members will probably change, either through litigation or through council planning.
"tIt's beter if the council begins planning for the change now," Morton said, "than towait until a alaw suitiss filed." Mortone explained that the current method

cerlainl result if forcing a change in he election process. "In you losea a court challenge, you have to opay yhe atess. the plainntiff'slitigation," he warned thec council.

Prevention \& Removal of Excess Ear Wax

The accumulation of excess cerumen or ear wax occurs in many
individuals. Wax may accumulate due to overactive wax producing glands, narrow or curved ear canals, or secretion of a wax that is either harder or softer than normal.
Ear wax may become impacted Ear wax may become impacted
and will be difficultoremove when it is pushed deep into the ear canal. Generally, there is no wax in the inside half of the ear canal unless it has been pushed there.

The best approach to excess ear
wax is to go to a physican for professional removal of the wax with the proper instruments. Do
notattempt toremove the wax with a cotton-tipped stick applicator or swab. Wax pushed next to the ear drum can cause loss of hearing. Also, accumulated wax may trap
water inside the water inside the ear, producing
problems during the warm summermonths when many indiviudal go swimming.
In some instances, accumula tion of wax in the external portion
of the ear canal can be prevented Many nonprescription wax-softening products contain propylene gly-
col or glycerin. Other wax-softening substances include olive oil,
mineral oil, and diluted hydrogen peroxide solution. After the wax has been softened, it should be removed by gently irrigating the ear
