

Three to Department of Corrections

Robert Eugene Abbott received 10 years in the Texas Department of Corrections for burglary with intent to commit theft during District Court proceedings held here this week.

Special harvest for PIK loans

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will offer special "Harvest for PIK" loans to cotton farmers who do not have enough upland cotton under CCC loan to satisfy their PIK requirements, Everett Rank, executive vice president of the Commodity

Credit Corporation, has announced.

Rank said a special procedure will be available for those producers who are required to harvest 1983 cotton for PIK but do not want a regular loan.

Two options are available at the time the loan is made:

The producer may receive the PIK cotton immediately and the proceeds from sale of cotton to CCC after the PIK availability date, or receive the proceeds immediately and the PIK cotton after the PIK availability date.

CCC will pay warehouse storage charges through the date the producer redeems the loan to satisfy the PIK requirements unless the producer elects not to pay the loan service fee.

"With this procedure," Rank said, "producers will be permitted to obtain their PIK commodities before the PIK availability date, but will not receive payment for the 1983 crop cotton sold to CCC to satisfy PIK requirements UNTIL THE PIK availability date."

Rank said CCC also will offer to purchase cotton that has been ginned, but has not been classed and is not stored in an

Editors Note: This is the first in a series concerning Garza Memorial Hospital with the series to be continued in each Wednesday Dispatch. Garza Memorial Hospital celebrated its 30th anniversary last winter and is now offering general

hospital care, outpatient laboratory and x-ray services as well as some surgeries. Garza Memorial has undergone several changes including remodeling and updating equipment. The hospital was opened on a limited

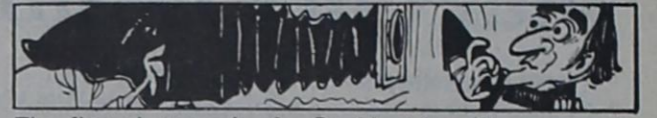
basis, August 4, 1952 handling obstetrical and medical cases with surgery scheduled for the following week. Garza Memorial spent many years of service to the community and surrounding areas, before financial troubles be-

gan to present problems and the hospital was closed for a few months in 1967. Voters in the county approved a hospital district issue with the Senate approving the district effective April 28, 1969. With the hospital

district established, it provided tax monies to upgrade the facilities and improve services. Under the present administration with Maritta Reed as administrator, many new services have been added. Besides the ones

already listed, nuclear medicine, inhalation therapy and cardiac monitors are available, remodeled emergency room to give twice the space, new heating and air conditioning systems have been added as have lab equipment, new carpeting, up-

graded medical records and a new waiting room for emergency patients. Next weeks issue will cover the new surgical room.

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Basketry just one of hundreds of crafts at Texas Folklife

Some people, like basketmaker Eloise Roe of Ingram, Tex-

The Book of Hebrews suggests a list of "saints" from the Old Testament. Sarah, the first woman named on that list of "saints" laughed at God. After a lifetime of embarrassment at her inability to conceive a child — God renewed his promise to Sarah. She and Abraham would have a son.

She laughed. She was 90 years old! Her husband was 100!

Why did she laugh? Because only a fool would believe that a woman with one foot in the grave was soon to have the other foot in the maternity ward. They laughed because God seemed to believe it. They laughed because they half believed it themselves?

Abraham and Sarah stopped laughing long enough to start their family. And they named their son "Isaac," which means "God made me laugh."

remain as pure as possible. That means combing nearby territory for natural materials such as grasses, reeds and bark and taking great pains to replicate the manner in which basketmakers of old produced their creations.

Roe's basketry will be on display at the 1983 Texas Folklife Festival, August 4-7 at The University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio. The Festival is an annual celebration of the state's ethnic diversity and pioneer heritage. Roe is one of 6,000 participants from across the state who come together to share the folkways of their forebears with some 100,000 visitors to the Festival.

At her booth in the "Back 40" area of the Festival, Roe demonstrates her craft for visitors and, in the process, expresses her love of it.

Roe prefers to use materials she can find in her immediate area, as do most traditionalists. They do not want to have an advantage over their ancestors who rarely had the opportunity to send a-

way for something that was not available close at hand.

"This craft teaches self-reliance and self-sufficiency," she says, "by using vines and plants that grow in our own backyards, along our streams and in the fields."

Plants such as Johnson grass, honeysuckle, grapevines, wisteria, cedar and cypress wood are among the favorite materials of Texas basketmakers. Sometimes Roe will come across plants she can't identify and be so impressed with the texture or color she will use it in making a basket.

"We don't know the name (of the plant) and we don't know what it will do, but that doesn't keep us from trying. We have some very unique things come out of it," she says.

Patience is a virtue in basketry, for even preparing raw plants before weaving is a long and tedious process. When using wood splints, basketmakers must find a tall, straight, knot-free tree, chop it down and then split it into sections. After the bark is removed, the

wood, once started with a knife, is pulled into long strips by hand until they are the desired thinness.

A different method is used with grasses, reeds and vines such as honeysuckle. As Roe explains, "You cut the honeysuckle vine, roll it into a small roll, secure it and boil it." After boiling the vines for three hours, "You take a piece of burlap or an old piece of towel and hold it in your hand and just pull the vine through and the bark slips off very nicely."

Then you rinse it off. When it dries it will be white. It will look like a commercial reed of some kind.

Tickets to the Texas Folklife Festival are \$5 for adults (\$4.50 in advance) and \$1 for children age 6-12; children under six are admit-
