



"The situation is critical and not getting better," Stenholm said. "Our West Texas stockmen and farmers face devastating losses from Mother Nature on top of the shocks and jolts they've received from poor market conditions in the re-

cent past. Stenholm will meet with Secretary Block, other members of Congress and governors from states affected by the current severe drought. After the meeting, to be held in Chicago, the Secretary will report to President Reagan on the effects of the drought and what can be done about it.

"We have been talking with county officials in the areas where drought damage has been heaviest," Stenholm said. "They have given us up-to-date reports on the situation in their own countries. The picture they paint is not a pretty one, as I know from walking the dry fields and pastures.

"But they also have very definite and concrete ideas to help the situation," he continued. "Their suggestions -- about CCC-stored grain, about further changes in regulations on PIK acreage, and so on-will be what I will take to Secretary Block."

Stenholm that while the recent declaration of several counties as disaster areas eligible for emergency loans has helped some, there is a need for further action.
