographs for farmers to identify their fields. "Farmers may request measurement service to be sure reports are accurate and avoid unnecessary

worry over the loss of program benefits," Ashley said. The service is provided for a nominal fee and the measurements are guaranteed for the crop year.

Garza County Farmers have until close

of business on July 15, to report cotton, grain sorghum, peanuts, sunflowers and soybeans. Acreage reports may be filed weekdays between 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m. at the county ASCS office.

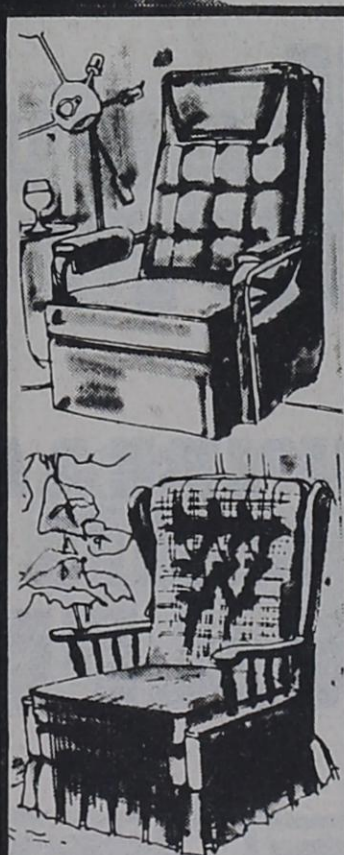

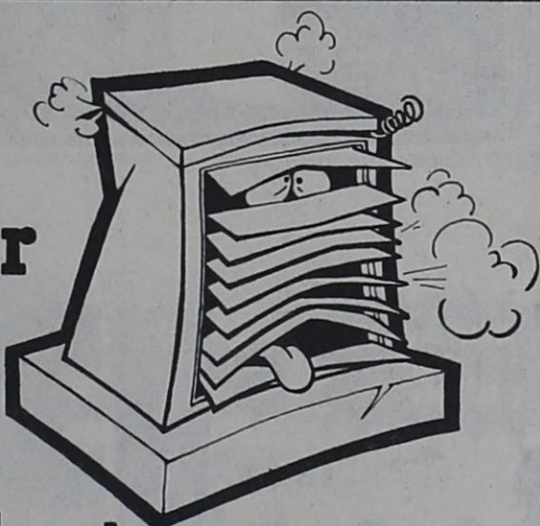

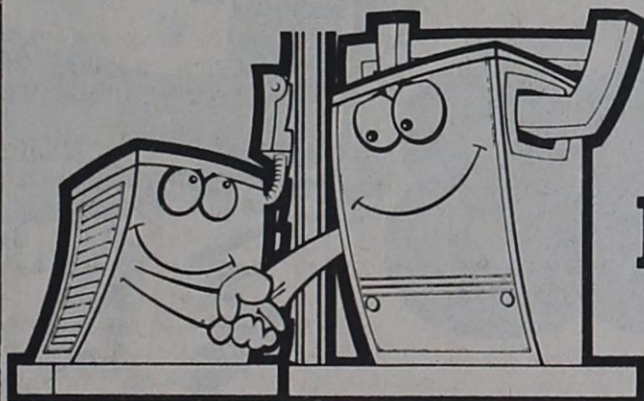

Pilots scurried through the building, by now fully dressed in flight gear, with pistols strapped in their shoulder holsters and secured ready for battle.

Those of us support officers with no real task but to sit, wait and listen, watched the excitement and wondered why we were preparing for war.

Sometime during the morning, the wing commander called me to his chair. "lieutenant, get this morning's L. A. Times. . . find out what the hell is going on in the world to put us in this situation."

Somehow I came up with the newspaper. . . someone had already thought of that idea. I read every single story of world events in that issue. . . took about half an hour.

There was absolutely no hint at all about any development in world events that could be anywhere close to causing the nuclear alert.

If we were at war, the Los Angeles Times didn't know it.

Of course, there was the usual daily story about Vietnam and the so-called Paris peace talks. But we knew, certainly this nuclear war alert had no connection to Vietnam.

Our speculation in the command post ranged from a possible secret attack on Russia (first strike, if you will) to a direct war with China over Korea.

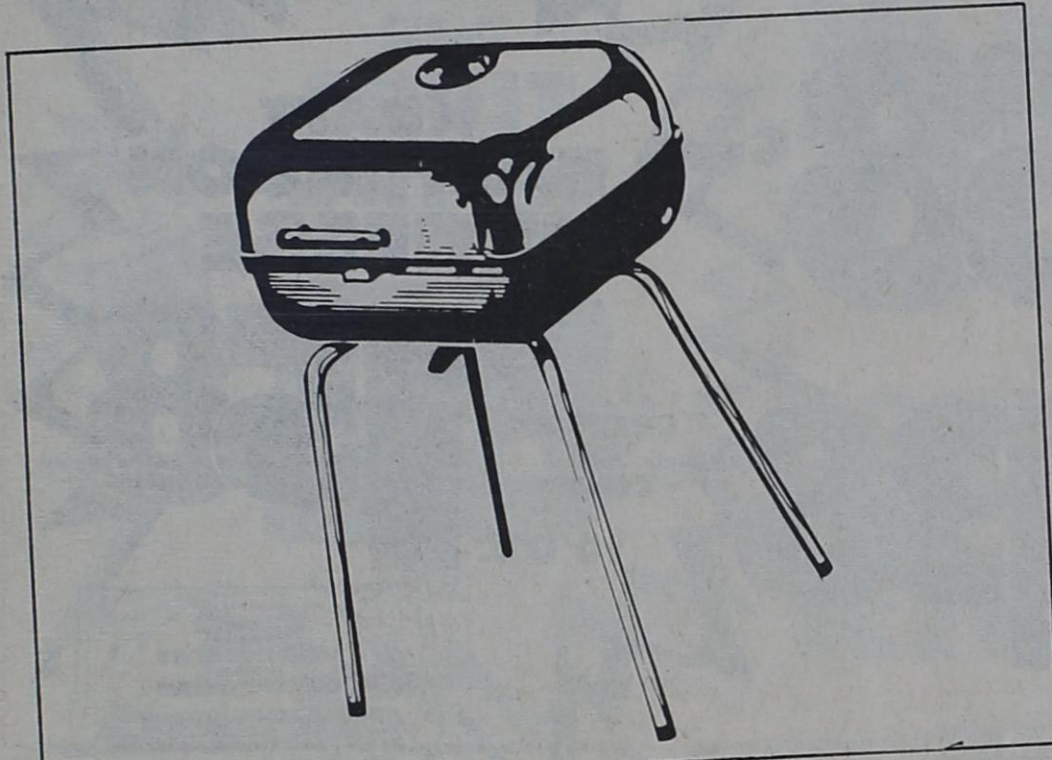
But from scanning the L. A. Times, we could not find a reason at all.
