Land Appraiser to Set Values on Justiceburg Property

Appraisal of land values on right-of-way for the highway construction at Justiceburg was approved by the Garza County Commissioners' Court at the regular meeting Monday morning. The firm of W.M. Noble, MAI, Real Estate Appraiser, Brownfield, was the only bidder. His fee was an estimate of \$2,500 to \$3,500. State law requires the court to determine land values from a certified appraiser. The property is 30 feet wide for 4.9 miles of right-of-way on the road to be constructed to the Lake Alan Henry dam site.

Commissioners also voted to approve the purchase of microfiche equipment to be used in document storage and archiving. County Clerk Sonny Gossett explained that the re-built equipment carries a one year warranty and the

\$9,500 cost is one half that of new equipment. Commissioners authorized Judge E.A. Howard to advertise for bids for

grounds maintenance at the courthouse. The contract will be let June 11. County attorney Preston Poole informed the commissioners that state law does not allow counties of less than 20,000 population to administer payroll deductions for credit unions. Commissioners had approved a plan for employees last month. Employees may participate in the credit union, but the treasurer will not be able to withhold deductions, employees will have to contribute to the credit union directly.

Treasurer Voda Beth Gradine presented the monthly financial statement, commissioners approved paying of bills and set the next meeting for the second Monday in June. The court will not meet May 28, Memorial Day.

Sales Tax Rebate Down 3.44% from 1989

The City of Post has received a check for \$14,542.75 from the State Comptroller, representing the city sales and use tax for the sales in March and reported in April. The total year to date payment of \$63,879.66 is down 3.44 percent from the 1989's \$66,156.23.

The latest rebate is down 18.89 percent from last year's \$17,929 for the same

reporting period. State wide the sales tax rebates showed an increase of 7.27 percent.

Other area cities and their rebates in the report showed Slaton with \$20,817.54, down 3.56 percent for the year; Tahoka at \$8,091.11, down 8.37 percent and Crosbyton at \$8,799.70, an increase of 6.24 percent for the year.

TEC Reports 4.1% Unemployment Rate in Garza County, Lowest in Years

The unemployment rate in Garza County, according to a report form the Texas Employment Commission, is 4.1 percent, the lowest in years.

"With the numbers this good, it ought to feel better than it does," TEC Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers said in reference to the statewide unemployment rate that places the Texas jobless rate at the lowest level in more than five

In Garza County the report, for the period ending March 1990, showed a total of 1,966 in the labor force with 1,886 employed and 80 unemployed.

"One year ago the jobless rate in Texas was 6.8 percent, and the last time we

Post School Trustees Elect Officers, Study Appointment

The Post Independent School District board of trustees, at the regular meeting Tuesday, May 8, postponed action on a decision to appoint a new board member to fill the unexpired term of board president Jack Kirkpatrick, who did not seek re-election to Place 6. The matter was placed on the agenda for the June meeting.

Trustees elected Royce Hart to serve as president, Dan Hodges as vice president and Ronnie Gradine as secretary.

Newly elected school board member Gary Workman attended the meeting. but by law could not vote pending filing of official oaths of office to the Texas Secretary of State.

The board canvassed voting from the recent election, with Hart receiving 192 votes, Workman 173 and Mike Tomlinson 61.

A recommendation to accept the resignation of Florene King was approved, as Superintendent Bill Shiver informed the board that Mrs King is planning to retire after 31 years of service. Board members presented a certificate of appreciation for Mrs King, "a well deserved recognition," Hart said.


Hart also recommended and the board approved hat special plaques of appreciation be presented to former board members Don Payne, Jack Kirkpatrick and Tom Middleton for their years of service. The presentation is to be made at the next meeting.

The board approved the renewal of three certificates of deposit: \$2,021,789 for 30 days at 6.95 percent; \$1,207,392 for 32 days at 7.0 percent and \$1,088,555 for 30 days at 7.0 percent interest.

Lubbock Audio Visual presented the lowest bid for a video recorder system for the athletic department. The bid of \$11,248.40 was approved. The equipment is to replace the use of photographic film and will be compatible with area schools whose coaching staffs exchange film. "The video equipment will be used by both the girls and boys' athletic programs," Shiver informed the board.

Shiver reported to the board that he had recently completed personal interviews with all teachers, principals and counselors and is compiling a list of 365 ideas and proposals that were suggested by the staff for improving the educational effort in the district.

Medicines, Sunlight, and Photosensitivity

Several medicines are capable of causing skin reactions referred to as photosensitivities. There are two types of photosensitivities. The more common type is called phototoxicity. Phototoxic reactions are thought to occur when exposure to the sun or ultraviolet rays, such as those produced by tanning beds, causes a release of energy from the medicine. This reaction, which may occur following a few minutes of exposure, often results in acute redness and localized swelling.

The second type of photosensitivity is called photoallergy. This is an allergic response that requires at least one previous exposure to the sensitizing medicine. Photoallergies may cause an immediate redness to the skin or a delayed inflammatory response to sunexposed areas of the skin.

A partial list of medicines which may be involved in photosensitivities include diuretics, the tetracyclines, oral diabetes medicines, antidepressants (e.g., amitriptyline and desimpramine), and certain anticancer medicines, such as methotrexate. Topical acne medicines (e.g., benzoyl peroxide and tretinoin) and topical psorosis medicines (e.g., coal tar) may cause the most severe reactions because they also dry the skin.

Lady Lopes Win Gold, Bronze at State Meet

The Post varsity girls' relay teams brought home gold and bronze medals following last Saturday's competition at the Class AAA State Track Meet in Austin's Memorial Stadium, as the foursome won first place in the 800 meter relay event and third in the 400 meters.

Dana Morris, Megan Bush, Crystal Clay and Sara Alexander endured the 100 plus degree heat on the stadium floor, using their stamina and conditioning to take the 800 event.

Their day was marred and plans for winning the overall team championship went sailing in the air, however, in the 1600 meter event.

Going into that final race, the Post girls had collected 32 points and needed only a second place finish to win the team championship trophy. The only other team in contention for the title entered in the 1600 meter relay, Daingerfield, needed at least a third to win.

Alexander shot out of the blocks and as she ran through the final steps, handing the baton to Bush, a gasp went through the stands as Alexander stretched but could not get the baton to Bush. Turning back, Bush grabbed the baton and took off, trailing in third place.

As she finished her lap, Bush had her arm extended to pass the baton to Morris, just as another competitor to Bush's right fell down on the track right in front of her. Bush twisted and managed to avoid the fallen runner, but the split second change put Morris at a disadvantage going into the third lap.

She raced ahead of the third place runner on the first turn and into the straight away Morris was edging closer for a challenge at second place. On the final turn the Daingerfield runner, coming up from behind, scooted around Morris right side. Morris was holding the baton in her right hand. Running stride for stride, there was a collision, the baton flew high into the

air and bounced off the track...and Morris stood stunned, glaring at the Daingerfield runner. At the finish line Crystal Clay turned, looked, waited, and when it was

evident Morris was not coming around the corner, the referee moved Clay out of the lanes. It was a rotten way to end a magnificent season, but as track fans know, those

mishaps at one time or another are bound to happen. Although there were many questions about the collision, the official ruling

from the curve judges was that there was no infraction. Cuero won the 1600 meter event in a time of 4:03.7, Marlin was second with a time of 4:04.5, Columbus third with 4:05.4 and Daingerfield came in fourth

Daingerfield won the team trophy with 47 points. They won the 400 meter event in a time of 48.1, followed by Bonham with 48.2 and Post with a time of 48.4.

In the 800 meter event the Post girls took the lead early and were only challenged seriously on the last leg, as Crystal Clay put on an extra boost of

energy in the final 100 meters. In both the 400 and 800 meter events baton exchanges by the Lady 'Lopes

were executed as they have all year. No amount of consoling could erase the tears and distraught emotions of the four relay team members following the 1600 meter event, as they realization of not being able to finish the race set in.

Post fans could point with pride to the girls, who maintained their sportsmanlike character throughout the event.

'Buckle Up America' Week May 21 - 28

May 21 - 28, including Memorial Day Weekend, has been declared "Buckle Up America!" week. This is the fifth year this program has been promoted by the U.S. Department of Transportation and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. In the past years while this program has been in effect, records indicate utilization rate has increased from 11% in 1982 to as high as 73% in 1989. Texas is leading the nation in seatbelt usage. Programs such as this increase our survival chances by a minimum of

40% and in some cases by 70%. The goals of this year's Awareness Week are to increase the correct use of safety belts and child safety seats and to expand public awareness of how automatic crash protection systems work. The nation is working to achieve 70% and high safety belt use as quick as possible. In November 1989, a survey in Lubbock indicated a 69.3% usage rate. This program also offers a 70% plus honor roll which is a recognition program to honor states, organizations, cities, counties, companies, schools, etc that have reached 70 percent and higher safety belt use. This program supports President Bush's objective to reaching 70 percent safety belt use by the year 1992.







As you may know, Dr Tom Hutton will be moving from his full time faculty position at the Health Sciences Center to enter private practice in the Lubbock commu-

We want to thank Tom for his many years of outstanding service to the University and our community and wish him well in his new venture.

I am taking this occasion to thank you for your generous support and to assure you of our continuing commitment to the development of Centers of Excellence in both Alzheimer's and Parkinson's disease.

The renovations are nearly completed for our new clinic which will be substantially expanded to provide much needed additional space for patient testing and family counselling. We also have new research laboratories that are in the process of being equipped and staffed. The research will focus upon the search for the cause and cure of Alzheimer's and Parkinson's disease. Thus, approximately 4,000 square feet of space will have been added to our facilities this

Professors Shirley Poduslo, from Johns Hopkins University, and Frank Denaro, from University of California San Diego Medical Center, have joined the department and have initiated their research in the newly formed Institute of Aging. We have recruited the clinical faculty and support staff to form an interdisciplinary care team to improve the care of Alzheimer's and Parkinson's patients. Alzheimer's care teams are planned for each regional campus of TTUHSC and will thus reach out to help patients and their families in all of West Texas. A new Tarbox Parkinson's Disease Clinic is being started at the Odessa Regional Academic Health Center.

In further development of the Neurology Department, we have

increased the number of neurology residents to six (as of July, 1990) to help care for our patients. In addition, we have established as a requirement that all medical students at each campus undergo a rotation which will extend their clinical education in Alzheimer's and Parkin-

son's diseases. Finally, we have also expanded our public information, education, and referral program to include all of West Texas. I invite you to visit us and become acquainted with our faculty and staff at the Alzheimer's and Parkinson's Institutes of TTUHSC, tour our laboratories, and talk to our physicians, scientists and staff. We welcome your input and thank you for your continued interest and support.
