# Parade tomorrow sets Annual Post Stampede Rodeo into high gear

## Lots of interest generated in 50th Anniversary event

The 50th Anniversary of the Post Stampede Rodeo opens tomorrow with the 5:30 p.m. Rodeo Parade in downtown Post, followed by three days of rodeo events. Trophies and cash awards will be presented to top floats and parade entries. Bill Carlisle will head the parade as grand marshall.

Rodeo shows begin at 8 p.m. sharp with the grand entry at 7:45 p.m., featuring "Hoss Fly Clown" Tommy Atchinson nightly. Each night a ticket holder will be the winner of a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond, with the drawing to be held sometime during the rodeo. Savings bonds for the drawing are being donated by Ammons Printing and Office Supplies and the Post Stampede Rodeo Association.

The TCRA Approved rodeo will also feature three big dances on the covered slab, with music by Jody Nix.

Producer of the rodeo will be Terry Walls of Stephenville.

# At-large Council election process may face alterations

Council elections may change to geographic alignment

City attorney Harvey Morton told Post city council members at the regular meeting Monday night that sooner or later the method of electing council members will probably change, either through litigation or through council planning.

"It's better if the council begins planning for the change now," Morton said, "than to wait until a law suit is filed." Morton explained that the current method of electing council members at large, if challenged in court, would almost certainly result in forcing a change in the election process.

"If you lose a court challenge, you have to pay the attorney's fees and cost of the plaintiff's litigation," he warned the council.

A realignment of the council election process, according to recent U.S. Department of Justice rulings in these type of cases, would require council representatives to be determined on a geographic basis, following a review of

the U.S. Census Bureau statistics. The federal courts have upheld in the past that city council elections must provide equal representation for minorities in a community, and that at-large elections do not satisfy the constitutional requirement.

Council members agreed to study the situation, although no definite plans

for reviewing the election process were established.

In other action, the council approved the Code of Ordinances and the final reading of the new "skateboard and bike ordinance," which restricts riding coasting vehicles on sidewalks in the commercial district.

An expansion of the Main Street landscaping project was also discussed, with a consensus that exact costs be determined for the work on West Main Street. Mayor Giles McCrary explained that between \$12,000 to \$15,000 of privately funded donations have already been committed for the cash expense of the project, and that by contracting with local resources, with a considerable savings being realized.

The landscaping on West Main Street would follow the original plans, with

cash outlays coming from private sources.

The mayor informed the council that at a Texas Municipal League meeting in Austin last week he learned about a move by unions to force local referendums on cities to place employees into civil service category. The TML has resisted

City manager Bob Turner told the council that a public hearing will be held in Lubbock August 13 by the Texas Water Commission to outline the state's water plan for 1990. Turner said the report he received specifically mentions the Lake Alan Henry and Post Reservoir as water projects to be built, which will satisfy the water demands and future needs of Lubbock.

Turner also informed the council that an all time low in fines were recorded by the Municipal Court in July, with only \$307 being collected. This followed a discussion concerning budget requests by the Sheriff's Department and a planned meeting by the law enforcement committee.

Water customers in Post recorded an all-time high in a one-month period from June 15 to July 15, with a total of 37,850,650 gallons of water being pumped from White River to Post.

The daily average was 1,261,688 gallons and the peak day was July 3 with 1,563,280 gallons.

The current usage is down considerably with only 612,768 gallons on average since July 16.

A review of the proposed budget for next year revealed a consensus that the effective calculated tax rate, based on the Appraisal District's property evaluations, would be approximately three percent above last year. A public hearing will be held prior to final approval of the budget, which goes into effect October

# Slaton man apparently dies from electrocution

Brent Oden, a 27 year old employee at A-Rock Materials, died Friday afternoon, August 3 following what was an apparent electrical accident at the gravel pit site north of Post on Texas Hwy 207.

Employees at the site attempted to revive Oden, as did members of the Post EMS, who arrived at the scene at approximately 1:10 p.m. The Garza County Sheriff's Department was notified at 1 p.m.

An investigation by the Mine Safety and Health Administration is continu-

ing into the incident. Those on the scene reported that Oden appeared to have activated a conveyer belt electrical switch. He was found lying on the ground near the electrical box. A prelimary autopsy report indicates Oden died from possible electrocution. He was the grandson of Edna Oden of Post.

# Bingo tax down 22.7% for Post

The city allocation on the two percent local tax on legalized charity bingo for the period May 2 to July 31, 1990 reflecting a year-to-date decrease of 22.7 percent, according to the recent report by the State Comptroller's Office.

The net payment for the period to Post was \$692.61, compared to \$1,098.23 for the same period in 1989. The total tax returned to the city this year is \$2,554.10, compared to \$3,305

Bingo is regulated by the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, and is sponsored locally by the Post Chamber of Commerce as a charitable game. The two percent local tax levy is based on the games' gross receipts.

#### **Prevention & Removal** of Excess Ear Wax

The accumulation of excess cerumen or ear wax occurs in many individuals. Wax may accumulate due to overactive wax producing glands, narrow or curved ear canals, or secretion of a wax that is either harder or softer than normal. Ear wax may become impacted and will be difficult to remove when it is pushed deep into the ear canal. Generally, there is no wax in the inside half of the ear canal unless it has been pushed there.

The best approach to excess ear wax is to go to a physican for professional removal of the wax with the proper instruments. Do not attempt to remove the wax with a cotton-tipped stick applicator or swab. Wax pushed next to the ear drum can cause loss of hearing. Also, accumulated wax may trap water inside the ear, producing problems during the warm summer months when many indiviudals go swimming.

In some instances, accumulation of wax in the external portion of the ear canal can be prevented. Many nonprescription wax-softening products contain propylene glycol or glycerin. Other wax-softening substances include olive oil, mineral oil, and diluted hydrogen peroxide solution. After the wax has been softened, it should be removed by gently irrigating the ear canal with warm water, using a rubber ear syringe.

# Youth and senior citizens map intergenerational exchange

A plan to build bridges across the generation gap in 20 South Plains counties and improve the quality of life for both youths and rural senior citizens has come off the drawing board and gone into construction

The project is Youth Exchanging with Seniors (Y.E.S.) Its goal is to promote positive intergenerational relationships between youth and seniors by providing assisted-living services that enhance independent lifestyles of the elderly in rural com-

Y.E.S. is a cooperative effort of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, the Texas Tech College of Home Economics and the South Plains District of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, an agency of Texas A&M University System.
It will link members of 4-H Clubs

and Future Homemakers of America with senior citizens in Bailey, BorCrosby, Dawson, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Lubbock, Parmer, Scurry, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum counties.

It is a model program, funded principally with a \$254,000 grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the nation's largest health care philanthropy. It is intended as a pilot effort which can be duplicated across the nation.

Co-directors of the project are Dr Sheryl Boyd, assistant chairman for development in the Department of Internal Medicine and associate professor of health organization manage-ment, TTU HSC; Dr Betty Stout, assistant professor of Home Economics Education in Texas Tech University's College of Home Economics, and Dr Kathy Volanty, South Plains District Director for Home Economics with the Extension Serv-

A Community Appreciation Coffee

The program was initiated (July 18-20) with a summer institute at the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center which provided two-and-a-half days of training for adults and a day-and-a-half for teens. More than 100 high school Home Economics teachers, County Extension Agents for Home Economics and senior citizens and some 20 youthful 4-H and FHA members from the 20 counties took part. Participating from Garza County were Sharla Wells, Economics teacher at Post High School; Stephanie Palmer representing Post FHA; Labeth Jones representing Garza County 4-H; and Katie Wolf, Garza County Extension Agent -Home Economics.

"This institute is not just about the Y.E.S. Project, it's about aging," Volanty told the participants. It included such topics as understanding aging processes, myths about aging, the project structure, existing serv-

ices, involving youth and seniors, strategies for community involvement and support, fostering business skills of participants, county planning

and program implementation. "The two best resources we have in our rural communities are our youth and our elders. This is matching them up," Boyd said.

Institute trainees will form the nucleus of county resource teams which will coordinate efforts in each county. Teams will include an Extension Service Home Economist, a high school Home Economics teacher, and a health care professional or senior

In the next two months, these teams will enlist a variety of community volunteers from business, health care and civic organizations to teach the youth service providers and match them with seniors requesting services. Seniors will also work with





#### Living on the Edge of the Cap

by Lee Howard County Agent - Agriculture Summer Gardening, Part I

"Heat wave" hardly does justice to what our plants and we have been through this summer so far. Three solid weeks of 100-degree weather in June put plants, water systems and gardeners under extreme stress. We can look forward to a long late summer and fall with much better temperatures for vegetable growth.

Iron deficiency is showing up in many landscapes and gardens. Extreme heat in June has made the interveinal yellowing of leaves more severe than usual. Iron treatment of soil and plants is helpful. Iron 138 chelate is the most efficient iron source for our region.

Intensley hot and dry weather stresses vegetable plants and favors spider mites and aphids. Mites start and proliferate on the underside of oldest leaves nearest the soil whereas aphids multiply quickest on tender growing tips at the top of plants. To test for mites tap a suspect leaf on a white or very dark surface. Light colored specks that move are mites.

Washing leaf surfaces and rose buds with a moderately forceful stream of water is often enough to dislodge aphids and mites. If you need to spray to control these insects, first scare the bees and other pollinators, lacewings, tiny wasps, lady bugs and other beneficials off plants by tapping branches.
They'll return when the spray has dried and is less toxic to them.
Summer Gardening, Part II
If your annuals look "stressed out"

beyond reasonable rejuvenation you can start over. Replant with potted transplants of: ageratum, dwarf fi-brous-rooted begonias, coleus, impatiens, cosmos, marigold, petunia, periwinkle, portulaca, and zinnia just to name a few. Some kinds will come from seed but time is too short for a long period of bloom enjoyment be-fore frost. Nurseries are taking fall gardening more seriously and con-tinuing to stock good plants, in pots and packs. Impatiens thrive in shade with good indirect light.

virtues of vinca (periwinkle). Hot weather tolerance, continuous blooming, bright clear colors, pastels, and whites are among its virtues. Vinca seems to thrive on heat. You might say it is fireproof, almost. Vinca does best in full sun.

You might like to try a new kind of plant, that grows very well on the High Plains. Look for Firebush plants in the nurseries. Firebush has grown very well and will behave as an annual here — it is not cold tolerant but is well worth the expense for the spectacular display of blooms it presents all summer.

Severe winter injury to Bermuda grass turf is widespread. Bare patches and weak growth are common complaints. Adequate irrigation and nitrogen fertilization are important to encourage regrowth. Before topdressing lawn with nitrogen, irrigate. Then apply nitrogen at the rate of one pound of the element per 1,000 square feet of lawn. To get this rate of nitrogen apply slightly over two pounds of urea (45-0-0) per 1,000 square feet every month until early September.

F.M. 2458 and F.M. 3519 NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR A PUBLIC HEARING

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is affording the public the opportunity to request a public hearing regarding the proposed widening and reconstruction of approximately 3.0 miles of the southerly section of the existing F.M. Highway 2458, and the proposed acceptance of approximately 3.40 miles of an existing Garza County road to the State Highway System for widening and reconstruction and designation as F.M. Highway 3519. The proposed projects would provide all-weather current design roadways connecting U.S. Highway 84 to the proposed Lake Alan Henry water reservoir and adjoining recreational area located in southeastern Garza County. The projects would be supervised by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and funded from the 1991 District Discretionary Fund.

The proposed upgrading of F.M. 2458 would begin at the intersection of F.M. 2458 and U.S. 84 approximately fourteen miles southeast of the city of Post and would follow the existing alignment of F.M. 2458 to the roadway's turn to the north and tie-into the west-to-east alignment at this location of the proposed F.M. 3519. The construction of F.M. 3519 would begin at the easterly limit of project construction of F.M. 2458 and would

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approximate the west-to-east-to-north alignment of an existing county road to the northwest projection of the Lake Alan Henry recreational area. The combined projects are approximately 6.40 miles in length and are located on a mostly westto-east alignment north and east of the Lake Alan Henry reservoir.

The existing F.M. 2458 is comprised of twenty feet of asphalt travelway on a shallow depth of base. The existing county road is dirt surfaced with an illdefined crown sloping to unlined drainage ditches. The improvements proposed for the roadways are typically comprised of two twelve-foot travel lanes and three feet of fully surfaced shoulder widths. The construction of the water reservoir would inundate much of Gobbler Creek Canyon and would necessitate the construction of a bridge with thirty-four feet of travel width spanning the canyon above the reservoir's design high water elevation as a part of the F.M. 3519 project. The typical widths of the proposed travelways and the clear bridge width would accommodate specialized farming equipment commonly using area roadways and would also benefit anticipated recreational vehicle use of the

The usual existing right-of-way on F.M. 2458 is one hundred feet and the usual existing right-of-way on the country road is sixty feet. The proposed minimum right-of-way width is one hundred feet on both projects and the proposed maximum right-of-way width is two hundred forty feet at Gobbler Creek Canyon on F.M. 3519. The implementation of the proposed projects would require the acquisition of approximately forty-one acres of land to accommodate the proposed design of the roadways and bridge. Garza County in cooperation with the city of Lubbock and the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will acquire the right-of-way on behalf of the State of

Although additional right-of-way will be required, no houses or businesses will be displaced. Information concerning benefits and services which may be available to affected property owners as well as information about the tentative property owners as well as information about the tentative schedules for right-ofway acquisition and construction can be obtained from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation Office at 135 Slaton Highway in

Maps and drawings showing the proposed location and design, information about the proposed projects are on file and available for inspection and copying at the office of Mr Frank Phillips, Resident Engineer, at 135 Slaton Highway in Lubbock. 



# Local cowboys compete at Ranch Roundup

dedicated ranchers and their families, featured in a ranch cookin' contest and a talent contest in the categories of painting/photography, crafts and music.

Just as their forefathers did before them in the late 1800s, these seasoned cowboys gather their families together, swap stories with other ranch families, and watch dads, brothers, cousins and hired hands compete against each other at working cattle. It's still the rough and romantic lifestyle that makes Texas cowboys known worldwide.

Attending the event from the Garza County ranches are Joe Marts, Jay Lott, Jeff Lott, Joe Pennell, Rooster Swartz, Sam Whitley, Jeff Scott, Shawn Pennell, Jack Lott, Cody Scott, Staci Marts and Staci Whitley

Folks at the Double U tell the legend for truth, since the real story has not survived the years.

Not long after the turn of the century, it seems that one of the original owners stepped off the train and onto Texas soil, taking a good look at his newly purchased land for the first time. So impressed was he with the sprawling open spaces, that he dug deep into his pocket and pulled out a shiny silver dollar. Tossing the coin high into the air, he shouted excitedly, "This is where I'm going to double

you," Another of the legends attributed to that when he was asked later about the challenges today are brush control name, he said it stood for "Double Utopia.'

Established in 1906 and owned today by the Post-Montgomery joint venture, the Double U Hereford Ranch encompasses approximately 55,000 acres in Garza, Lynn and Hockley Counties. Each October the Double U holds its production sale, offering cattle from both its commercial and registered breeding operations. About 80 commercial heifers are sold each year, along with 60 registered bulls and 30 registered heifers.
