A Snyder woman was killed Wednesday evening, June 1, in a one-vehicle accident that occurred on South U.S. 84 approximately five miles outside the Post city

Byra Vay Strong, 54, of Snyder was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident by Garza County Justice of the Peace, Precinct 4, Dee Justice.

Mrs. Strong was the only occupant of a 1978 Toyota traveling northwest on U.S. 84.

According to witnesses, the vehicle veered off the road and into the median. In an attempt to regain control, Mrs. Strong evidently over-corrected and the vehicle slid sideways across the highway, hit the embankment and became air-

Mrs. Strong was ejected from the car through the passenger's door as the car overturned. According to reports, she was not wearing a seat belt.

Control Bagworms Now Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began in early May on the South Plains this year. Hatching is usually completed in about three weeks. Insecticide control is most effective in late May and early June when the bagworms are small.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves. They soon begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to sec. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about 1 1/2 inches long. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the female lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1500 eggs.

Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest. But if bagworms were present on the plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring.

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion, dylox and orthene. The biological insecticide Bacillus thuriengensis can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. The addition of a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps adhere the insecticide to the treated trees and shrubs. Always read and follow label instructions when applying in-

packers and retailers. An evening banquet will feature an address by Martin Jorgensen, a South Dakota rancher who was named the 1988 "Cattle Businessman of the Year" by the National

Cattlemen's Association, The second day of the conference will focus on producing cattle to meet packer specifications and production and marketing options for

cattlemen. The conference will be at Rudder Center on the Texas A&M University campus, with the opening session set for 9 a.m. on July 7. The conference is being hosted by Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Comptroller Says 90-91 **Funds Okay**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said recently that the state should have enough money to continue current levels of state services in its 1990-91 budget period without new taxes.

That will be true, Bullock said, even though \$972 million in temporary taxes, fees and onetime bookkeeping deals adopted by the last Legislature are allowed to ex-

This was Bullock's first revenue estimate for the '90-91 budget which the legislature will write when it convenes next January.

Bullock said that sales tax growth of 7.9 percent per year and motor vehicles sales tax growth of 6.2 percent per year will boot '90-91 major fund revenues to \$29.9 billion, a 4.8 percent increase over

The sales tax gain will be spurred by an increase in consumer spending and an economic recovery led by manufacturing, Bullock

He noted that the sales tax and motor vehicle tax "today are twothirds of all revenue, compared to one-half of tax revenue just five short years ago."

Natural gas tax revenue will be up 5.7 percent per year in '90-91, but oil taxes will gain only 1.2 per-cent per year as production continues to decline, Bullock said, even though average prices will rise to \$20 a barrel in 1990 and \$21,61 in

Bullock said there will be sufficient money to pay for current services even if the state loses \$1.9 billion in court cases challenging the corporate franchise tax, insurance tax and utility taxes.

He said the revenue forecast could change, of course, if there is a national recession, a sharp drop in oil prices over a period of time or further challenges to state taxes. He did not put a price tag on any of these possibilities.
