One-Car Accident Claims One Death

A Snyder woman was killed Wednesday evening, June 1, in a one-vehicle accident that occurred on South U.S. 84 approximately five miles outside the Post city limits.

Byra Vay Strong, 54, of Snyder was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident by Garza County Justice of the Peace, Precinct 4, Dee Justice.

Mrs. Strong was the only occupant of a 1978 Toyota traveling northwest on U.S. 84.

According to witnesses, the vehicle veered off the road and into the median. In an attempt to regain control, Mrs. Strong evidently over-corrected and the vehicle slid sideways across the highway, hit the embankment and became airborne.

Mrs. Strong was ejected from the car through the passenger's door as the car overturned. According to reports, she was not wearing a seat belt.

A Saturday evening tour included visits to the Iwo Jima Memorial, the Jefferson Memorial, Kennedy Center, and the Lincoln Memorial.

Sunday morning will be spent at National Geographic, the Naval Museum, "The Awakening."

Later, a trip to the Smithsonian Institute will include lunch at the Art Gallery Cafeteria and visits to the National Gallery of Art, the Air & Space Museum, the Natural History Museum and the American History Museum.

Monday, June 6, the group will travel to Annapolis for a Naval Academy tour and will visit the National Cathedral.

Part of the afternoon will be spent in a visit to the National Zoo, lunch, and a return visit to the Smithsonian.

The Post group will leave Washington Monday night and return home very early Tuesday morning, June 7.

Lubbock Lakes Site Tour Offered by Tech Museum

Tours of the Lubbock Lake Landmark, an author's lecture and an autograph party will be offered at The Museum, Texas Tech University, 4th and Indiana in Lubbock on Sunday, June 12.

Dr. Eileen Johnson, director of the internationally significant archaeological site, the Lubbock Lake Landmark, will discuss the site and give a slide-lecture at 1:30 p.m., followed by an autograph party for her book "Lubbock Lake."

Following Dr. Johnson's presentation, tours of the Lubbock

Lake Landmark will leave from the Museum at 2:45 and 3:45. Transportation will be furnished and there is no admission charge for the day's activities.

In October, an on-site interpretive center and research facility are to be built at Lubbock Lake Landmark by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department to make the site more accessible to visitors.

The Museum will continue its research at the site, and be responsible for the on-going educational program and serve as a repository for all artifacts discovered at the site.

Payton Attends 4-H Roundup

Steve Payton of Post will be among the more than 2,000 4-H members, adult leaders, friends of 4-H, and county Extension agents who will gather on the campus of Texas A&M University June 7-8 for the annual Texas 4-H Roundup.

Steve, a Senior 4-H member, will present a method demonstration in the safety area with his presentation, "Safety in the Home."

Competition in method demonstrations and other contests will command attention the second day of Roundup. 4-H'ers competing in these contests must have won at the county and district levels to qualify for state competition.

Contest winners will be recognized at a special assembly in Rudder Auditorium that evening at 8 p.m.

During the Roundup, 4-H'ers will be participating in 40 different contests and events, ranging from demonstrations in consumer and mechanical skills to livestock and horse judging and public speaking, said Gayle Hall, 4-H specialist with the Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service.

Roundup activities will begin with the State 4-H Food Show the first day.

An opening assembly that evening in Rudder Auditorium will

officially kick off Roundup activities.

A highlight will be the recognition of certain individuals and businesses for their longtime support of 4-H, and the presentation of scholarships totaling more than \$500,000 to 93 outstanding 4-H members.

The scholarships are being funded by the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation.

Also, Dr. Perry Adkisson, chancellor of the Texas A&M University System, will be recognized as a National 4-H Alumni Award recipient.

Comptroller Says 90-91 Funds Okay

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said recently that the state should have enough money to continue current levels of state services in its 1990-91 budget period without new taxes.

That will be true, Bullock said, even though \$972 million in temporary taxes, fees and onetime bookkeeping deals adopted by the last Legislature are allowed to expire.

This was Bullock's first revenue estimate for the '90-91 budget which the legislature will write when it convenes next January.

Bullock said that sales tax growth of 7.9 percent per year and motor vehicles sales tax growth of 6.2 percent per year will boost '90-91 major fund revenues to \$29.9 billion, a 4.8 percent increase over '88-89.

The sales tax gain will be spurred by an increase in consumer spending and an economic recovery led by manufacturing, Bullock said.

He noted that the sales tax and motor vehicle tax "today are two-thirds of all revenue, compared to one-half of tax revenue just five short years ago."

Natural gas tax revenue will be up 5.7 percent per year in '90-91, but oil taxes will gain only 1.2 percent per year as production continues to decline, Bullock said, even though average prices will rise to \$20 a barrel in 1990 and \$21.61 in 1991.

Bullock said there will be sufficient money to pay for current services even if the state loses \$1.9 billion in court cases challenging the corporate franchise tax, insurance tax and utility taxes.

He said the revenue forecast could change, of course, if there is a national recession, a sharp drop in oil prices over a period of time or further challenges to state taxes. He did not put a price tag on any of these possibilities.

Bullock noted that even though the revenue picture is bright, "it has no money to handle any increased spending by the Legislature."
