Garza Memorial Hospital Hosts Open House During Hospital Week

The week of May 8-14, Garza Memorial Hospital, along with hospitals all across the state, will be observing Texas Hospital Week in conjunction with National Hospital Week.

This year's theme "Texas Hospitals, Special Places for Special People" emphasizes the impact of hospitals and health professionals. Because of their state-of-the-art equipment and facilities, and the many highly skilled health care professionals who deal daily with life and death situations, hospitals are unique places employing a team of special people.

As part of the hospital week program, GMH Director Maritta Reed has announced that the local facility will provide free blood pressure checks, free blood sugar checks, free blood typing, and a cholesterol check for \$6 to hospital visitors.

The \$400,000 Garza Memorial Hospital was completed in 1952 and was formally dedicated on September 25, 1952, but plans and ideas for a local hospital had been floating around the county for many years prior to that.

Actual talk and leg work began in early 1950 when a committee was appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to check into the possibilities of building a hospital on land donated by John Herd.

Through this committee, and the aid of many other people, a petition was drawn up to be presented to the Commissioners Court for approval in May of 1950.

The petition called for a \$175,000 bond election. Approval of a 17-bed hospital had previously been received from the federal government with the government matching the local bond.

The Commissioners Court ap-

proved the petition and it was circulated and the election was called. Garza County residents approved the bond by a big majority.

But when bids were advertised in March 1951, it was discovered that increases in the prices of materials would necessitate another \$50,000.

This amount was raised and in June, contracts were let on the building to McQuade Construction Company, contractors. Actual construction began the first week of July 1951.

Garza Memorial Hospital was built as a 24-bed unit, with six single bedrooms and nine double bedrooms. Eight bassinets were included in the equipment in anticipation of an increase in Garza County's population.

The hospital also included an air-conditioned surgical suite and an isolation ward consisting of a four-room section.

In addition to the active staff and visiting staff, the hospital personnel also included four nurses.

The Senator was greeted at United Sewing by owners Jim and Beverly Vinyard and Caroline Bryan, supervisor of the Post factory, and a welcoming group of Post citizens.

After a briefing from Mayor McCrary and Jim Vinyard, Caroline Bryan conducted the visitors on a tour of the sewing facility.

She demonstrated the shipment receiving process, bundle breakdown, sewing and hemming procedures, surging, finishing, inspection and shipment.

After the tour of the sewing operation, a reception was held following a brief address by Senator Gramm.

In his address, the Senator touched on how the City of Post and Chamber of Commerce helped lure United Sewing to Post through various incentives.

Currently, the company is expanding by opening a new facility in Haskell and plans to increase the work force in Post by mid-summer.

Incumbents Winners In Local Races May 7

Incumbents were the winners in some close races when Garza County voters made their choices on Saturday, May 7 to fill positions on the Post City Council, Garza Memorial Hospital Board, and Post and Southland ISD School Boards.

In a close contest for three places on the Post City Council, incumbents Larry Waldrip, who received 194 votes, and Jack Alexander, who received 177 votes, were returned to office and will be joined by Irene Fry who received 190 votes.

In the same race, 172 votes went to Benny Jackson and 153 votes to Bobby E. Green.

Incumbent David Tyler will serve another term on the Garza Memorial Hospital Board, receiving 303 votes in the election. New board member Ronny Ammons received 190 votes and Becky Warren received 180 votes.

Three positions on the Post ISD School Board were filled by Don Payne, Jerry Hays and Dan Hodges.

Incumbent Payne received 349 votes, followed by Hays, also an incumbent, with 336 votes. New board member Hodges received 276 votes. Other board member candidates were Dwainna Wulfjen with 72 votes and Ronnie Gradine with 62 votes.

The three Southland ISD School Board were filled by incumbents V.C. Wheeler, 67 votes; J.W. Basinger, 59 votes; and Jerry Farquhar, 53 votes. Billy Weaver received 28 votes in the school election.

seven nurses-aides, two janitors, a cook, a bookkeeper and an administrator.

Operating cost for the hospital was originally estimated at approximately \$85,000 per year, figured on a basis of \$250 per day. It was estimated that the hospital would have an average daily census of 10 people after service was underway.

From 1952 to the present, Garza Memorial has undergone changes in hospital personnel; facilities have been added to or removed from the unit; and GMH, like health facilities everywhere, has been plagued by rising health costs, but the staff at Garza Memorial is still on hand 24-hours a day to provide quality health care for the citizens of Garza County.

Family Focus

Backaches Are Preventable

Backaches are as ordinary as the common cold. But unlike a cold, back pain is often preventable.

If you suffer from backaches, you have a lot of company. According to the American Medical Association and insurance company data, 8 out of 10 Americans will experience back problems during the course of their lifetime and some 22 million are affected by back discomfort during the course of a year.

Although the statistics are staggering, the problem of back pain is certainly not unbeatable. Fewer than 20% of back problems are caused by diseases of the bones and joints of the back; the remaining 80% are due to poor daily lifestyle habits.

What most people don't realize is that it doesn't take some drastic event, like lifting a heavy object, to produce back problems. They often occur after years of sitting, standing, lifting, or doing common chores improperly.

Dr. Mary Ann Ueussner, who is a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service, offers the following suggestions for avoiding back injury:

Lifting - Hold the item close to you so it doesn't pitch your spine forward. Bend your knees so your legs do most of the work and hold your back straight as you lift.

Sitting - Sit to the back of chairs and keep your back well-supported and your spine straight. If you sit for long periods of time, put your feet on a footstool, phone book or some other object to take the pressure off the lower back. Try to change position or redistribute your weight at least every 45 minutes.

Standing - When you must stand for long periods, put one foot on a small stool or box to release the stress on your spine.

Lying Down - Recline on your side with knees and hips flexed so your body is partially curled. Or sleep on the back with one or two pillows under the knees. Avoid sleeping on your stomach or in any position which twists the spine.

The specialist observes that a lack of fitness also contributes to back problems. One of the major causes of back pain is a combination of poor muscle tone, weak muscles and lack of flexibility. Excess weight also shifts the body's center of gravity and puts an added strain on the back, especially if the extra pounds are carried around the midsection.

If your job requires standing or sitting for long periods, learn to do it properly to reduce backstrain. Keep your stomach pulled in, your back straight and your head up. If you're bothered by backaches, use a chair with firm support and adjust it to a height where your knees are higher than your hips. When standing, keep one foot slightly elevated on a footstool, empty carton, or wastebasket. When one knee is bent, it takes a lot of stress off the back.

Having a healthy back is another good reason to become involved in a general fitness and weight control program.

Exercise - What Does It Do For You?

Exercise will do something for every body -- young, old, male, female, in any shape and condition.

Exercise keeps muscles toned up by keeping them nourished with an ample supply of blood so they will be supple. Exercise also helps keep bones at proper strength by preventing the loss of calcium.

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

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


