Originally called Decoration Day, there are a number of legends and stories about the origin of Memorial Day and several communities claim to have originated the observance.

But in 1966, the U.S. government proclaimed Waterloo, New York, the birthplace of the holiday.

The people of Waterloo first observed Memorial Day on May 5, 1866, to honor soldiers who had died in the Civil War. Businesses were closed, and people decorated soldier's graves and flew flags at half-mast.

In May of 1868, General John A. Logan, Commander in Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued an order "that every post of the Grand Army should hold suitable exercises and decorate the graves of their dead comrades with flowers," closing with the words: "Let no ravages of time testify to coming generations that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided Republic."

This order, issued so many years ago, still carries on, but extends now to the dead of all wars -

Crawford Gets Award of Excellence

Dr. Catherine Crawford, South Plains District 2 director for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, received the Award of Excellence in the administration category in special ceremonies at Texas A&M University on April 26.

Crawford has served the people of the South Plains with distinction for the last 17 years, noted Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, director of the Extension Service, in making the award. Her leadership has helped Extension staff members to receive the latest technical and practical training that has enabled them, and the volunteers with whom they work, to maintain outstanding county educational programs, he said.

Crawford's stature in home economics and with both Texas Tech University and Texas A&M University research and teaching facul-

ties has been of the highest caliber, Carpenter said. Her reputation as an emissary for home economics education, as well as for the Extension Service, has earned her the highest awards that those entities can bestow upon their leaders, he added.

Crawford retired on March 31 of this year. Her successor will be Dr. Kathy Volanty, who presently is serving as Coastal Bend District 14 Extension director at Corpus Christi.

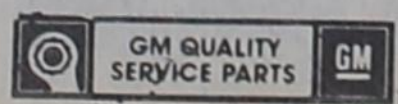

National Eye Care Project Seeks Elderly

Eligible callers will be referred to a nearby eye physician and surgeon (ophthalmologist) who will provide the care at no out-of-pocket cost.

The National Eye Care Project (NECP) is sponsored by the state society of eye physicians and surgeons and the Foundation of the American Academy of Ophthalmology. It is designed to make medical eye care available to persons age 65 or older who might otherwise not receive critical care to preserve their sight.

To be eligible, a person must be:

- age 65 or older.
- financially unable to pay for the care.
- In addition, the person must not currently be the patient of an ophthalmologist who is providing medical eye care.

Eye glasses, prescription drugs, and hospital care are not provided by the program.

More than 215,000 persons have called the NECP, and thousands have been treated for potentially blinding eye diseases.

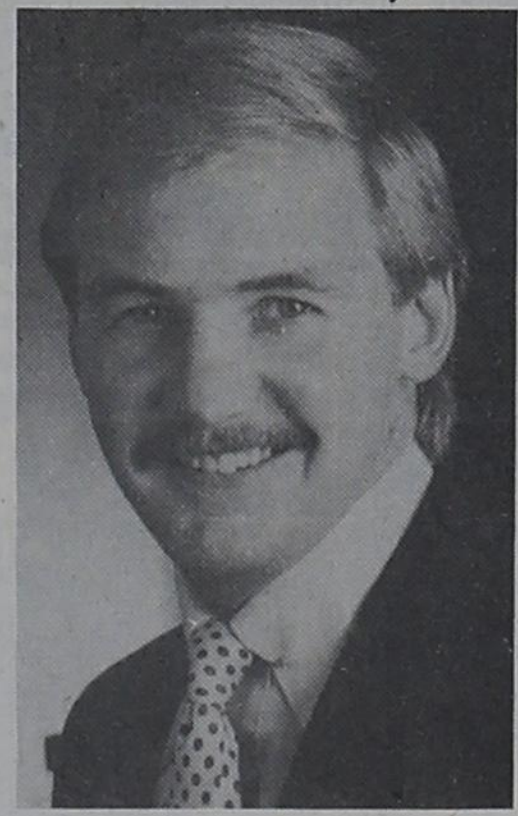

Texas 4-H Scholarships Exceed \$500,000

Outstanding 4-H members from across the state will reap a bountiful harvest of scholarships at the 1988 Texas 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University June 7-9.

More than 90 youths will receive scholarships totaling more than \$500,000. "Our Texas 4-H scholarship program is second to none and contin-

ues to grow each year due to tremendous support from the private sector," said Preston Sides, 4-H specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension

Service and executive director of the Texas 4-H Foundation.

The 4-H Foundation is a non-profit organization that provides private sector support for the 4-H program in Texas and arranges for scholarship donors and numerous other gifts and awards.

"The Texas 4-H Foundation sponsors the world's largest scholarship program," Sides said. "It all began some 27 years ago when one scholarship of \$1,000 was awarded."

This year's 93 scholarship recipients will come from applicants who will be interviewed the day preceding 4-H Roundup, said the 4-H specialist. Recipients will be recognized at the opening assembly of Roundup at 7 p.m., June 7, in the Rudder Conference Center auditorium on the Texas A&M campus.

Production Rate Continued At 100 Percent Market Demand

The Railroad Commission has continued the Texas oil production rate for June 1988 at 100 percent of market demand.

Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent and Commissioner Kent Hance continued the top production allowable after reviewing oil companies' nominations to buy a total of 2,037,754 barrels of Texas oil per day. The June nomination total, an increase of 7,986 barrels daily when compared to May purchaser nominations, indicates market demand. June 1987 nominations totaled 2,062,772 barrels daily.

The Commission first went to the ceiling level for oil production in April 1972. It applies to all fields in the state except those that are assigned lower legal rates of production so that reservoir pressures will not be depleted before the maximum amount of oil has been recovered.

Chairman Nugent also reported that June nominations for the purchase of Texas gas totaled 20,906,044 Mcf/d (thousand cubic feet per day). May nominations totaled 20,277,816 Mcf/d. June 1987 nominations amounted to 21,213,412 Mcf/d.

The next statewide oil and gas production allowable hearing will begin at 10 a.m. on Thursday, June 16, at the Doubletree Hotel at Lincoln Center in Dallas.

Chairman Nugent reported that crude oil and petroleum products imported into the U.S. averaged 7,431,000 barrels per day for the four week period ending April 22, an increase of 2,122,000 barrels per day from the same period a year ago.

Texas Farm Labor Handbook Available

A new handbook is available from the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service that focuses on issues relating to farm labor.

The "Texas Farm Labor Handbook" provides a brief summary of 23 state and federal labor regulations that impact many farmers and ranchers, said Dr Richard Edwards, Extension Service economist who prepared the publication.

The handbook covers such laws as the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, the Fair Labor Standards Act and the Texas Agricultural Hazard Communica-

tion Act. The Hazard Communication Act, for instance, mandates that certain agricultural employers maintain and make available to employees information about chemicals that they are using.

Among topics are employment of minors, minimum wages, unemployment compensation, migrant housing, motor carrier regulations and human rights.

Employers of agricultural labor need to be aware of laws that affect them, Edwards said. The handbook provides answers to many common questions regarding farm labor and also lists the responsible agencies that can be contacted for more information.

Edwards said that the handbook is not an official interpretation of any regulation or law but is intended to provide information on numerous laws and regulations affecting farm labor.

A copy of the handbook is available from any county Extension Service office or from Edwards, Department of Agricultural Economics, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843-2124.

Drilling Permits Decreased In April

A total of 1,367 drilling permits were issued by the Railroad Commission in April, according to RRC Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent. In March, the total was 1,441.

The April total included 936 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 54 to deepen existing holes, 219 to plugback existing holes, and five for other wells. Operators were also issued 153 amended drilling permits.

Permits issued for new oil and gas holes in April included 106 in the Lubbock area (District 8A) and 11 in the Panhandle (District 10).

In the first four months of 1988, the Commission has issued 5,390 drilling permits, a nine percent increase from the 4,916 issued during the same period of 1987.

The 1,367 permits issued in April included 667 oil permits, 178 gas permits, 479 oil and gas permits, 30 injection permits, nine disposal permits and four other permits.

Completions Decreased In April

Texas oil and gas operators reported 178 gas and 555 oil completions in April, according to Railroad Commission Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent. March's total was 240 gas and 689 oil completions.

Gas completions in April included 11 in the Panhandle (District 10).

Oil completions included 57 in the Lubbock area (District 8A) and 29 in the Panhandle (District 10).

Total completions reported in April included 555 oil, 178 gas, and 85 service completions. In March, operators filed 689 oil, 240 gas, and 60 service completion reports.

Operators also reported that 1,057 holes were plugged in April, compared to 1,281 in March. A total of 198 dry holes were reported in April, compared to 457 in March.
