Commissioners Approve Funds

Jim Jackson with the ambulance committee and Cathy Stocco with South Plains EMS met with the Commissioners Court to get approval on a donation of \$1,250 from the county for the upgrading of equipment, special skill classes and emergency nurse training workshops. The court approved the donation to the South Plains EMS.

In other business commissioners approved the increase of benefits with the Texas County and District Retirement System to Plan I, benefit increase effective January 1, 1984. A copy of the Plan I benefits and the Suggested Form of Commissioner Court Order Selecting Increases for Retirement Benefits to be made a permanent record in the minutes.

The court also approved the resolution for a new Farm to Market Road extending from end of FM Road 2008 North to FM Road 651, 15.0 miles Northeast of Post.

Jana Henderson was approved for employment as relief dispatcher and Twilight Dudley, midnight shift dispatcher in the Sheriff's office.

Sonny Osby was also approved for employment in Precinct 3.

Ruby Williams met with the court representing the community center. She gave an update report and to get approval on three new board member replacements. Sue Chun, Jerry Osborn and Louis Earl are the new replacements with the court giving their approval.

Non-profit organizations interested in signing up for sidewalk space should contact the Chamber of Commerce office at 495-3461.

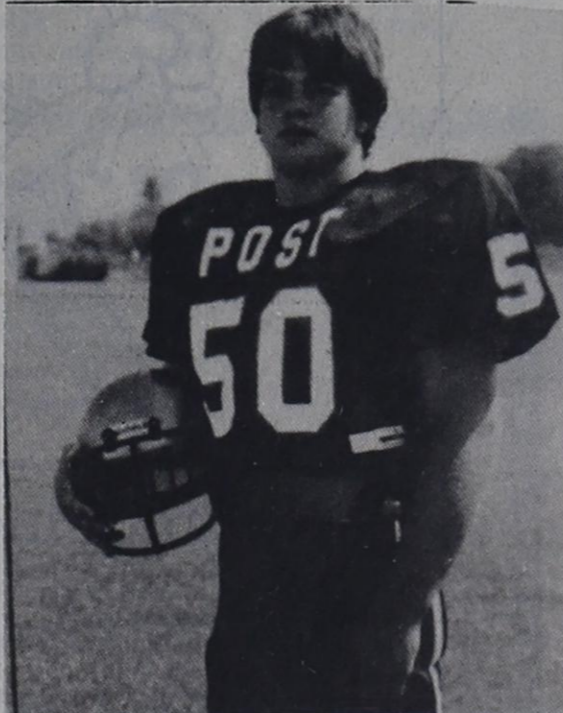

Craft Earns Top TIAA Honors

Former Post Antelope Toby Craft, now middle linebacker for the McMurry Indians, was named Freshman of the Year of the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association (TIAA) this week.

Toby also received the honor of being named all conference second team linebacker.

Craft, 5' 11", 200 pound linebacker, was second on the Indian team in tackles with 93 and ended the season with five quarterback sacks.

He learned two days before the season started that he would be starting for the Indians due to the ineligibility of the regular starter.

Toby also was named conference player of the week against Austin College when McMurry won that game 6-3 and Toby had 10 individual tackles.

McMurry ended their season with a 6-3 record and are co-champs with Sul Ross University. This was their best season since 1980 when they finished 9-1.

popular Sunday edition," the publisher concludes, "but economic conditions here are just not strong enough."

Those readers who want a localized television listing should be aware of the fact that without proper advertising support, the publication can not be produced.

The Day it was 'Bad' to be a Texan

This week we were bombarded with television reminders of President John Kennedy's assassination November 22, 1963.

Most of the media hype was just that... and I tuned it out as much as possible.

But like many Texans and Americans, the memories of that tragedy couldn't completely be stifled.

I remember the shock when the office secretary came bursting into the newspaper room screaming... "JUST LOOK WHAT YOU TEXANS HAVE DONE! YOU'VE KILLED OUR PRESIDENT!!"

The lady was so distraught she didn't make any sense, and those three of us in the room all jumped her... "what do you mean? You're kidding, right?"

She wasn't. And what really hurt was the smear on any of us who were identified as Texans... for a while I thought Texas might be invaded.

I was in the Air Force, coincidentally, editing a weekly newspaper at McCord AFB, Washington, which is located near Tacoma.

It was a frightful two-three days. The base was put on full alert... nobody knew for sure what was happening... all work came to a standstill.

In Tacoma it was a cool, bright Pacific Northwest autumn Friday morning.

The base newspaper had just been distributed to the various stops, and the editor was relaxing a little, surveying what mistakes might be called to his attention later.

Millions of people around the world this week are retelling this same kind of story for it was a day not unlike the surprise attack on Pearl Harbor of another

generation... a turning point in the history of our nation.

What hurt and still hurts the most is the attack people made on Texas and Texans...

Lee Harvey Oswald, whether you believe he was alone in the act or not, was not a Texan! And even if he was, a single demented man certainly doesn't reflect the entire state.

Former Texas Governor John Connally said it best on the Today Show Tuesday "Robert Kennedy was killed in Los Angeles, but somehow that city never got the stigma that Dallas got... yes, I think Dallas and Texas got a bum rap."

Whatever we felt about President Kennedy, politically or personally, the assassination in Dallas left Texans wishing it would have happened somewhere else.

And if you were a Texan not living in Texas then, you know that it was not a time to wave the Lone Star flag.

Those words ring in my ear and sting my heart... "JUST LOOK WHAT YOU TEXANS HAVE DONE... YOU'VE KILLED OUR PRESIDENT!!"

I'll get over it... but it still hurts.

Workroom Techniques from designers

Clothing designers use many time-saving methods in their workrooms. Here are some of these methods as described by the American Home Sewing Association:

— Keep pins at hand for fitting in a small pouch fastened at the waist with a safety pin. A pin pouch can be made in any smooth fabric, such as vinyl, plastic or chintz.

— For hand stitching or clipping threads, make a mock sewing bird. Use an alligator clip tacked onto a piece of elastic which is stitched closed in the back and then attached to the machine arm. Use this "sewing bird" to help keep fabric taut and stitching even.

— Try using weights instead of pins to hold pattern pieces. You won't have to pin delicate fabric and layouts will be made easier.

— For quick cutting, cover your sewing table in cork. Then put changeable brown paper on it to

keep the surface clean. You can attach pattern pieces to the fabric in the hem and seam allowances by pushing pins into the cork.

— To press open seams, wet strips of old sheeting 1-inch wide. This will help you control the steam where and when you want it during construction. You can save the steam iron for use in the final pressing.

On the first of November, Ronnie Ammons, an EMT, taught the girls how to take care of sprained ankles, skinned knees, cuts, sunburn, and insect bites.

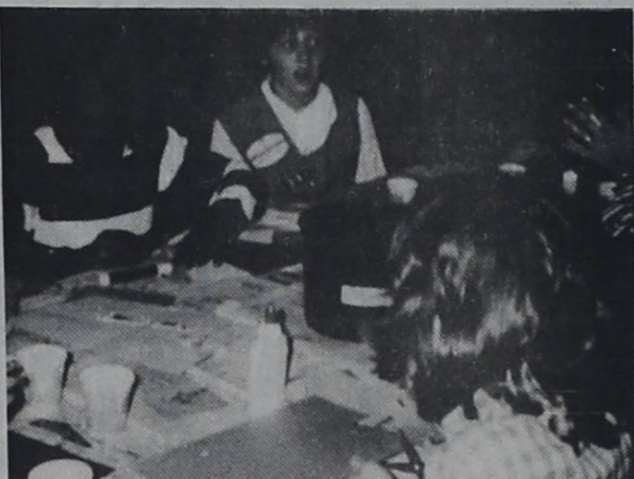
The scouts then learned a dance from Trinidad and also the Cotton Eyed Joe.

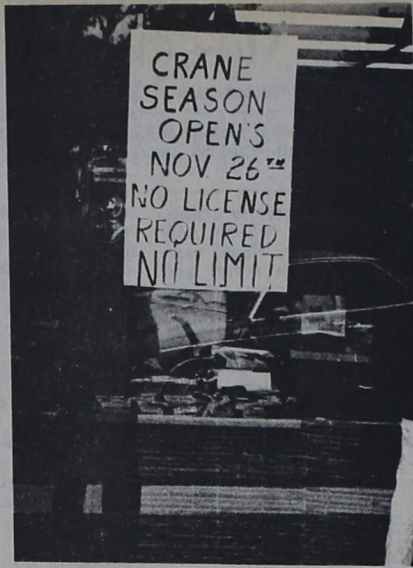
"The county tax assessor-collectors of Texas are personally and professionally committed to staying

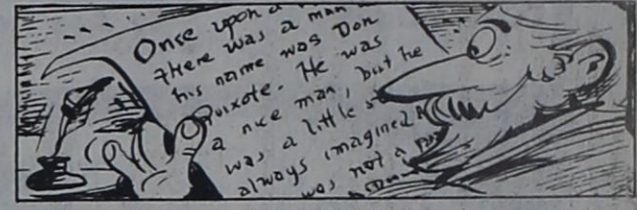

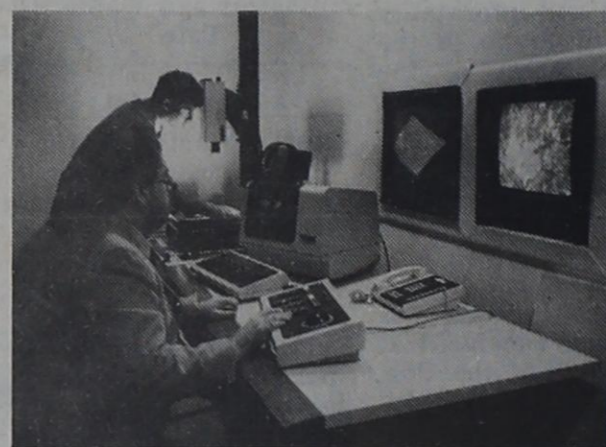
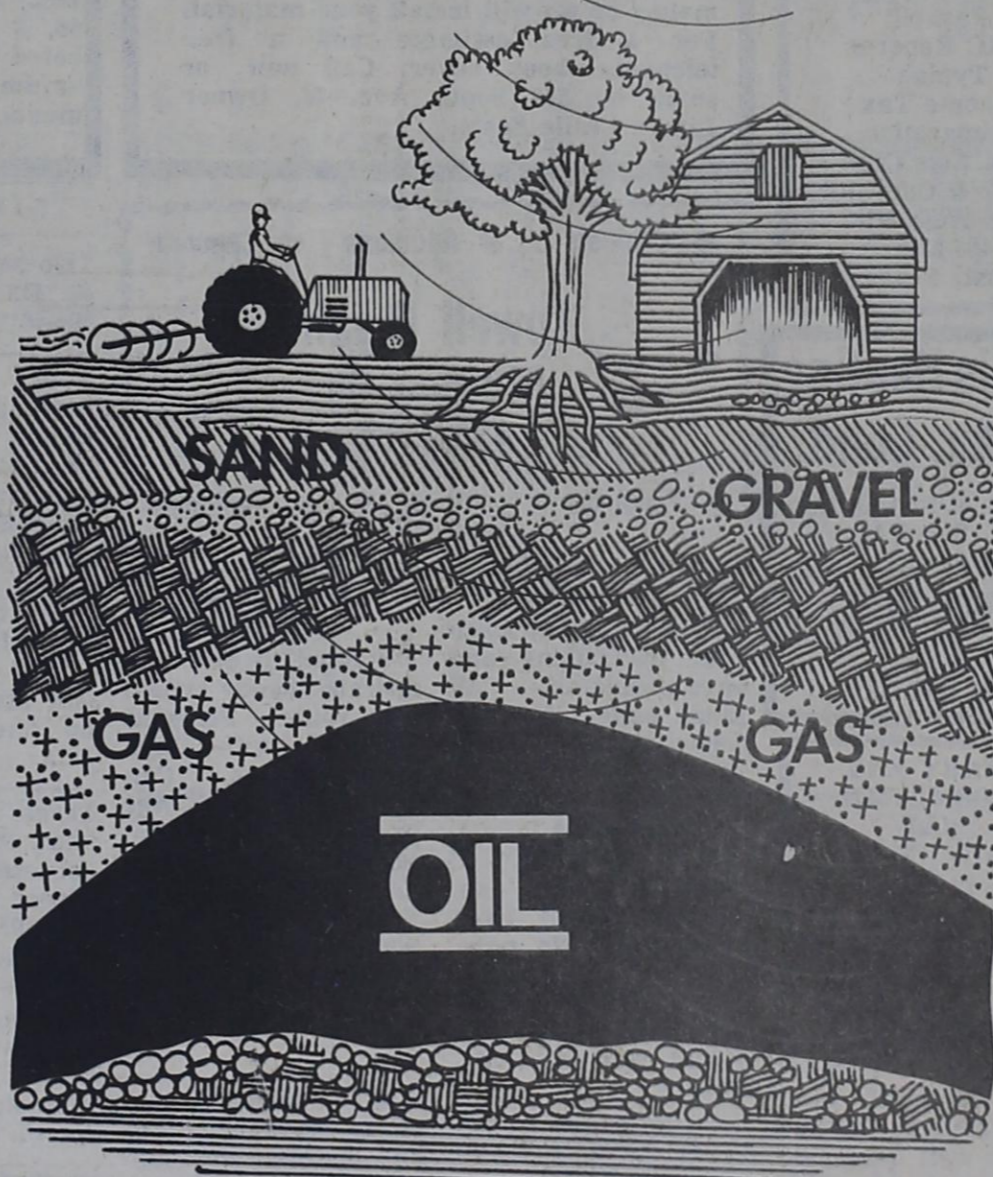
