School board lets bids for new year

The Board of Trustees of the Post Independent School District met in regular session Tuesday, July 12 to discuss the hiring of personnel and the awarding of various bids.

Charles "Chili" Black was hired by the Board to be the new junior high school coach. Julia Hudman was also employed by the district to replace Gwen Marrier, an eighth grade English teacher.

The resignations of Connie Perry and Jennifer Huneycutt were accepted in other business Tuesday evening.

Dennis Welding was awarded the contract for the washing of the fourteen P.I.S.D. school buses. The district will pay \$59 to wash and grease and have the oil changed on each bus at least once per month. The price is for labor, as the school district will furnish the oil and filters for the changes.

Milk will cost 16½ cents per half-pint for the schools next year. Borden submitted the

only bid for milk. The school district will be using Texaco gasoline next year. Griffin Oil Company was given the P.I.S.D. contract with a bid of .9818 per gallon. The price for gasoline will be subject to increase or decrease according to market conditions.

Griffin will also furnish Post schools with oil at a case price of \$23.36 for Havoline 10W-40.

Anti-freeze will be \$4.50 per gallon, down .19 per gallon from last year. Garza Auto Parts was awarded the contract for antifreeze.

In other business, the Board accepted the bid of \$916 from Ammons Printing for the printing of football programs. The cost of the programs will be exactly the same as last year.

Board members also approved financial statements and bills for payment.

Main Street project talk given to Rotarians

Paula Peters visited Post Tuesday, presenting a no-nonsense program to Post Rotarians and guests, outlining what Texas Mainstreet Project has done for cities whose downtowns were dying.

Working under the administration of the Texas Historical Commission, Texas Mainstreet's goal is to work with cities to revitalize and preserve downtown areas.

Ms. Peters' slide presentation demonstrated several "before and after" examples of cities as Navasota, Gainesville, Plainview and Georgetown.

She explained that the Austin-based organization is not a "hand-out" or "give-away" project, but one that emphasizes a self-help concept.

Each year Texas Mainstreet accepts applications from Texas cities of 50,000 population or smaller and then selects five of these towns as Texas Mainstreet cities.

Once selected, the participating cities are offered a wide variety of services and organizational assistance.

"One of the contractual agreements," Ms. Peters added, "is that our Mainstreet towns must hire a full-time project manager."

That is one of the keys to success for the program.

The enthusiasm for making downtown Post shine like some

of the Mainstreet examples is inspiring. We offer our full support at The Post Dispatch for Post to be considered as a Texas Mainstreet

Project and are excited about the possibilities of what we can do when we work together.

Area airports to be discussed

A Texas Aeronautical Facilities Plan regional planning meeting will be held at 10 a. m. on Friday, July 22, 1983 in the Party Room, Pioneer Memorial Building located at 101 W. Main, Crosbyton.

Airport development needs of Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, King, Lynn and Motley Counties will be discussed. The meeting will be conducted by the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

All area citizens with an interest in air transportation and airport development are invited to attend. Participating in the meeting will be city and county elected officials, airport board members, airport managers, representatives of the South Plains Association of Governments and other citizens.

During the meeting, the airport development needs currently identified in the Texas Aeronautical Facilities Plan (TAFP) for area airports will be reviewed. Preservation and development of airport facilities in the area will be covered. The availability of state and federal funds for airport development will be discussed. Information on area economic development, community goals and objectives, and other factors that may influence the need for, or timing of, airport development will be requested.

The TAFP is an expansion and update of the Texas Airport System Plan developed for Texas and the Federal Aviation Administration by the Texas Aeronautics Commission. The Plan was first published in 1974. The latest Plan revision was published in January, 1979. Completion of this TAFP revision is scheduled for mid-1984.
