

Dispatch Celebrates 60th Anniversary

In June, 1926, Eddie Warren helped start a new newspaper in the city of Post even though there were two established papers in town.

This issue begins the 60th anniversary of that paper started by Warren titled "The Post Dispatch."

The city's first newspaper, the "Post City Post", began publication in 1908.

Warren's father, E.A. Warren, Sr., leased the paper in 1917 and published it until his illness and death in 1925.

During the last years of Warren's operation of the "Post", a second paper, "The Garza County News,"

began publication. With his father publishing the paper in Post, Eddie did the same in Southland.

In 1924 Eddie established "The Southland Sun" in the growing community of Southland and published it until November, 1925, when Eddie moved to Post and helped with "The Post" when his father became ill.

Following the elder Warren's death, his widow Eva Warren and her stepson, Eddie, tried to purchase the "Post" paper from the owner, H.B. Murray, but a price could not be agreed on.

With the outcome in mind of not being able to purchase the "Post", Eddie

TEXCEL Group Plans for Future

"We hope to be ready to catch the fall rains of 1990," Lubbock City Water Engineer Sam Wahl told Post's TEXCEL water committee last week in a meeting here.

Wahl said that a contract for engineering work should be ready for the Lubbock City Council to sign in a couple of weeks for work at the Justiceburg lake site.

"In October we should be ready to notify land owners about surveying, and in about 18 months have the land purchased," Wahl added.

The recent agreement between the city of Lubbock and Justiceburg lake site land owners allows for 30 months for the land purchasing.

"We hope to get actual dam site work started in April to September 1988 and be finished by mid-1990, the engineer said.

"We really have appreciated working with land owners, who have all been cooperative and they are

very fine people," Wahl added.

He was at the meeting to discuss water distribution problems and solutions with the Post TEXCEL water committee, which is studying the local system.

When asked about the Post lake development, Wahl said that Lubbock will be working with the White River Municipal Water District on a contract during this year, and that water quality studies will begin in the near future.

WRMW district superintendent Al O'Brien, who was also at the meeting, gave no answer to the question of when construction might begin on the lake just east of Post.

Also attending the meeting was Lubbock planner Jim Bertram, who told the Post committee that a comprehensive plan for the future should be developed in order to determine where growth is most likely to

Declared Unsafe Algerita Walls Falling

Meals for the Garza County Trail Blazers will be served at the Post school cafeteria for the next few weeks, a move brought about by the severe deterioration of the south and west walls of the Algerita building.

The Garza County Heritage Association, owners of

the building, had requested an inspection by engineers last week, following recent heavy rains and observations of the condition of the walls.

Meeting in joint session Monday morning, the Post City Council and Garza County Commissioners' Court heard from Trail Blazer representatives and discussed various options for the temporary housing of the nutrition program.

County Judge Giles Dalby called Post ISD superintendent Bill Shiver, explaining the emergency situation, and after consulting with school cafeteria manager Mrs. Johnnie Willson, Shiver called back saying that temporary use would be okay.

The cafeteria will have to be returned to school use the last week of July, which gives the Trail Blazers a few weeks to work out other arrangements.

Initial estimates of repairing the Algerita to meet minimum safety standards are \$49,357.

Responding to the request from the Heritage Association, engineers from Parkhill, Smith and Cooper of Lubbock inspected the building and reported:

"Two of our structural engineers inspected the above structure May 21, 1986, to evaluate the deteriorating condition of the south end of the building and to evaluate its structural integrity, safety and the need for repairs. A similar inspection was made on October 18, 1983."

"Considerable deterioration has occurred since the 1983 inspection, to the extent that we now consider the south wall, and portions of the east and west walls adjacent to the south wall, to be hazardous and a threat to life safety."

"The south wall could collapse at any time particularly in the presence of a heavy storm or extended period of wet weather."

"We recommend that immediate measures be taken to shore up the portions of the structure that are on the verge of collapse."

"Because of the extreme urgency of the situation, we asked Don Bundock, General Contractor, to visit the site with us Wednesday afternoon, May 21, 1986 to

view the situation, and to prepare an estimate on what it would cost to shore up the structure, to eliminate the life-threatening situations, and then to restore the damaged portions of the structure as soon as funds become available."

"The south wall, the south four feet of the east wall and approximately 30 feet of the west wall need to be removed before they collapse."

The \$49,357 estimate "includes shoring up the existing structure, replacement of defective portions of the west and east walls (including a new foundation), weathering-in of the temporary south wall with a stucco finish, replacement of existing interior finishes at areas where repair work is required, and painting of all new exterior surfaces to the match existing building."

"Also included would be pointing up and patching cracks and voids in the existing masonry work

which does not have to be replaced, and the installation of a concrete apron at the south end of the building."

The engineers also estimated that to get the building up to restored condition would cost approximately \$84,997.

Jack Alexander told the joint group Monday morning that the Heritage Association does not have funds for the repair.

Maxine Earl said she would contact state historical commission representatives in Austin to seek state or federal grants to help repair the building.

Oil Drilling Report

Showing ability to pump 56 barrels of 36-gravity crude per day on an open choke, the No. 104 Slaughter "H" has been completed in the Happy Field, Garza County, 12 miles south of Post. Maynard Oil Co. is the operator. Maynard took the hole to an 8,267-ft bottom. It will produce from an open-hole (unperforated) interval in the

Ellenburger Formation, 8252 to 8,267 feet into the wellbore. An undrilled wildcat location has been abandoned in Garza County, two miles north of Justiceburg. It had been designated as the No 2 Connell, with American Petrofina Inc. as the operator. Murexco Petroleum has given up

on it efforts to make a producer out of a Garza County wildcat venture located five miles west of Justiceburg. Spudded last Dec. 3, the well was known as the No. 1 Bud Alldredge et al. It bottomed with no indicated commerical shows at a depth of 8,194 feet. Perforations in the Mississippian Formation was judged non-commercial. The well has been plugged and abandoned.

The No. 4 Slaughter Estate has been brought on line as a pumping oiler in the Dover Field, Garza County, about 15 miles southwest of Post. The well potentialed at 10 barrels of oil per day along with 10 barrels of salt water. Oil tested at 42-gravity. With Durham Inc. as the operator, the well probed to total depth of 8,424 feet and was plugged back to 8,035. Production will be from a perforated interval in the Strawn Formation, 7,860 to 7,865 feet.

Marshall and Winston Inc. has branded the No. 1-A McGehee as a dry hole at a Garza County wildcat location eight miles northwest of Post. Spudded on Oct. 2 of last year, the well probed to a dry bottom at a depth of 9,194 feet. It has been plugged and abandoned.

A pumping oiler has been brought on line in the Post Field, five miles northeast of Justiceburg, with Wheeler Oil Co. as the operator. It is the No. 13 W.V. Roy, pumping oil at the rate of three barrels per day plus eight barrels of waste water.

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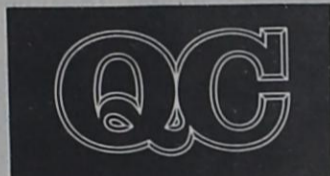

 Eggs Fit Into Dietary Guidelines

The latest revision of the U.S. Dietary Guidelines has some good news for egg lovers.

Many consumers mistakenly think they must avoid or strictly limit cholesterol-containing foods such as eggs in order to prevent heart disease.

The revised dietary Guidelines for Americans, make it clear that saturated fat, total fat and excess calories also play a role.

The Guidelines do recommend that people moderate the use of eggs yolks and organ meats, which are high in cholesterol, but low in fat.

But before eliminating eggs from the diet, it's important to have a physi-

cian determine your level of blood cholesterol.

People with elevated levels may benefit from reductions in dietary cholesterol and fat while those with normal or low levels may not need to be as concerned.

In general, eggs fit into the diets of people who want to adhere to the dietary guidelines of eating a variety of foods and maintaining a desirable weight by getting adequate starch and fiber while avoiding too much fat, sugar, sodium and alcohol.

Most egg dishes incorporate a variety of other foods from the dairy, fruit and vegetable and bread groups.

They are low in calories--with 80 calories for one large egg--and also contain a good level of vitamins and minerals for those calories.

To prepare eggs in ways that will help them best fit the dietary guideline try using non-stick pans and cooking sprays to cut down on fat when cooking.

Poached, soft-cooked or hard cooked eggs require no fat at all for cooking.

bought the lot and built the building for his new newspaper.

The building (which is where the present Dispatch office is) was complete and furnished with the equipment from his Southland paper and by May, 1926 and the first edition rolled out from the press in June of that year.

Soon after his first edition the "Garza County News" went out of business and six months later "The Post" left.

That left the Warrens all to themselves to start a very successful career in

the newspaper business.

"I am the third E.A. Warren in the newspaper business," Eddie proudly proclaimed.

In 1950 Eva retired and sold her half of the "Dispatch" to Eddie and his wife, Pauline.

Eddie had a three year interruption from his newspaper work when WWII came along.

In the early part of 1943 Eddie served as a Naval aerial photographer in the South Pacific.

Until he came home around the end of 1945, Pauline had the reins of the paper.

"If there is another war," Pauline declared, "I am going to go and he (Eddie) can stay and run the paper."

Pauline recalled many problems she faced but said that with the help of the people at the courthouse, the chamber of commerce, and many others, the paper survived.

When Eddie returned home he also returned with a love of photography.

Eddie claims that he probably has the largest selection of photographs of natives in the South Pacific

than anyone.

And his love for photography did not stop when he returned to his paper.

The Warrens will not only be remembered for his weekly paper, which probably received more Texas and West Texas Press Association awards than any other weekly newspaper in the state of Texas, but also for their willingness to get involved in the community and the events around them.

"What ever was going

on," Pauline recalls, "you would find Eddie right in the middle of it."

Eddie helped organize the West Texas Press Association in 1926 and became it's fourth president.

He is also a charter member of many organizations in the area.

In May, 1957, Jim Cornish bought the "Dispatch" and thus ended the Warren era with the paper.

It did not end his continuing to help the city of

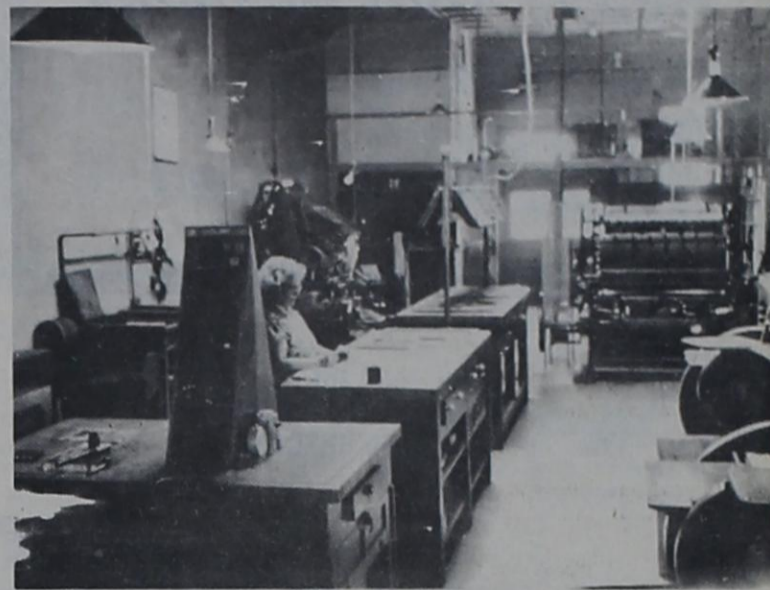
Post as he served several years as City Manager.

But the years that the Warrens talk most about are when they had the paper.

They get a gleam in their eyes and a tone of excitement in their voice as they

talk of all the things that have happened, like it was just yesterday.

They continue to see a good future of the "Dispatch" as it serves the city and county in the never ending service of reporting the news.



Inside The Post Dispatch in its early days.



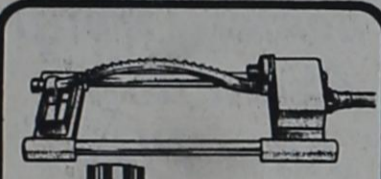
The Post Dispatch as it looked in 1930...four years after the paper opened. (Photo courtesy Eddie Warren)

(Continued from P1) growth has taken place in the past."

"The best way to look to the future," Bertram emphasized, "is to study where

By studying past growth, Bertram said that production on future growth are

much more accurate. He also said the study should include natural barriers to growth, such as railroad tracks, terrain and social aspects.

He strongly urged local governments to prepare zoning ordinances in advance of the anticipated growth due to the two lake developments.

"Val Verde County, near Lake Amistad, is an excellent example," Bertram said, "and I think you are very fortunate that your county commissioners have

already begun the steps to get ordinance controls."

The future demand for water use was also discussed, with O'Brien pointing out that Post uses approximately one million gallons of water a day, and White River could provide as much as three million a day if necessary.

He pointed out that a potential problem is the lack of a back-up water supply, in case the pipeline from White River were to break.

"Post would be completely shut out of water if a problem were to develop," O'Brien emphasized. He said that the old water

well system on top of the caprock had been dismantled after water from White River began arriving to Post.

The low price of water to users in Post was also mentioned as a problem, especially considering that the operational budget of the Post water department is subsidized by general tax revenues.

Comparing to other West Texas cities, Post has the lowest water rates and taxpayers make up approximately \$70,000 a year in tax revenues to offset the costs of water and distribution.

An example of the compa-

rate costs on average to residential customers was provided by Lewis Earl:

The TEXCEL committee is working on proposals to the city for solutions to the water distribution problems in Post.
