## Council Considers Printing Delinquents

Post City Council members, in their May 9 meeting, discussed and approved a motion to publish a list of delinquent taxes after notice of intent to publish is given.

No publication date was given for the delinquent list.

The Council also voted to attach a \$500 penalty clause to the animal ordinance which went into effect recently.

The animal ordinance number 93 provides "a prohibition against livestock in that area bounded by 11th Street on the north and 7th Street on the south and by Avenue M on the west and the Santa Fe Railroad Reservation on the east..."

## GMH Directors Take Oath of Office at Meeting

David Tyler and Ronny Ammons were sworn in and officers elected at the regular meeting of the Garza Memorial Hospital Board of Directors Thursday, May 12.

The votes were canvassed with David Tyler receiving 315 votes, Ronny Ammons 195 and Becky Warren 189.

After the elected officers were installed officers were elected.

Jack Alexander was elected President, David Tyler as Vice-President and David Nichols, Secretary.

In other business, the First National Bank of Post was designated depository for the hospital.

Alexander abstained from the vote.

Hospital administrator Maritta Reed presented a revised Quality Assurance Procedures for Discharge Planning, Admitting/Business Office, Infection Control, Medical Records & Utilization Review and Swing Bed Departments.

The directors were asked to take them home and look at them and if any changes needed to be made it could be done at the next meeting.

The directors agreed that revisions needed to be made to comply with state regulations.

Bids for a new lawn mower were received with the purchase to be made from Neff Western Auto of Post.

The hospital will buy a Lawn Boy, 27", 1987 mower with a two year warranty for \$349.95 along with a grass catcher for \$36.95.

The directors discussed the delinquent accounts.

Tyler brought up a complaint he had received from more than one person that many do not receive an itemized statement before they received their letter from the hospital.

Tyler indicated that the insurance companies would not pay without an itemized statement.

The board agreed that a statement should be sent out and asked Reed to check into the situation.

In informational items to be discussed Reed brought up a letter from hospital attorney Ron Pearson concerning the policy changes in recruiting physicians.

Pearson indicated that the wording and procedure needed to be stated as from a tax exempt status which the directors agreed.

The directors were also informed that paramedic students Melvin

There seemed to be a problem with the bonding on the company of Abell-Dougherty of Lubbock who was awarded the bid.

Stracener told the trustees that everything was taken care of and he was waiting for permission to now proceed with the work.

The trustees told Stracener to get the work started as soon as possible so that the work would be complete by two-days, right before school starts.

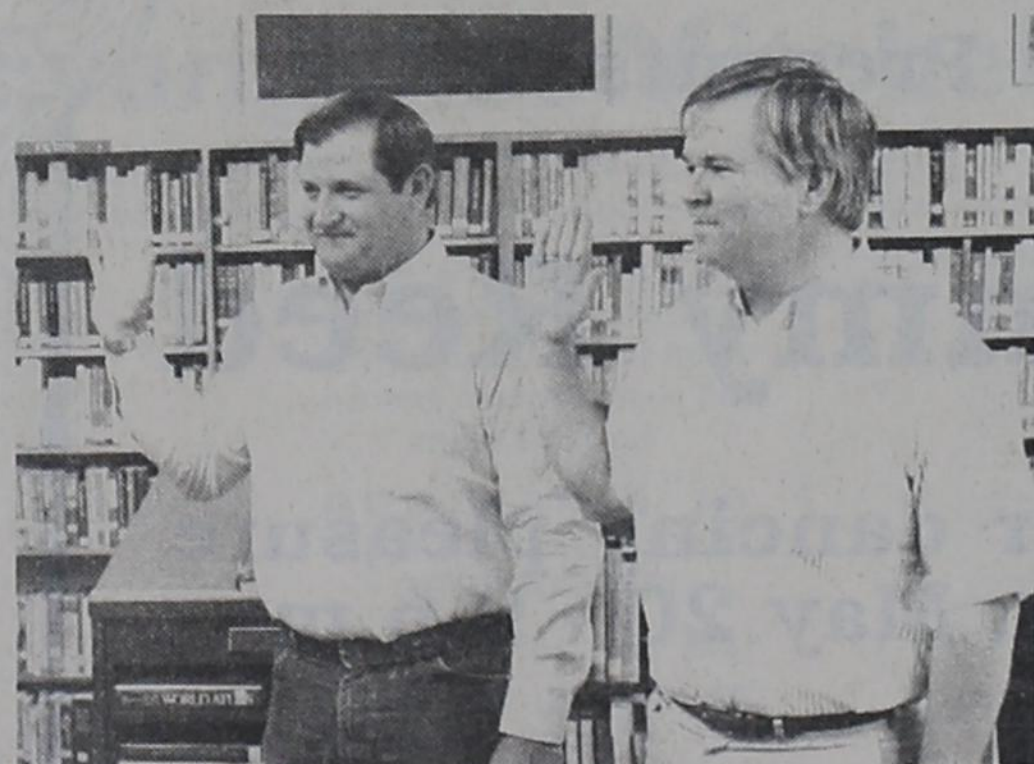

# Silver Haired Legislature Election Will be May 24

In an election to be held Tuesday, May 24, four representatives from the South Plains will be elected to the second Silver Haired Legislature, which will convene in Austin later this fall.

Maxine Earl of Post is one of the candidates seeking election to represent the district consisting of Hale, Motley, Floyd, Crosby, Dickens, King and Garza Counties.

Her opponent in the race is Manuel Ayers of Hale County. Two representatives will be from Lubbock and one representative from the district covering Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Terry and Yoakum Counties.

The Silver Haired Legislature is an elected non-partisan body of 116 citizens 60 years of age and older elected by their peers, to con-

sider and vote on proposed legislation that concerns the needs of both present and future older Texans.

Absentee balloting is now underway and will continue through May 20.

Persons requesting mail-in ballots must be homebound, reside in a long-term care facility, or be out of town election day. Persons requesting mail-in ballots must also provide proof of voter registration. Only official ballots obtained from SPAG will be counted.

The May 24 election will be held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Garza County Trailblazers.

Simple Strategies For A Quick Spring Shape-Up

What's the best way to shed unwanted pounds in time for summer without resorting to drastic measures such as deprivation diets and grueling exercise routines?

Moderation is the key, says Barbara Beck, M.S., R.D. for the Dannon Yogurt Information Center. Beck advises adopting a low-fat diet that's rich in fruit, vegetables, lean meats, whole grains and low-fat dairy products, as well as working exercise into the daily routine. Now that spring is here, an abundance of fresh and tasty fruits and vegetables will soon be readily available. And, barring spring showers, there's not better time to start walking everywhere, including to and from work, errands and appointments.

For more spring shape-up strategies, read on:

- \* Cut back on fat you can see -- butter on bread or potatoes, salad dressings, the fat on a piece of steak. Remember that fat is the most concentrated source of calories, with more than twice the calories of an equal amount of protein or carbohydrate. For instance, just one tablespoon of margarine contains 102 calories, while a tablespoon of sugar contains 46.
- \* Cut back on fat you can't see by knowing which foods are high

in fat such as ice cream, cheese, whole milk, marbled meats and fried foods. If baked goods leave an oily stain on the paper bag, they're rich in fat. Always check a packaged food's label to learn its fat content.

- \* Make smart trade-offs to limit your intake of calories:
  - 1 cup sour cream (415 Calories) for 1 cup Non-Fat Plain Yogurt (110 Calories); save 305 Calories!
  - 1 tablespoon mayonnaise (100 Calories) for 1 tablespoon mustard (10 Calories); save 90 Calories!
  - 1 cup ice cream (470 Calories) for 1 cup low-fat frozen yogurt (200 Calories); save 270 Calories!
- \* Don't make the mistake of cut-

ting dairy products from your diet -- they're a rich source of much-needed calcium. Instead, select low-fat dairy items and reduce the fat and calories without reducing calcium. Look for non-fat and low-fat yogurt -- an eight-ounce serving supplies almost half the U.S. RDA of calcium. Other good sources are skim milk and low-fat ricotta and cottage cheeses.

- \* Fill up on great-tasting, low-calorie fresh produce items, such as tender, young asparagus, crisp snap beans, sweet corn and baby green peas. Steam vegetables rather than sauteing them to cut down on fat calories, or enjoy their fresh flavor by adding raw vegetables to a salad. As a refreshing alternative to ice cream, cookies and other high-calorie desserts, indulge in tempting fresh fruits such as juicy strawberries, blueberries and cherries that are now in season. Eat them plain or mix with vanilla or lemon yogurt.
- \* Stick to seafood and lean cuts of meat. For a light and well-seasoned taste, try marinating in yogurt before grilling. The result is a moist, tender and tasty entree.
- \* Work exercise into your daily routine and see the calories you'll burn:
  - 60 calories per 1/2 hour by Strolling @ 1 mile per hour.
  - 180 calories per 1/2 hour by Walking @ 4 miles per hour.
  - 150 calories per 1/2 hours by Cycling @ 8 miles per hour.
  - 150 calories per 1/2 hour by Dancing.

## Dr Kathy Volanty Named District Extension Director for South Plains District 2

Dr Kathy Volanty of Corpus Christi has been named district Extension director for South Plains District 2 of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, effective May 1. She will be headquartered in Lubbock.

Volanty has served as district Extension director for Coastal Bend district 14 since 1982, and has served in various leadership roles with the Extension Service since 1971.

She will fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Dr Catherine Crawford this spring.

In announcing Volanty's appointment, Dr Zerle L. Carpenter, director of the Texas Agricultural

Extension Service, said she will provide administrative leadership and program guidance to county Extension agents-home economics in the 20 counties that comprise the district and will work in planning Extension educational programs for the South Plains with Bob Robinson, the district Extension director for agriculture.

Carpenter noted that Volanty has been widely recognized for her effective leadership in implementing educational efforts that have helped families achieve a better way of life. "We are looking forward to expansion of her educational programs in this key area of Texas," Carpenter said.

Volanty began her professional Extension career as assistant county Extension agent serving Potter County in 1971, and after two years her title was changed to county Extension agent-home economics. She transferred to Hutchinson County in 1976 as county agent and served there for a year before being named district director for Central District 8 at Stephenville. Her next assignment was that of district Extension director in the Coastal Bend.

A native of Canyon, Volanty holds B.S. and M.S. degrees from Texas Tech University and the Ph.D. degree from Texas A&M University. She is an active member of the Texas Association of Extension Home Economists, the American Association of Adult and Continuing Education and the Texas and American Home Economics Associations.

Volanty has earned a number of major awards for leadership, including the prestigious Texas Superior Service Award in the administrative/supervisory category. The award is the highest given by the Extension Service to its staff members.
