## Brownfield Volunteer Here

The Family Network volunteers from Brownfield are actively involved in the education and prevention of drug use through the self-esteem program and supervised activities for youth in their community.

Everyone is invited to attend the informal session, exchange ideas with friends and neighbors from Brownfield.

commissioners' court meeting.

A citizens group addressed the commissioners on the importance of the counseling program and asked the court to reconsider its decision earlier this month not to continue funding the project.

The decision to extend the program for six months included the appointment of a five-member citizen advisory board to oversee the program and to report to the commissioners on the activities of the counselor.

Appointed to the board were Nelda Dalby, Mary Brewer, Faye Mathis, Jeri Lott and Rev Tom Pass.

The commissioners also stipulated that at the end of the six months, the city of Post would be asked to share in the cost of the program.

County Judge Giles Dalby abstained from the vote, which was unanimous.

In other action, the court authorized advertising for bids for exterior refurbishing of the courthouse and installation of storm windows.

The court approved a resolution supporting state legislation to authorize county governments to issue ordinances.

Judge Dalby emphasized the legislation is important to control sanitation and development outside of the city limits.

Commissioners authorized Judge Dalby to enter into an agreement with a Dallas firm for the lease-purchase of teletype equipment, which will be formally considered during next October's budget hearings. The equipment would not be ordered until January 1986 and would replace the 10 year old teletype which is frequently being repaired.

The commissioners also approved a resolution supporting state legislation which would allow county governments to ignore state-mandated programs if the state fails to provide adequate funding.

"The way it is now," Judge Dalby explained, "the state legislators can refuse to raise taxes, but require local governments

to provide the services and then local taxpayers have to find the money through taxes."

County treasurer Voda Beth Gradine asked the commissioners for guidance on implementing recent IRS rules concerning employee-operated county-owned vehicles.

Commissioners directed that the county auditor provide instructions on implementing the IRS rules.

Following the regular meeting, commissioners met in executive session at the request of Sheriff Jim Pippin.

Attending the meeting were Judge Dalby, commissioners Herbert Wall, Tommy Young, Ted Aten and Buck Craft, treasurer Gradine and Donald Windham.

## Colleen's Comments

The first Easter trail Peter Cottontail hopped down was in Pennsylvania, and that first trip took place in 1728, long before commercial egg dyes became popular.

Back then, many Pennsylvania Dutch children used natural dyes from herbs and foods to dye the eggs that were then exchanged as tokens of good times to come.

This Easter your children might enjoy making their own dye (with your help) as well as coloring the eggs.

They might even learn something about the many uses of foodstuffs along the way.

For softer, lighter shades, prepare the dye and strain it to remove the herbs, roots or foodstuff used to obtain the color.

Then, dip and turn pre-cooked eggs in the dye until you get a pretty shade.

To create a deeper shade, simply make the dye and cook the eggs at the same time, allowing the eggs to simmer for as long as 20 minutes to reach the deepest hues.

Another method of dyeing eggs is to wrap raw eggs in bits of the dye-making plant or food and then tie them in cheesecloth.

When the eggs are boiled, the dye is transferred directly to the eggshell, leaving a unique mottled effect.

Adding vinegar or alum to the dyeing mixture will increase the strength of the dye.

Here are some "recipes" for various colors:

For yellow dye, use chamomile tea or dandelion blossoms, pour boiling water over the tea or blossoms, cover and let stand for half an hour.

Strain the liquid and add a teaspoon of vinegar and the dye is ready.

Make gold dye by simmering two tablespoons of tumeric for 20 minutes.

Add a teaspoon of vinegar before dyeing eggs. Since tumeric does not dissolve, the coloring will be slightly marbled.

A brass-brown shade results from onion skins, even red onion skins.

Place the skins in a pan of water and simmer until the desired shade is obtained. Strain the liquid and add a teaspoon of vinegar and the dye is ready.

Lavender-blue eggs can be made with blueberries or grapes.

Crush the berries or

grapes by hand or in a blender.

Add water and simmer for a few minutes.

Strain the mixture and add a teaspoon of vinegar to complete the dye.

Use a similar method to make robins-egg blue from cabbage.

Mint leaves will make pale green Easter eggs.

Pour boiling water over mint leaves, cover and let simmer for half an hour.

Strain the mixture and

add a teaspoon of vinegar to complete the dye.

Any of the dye-stuffs can be wrapped around or folded against a raw egg and enclosed in cheesecloth and then boiled to obtain unusual patterns of color on the egg.

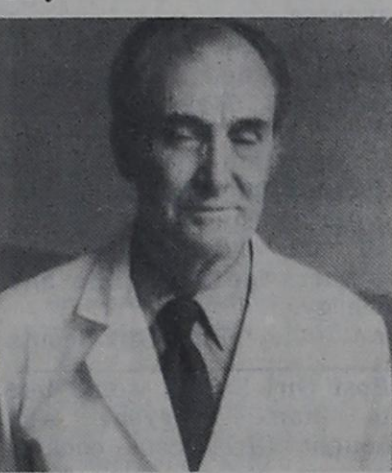

The track team participates in the San Angelo relays this weekend.

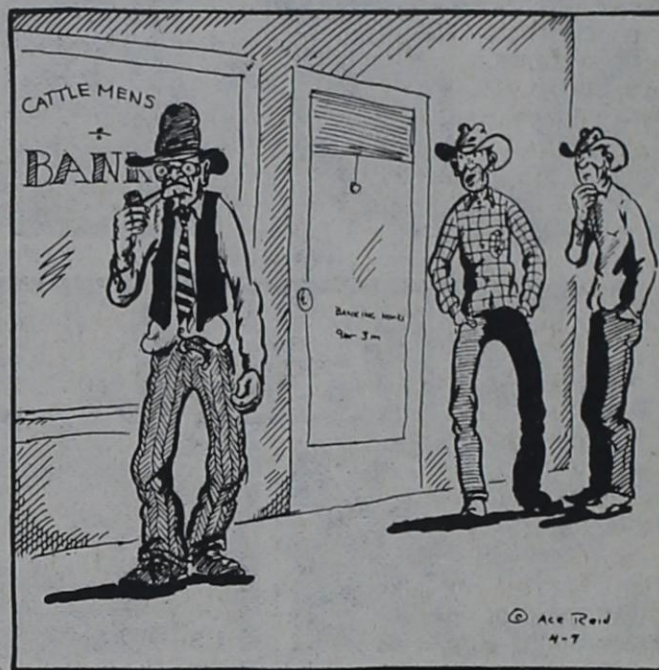
