Then, dip and turn precooked eggs in the dye until you get a pretty shade.

To create a deeper shade, simply make the dye and cook the eggs at the same time, allowing the eggs to simmer for as long as 20 minutes to reach the deepest hues.

Another method of dyeing eggs is to wrap raw eggs in bits of the dye-making plant or food and then tie them in cheesecloth.

When the eggs are boiled, the dye is transferred directly to the eggshell, leaving a unique mottled

Adding vinegar or alum to the dyeing mixture will increase the strength of the

Here are some "recipes" for various colors:

For yellow dye, use chamomile tea or dandelion blossoms, pour boiling water over the tea or blossoms, cover and let stand for half an hour.

Strain the liquid and add a teaspoon of vinegar and the dye is ready... Make gold dye by sim-

mering two tablespoons of tumeric for 20 minutes. Add a teaspoon of vinegar before dyeing eggs.

Since tumeric does not dissolve, the coloring will be slightly marbelized. A brass-brown shade re-

sults from onion skins, even red onion skins. Place the skins in a pan f water and simmer until the desired shade is obtain-

ed. Strain the liquid and

add a teaspoon of vinegar and the dye is ready.

Lavender-blue eggs can e made with blueberries

or grapes. Crush the berries or grapes by hand or in a blender.

Add water and simmer for a few minutes.

Strain the mixture and add a teaspoon of vinegar to complete the dye. Use a similar method to

make robins-egg blue from cabbage. Mint leaves will make

pale green Easter eggs. Pour boiling water over mint leaves, cover and let simmer for half an hour.

Any of the dye-stuffs can be wrapped around or folded against a raw egg and enclosed in cheesecloth and then boiled to obtain unusual patterns of color on the egg.




