Garza County, along with other West Texas counties, has been exploring for some time the possibilities of an area regional jail facility which would house prisoners awaiting transfer to a Texas Department of Corrections facility, and to date the prospects look bright for a Post location for the regional jail.

In a proposal to the Regional Jail Committee of South Plains Association of Governments, the two governing bodies of Post, the City Council and Commissioners' Court, have agreed to offer to the contractors of the Regional Jail Facility, at no cost to the contractor,

in the future. Several companies are expected to bid on construction of the jail when a meeting is held in the SPAG offices and bids are accepted on June 3. Most of the possible contractors for the proposed regional jail facility have visited Post and inspected the area which has been proposed.

In addition to the Garza County site, proposals have come in to SPAG from Crosbyton, Slaton, and

Earlier, the Abernathy site, representing Lubbock and Hale Counties, appeared to have a slight edge, since this area could be expected to provide about 80 percent of the inmates of the facility, based on past records.

Also, Judge Rod Shaw of Lubbock County has said that the county would prefer a site as close as possible to the Lubbock County jail, since a remote location would

increase the county's costs - and daily costs of keeping inmates in the jail, estimated at \$35 per prisoner per day, is another major factor in the participation of Lubbock County in the project.

However, in recent weeks, the Post site seems to be favored for the facility, due to the cooperation of the city council, Mayor Giles McCrary, the commissioners, and the work done by County Judge

A facility, of 125 beds to start would call for employment of 50 to 75 people. A 200 bed facility would provide employment for 90 people, and a total of 250 employees would be needed if the facility reached a projected total of 500

The facility would be built, financed and operated by a private corporation who would charge involved counties the per diem rate. The firm concerned with jail management would be responsible for personnel and salaries.

The economic result of such a facility would have a great impact on the area - in addition to the payroll generated by the facility, locating the jail in Post would also generate business in other areas.

After the contract is let, construction of the regional jail facility could be completed within 11 months.

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

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## **Area Cattlemen Approve** Beef Referendum 61-9

In recent voting, Garza County beef producers approved the Beef Checkoff Referendum by a vote of 61 to 9.

The 70 local producers were among voters who turned out nationwide to vote on the Tuesday, May 10 referendum.

Results of the nationwide voting will not be known for several days, but a spokesman for the Texas Beef Referendum Association said early returns indicate that the referendum should be approved

in Texas by an 88 percent margin and nationwide by a 78 percent margin.

These percentages, however, are indicators and are not official.

The referendum proposition was concerned with whether or not to continue collecting \$1.00 per head of cattle sold for use by the beef industry.

The Beef Promotion and Research Act of 1985 enabled the beef industry to implement a national, uniform \$1.00 per head checkoff program for beef promotion, research, consumer information, and industry information - effective October 1, 1986.

All cattlemen, regardless of size or type of operation, invest

The \$1.00 checkoff is collected by an auction market, inspector, order buyer, dealer, brand inspector, packer or other buyer each time cattle are sold.

The Act calls for a coordinated program, built on the existing federation of state beefs councils and the Beef Industry Council, along with the 113-member Beef Board, which oversees the program.



The preliminary Texas oil production total for March is 59,818,805 barrels, up from 206 West Main 495-3687 56,262,229 barrels in February.


