Contractors to Submit Bids for Regional Jail Facility at Friday SPAG Meeting

Garza County, along with other West Texas counties, has been exploring for some time the possibilities of an area regional jail facility which would house prisoners awaiting transfer to a Texas Department of Corrections facility, and to date the prospects look bright for a Post location for the regional jail.

In a proposal to the Regional Jail Committee of South Plains Association of Governments, the two governing bodies of Post, the City Council and Commissioners' Court, have agreed to offer to the contractors of the Regional Jail Facility, at no cost to the contractor, 43.93 acres of land owned by the city of Post.

Additionally, it was agreed to bring city-owned water and sewer utilities to the building site, on farm to market road 651 (Spur Highway), at no cost and to assess no fees for permits, tie-ons, etc.

Also, cartage of waste and debris would be provided free of charge during construction.

A report of the firm of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper was included with the proposal to SPAG and pointed out that Post is more than adequate in all areas relating to utilities, both for present proposed use and for much greater expansion

in the future.

Several companies are expected to bid on construction of the jail when a meeting is held in the SPAG offices and bids are accepted on June 3. Most of the possible contractors for the proposed regional jail facility have visited Post and inspected the area which has been proposed.

In addition to the Garza County site, proposals have come in to SPAG from Crosbyton, Slaton, and

Abernathy.

Earlier, the Abernathy site, representing Lubbock and Hale Counties, appeared to have a slight edge, since this area could be expected to provide about 80 percent of the inmates of the facility, based on past records.

Also, Judge Rod Shaw of Lubbock County has said that the county would prefer a site as close as possible to the Lubbock County jail, since a remote location would

increase the county's costs - and daily costs of keeping inmates in the jail, estimated at \$35 per prisoner per day, is another major factor in the participation of Lubbock County in the project.

However, in recent weeks, the Post site seems to be favored for the facility, due to the cooperation of the city council, Mayor Giles McCrary, the commissioners, and the work done by County Judge

'Chief' Runkles Gets Founders Award

The National Order of the Arrow Committee of the Boy Scouts of America has recognized 'Chief' Frank Runkles of Post with a special Founder's Award.

The award honors Runkles for demonstrating to his fellow Arrowmen that he memorializes in his everyday life the spirit of achievement as described by founder E. Urner Goodman and co-founder Carroll A. Edson.

Runkles first began working on the South Plains Order of Arrow organization in the late 1930s and was responsible for naming the local order, Nakona Lodge 150 as well as selecting the buffalo for the totem, which was accepted by the

governing body of the organization.

The Order of the Arrow is a service organization of the Boy Scouts with specific emphasis on maintaining physical elements of camps.

Runkles is the only life time member of the Nakona Lodge and has more than 67 years service to scouting.

When Runkles assumed his job as ranger at Camp Post in the late 1930s, he saw a desperate need for some permanent organization recognizing those scouts who had excelled in camping skills and offering them an opportunity to use those skills in service to the council and scouting program.

He had previously worked in

other councils with similar needs and had established various organizations to meet those needs.

The most effective of these programs, it seemed to Runkles, were those that used a format of the Plains Indian culture as exemplar of the high ideals and fortitude to be expressed in the organization.

During the summer and fall of 1938 Runkles organized the South Plains Area Council (SPAC) Indians. They served basically the same purpose that the Order of the Arrow services today.

The Order of the Arrow was by then a nationally affiliated organization and realizing its ad-

vantages, Runkles recommended to the Council Camping Committee in 1939 that the Order of the Arrow become the official council honor campers association.

Ceremonies Disrupted by Escapee

The Post High School graduation ceremony last Friday night at the stadium was disrupted momentarily about midway through the event by 17 year old Rogelio Esparza who ran onto the field approaching the speaker's podium before being apprehended by law enforcement officers.

Family and friends of graduating seniors watched the scene develop during the presentation of scholarships.

Esparza had been arrested a few minutes earlier in front of the Post Elementary School on West 8th St.

He entered the stadium through the open gate on the northeast side, then ran south toward the southeast end zone gate and out-ran the pursuing law enforcement officers.

Esparza, whose hands were cuffed behind him, came within five yards of the front row of graduating seniors before Sam Butler vaulted from the stands and brought the young man down to the turf.

Butler, a recent graduate of the South Plains Association of Government (SPAG) law enforcement school and a certified peace officer, helped Garza County Sheriff's deputy Kirk Harris subdue Esparza.

Texas DPS trooper Jerry Cannon, who had earlier assisted the Garza County Sheriff's Department in arresting Esparza on suspicion of driving while intoxicated, helped complete the capture.

Before being subdued Esparza was yelling obscenities and continued until he was inside the DPS patrol car.

Esparza was charged with DWI and aggravated assault on a peace officer. While being processed at the jail, the young man pulled a boot knife, threatening the officers. He has been released on bonds of \$10,000 and \$750. He recently moved to Post from Pecos.

The audience first noticed something was going on when a car

traveling north on the Gail Highway began honking the horn as it passed the stadium, with its passengers yelling obscenities.

Shortly afterward sheriff's deputies Harris and Maurice Herridge whizzed by south bound, in pursuit, then returned northbound.

They stopped the vehicle, driven by Esparza, in front of the Elementary School and called Cannon for support.

As Cannon went to the driver's side of the vehicle, Esparza released the seat belt, unlocked the door and bolted down the street, with his hands cuffed behind him.

Those at the ceremony applauded the law enforcement officers as they

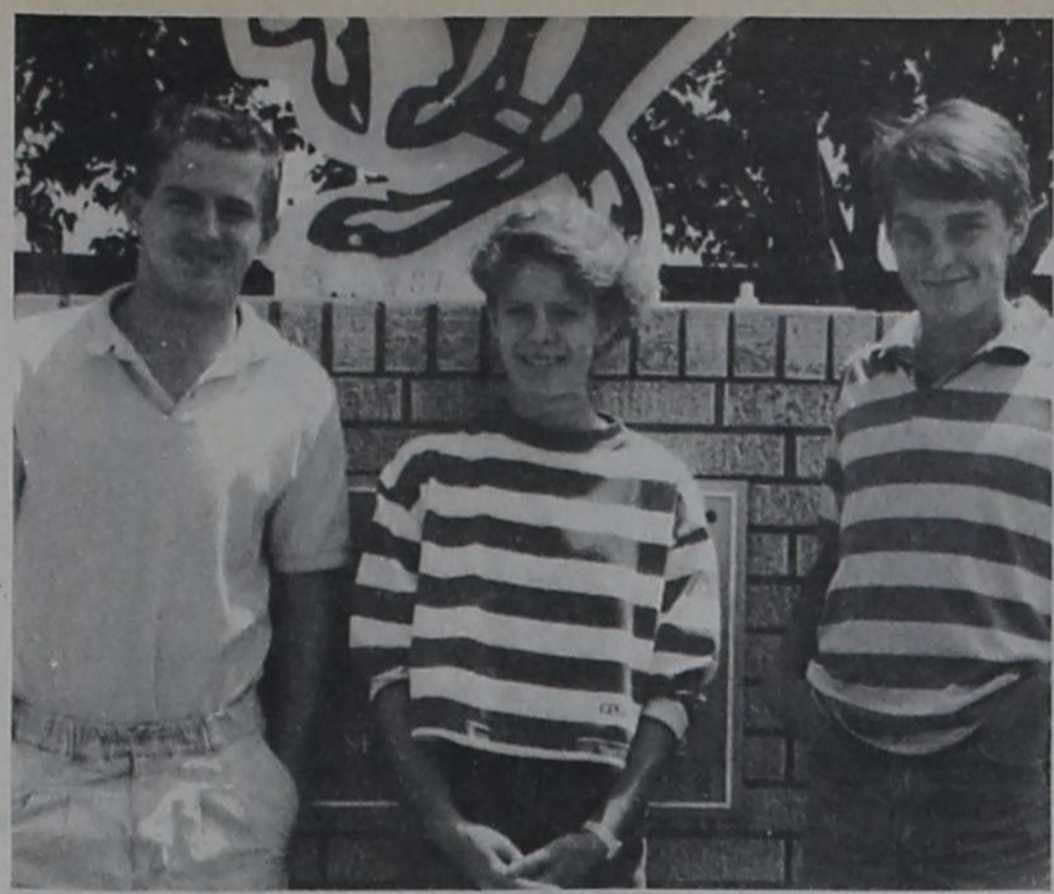

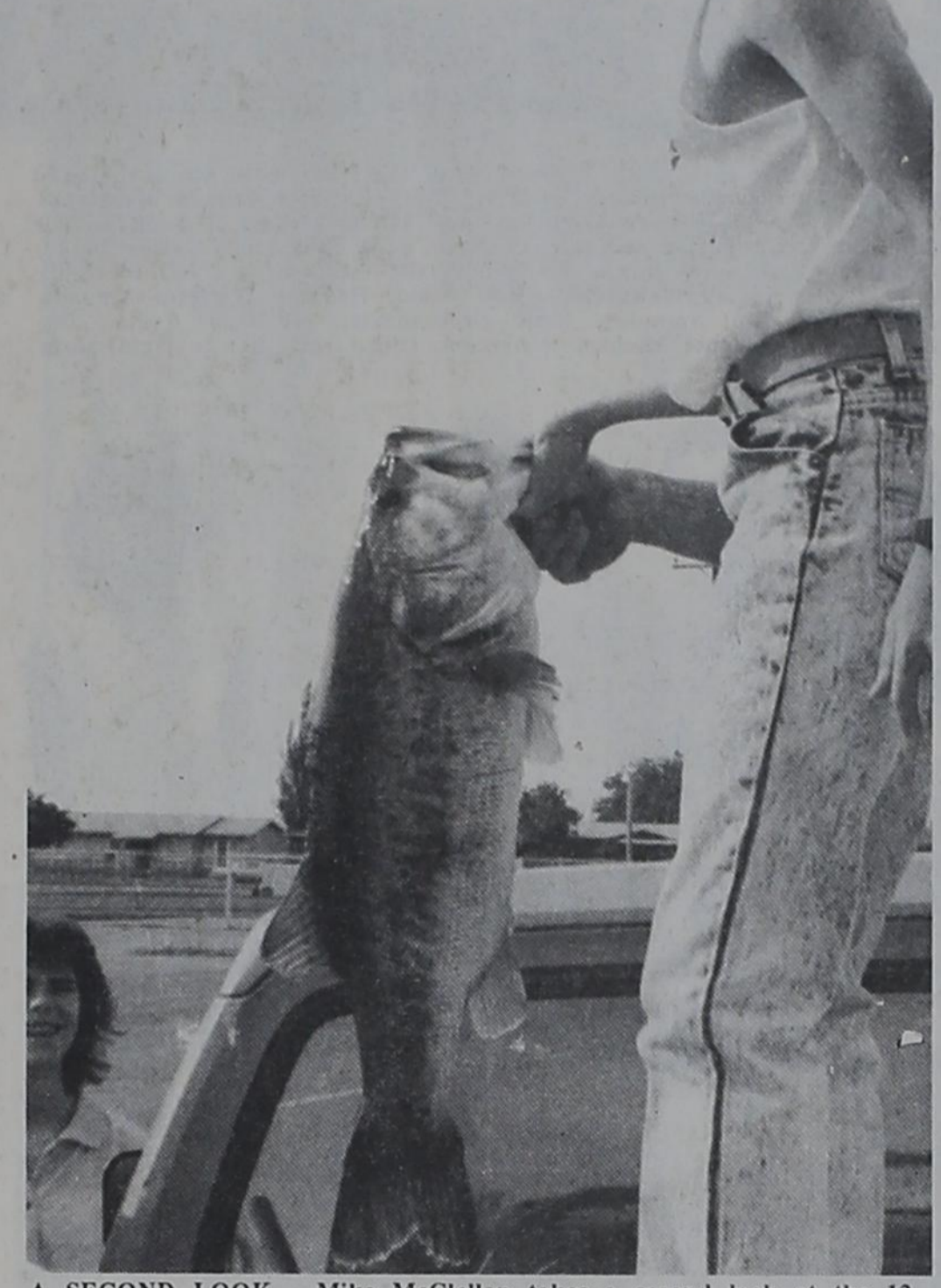

Texas crude oil production averaged 1,929,639 barrels daily in March, according to preliminary figures released by Railroad Commission Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent.

This figure compares with preliminary February production of 1,940,077 barrels daily. Final production reports for February indicated average production at 1,953,233 barrels daily.

The preliminary Texas oil production total for March is 59,818,805 barrels, up from 56,262,229 barrels in February.
