
Horn To Serve

If legal questions can be answered adequately, a new industry for Post may be in operation by next fall, producing a variety of non-woven cotton products by Cotton Unlimited Inc., and employing up to 60 people.

Post Economic Development Corp. chairman Giles Dalby introduced Coton Unlimited Inc. president Joe Pate to the Post City Council at the regular neeting Monday night, explaining the manufacturing plans and outlining a proposal for the city to lease equipment and then sub-lease the equipment to the company.

"A new economic development law passed by the state legislature provides a way for cities to assist new industries," Dalby explained, "and with the city easing the equipment a substantial savings would make the start-up viable ... plus, the city would not be out any expense, as the manufacturer would sub lease the equipment."

Pate showed samples of the products to council members and explained the more than two years of research which has been dedicated to getting the product ready for manufacturing. Among the samples included insulation for buildings and homes, and oil slick absorbant, horse blanket and special batting for heating and air conditioning ducts.

All the materials are fire proof, and to prove his point, Pate and business associate Paul Muncrief of Las Cruces, N.M. put a flame from a cigarette lighter to the material ... which turned black but would not sustain the flame.

"Testing has been done by Eastman Kodak and at Texas Women's University," Pate said, "we wanted to go to the best in this field to make sure we are on the right track.'

A Boston testing firm conducted a test of the insulation material and declared it meeting the highest of standards, especially for the weight. "It will match up with fiber glass, and the lighter weight makes it much more efficient," Pate added.

Pate told council members that the equipment is ready to be leased and could be on site within a short period of time, with production to begin as early as September. Plans call for using portions of the Postex Plant building. The PEDC board of directors was to meet Tuesday afternoon with Wright Fibers Inc. and Pate to work out details of building use, so that both new industries could be accommodated.

McCrary emphasized.

Although no specific plans are drawn, it appears that Post will have to ship garbage to a regional landfill, either at Brownfield or Snyder.

This will require the purchasing of specialized equipment and trucks to haul the garbage.

"It looks like our residential customers will end up paying as much as \$18 a month for sanitation service," McCrary added. He also said early estimates indicate sanitation costs will triple.

After a lengthy discussion about the problems and costs of the new federal regulations, McCrary recommended an incremental increase in sanitation rates, "which should soften the shock of these higher rates." He also insisted that the additional revenues be placed in a specially marked fund to be dedicated for the purchase of new equipment when the city is required to make the changes.

Council member Larry Waldrip slowed down the first reading of the rate increase, which would take effect in June, by requesting and getting clarification about the dedication of the additional revenues. After discussion and agreement that the money would be set aside to fund the necessary equipment, the vote to approve the incremental rate increase of 33 1/3 percent was approved unanimously.

'We will need to educate our people about this problem and somehow we're going to have to find better ways to cut down the volume of our sanitation," McCrary said.

The city currently handles approximately 4,000 tons of garbage a year.

The day of the "throw-away" society may be doomed. The implications of the new procedures are wide ranging and few people realize how much their lives are going to change when the federally mandated rules begin to be applied.

The city's participation in the project would save several thousand dollars on sales tax and four to five percent on interest payments.

There's just something about the way Will McCrary puts it all together at the Garza Theatre that keeps us coming back for more.







In the petition, assigned Docket No. 9453, Brazos Electric requests waiver of the obligation to sell retail power to qualifying cogeneration and small power production facilities ("Of's") and the Members seek a waiver of their obligations to purchase power directly from OFs. These obligations are contained in PUC Substantive Rule 23.66(d)(1)(A) and 23.66(d)(2), as well as 18 C.F.R. 292.303(a) and (b).

The proposed waivers will not impair the ability of QFs to sell electric capacity and energy or to purchase electric capacity and energy. In the territory served by Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members (63 counties throughout Texas), Brazos Electric will assume the obligation for all purchases of QF generated electricity and the Members will assume all obligations for sales to QFs of capacity and energy. Only duplicate obligations which would otherwise be applicable to both Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members are proposed to be eliminated.

Reciprocal waivers of the type requested by Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members have recently been granted by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. The proposed waivers will not discourage cogeneration and small power production. Members' avoided cost can never be more than Brazos Electric's avoided cost because the Members purchase all of their wholesale power requirements from Brazos Electric.

The proposed waivers are subject to approval by the PUC. Inflammatory Bowel Diseases

As many as 2 million Americans suffer from either of two major inflammatory diseases of the bowel or intestine. These two conditions – *ulcerative colitis* and *Crohn's disease* – can occur at any age, most often affecting individuals between ages 12 and 18.

Inflammatory bowel diseases often cause fever, cramps, weight loss and "bloody" diarrhea. Although the exact reason for bowel inflammation is unknown, some health experts believe a toxic or infectious material triggers an immune response that ultimately results in a painful and swollen intestine. The swelling may become so pronounced that it becomes difficult for waste materials to pass to the rectum.

Prescription steroids, such as prednisone, may relieve inflammation. Because of the potential side effects, oral steroids should be used with caution. Topical application of steroids such as beclomethasone, is accomplished through the use of steroid enemas. Other prescription medicines which have shown to be effective in the relief of bowel inflammation include sulfasalazine, 5-ASA, and ACTH. Diarrhea, if present, may be treated with diphenoxylate and loperamide. If anemia becomes a problem, iron and folic acid supplements may be needed.



Cracking the four minute mark at Abilene will give the Lady 'Lopes an important edge as they continue to improve their times.






