Ranchers May Apply for CCC Corn at Reduced Rates

Garza County has been designated by Farmer's Home Administration as a disaster affected county due to the drought this summer.

Livestock producers who were affected by the drought are eligible to purchase lower grade Commodity Credit Corp. corn to feed their livestock or poultry.

Affected producers are urged to sign up at the County ASCS office from December 6-14.

According to Victor Ashley in the ASCS office, the corn to be released through the emergency feed program is priced at 75 percent of the 1983 basic county loan rate in the county where it is stored.

Nationwide, about 27 million bushels of U.S. No. 4, U.S. No. 5 and sample grade corn are available from CCC.

Farmers purchasing the corn are responsible for transporting it to their farms. The two nearest locations of stored corn are Brownfield and Plainview.

Authorization for the CCC corn sales came with President Reagan's signature last week to a measure passed by Congress

dealing primarily with the dairy and tobacco programs.

Ashley said that in addition to being located in USDA-designated disaster county, a farmer or rancher eligible to purchase the corn must also have insufficient feed on hand to maintain foundation livestock and poultry through the end of a 90-day feeding period.

The period begins when a producer applies for the assistance.

The maximum amount of corn allowed to be purchased will be 10 pounds of feed per day per animal unit times the number of days in the feeding period.

They told of the student involvement in the Doss Center and activities provided by the center. Mr. Satterwhite agreed to return to meet with the community-youth center board members at their regular December meeting for the purpose of outlining the M. S. Doss program of activities.

Easy Cranberry Cobbler With Heritage

Packaged biscuit mix, a real time-saver, has orange rind added to it. Serve baked cobblers with garnish of thawed frozen whipped topping.

- Cranberry-Apple Cobbler**
- 4 cups sliced peeled apples (4 medium)
 - 1 cup raw cranberries
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 3 tablespoons Minute tapioca
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup water
 - 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 - 1 cup all-purpose biscuit mix
 - 2 tablespoons sugar
 - 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
 - 1/4 cup milk
- Combine apples, cranberries, 1 cup sugar, tapioca, salt and water in large saucepan. Let stand 5 minutes. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Pour into shallow 2-quart baking dish; dot with butter.
- Combine biscuit mix, 2 tablespoons sugar, orange rind and milk. Drop from teaspoon onto hot fruit mixture. Bake at 375° for 30 minutes, or until lightly browned. Serve warm, with whipped topping if desired. Makes 9 servings.

The team is preparing this week to take on the Daingerfield Tigers for the Semi-Final trophy and a chance at the State final. (See related story.)

The Antelopes went into the quarterfinal game knowing they had to stop Ballinger's quarterback and shut down the Bearcats' passing attack.

The game was a classic match-up between Post's basically running and Ballinger's pass oriented offenses.

The Antelopes also had a surprise for the Bearcats on two kick-off returns, as Curt Greer took the handoff straight up the middle, scoring both times. The play was set up by a Dale McVay fake handoff to Milton Williams.

The two touchdown returns came in the second half, giving the 'Lopes a much needed edge.

First Half Action

Ballinger took the opening kickoff and drove the ball from their own 17 to a touchdown in an impressive show, eating up 5:37 of the clock in the 14 play drive.

The touchdown came on a pitchout to Scott Spaw around right end from the Post 17, as he cut across to the middle to the end zone. The extra point put the Bearcats out front 7-0.

Things looked a little bleak for the 'Lopes in the first quarter, as they were unable to get untracked.

Ballinger got as close as the Post 17 yard line on its next possession, but a determined Antelope defense pushed the 'Cats back to the 31, led by a quarterback

sack by James Brown.

Two pass attempts failed, with Felix Bustos tipping the third down pass just as it reached the receiver.

The Antelopes took over following a punt and drove to the Bearcat 25, when on first down Joel Kirkpatrick's pass to Charles Johnson was intercepted at the one yard line early in the second quarter.

Giles Dalby sacked quarterback Aaron Keese, knocking the ball loose at the six, Ballinger recovered its fumble but was unable to get past the eight and punted.

Antelopes Get on the Board

Taking the ball with 5:40 left in the first half at the Ballinger 41, the Antelopes struck pay dirt in three plays, with Williams blasting around right end from the 11.

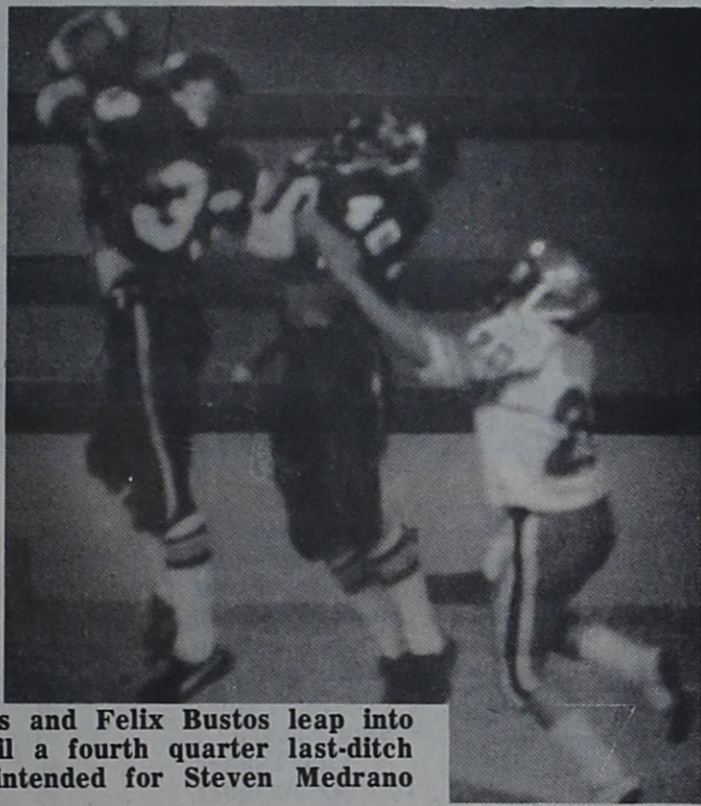

The Tigers are directed by head coach Dennis Alexander, now in his eighth year at Daingerfield.

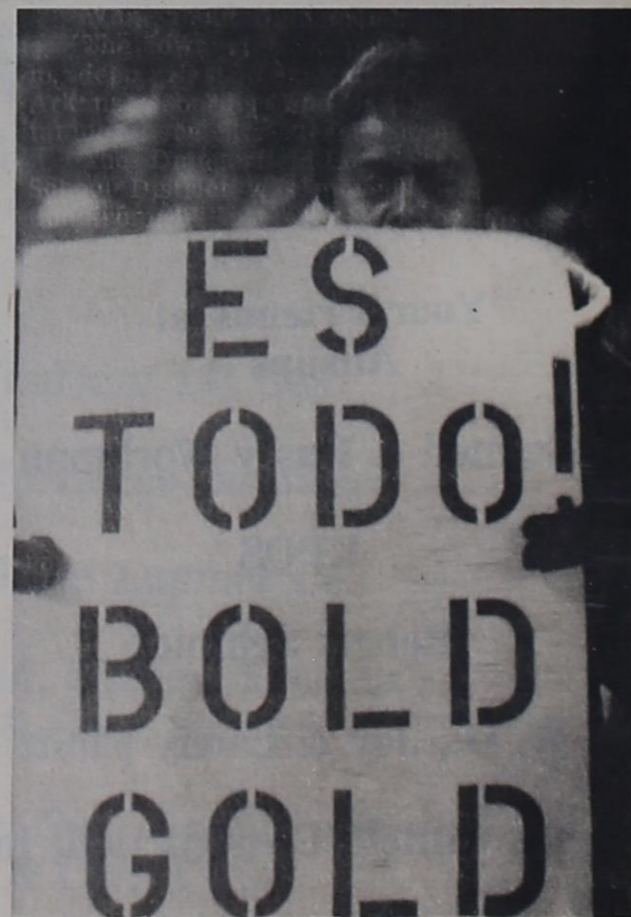
As strong as they have been on offense, the Tigers have been just as impressive on defense, allowing only eight points all year.

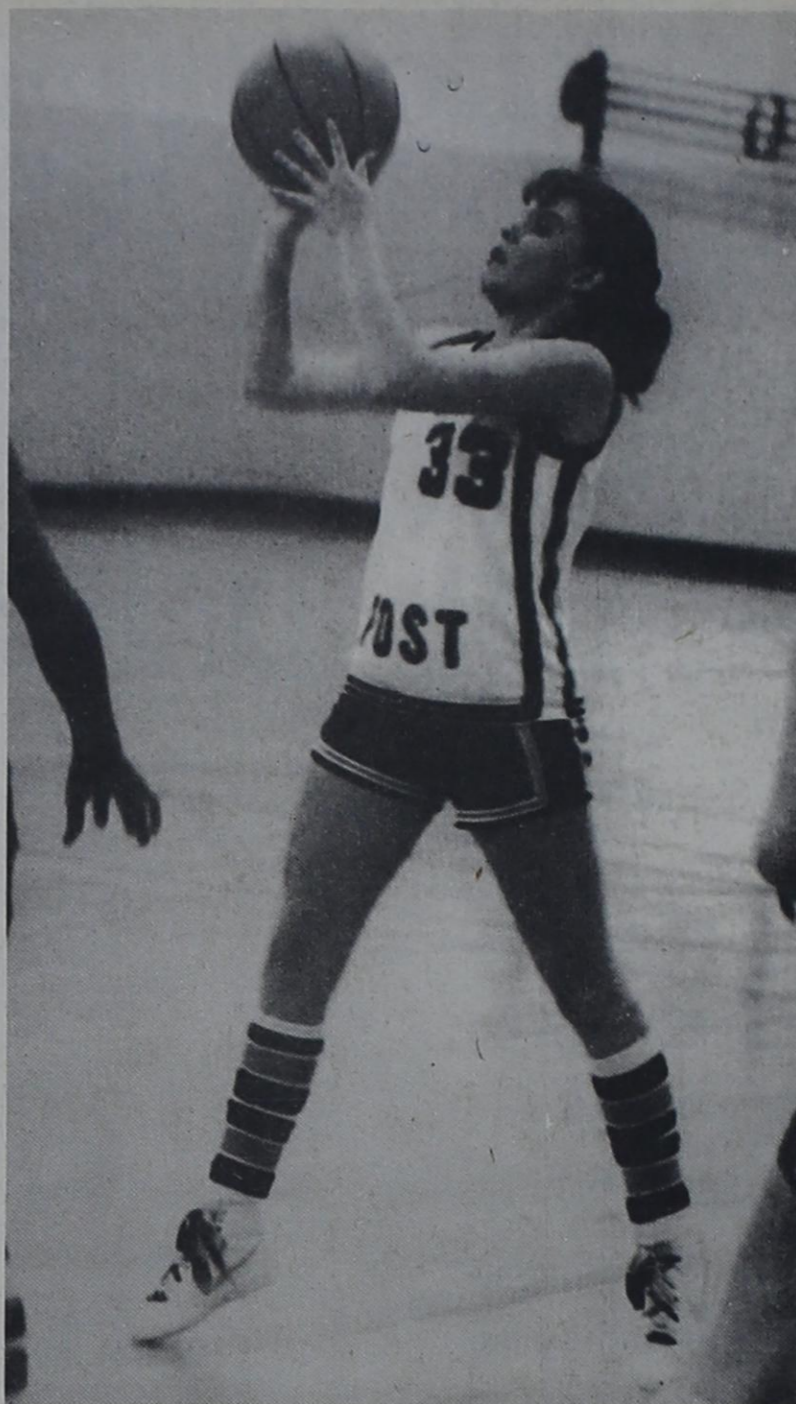
In game two of the

Shellfish poisoning

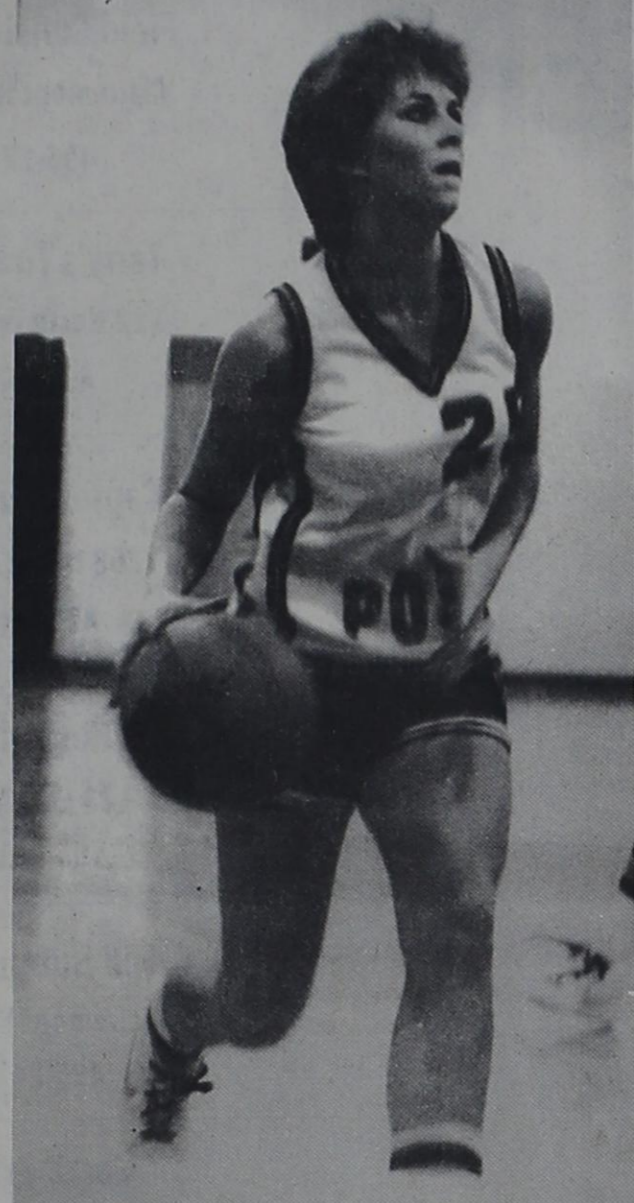
