Post ISD Trustees Approve May 11 as School Holiday

"We have gone two years without needing our bad weather days," Post ISD superintendent Bill Shiver commented during last week's regular meeting of the board of trustees, and May 11 was approved as a school holiday.

It just so happens that the state track meet will be held that weekend, and hopes are high for Post athletes to be in Austin for the competition.

Trustees also authorized the publication of bids for repair to the elementary school heaters and for renovating athletes' restrooms at the high school gym. "If you think the bids are too high, just reject them," Shiver said.

School architect Bill Stracener will provide a report to the board concerning roof conditions. Shiver reminded trustees that portions of payments to the contractors have been withheld until the board is satisfied that all work has been done properly.

While other school districts across the state may be worrying about how to keep the doors open when and if state funding dries up in May, Post ISD's certificates of deposit that were renewed provide more than adequate funding. Trustees approved renewal of certificates of deposit of \$2,080,52 for 31 days at 7.17 percent, \$1,093,725 for 30 days at 7.07 percent and \$1,270,568 for 31 days at 7.07 percent.

Trustees approved the 1990-91 school calendar, "which I am sure we'll be changing in June again," Shiver added.

American Cancer Society Neighborhood Campaign

"Contributions to the American Cancer Society in Texas represent one of the best returns on the dollar that I know of," said Billie Cross, chairman of the American Cancer Society's 1990 educational and fundraising Community Crusade in Garza County.

In preparing for the April 23 - 28 Community Crusade, Cross feels it is important for Garza County residents to know how the Society invests their contributions. "We are proud of our fiscal record and I know our friends and neighbors will be even more willing to give to the American Cancer Society when they learn how well their money is being spent," she said.

Contributions raised in 1987-88 were invested during this last fiscal year (September 1, 1988 - August 31, 1989) in Texas as illustrated: Cancer Research, 43%; Public Education, 29%; Patient Services, 25%; Professional Education, 10%; Fundraising, 15%; Program Development/Administration, 3% for a total of 125%.

"This 125 percent expenditure reflects increased research spending in Texas by the national American Cancer Society," Cross said. "This means that contributions to the Society are more valuable than our contributors may realize."

"The American Cancer Society is currently sponsoring research investigations in 12 major Texas hospitals, medical schools and universities totaling more than \$10.3 million," said Cross.

"Because so much promising

research is taking place here, the national American Cancer Society allocates additional funds to Texas scientists and institutions," she said.

"Programs that help people are our priority," Cross added. "We keep a tight control over our administrative cost and keep them within acceptable limits, as this breakdown indicates," she said.

American Cancer Society programs like those that benefit cancer patients (Reach to Recovery, volunteer transportation, medical equipment loans, etc.), help educate the public about cancer prevention and detection (films, pamphlets, exhibits, and the Great American Smokeout and this spring's Great American Food Fight Against Cancer), and inform the medical community about advances in cancer treatment and diagnosis are delivered and administered primarily through volunteers.

"Volunteers help maintain these impressive figures, and volunteers are responsible for the success we've had here in Garza County," Cross said. During a discussion concerning a report on pregnancies of high school students, Shiver suggested that the board "might want to look at adding a school nurse." He explained that with 1,050 students, it is difficult for one nurse to provide the kind of care that is expected or best for the students.

"If it benefits our kids, I'm for it," president of the board Jack Kirkpatrick emphasized.

Shiver reported to the trustees that the class action suit which Post ISD joined four years ago has resulted in a payment of \$8,000 and the school district is expected to receive a total of \$24,000 from the lawsuit settlement on asbestos.

"We never expected to receive a penny on this," Shiver added, "so I guess we made a good decision on this one."

When new business came up on the agenda, Kirkpatrick suggested the board consider increasing the compensation for Shiver, which drew a stern and unequivocal negative response from the superintendent.

"I don't need it, it isn't right, and I will not accept more," he emphasized.

"My compensation is in line with this size of school and I could not in good faith accept more, really, the most valuable person in your community is your school teacher. It would be unethical for me to not speak out against an increase of my compensation," he concluded.

Attending the meeting were board members Kirkpatrick, Royce Hart, Pru Basquez, Ronnie Gradine, Jerry Hays and Shiver.

Special Effort Needed to Protect Children from Abuse

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month, and the Garza County Child Welfare Board is using the event to raise public awareness of a nasty problem and one that needs special effort to protect children from abuse.

One of the items being used in this campaign is a little button (see related art work) which emphasizes that words can hurt just as much as physical abuse.

Too often adults blurt out hurtful utterances to children, not realizing that self esteem or the lack of it is even more damaging in the long run than physical hurts.

Children can recover from the sting of a whipping or a slap in the face, but hearing an adult tell them they're no good, or a stupid idiot or other degrading barbs, can last a lifetime.

Educators know all about this, one of the biggest problems they face in helping children is to get beyond the lack of self esteem. If we can teach children to believe in themselves, we can teach them how to learn.

If you think child abuse problems don't exist here, take a look at these statistics:

In the fiscal year 1989 there were 36 investigations of child abuse in Garza County, and a total of 311 in Crosby, Dickens, Garza, Lynn, King, Terry and Yoakum counties.

There are currently 39 children under the protection of the Texas Department of Human Services from these counties.

These children live in foster homes, group homes, residential treatment facilities, and adoptive placement homes all across the state.

The Child Protective Services program is mandated by state law to protect children from abuse and neglect in their families and homes. This program's clients include both the families and the children when the child has been the victim of child abuse or neglect.

Here is the story of just one case in Texas that will illustrate some of the problems we face...

While working on a case, a financial worker in Collin County found a houseful of dirty, hungry, little children.

There was nothing wrong with their mother and father, except that they would get dressed up, leave the children and go into town and eat a steak supper. They never seemed to have enough food to feed their 11 children, though.

Their house was an old tumble-down farmhouse. Inside the parents had nailed some apple boxes to the wall as beds for their twin babies. They had a little cover and a few other possessions.

When the worker came back into town, she went to talk with the county judge. He took immediate action. They got the public health nurse, went out to the farmhouse, gathered up all the children and brought them to town.

They found two of the little boys sitting in an old, unused fireplace. You can imagine those dirty youngsters.

There just weren't any community resources, so there was no place to keep them. The judge said, "Well, I don't know of any place big enough for all of them except the jury room. I know we've got 12 clean beds up there."

The judge authorized hiring a middle-aged practical nurse to stay with the children. She cleaned them up, cut their hair, put them to bed and kept them in the jury room two or three days.

Of course, the father and mother were brought in, and they said, "We don't want to give up our children." But, after a court hearing, the children were removed and placed in foster care.

I sometimes wonder what ever happened to the parents. They left the area and left 11 little ones behind.

This was an example of a financial worker going well beyond the normal requirements of her job and extending social services and protective care to some needy children.

How many Garza County children might we have living in similar circumstances?

If there is one, we need to find that child and take corrective action. That's what this month is all about.

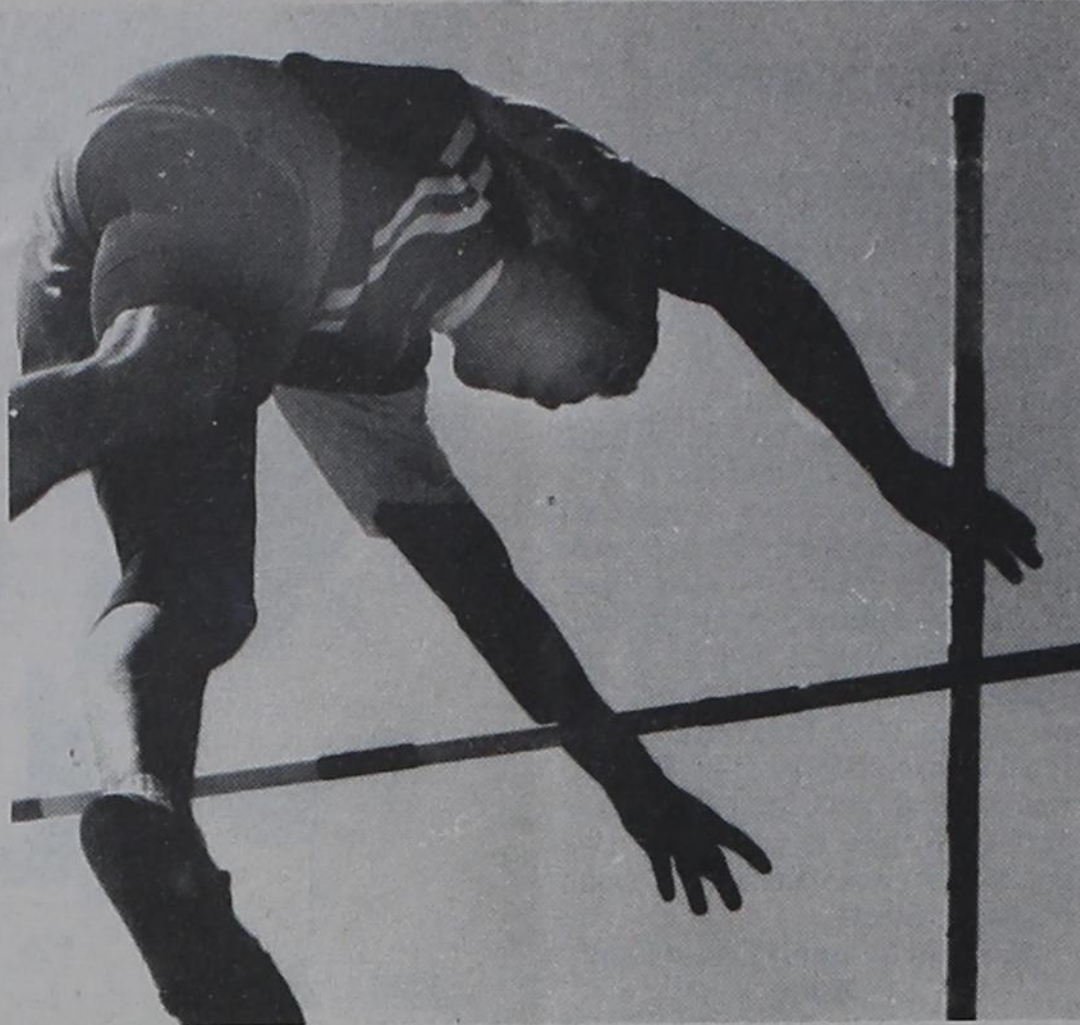
