Bill Hall will serve as parade marshal of the annual Post Rodeo Stampede parade which will kick off rodeo activities set for Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights.

Chamber of Commerce secretary, Donna Stelzer reports that five floats have been entered to date and four riding clubs will participate in the parade also.

Texas Tech's Red Raider will be riding in the event as will Miss White River. Only one bicycle entry has been received thus far.

The famous six white horses of Hardin Simmons University will also participate in the parade.

Floats entered thus far include the Woman's Chamber of Commerce, Sioux Lodge, Palmer Ranch Scene, Palmer Oil Field Scene and EMTs.

Riding clubs include the West Texas Raiders of Lubbock, Scurry County Sheriff's Posse, Lubbock Rangers Jr. Riding Club and the Calico Gals of Midland.

The Middle School cheerleaders are also scheduled to participate.

The famous six white horses are perhaps one of the best living advertisements of Hardin-Simmons University throughout the United States, having appeared in New York City, San Francisco, Chicago, and at a presidential inauguration in Washington, D.C.

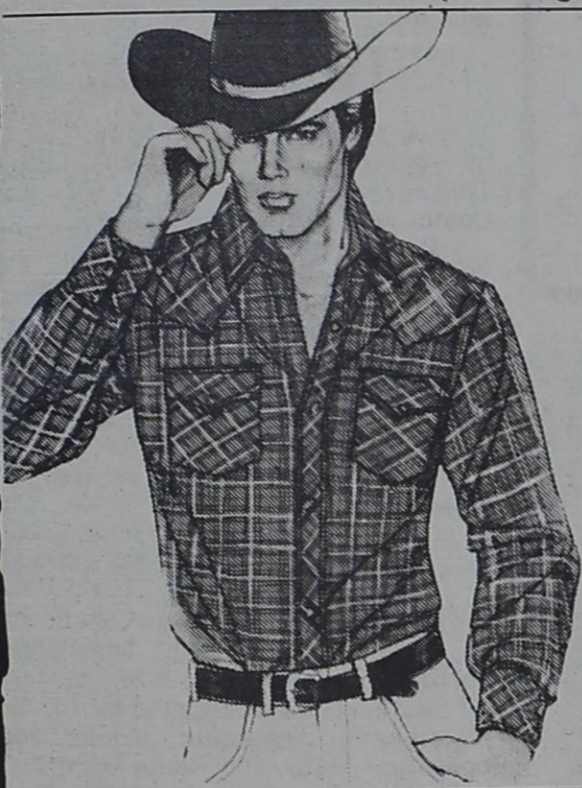

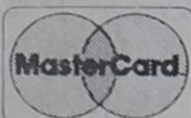

As the demand for crews of local and migrant hoe hands increases, notes Ed Dean, Field Service Director for Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., there is a corresponding increase in the need for farmers to be aware of minimum wage, unemployment compensation and other regulations pertaining to farm labor. Some of the regulations, he says, particularly those outlined under the Migrant and Seasonal Agricultural Worker Protection Act (MASAWPA), are "brand new" and may have gone unnoticed by producers. However the \$3.35 per hour minimum wage which applies to any employer who used as many as 500 man days of labor during any calendar quarter of the previous year, is the same as in 1981 and 1982.

Field Day set Sept. 13

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at the Lubbock location will host the 74th Annual Field Day, Tuesday, Sept. 13 beginning at 1 p.m.

Highlights and topics to be featured will include weed control, cotton fiber, quality, drought stress of crops, and grape research. In addition, specialists will be centrally located and available for discussion of specific problems.

Displays and exhibits will also be featured for public viewing.

Other agencies located at the Lubbock-Halfway Center and cooperating in the event are the USDA-ARS, Texas Forest Service, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the High Plains Research Foundation.

seasonal workers and migrants. And although the act distinguishes between the two (a migrant is one required to be absent from home overnight), most of the act's major provisions apply to both.

The MASAWPA says users of workers in either of these categories must disclose to each, in writing, where he or she will work, what is to be done, the period of employment, the wage to be paid, any other employee benefit provided and at what charge, the existence of any strikes that may be in progress, and any commissions or benefits that are to be paid with respect to the employment.

A U.S. Department of Labor poster advising workers of their right to these written disclosures and other rights and protections must be posted in a "conspicuous place."

If housing is provided for migrant workers, the employer must post in a conspicuous place or present to each worker a statement of any terms and conditions imposed on occupants. A record must be kept, provided to worker and preserved for three years showing the wage base, piecework units earned if applicable, hours worked, total pay period earnings, specific sums withheld and the purpose of each, and net pay.

When a farm labor contractor is involved, employers are required to take reasonable steps to determine that the contractor has a valid and appropriate certificate of registration. "This is only a brief rundown of the nuts and bolts of federal farm labor law," Dean says. "But PCG on request will be glad to supply more detailed information, plus state regulations pertaining to environmental standards for sanitation."

Forty-seven guests registered between the hours of 7:30 and 9 p. m.

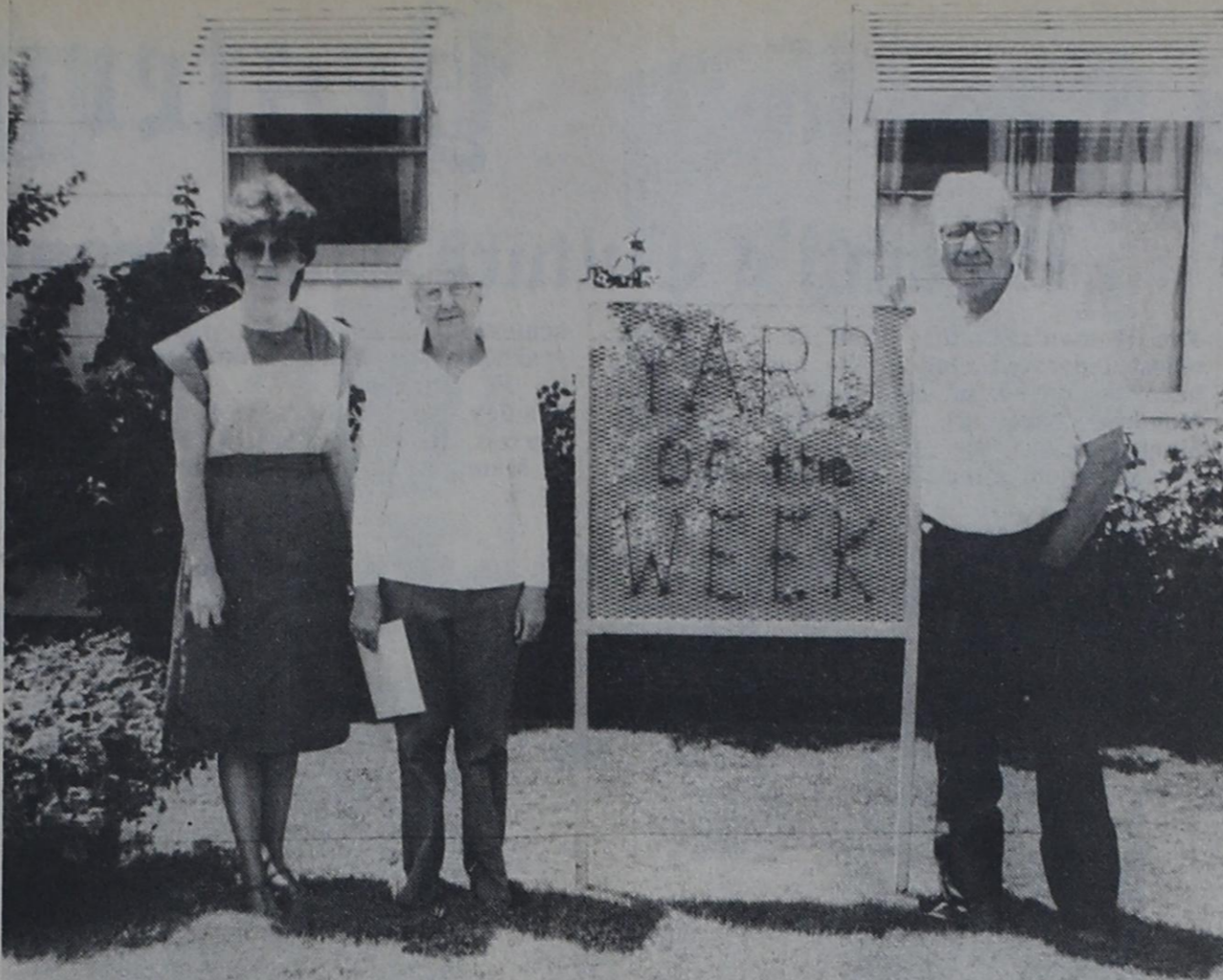
Guests were greeted at the door by the honoree and her mother-in-law, Martha Alford and then were served cookies, nuts, mints and punch from a table decorated

Day care parents can be helped

Working parents who meet income eligibility requirements can be subsidized up to 90 percent of the cost of their children's day care through a Department of Human Resources program. The funds for this program are funneled from the State to the Department of Human Resources to the South Plains Community Action where they are dispersed.

The program is planned to help low income families. The children who are recipients of AFDC, SSI assistance, or food stamps, as well as other income eligible children may qualify if the day care allows their parents or caretakers to participate in employment or training. Children of parents who are in school full time to receive a high school diploma are also eligible for day care. Children of parents who are in training up to one year beyond high school or its equivalent are eligible for the day care service.

Eligibility for the day care assistance is based on family size and income. Parents must be employed or in training and will place their children in licensed day care homes with whom the Agency has a contract.

Presently the South Plains Community Action Day Care Broker is able to help 80 children from 13

counties (Hockley, Lamb, Bailey, Cochran, Yoakum, Garza, Lynn Terry, Floyd, Dickens, Hale, Crosby and Lubbock (rural)). The program has been in existence for over a year. It has helped Day Care Group homes get started as well as placing children in existing Day Care facilities.

Yesteryears in Garza

Woman's Culture Club Organized in 1913

The Woman's Culture Club of Post is the oldest federated club in the county, having been organized in 1913 and federated on Monday, Sept. 28, 1914. Mrs. John B. Slaughter was the founder and served as first president after its federation status was

achieved. According to the 1915-16 club yearbook, the membership roster was: Mrs. G. M. Bachelor, S. B. Bardwell, G. W. Bradley, Tom Cutter, A. E. Dickhut, J. R. Durrett, R. E. Gilmore, J. F. Hartford, W. T. Mann, A. L. Marhoff, J. P. Newell, C. L.

Pickett, Jim Power, V. A. Robinson, J. W. Smith, W. O. Stevens, Bob Warren and honorary members, Mrs. H. W. Fairbanks and Miss Lorena Fairbanks. Mrs. H. W. Fairbanks and J. F. Hartford had served as club presidents until the federation process was completed. Mrs. Durrett followed Mrs. Slaughter as president and then Mrs. Jim Power followed Mrs. Durrett and Mrs. D. C. Williams followed Mrs. Power. The club has met each year since its inception, having celebrated the Post Jubilee in 1957, its own 50th anniversary and has been a moving force in town ever since its beginning.

REPORT OF POST PUBLIC SCHOOL

The second quarter of Post Public School closed Friday, Jan. 15. The school as a whole is making good progress. Forty new pupils have been enrolled during the quarter, and each Monday brings new pupils.

The present enrollment is two hundred seventy-two. The majority of pupils are taking an active interest in their work.

Special efforts have been made during the quarter to secure promptness and regularity in attendance. Progress has been made in this direction, however, the evil has not been entirely eradicated. I again earnestly seek the aid of the parents in this great work,

said T. R. Greenfield, superintendent, as in all our undertakings to improve our school for without your cooperation our efforts will be in vain. There are no two greater virtues that we can instill into the minds of your boys and girls than promptness and industry, and it is far better that your children learn these in their school life than in life's school.

Peach Cobbler an American Classic



Peach cobbler, like peach buckle, peach fool or pandowdie have been created by cooks with a lot of creativity and a sense of humor, too. The fact that they're still enjoyed today is a tribute to their goodness. This peach cobbler is a classic version from the makers of Karo corn syrup.

PEACH COBBLER

- 2 pounds peaches, peeled, sliced (about 4 cups)
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 cup Karo light corn syrup
- Biscuit Topping (recipe follows)
- 1 tablespoon corn starch

Place peaches in 1 1/2 quart casserole dish. In small bowl stir together corn starch and nutmeg. Gradually stir in corn syrup until smooth. Pour over peaches; toss to coat evenly. Bake in 400°F oven 20 minutes. Drop Biscuit Topping by spoonfuls onto hot fruit mixture. Bake 25 to 30 minutes longer or until golden brown. Makes 8 servings.

Biscuit Topping: In bowl stir together 1 cup unsifted flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder and 1/4 teaspoon salt. With pastry blender or 2 knives cut in 2 tablespoons corn oil margarine until coarse crumbs form. In bowl stir together 1/4 cup milk, 2 tablespoons Karo light corn syrup and 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind. Stir into flour mixture just until blended.

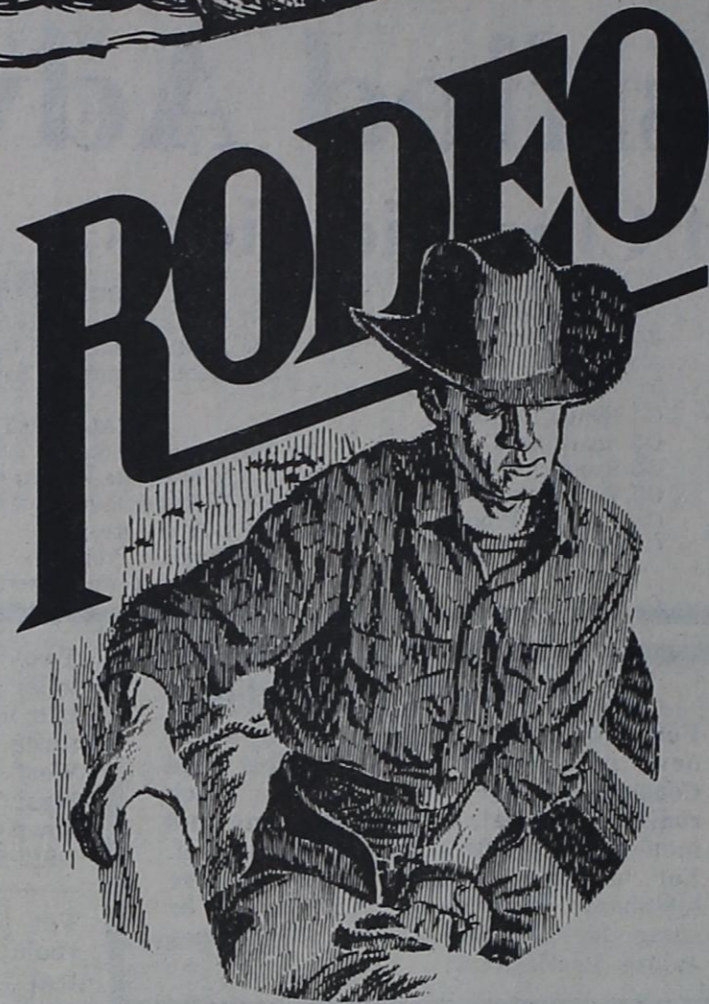

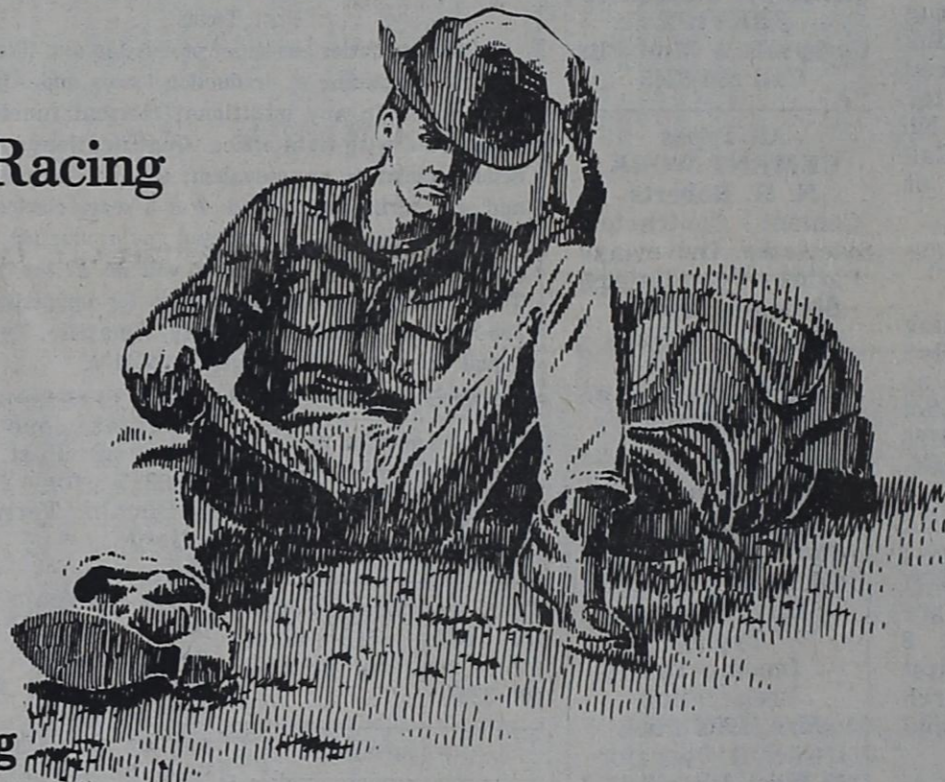
