Members of the Post Art Guild began officially accepting entries for their Spring Art Show on Tuesday, May 3, but as early as a week before that date, entries were coming into the Algerita Art Center for what promises to be an outstanding show.

According to Billye Hackney, Post Art Guild vice-president and director of the Spring Art Show, interest has been very good and this year's show could be one of the best ever for the art guild.

The Spring Art Show at the Algerita Art Center, consistently one of the best in the area, will open to the public on Friday, May 6 at 9 a.m. and will be open until 7 p.m.

The same 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. hours will be in effect on Saturday, May 7 and on Sunday, May 8, the art center will open to the public at

1 p.m., with an awards presentation scheduled for 3 p.m.

A patron's reception will be held at 7 p.m., May 5 following Thursday's judging of the show by Michael L. Thornton and Harvey Madison.

Michael Thornton is a graduate of East Texas State University and holds an M.F.A. degree from Texas Tech University.

He is currently Chairman of the Fine Arts Department and a professor of art at Western Texas College in Snyder.

He has taught two-dimensional design, freehand drawing, metal-smithing and design at Texas Tech University and art education and two and three dimensional design at Western Texas.

He has been Gallery Director of the Fine Arts Gallery, WTC, from 1972 to 1988 and Art Consultant of

the Scurry County Museum, 1974-1984.

He was also Art Consultant with the Diamond M Museum from 1981 to 1984 and was an Associate Interim Director of the Diamond M Museum in 1981.

Harvey Madison, owner and operator of Madison's Photographics in Lubbock, has eleven years experience as a professional photographer and has won many awards in both commercial and artistic photography.

With a masters degree from Texas Tech University, Madison teaches photography courses for the public, as well as through the Division of Continuing Education at Texas Tech, and is the past director of the photography program for the Texas Tech Mass Communications Summer Workshop.

An avid supporter of the Arts, Madison has served as judge for a number of photographic art competitions.

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Local Elections Saturday

Candidates Respond to Questionnaire

The Dispatch recently distributed candidate information requests to candidates in the May 7 race for places on the City Council, Hospital Board, Post ISD Board and Southland ISD Board.

On the information requests the candidates were asked to give the primary reason they were seeking office; what plans they had if elected; what specific problems they felt needed to be solved; and what qualifications they felt they had for office.

All candidates received the questionnaire and were given the opportunity to respond.

POST CITY COUNCIL

Jack Alexander

Jack Alexander is an incumbent seeking re-election to the City Council and his primary reasons for seeking re-election are "to continue the long range plans for our city; to continue getting the most of our tax dollars; to continue to seek jobs for our citizens; and to continue to promote our great community."

If re-elected, Alexander's plans include the work necessary "to improve our water system; to improve our streets; to improve our insurance-retirement program; and to improve overall city service.

Problems to be solved include "the water problem; removal of unsafe houses and structures and junk cars; and the bad weather warning system.

Alexander has had over 20 years experience in local and area government and adds that he is "fair, will listen, will make my own decisions based on all the facts. I have an adequate educational background. I understand the essential elements of city government."

Larry Waldrip

Larry is also an incumbent seeking re-election to the City Council.

He is seeking re-election to this office because "I feel our city needs progressive-minded councilmen who are willing to listen and respond to the citizens of Post."

Waldrip plans "To actively seek new industry by working closely with the Chamber, PEDC, PMA and county in order to preserve the well being of our city," if he is re-elected.

He feels that "The lines of communication need to be open between our various committees and the townspeople. In order to have a workable plan, we must

communicate."

After his terms on the council, Waldrip says, "The past two years on the council have been a learning experience, and my responsibilities have not been taken lightly."

"Areas of involvement include budget and planning; monitoring monthly expenditures; street, water and sewer and city housing. In each instance I have applied what I felt was common sense and logic."

Bobby E. Green

Bobby Green is seeking a place on the city council and does not have a primary reason, but several different reasons.

"Among these are the way city funds are spent. I would like to see a more conservative approach to city business. Also I would like to see a more informed general public. After all, everything decided upon by the council concerns every citizen."

Green doesn't believe a specific plan if elected could be designated at this time, "If you are not involved in city planning and familiar with complete city operations, then any plans you formulate at this point in time would be mere speculation."

"I think before any plans are decided upon upon that a lot of in-

put from the general public should be considered."

Concerning specific problems which need to be solved, his view is that "We have problems with some of our city ordinances. Some are not only unpopular, but are also freedom restrictive."

"I point to some of our building codes and also that many of our ordinances are unequally enforced, if enforced at all."

Green is a long time Post resident who "grew up here and graduated from high school."

"I was a local businessman for nine years (owner and operator of Caprock TV), plus I have many years of dealing with the general public."

Irene Fry

Irene Fry, who is seeking a place on the council, was out of town at the time the questionnaire was mailed out, but did call the Dispatch to tell us she "would give to the best of her abilities in listening to and solving the problems brought before her which would be for the betterment of Post and its citizens."

Audiences Give Standing Ovations!

The performance of "Butterflies Are Free" by the Garza Theatre this past weekend was truly one of the most beautiful plays ever performed on this stage.

Under the professional direction of Will McCrary, the cast of James Burnett, Tina Self, Suzanne Pass and Benny Jackson brought the audience through the emotions of happiness, laughter, sadness and satisfaction.

Burnett and Self, newcomers to the Garza Theatre stage had standing ovation performances.

Burnett, playing the blind young man Don Baker, actually had people believing he was blind.

Baker had been blind since birth and finally talked his domineering mother, played by Pass, to allow him to live on his own in the big city.

Baker finds himself in an apartment next to a pretty young girl named Jill Tanner, played by Self.

Tanner, a very young divorcee that is very "go-lucky" and not the least bit organized, is played with great skill and emotion by Self.

In fact, when Tanner first comes in to visit with Baker she is amazed at how neat and organized he is, not realizing that he is blind.

The events that happen from the point she realized he is blind through the rest of the play is a very hilarious but warm and touching moment as the audience saw two young people gradually falling in love with each other.

But things seem to come to a halt as the door of the apartment opens and without even saying a word Baker knows that it is his mother, Mrs Baker, played by Pass.

Even before Mrs Baker entered the scene you had a dislike for her. She seemed over-protective, bossy and you felt like she was trying to run Baker's life.

When you finally get to meet her you see that you were exactly right.

But toward the end of the play you see a change in Mrs Baker, especially after the long, "to-the-point" talk she had with Tanner.

She begins to change a little but still hangs around to make sure that Baker is alright for the big date with Tanner that night.

But the date with Tanner goes sour.

Tanner gets carried away with another party and seems to forget about Baker coming back to the apartment only to pack her things and move in with her newly found boyfriend Ralph Austin, played by Benny Jackson.

Austin is an arrogant director that has cast Tanner in a small part in one of his plays.

He seems to go out of his way to insult Mrs Baker which just thickens the atmosphere of the whole scene.

Finally, Tanner breaks the news

to Baker that she is leaving to live with Austin.

With this news Baker's self confidence is shattered and he finally agrees to go back home with his mother.

But Mrs Baker sees what is happening and to everyone's surprise doesn't allow Baker to come back home.

She insists that he stay there and try it on his own and pursue his career in music.

The final scene between Baker and Tanner was very moving when Tanner finally said good-bye.

Baker, for the first time, felt alone and actually blind without the girl he loved.

The scene was amplified by the emotions and violence displayed by Baker.

But it ended happily with the return of Tanner to help and support Baker, who actually helped and supported Tanner throughout the play.

The people behind the scenes were Anne Leake, stage manager, production manager Mildred Stewart, Oliver McDougle, Chad Overton, Scott Zapert and Chris Vessels.

KPOS recorded the sound tapes. Nona Lusk took care of the box office while Wes Burnett took the responsibility of house manager.

The cast of "Silver Whistle", the first performance of the Garza Theatre two years ago, was the special guests of the theatre for the opening night performance.

The next performance will be "Blithe Spirit", June 9-12.

POST ISD BOARD

Ronnie Gradine is seeking Position One on the Post Independent School District Board because "I would like to help with the decisions that affect our school system. His specific plans are to "make

sure every student gets a quality education."

In regard to problems that need to be solved, his opinion is "we need more vocational courses offered at school for the students who would like to work - courses in auto mechanics and wood shop. "We also need more communication between teachers and the parents."

Gradine feels he is qualified for

the position because "I own my own business and know how to handle the situations that might come up."

Dan Hodges

Dan Hodges is seeking the Position One opening on the school board for a "simple reason": "I have two children that attend our schools and I am concerned about the future of our school system, not only for my children but for all the students and teachers of our school system."

His plans if elected are "to be a fair and open-minded representative on the school board. The school system exists first and foremost to educate students. Any decisions made will be based on what is best for the entire school system."

On problems to be solved - "I think the main goal of any good school system should always be to increase the quality of education in the entire school system, from kindergarten through the twelfth grade. No matter how high the quality of education gets in a school system, it can always be improved."

Hodges feels that he is "qualified for the office for several reasons. Number one, I was born and raised in Garza County. Number Two, I attended Post public schools for 12 years, and, third, I have a desire to serve as school board trustee."

Dwainna Wulfjen

Dwainna Wulfjen, candidate for Position One on the school board, is seeking the office because, "I feel we need a woman trustee. I think we need new people on the board with new and different ideas. I want to represent the views of other concerned parents and community members."

If she is elected, Wulfjen would "like to see additional curriculum added in the high school, such as computers. I would also like to see a complete renovation of the track. I would like to have the teacher's budget increased enough to supply them with all the teaching aids they need and I would like to see the heating and cooling system renovated for the entire school system."

Concerning problems to be solved in the school system, she feels that "as board members we need to keep in mind that we are representing other community members and vote accordingly, not as individuals."

Wulfjen has ten years of accounting background, "three of which were in the Colorado City School Business Office. I will be aware of the problems in all schools as I have a son in kindergarten, a daughter in the eighth grade and a daughter that will be a senior."

David Tyler

David Tyler is an incumbent on the Garza Memorial Hospital Board and is seeking re-election because "I was asked to seek office by friends and neighbors."

Tyler has served on the hospital board for the last six years.

Ronny Ammons

Ronald G. (Ronny) Ammons is seeking a place on the Garza Memorial Hospital Board because of "experience in the health field. I feel that this would be an asset to the hospital, current board of directors and the citizens of Garza County."

I elected, Ammons would like to "work with the present board to upgrade the facility and to help provide better patient care, such as: Possibly to provide phones in patient's rooms and intercom service."

"One of the main problems that I feel needs to be addressed is the reputation the hospital seems to have and that is patients stating "If I get hurt or sick don't take me to Post hospital. They can't take care of it, take me to Lubbock."

"The public needs to know that our doctors on staff are not going to admit a medical case that they feel the facility and/or staff cannot handle."

"I feel that as a board member with some medical experience and knowledge I would be beneficial to the operation."

Becky Warren

Becky Warren is seeking a position on the hospital board from a desire "to uphold the standards of the hospital and to assure the citizens of Garza County the best medical care possible. Garza Memorial Hospital is one of our county's greatest assets."

If elected, Warren's only plan is "to make sure that the hospital is operated properly and to do my job to the best of my ability."

"As one who is not presently on the board, I feel that I am not prepared to make decisions on present problems faced by the hospital. However, I will give all my attention to any problems that do arise if I am elected."

Governor Ireland served two terms as governor and was defeated by John Reagan for the U.S. Senate.
