The producer may receive the PIK cotton immediately and the proceeds from sale of cotton to CCC after the PIK availability date, or receive the proceeds immediately and the PIK cotton after the PIK availability date. CCC will pay warehouse storage charges through the date the producer redeems the loan to satisfy the PIK requirements unless the producer elects not to pay the loan service fee.

"With this procedure," Rank said, "producers will be permitted to obtain their PIK commodities before the PIK availability date, but will not receive payment for the 1983 crop cotton sold to CCC to satisfy PIK REQUIREMENTS UNTIL THE PIK a-

vailability date." Rank said CCC also will offer to purchase cotton that has been ginned, but has not been classed and is not stored in an (Continued on P. 6)
