## **Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit to be at** Garza Memorial Hospital

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Post at the Garza Memorial Hospital, Wednesday, June 29 to assist in the early detection of cancer.

The screening mammogram is \$55, payable either by cash, check, Visa, Mastercard or American Ex-

Appointments for the screening may be made by calling 495-2828. According to the American Cancer Society, one out of 10 women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as

the result of breast cancer. Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent, five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and The American College of Radiology. These guidelines are:

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years, depending on breast type and risk factor. III. 50 years of age and over - An

annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

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





Rates Simpler, Many Lower For many years, figuring the proper rate for shipping goods by truck has been tough for both trucking companies and shippers. No longer. Using authority given us be Senate Bill 595, we trimmed some 1,500 pages of tariff information to 68. These easy-toread rate tables help everybody in the transportation chain from shipper to consumer. Shippers can easily find the most cost-effective

trative costs as they calculate rates, and consumers benefit from this increase in efficiency through lower product prices. In fact, under our new base rates, the average charge for shipments weighing 10,000 pounds or more has dropped 28

Requirements Set When the legislature wanted to know more about commercial vehicles in Texas and expressed concern about their safety, it asked the Commission to undertake a massive registration program. Literally hundreds of thousands of commercial vehicles never before regulated were placed under Commission supervision. Our job was to define what a commercial vehicle is, which vehicles must be registered with the Commission, and what insurance coverage vehicle owners must maintain.

It was a tough assignment. Should every pickup owned by a small businessman or farmer or rancher be registered and forced to carry expensive extra liability insurance? After months of public hearings and comment, we drafted a set of registration and insurance rules that met the requirements of the legislature without unduly burdening small business and agricultural interests.

The new rules say owners of vehicles weighing over 10,000 pounds which transport property in furtherance of a commercial enterprise" must register them with the Commission. No additional liability insurance is required beyond that already mandated by the Texas Safety Responsibility Law. Operators of larger commercial vehicles weighing over 48,000 pounds must also register them and maintain a minimum of \$500,000 combined single limit liability coverage to protect the public.

We exempted farm and ranch vehicles, vehicles belonging to certain cooperatives, and certain other vehicles from the registration and \$500,000 liability requirements.



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
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ware of backyard pools and spas in the neighborhood. Your child could wander off and fall in.

Never let older children swim in unsupervised areas like quarries, canals or ponds. Older kids are at risk of drowning when they overestimate their ability or underestimate how deep the water is.

Teach your swimmers four key rules: (1) Swim with a buddy, never alone; (2) Don't dive into unknown bodies of water - jump feet first to avoid hitting your head on a shallow bottom; (3) Don't push or jump on others; (4) Be prepared for an emergency.

Selecting A

Swimming Program When your child is ready for organized swimming lessons, what should you look for in a program? Your options may include those classes offered through parks and recreation, YMCA, the Red Cross, community centers, or private in-

Talk with other parents and children to find out which programs they've enjoyed, since the "fun factor" will be a great motivator for your child. Observe classes if possible and talk with the instructor before enrolling your child.

Instructors should, of course, be certified by the Red Cross. But there's no certification for how well the teacher relates to children. Look for the teacher who is patient, friendly and playful with the chil-

Ask the instructor about the curriculum of water activities. Many activities look like games, but encourage children to participate at their own level.

Check the organization of the class. Are children grouped by age or skill? Being with agemates may encourage children to try new things in the water. Being with swimmers who are much more advanced can be too intimidating.

How big is the class? The Red Cross recommends one instructor for every 10 children. If your child hasn't done much swimming or is afraid of the water, a smaller class will be better.

Note the flotation device policy. Greeting the guests was the bride- fresh flower arrangement in the If you're considering a beginners program which doesn't use flotation devices, the student-to-teacher ration should be very small.

How long is the class? About 30 to 40 minutes in the water is enough for most children. Also ask how the instructor deals with children who become cold or tired be-

fore the lesson is over. Consider the facilities too. The water should be an inviting temperature in the low 80s. The locker room should also be well-

maintained, ventilated and warm. Swimming is a potentially lifesaving activity as well as a life-enhancing sport. Help your child learn and enjoy swimming by selecting a suitable program.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of 10 women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent, five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

The Mobile Breast **Cancern Detection** Unit will be in Post Wednesday, June 29.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptons of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and The American College of Radiology. These guidelines are:

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years, depending on breast type and risk

III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate infamily history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$55. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.



Watch Work Habits **During Hot Weather** 

Hot, humid weather which typifies Texas summers can be dangerous to your health, particularly if

you work outdoors. Outdoor workers often-suffer from such physical disorders as heatstroke, heat exhaustion, heat cramps and fainting, said Thomas D. Valco, safety specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricul-

tural Extension Service. Such disorders occur most often when workers do not take time to adjust to the heat, Valco said. Summer hot spells, the first few days of work for new workers, and the first day back on the job after a vacation or illness are likely to be times when workers suffer the most

from heat-related problems. The combination of high temperatures and high relative humidity can be especially dangerous, said the safety specialist.

For example, a temperature of 100 degrees F. and a relative humidity of 50 percent have the same effect on the body as if the temperature reached 120 degrees. The human body cools itself by the evaporation of perspiration, but high relative humidity retards evaporation or perspiration from the skin, Valco said. To avoid potential health prob-

lems during the hot summer weather, he offered these suggestions for farmers and ranchers and others who work outdoors: --- Rest periodically in a cool

place; rest is most beneficial when breaks are short but frequent. --- Drink fluids every 15 to 20

minutes. Water intake must equal perspiration loss, so drink more than enough to satisfy thirst. Rely on meals to replace salt. --- Wear loose garments of thin

cotton fabric to enhance air circulation near the skin and to allow body heat to escape. --- Slow down work speed or distribute the workload evenly over the

course of the day. --- If possible, postpone nonessential work for cooler peri-

--- Transfer workers to help from

other jobs or obtain extra helpers.

Younger and more physically fit workers might take over. --- Where possible, shield workers from equipment heat sources, use exhaust fans near heat sources, and provide open windows and cooling fans for maximum air flow

around individuals. --- Provide maximum opportunities for outside workers to work in

well ventilated, shaded areas. Heeding these suggestions and keeping tabs on the daily temperature and relative humidity can go a long way to preventing heat related disorders during summer weather, said Valco.

scofflaws. Senate Bill 595 gives up the authority to assess administrative penalties of up to \$10,000 for violation of the Motor Carrier Act or Commission rules. We've informed carriers and shippers of the penalties for wrongdoing and have emphasized that we will deal harshly with willful violators. Indeed, we have already assessed a number of penalties.

Summary As you can see, the face of transportation in Texas is ever-changing. As new legislation is adopted, new challenges arise. No matter what the changes, you can be sure of one thing. The Commission remains dedicated to making the state's transportation industry efficient, effective, and safe.




