Commissioners Approve Deferred Compensation Plan

A deferred compensation plan presented by Public Employees Benefit Services Corporation representative Budd W. Taylor was approved by the Garza County Commissioners' Court during the regular meeting Monday morning.

The program, open to any county employee, will provide for a deferred compensation through payroll deduction and provide a tax savings. Taylor explained that the plan is totally voluntary and at no cost to the county or taxpayers. The program is sponsored by the National Association of Counties. Taylor will return to Post in four to six weeks to explain the plan to employees.

In other action, commissioners authorized treasurer Voda Gradine to enter into a continuing contract with the First National Bank in a warrant for Precinct 3 indebtedness. The balance of approximately \$26,000 is being paid for through Precinct 3 revenues. "John (Valdez) has done a good job of getting this balance down," Gradine said. Interest on the warrant is two percent above the county's certificates of deposit rate.

'Hank the Cowdog' Author to Visit Post Schools April 26

Popular writer John R. Erickson will visit Post Thursday, April 26 as part of the National Library Week being observed by the Post school libraries.

Erickson, author of more than 25 books and 500 articles, will be at the Post Elementary school auditorium at 9 a.m. and at Post High School at 11:30 a.m., where copies of his books and tapes will be on sale as well as personal autographs.

Erickson, who was raised in Perryton, took a degree from the University of Texas and was three credit hours from a master's degree a Harvard Divinity School when he decided to return to Texas to write.

While writing four hours a day, he supported his wife and family at a number of odd jobs, including eight years working full time as a ranch cowboy.

After 15 years of trying and failing to get his work published in New York, he founded his own publishing company, Maverick Books, in 1982. It was under Maverick imprint that he began publishing his highly successful Hank the Cowdog Series of books and cassette tapes.

By the spring of 1988, the Hank Series had become so popular that he turned the publishing and store distribution to Texas Monthly Press of Austin. Maverick Books remains a thriving business, concentrating on sales to schools and educators.

His work has appeared in The Dallas Morning News, Dallas Times Herald, Persimmon Hill Magazine, Texas Highways Magazine, The Cattleman Magazine, Western Horseman and other publications.

He is a member of the Texas Institute of Letters, the Philosophical Society of Texas, and the Book Publishers of Texas. In 1985 he received a Cultural Achievement Award from the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and in 1988 his book "Hank the Cowdog and the Case of the Halloween Ghost" received the Oppenheimer Award as the best humor book of the year.

Erickson has been the subject of numerous articles and interviews, including a segment on Bob Phillips' "Texas Country Reporter". In 1985 his first "Hank the Cowdog" book was made into a 30 minute animated television segment on "CBS Storybreak" and has aired on national television eight times.

In March 1989 television station KLRU, a PBS affiliate in Austin, aired an hour-long program of music from the Hank Series. The concert was recorded in the same studio and with the same crew that produces the popular "Austin City Limits" program on PBS.

Erickson devotes full time to his writing and speaking chores, and lives in Perryton with his wife of 22 years, Kristine, and their three children Scot, Ashley and Mark.

Copies of the hardback books sell for \$10, paperback for \$5 and cassette tapes, ready by Erickson, for \$10.

ance with the Texas Association of Counties, which administers the compensation plan.

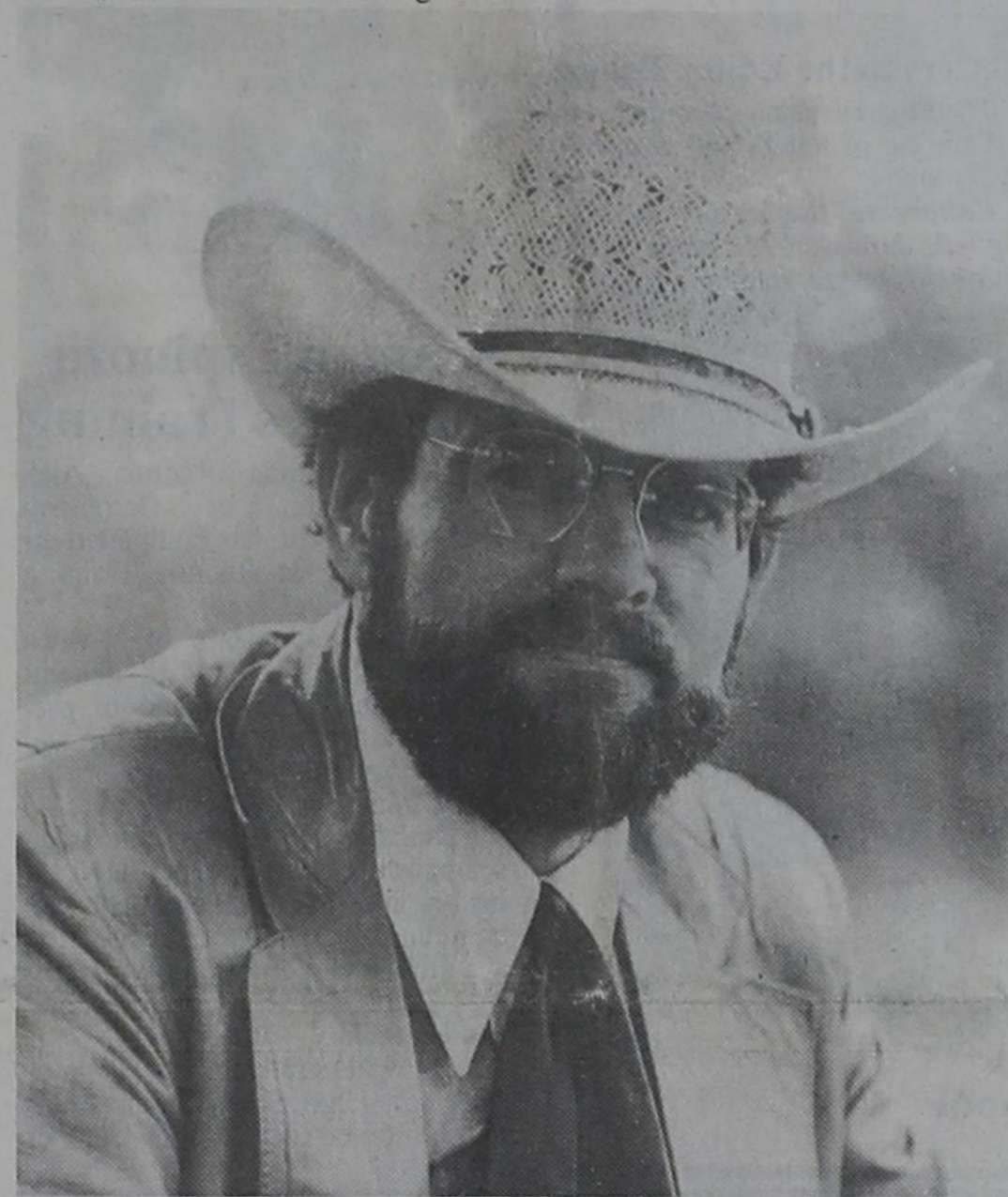

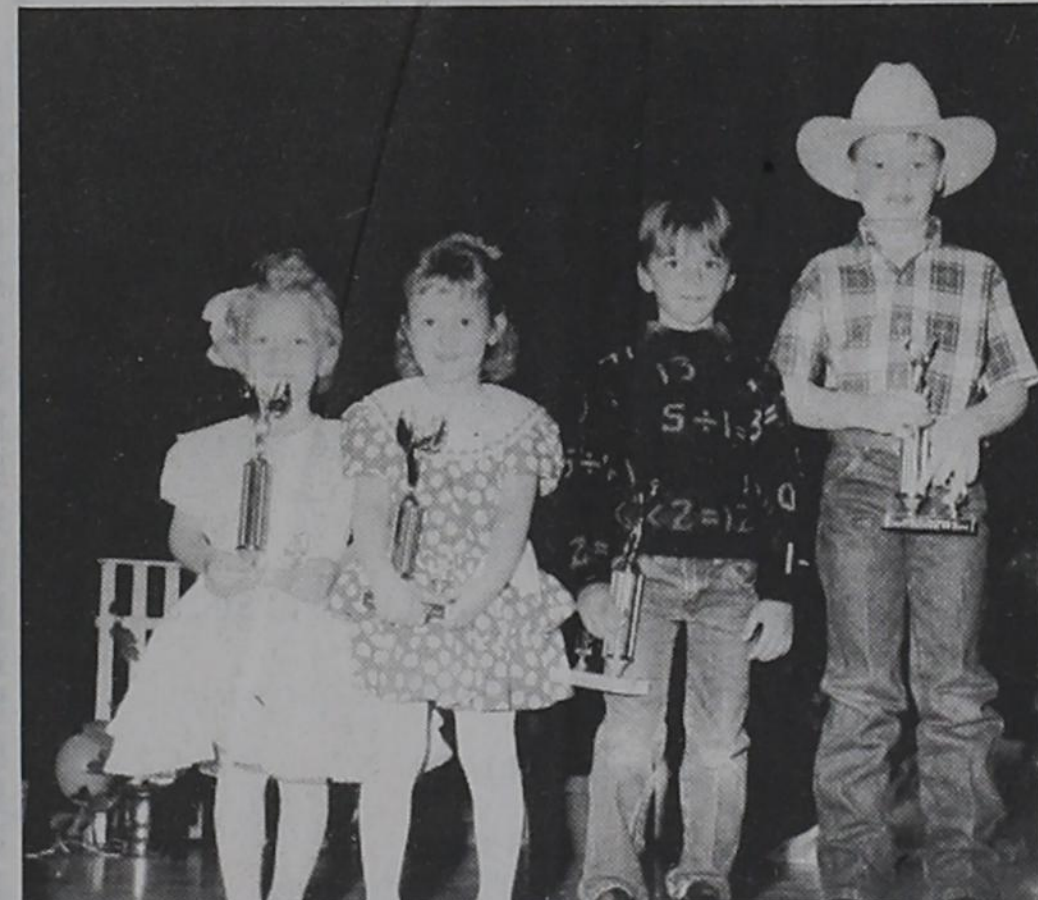

After some discussion, commissioners requested Gradine to get a list from the sheriff as to which employees each of the items went to, so that deductions could be made on each individual's uniform allowance. The total amount of the purchase, according to the invoice, was \$245.08.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Sammy Ellis, Ted Aten, John Valdez, Herbert Walls and Judge E.A. Howard.

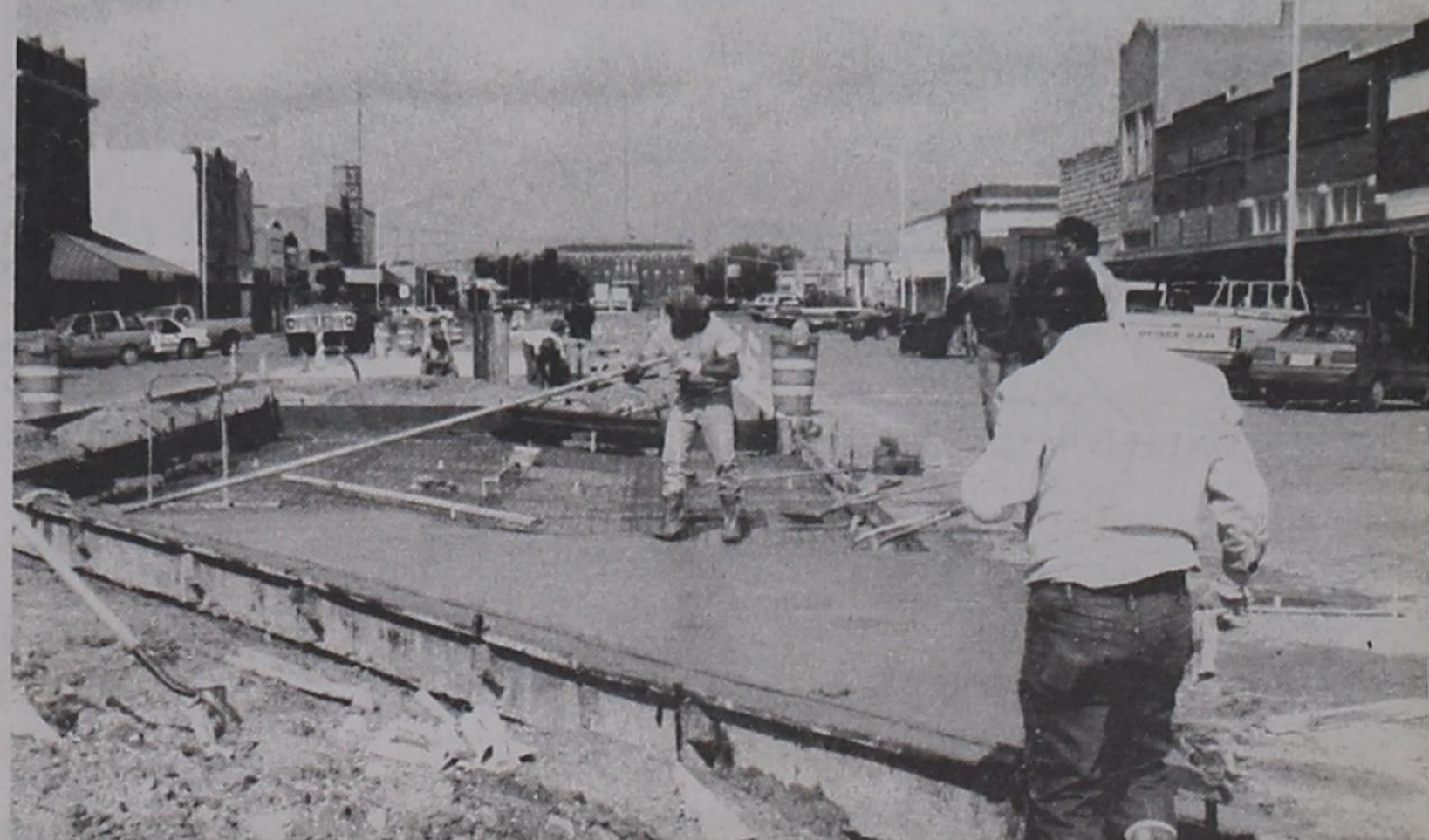

Relief for PMS Symptoms

PMS stands for premenstrual syndrome - a group of emotional, physical, and behavioral symptoms that affect many women. Specific symptoms include, but are not limited to, depression, anger, irritability, breast tenderness, headache, bloating, and changes in normal sleep patterns and appetite. Nondrug approaches to PMS include dietary changes, exercise, stress reduction techniques, and family member support.

Prescription medicines: Progesterone and oral contraceptive medicines have been used to modify or delay the menstrual cycle. Pain relievers such as naproxen and mefenamic acid decrease the production of prostaglandins - substances which may be in excess when PMS symptoms occur. Diuretics such as spironolactone may help control the bloating and breast pain that often occur just prior to menstruation. Tricyclic antidepressants such as nortriptyline may help ease premenstrual depression.

Nonprescription medicines: Aspirin, acetaminophen, and ibuprofen provide relief of pain. Pyridoxine (vitamin B-6) is included in some nonprescription medicines based on the theory that this vitamin suppresses the production of prolactin, a hormone found in high levels in some PMS sufferers.

Some Gardeners Planted Tomatoes Early

Spring is here -- MAYBE!!! The early birds who planted tomato plants will get to plant them again, but don't worry, the same people that you bought from will have more for sale.

Be wise and watch the soil and air temperature.

Plant tomato, pepper, and egg-plant when the soil at the four-inch depth is at least 60-65 degrees F.

To warm the soil and thereby increase the growth rate of roots, make raised beds and cover the soil with black plastic mulch.

Immediately after planting, install plastic wrapped cages over the plants to increase air temperature and relative humidity while preventing wind damage.

Plastic wrapped cages protect tomatoes from attack of the beet leafhopper and thrips insect.

Later in April when the soil warms up plant squash, cucumbers, muskmelons, watermelons, and okra.

Wait until the soil is 65-70 degrees F. to plant the vine crops, blackeyes and pintos.

Gardens can be fun for the family and help in the curtailment of cost during the year.

Remember to be a good neighbor and when your garden really starts to load up and is making more than your family needs, give the excess to some one who does, they will appreciate it and you will feel better too.

PCCA Announces Sign-In Deadline

Plains Cotton Cooperative Association (PCCA) officials have announced April 30 is the last day cotton producers can sign up for the coop's textile mill option program.

All members who market their cotton through the coop are eligible to share in the mill's earnings by agreeing to a \$5 per bale retain which will be returned to the member after five years.

PCCA's Denim Mill in Littlefield, Texas is the only farmer-owned textile mill in the world. In the past two years, it has returned average earnings of \$9.59 per bale in cash and book credits.

Producers can sign up or get additional information at their local coop gin.

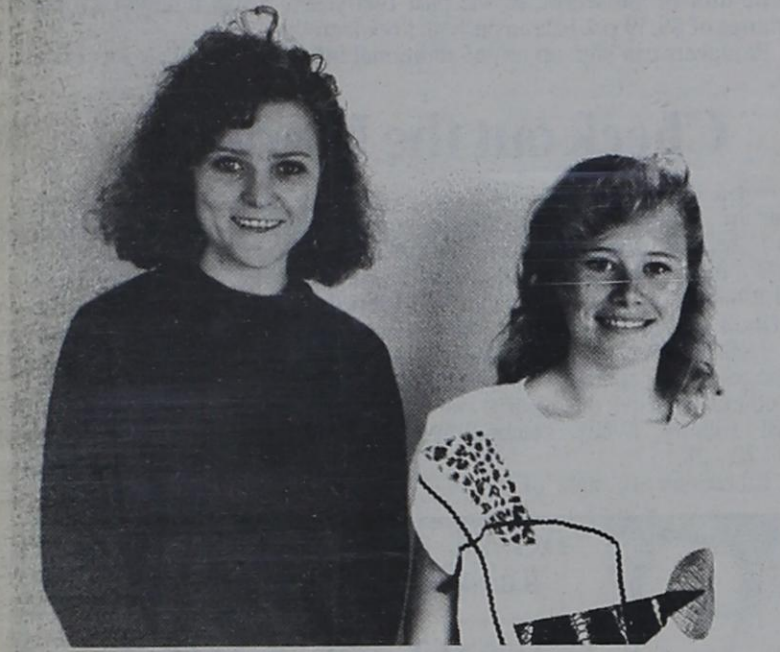
