



# Pickin' Wins Trophy

Derick Dunn, 14 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronnie Dunn won the Grants' 15th annual Blue Grass Music Festival in Hugo, Ok., August 3-7 playing the banjo.

Derick was among 17 contestants playing in the banjo contest and for his first place finish was awarded a trophy and cash prize.

The festival is billed as the largest in Bluegrass Festivals and draws people from 40 states and several foreign countries including Japan.

Derick is also the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Dillard Dunn of Post and Mrs. Haywood Basinger of Slaton.

A student of Tim Sinclair of Lubbock, this was the first summer for Derick to enter such events and won first place in June at the Buffalo Gap contest. Derick enters the junior competition which is up through 16

years of age. Since Derick won the event at Oklahoma, he will be unable to enter the junior competition next year, but may compete as a senior.

One of the highlights of Dericks visit to the Bluegrass Festival, other than winning first place, was being able to pick and play with big name banjo players at the event.

He hopes to be able to attend and enter the nationals to be held in Kansas in September. Derick also plays in Meadow, Ropesville and Lubbock each month.

Big name entrants in the festival included the Osborne Brothers, The Lewis Family, The Johnson Mountain Boys, McLain Family Band, Bill Harrell, The Tennessee Gentlemen and Raymond Fairchild and the Crowe Brothers.

Derick will be a freshman student at Post High School.

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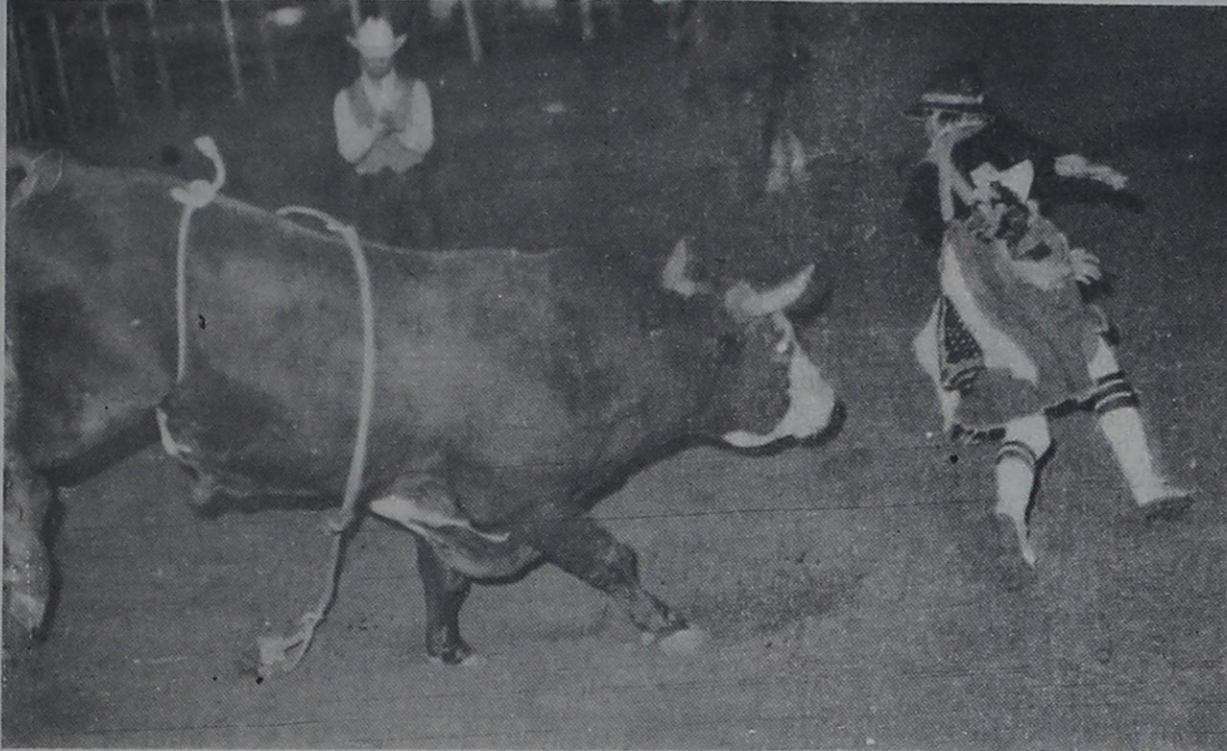

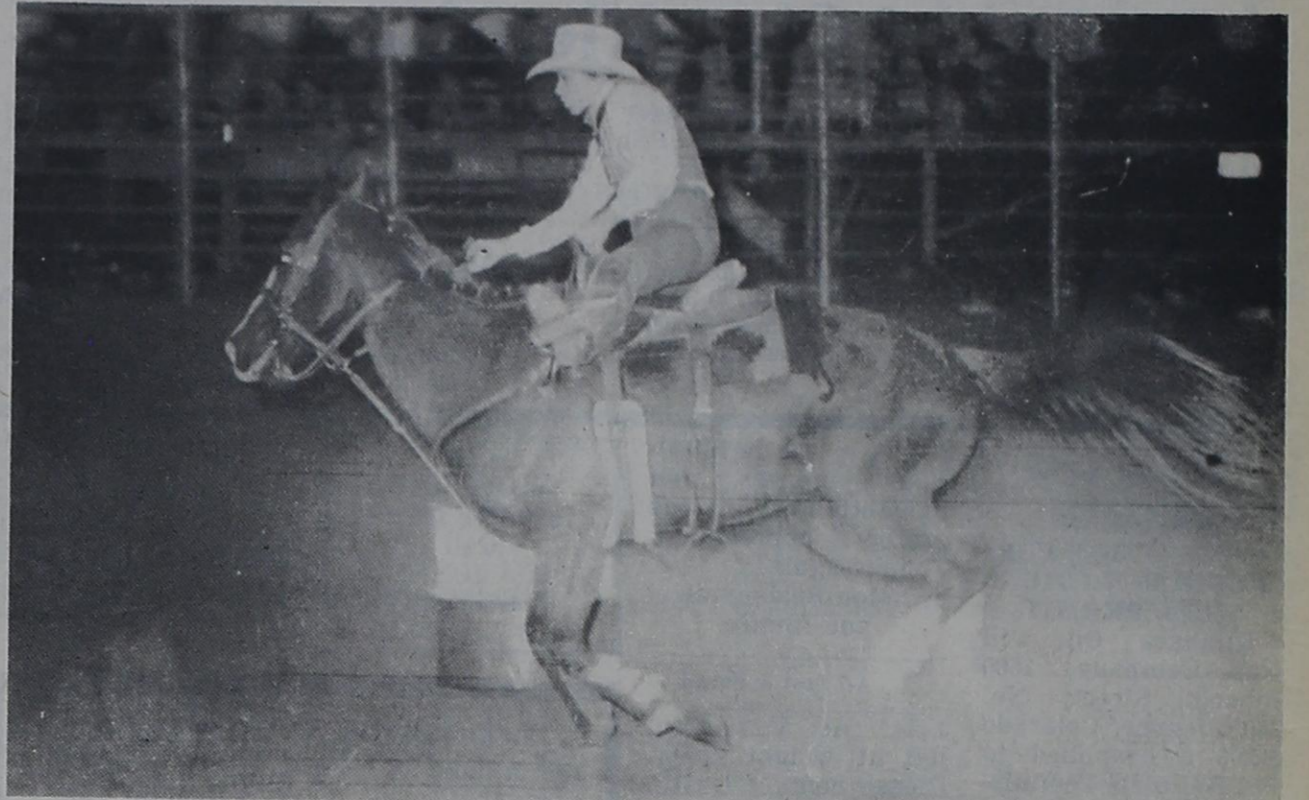

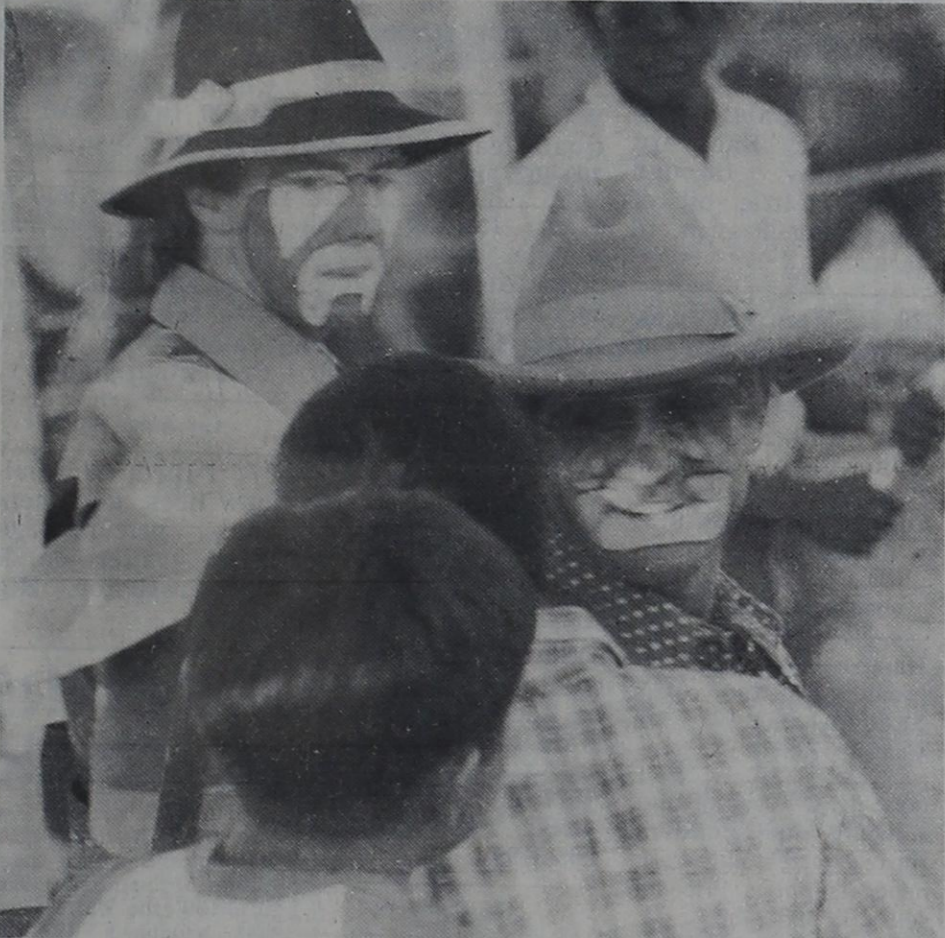

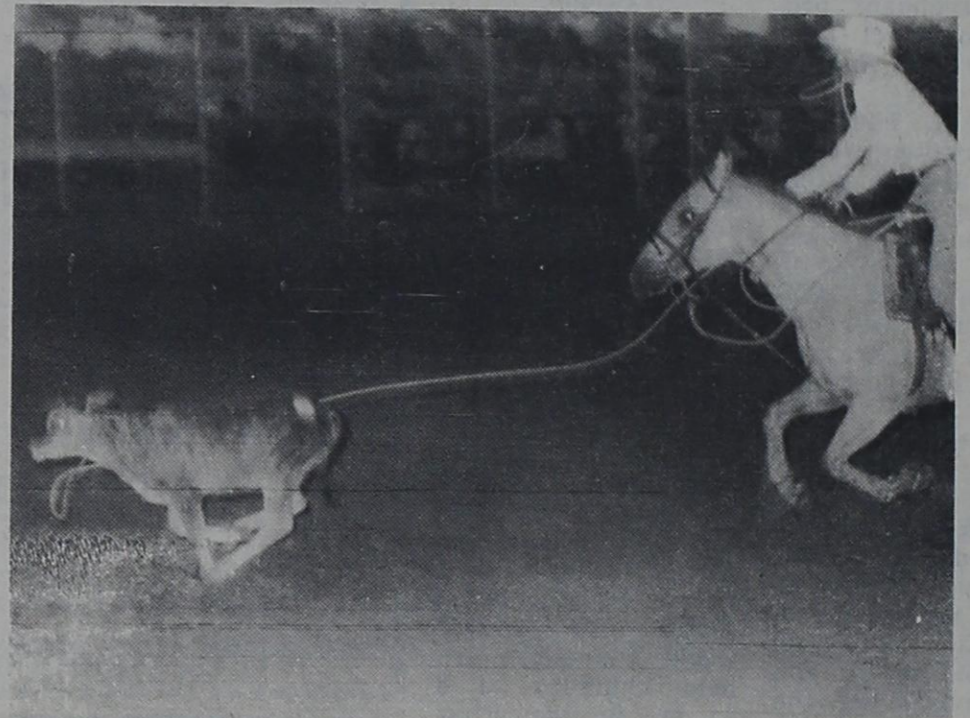
